The 2020 United States Census is fast approaching. The Census is a headcount of every person living in the United States and takes place every 10 years. Every household needs to participate to ensure the government represents all people.

A little background info - the Census is part of the U.S. Department of Commerce and is required and mandated by our U.S. Constitution. The census determines the number of seats each state has in the House of Representatives, a process called apportionment. The Census also is used to determine and distribute the billions of dollars in federal funds to state and local governments. These statistics gathered from the census will create a profile of the type of income in our community which will determine the amount of federal funding Painesville receives over the next 10 years.

It's important to know that the 2020 census form will not include the question of citizenship. Information about the 2020 census will be mailed to most addresses beginning in mid-March. You will be able to respond either online, by mail or by phone. The U.S. Census Bureau has taken strong precautions to keep all information, including online responses, secure.

The census questioner asks for people's names along with other information such as total income. All information gathered by the census is completely confidential and protected by federal law, meaning your answers cannot be used against you. Please, be counted, our city will be better for it.

Painesville and the Covid-19 Coronavirus

As the country and world reacts to the Covid-19 pandemic, it is important for us as a community practice healthy illness prevention habits to avoid the spread of diseases. This is an ever-changing situation that we are working with the Lake County General Health District on. While we cannot predict what tomorrow holds, we can help in prevention. Please take the following steps seriously:

1. Practice proper illness precautions

Wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Cover your mouth with a tissue or sleeve when sneezing or coughing. Avoid touching your face with unwashed hands. Practice proper hygiene, get plenty of sleep, drink water and have a healthy diet,

2. Stay home if you are sick

We cannot emphasize this enough, if you think you may be ill, stay home. You are doing more harm to your friends, coworkers and neighbors than good by going out when you are sick and infecting those around you.

3. Clean "high-touch" areas

High-touch surfaces include counters, tabletops, doorknobs, bathroom fixtures, toilets, phones, keyboards, tablets or any surface that may come into contact with body fluids. Make sure there is proper ventilation when using these products.

4. Limit Social Interaction

practice Please social distancing. Live your normal life but try to keep your distance from others. The health district recommends six feet between people. Avoid handshakes, hugs and other forms of contact. The CDC and Ohio Governor recommend avoiding mass gatherings and to maintain your distance at all times.

And finally, avoid unnecessary travel. Order online, cook at home, take advantage of curbside pick up, watch movies on a streaming device, call a friend, etc. Now is not the time for unnecessary trips to the store or visiting friends and family in other areas. Stick close to home and utilize technology to help combat the spread of illness.

Trash & Yard Waste Pickup Reminders

The City's contracted hauler for refuse/trash service is Republic Services. Each week, Republic collects residential trash that is placed in a container on the curb. A separate blue container is provided by Republic for recycling, which is picked up every other week on the same day as your trash collection.

Starting April 1, Republic will also begin picking up yard waste the same days as recycling. Please note it is not picked up

each week, but every other week like recycling. Yard waste must be containerized, bagged or tied in bundles not exceeding 4 feet in length. Limbs and branches cannot exceed 4 inches diameter.

There is also an internal crisis team doing daily (sometimes hourly) updates between city staff and residents to ensure safety. This team includes the City Manager, Assistant City Manager, Police Chief and staff, Fire Chief and staff, Communication and Coordinator Human Resources. All relevant updates will be posted on the city's social media sites (@CityofPainesville) and online at www.painesville.

Along with the LCGHD, we are collaborating with the Lake County Emergency Management Agency, the Governor of the State of Ohio, the county Police Chiefs, the county Fire Chiefs, and all the Mayors/Managers of Lake County to make informed decisions.

Will city services be affected?

Painesville plans to continue to provide all services to its customers as is. However, we evaluate our staffing numbers daily. In an event that there is a serious outbreak, essential personnel will still be here to provide essential services to our residents like fire, police, water, sewer, electric and communication. Non-essential personnel will be sent home. We will continue to use open communication via social media, Continued on page 2



Bankruptcy 101:

Overcoming the Fear of Filing Bankruptcy

Filing bankruptcy is scary on many fronts. I know because I'm a bankruptcy lawyer and I talk to bankruptcy clients every day. I also have had financial problems like most everyone else and I was scared at the time. I thought about filing bankruptcy. I must admit it was a very frightening thought. I really believed that my life for all practical purposes would end in humiliation and despair. I believed that everyone would look at me and talk and snicker. That it would be in the newspapers and my parents would disown me and that I would die lonely because no one would ever speak to me again. Forget about ever getting another date. They probably wouldn't even let me adopt a cat.

At that time, I couldn't put my finger on why the thought of filing Bankruptcy was so HORRIFYING. Since that time, I have had the opportunity to speak with many people who have gone through the bankruptcy process and now I know why the idea of bankruptcy is so scary. I also know now why it is such an irony that the solution to so many scary things causes us such apprehension. The reason is simple. It is an assault on our pride. A blow to our ego.

There is no other reason to fear such a remarkably effective solution to real tragedy (like, say, having your wages garnished, being sued, losing your home, not having money to eat, dying from stress, going insane, etc.) Pride is one of the seven deadly sins because it causes us to do things that we should not. It also causes us NOT TO DO THINGS THAT WE SHOULD.

Based on my conversations with many people I have concluded that bankruptcy is looked at in the negative. I know people are reading this last line and thinking "duh-yeah!" But in my world, I don't think it is so straight forward. Because I see fearful, distressed, stressed out, suicidal, miserable, guilt ridden, angry people made better by bankruptcy. Not just a little better, either. A lot better. The "I can't believe it, but I actually have peace of mind!" kind of better. I run into people at the grocery store who tell me life has never been so good. I wouldn't normally believe them because I knew them. They were our clients. They were people who came into our office eight months earlier depressed, hopeless, despondent, fearful and beaten. But now their faces, their demeanor and their attitudes are hardly recognizable. They have been restored to sanity.

They have been healed and they know peace. That past life that was so unmanageable, painful and, seemingly, spiraling downward out of control did not crash and burn. Something took the controls and managed to pull it back up seconds before the fiery fateful collisionmoments before they came to that dark place that is not known but dreaded. That something was the law of Bankruptcy!

It was probably something greater that took them to the acceptance that bankruptcy was the only thing that could right their lives at this point. But that is beyond this discussion. Everybody's bottom is at a different level. The only question is how much suffering a person endures and makes their family endure until they embrace the solution. I am a simple man. I think financial problems have a simple solution. That solution is bankruptcy.

So, no, you are not a loser if you need bankruptcy and use it. You will be a winner. Trust me, I know. We are not dealing with kids or irresponsible adults who went crazy at the mall and want to skate out of debt. Not in this world. Not now. In these times, people are struggling to eat; to drive to work; to live. And, no, you are not the only one who is in this much financial trouble. You only think you are because they don't make television sitcoms about the pretty people living in California hanging out at the beach filling out their bankruptcy petition. YOUR FINANCIAL PROBLEM IS TEMPORARY. YOU WILL RECOVER. You just need a little breathing room. If you let it cause you health problems- those may be permanent. General Motors is a prime example. They went bankrupt in 2009. In 2011 they made record profits.

So, what's my point? Don't listen to other people's opinions because they are only parading their ignorance. Don't be proud because pride is the mask of a fool. Don't be afraid because there is a solution to financial distress. Don't think you're the only one because that's just other people lying to you. Don't be idle because if you are, you'll never be free from the financial craziness, harassment, emotional turmoil and debt collector head games. And do be positive because winning is a state of mind not a state of financial wealth. Get your peace of mind back!


