The President's Message - July 2019

CELEBRATE!

CELEBRATE: (verb) acknowledge (a significant or happy day or event) with a social gathering or enjoyable activity.

Recently in my daily Bible reading I read Ezra 6:16 (ESV): "And the people of Israel, the priests and the Levites, and the rest of the returned exiles, **celebrated** the dedication of this house of God with joy." How did they celebrate? Verse 17 tells us: "For the dedication they offered 100 bulls, 200 sheep, and 400 lambs as sacrifices, and 12 goats as offerings for sin, one for each tribe of Israel."

What a great day to celebrate! King Cyrus of Persia allowed the Israelites to leave their exile in Babylonia and return to Judah to rebuild the temple and take the captured temple treasures with them. They returned to Jerusalem and worked at rebuilding the temple. It took four years and was completed in 520 BC. "They...celebrated...with joy." The dedication certainly was a time to celebrate – the broken temple of God had been rebuilt.

Celebrating is good. We will celebrate the 4th of July. Benjamin Franklin on July 3, 1776 wrote: "The colonies have separated from the tyranny of England, and we can finally stand together as the newlyformed United States of America! On this July 4, 1776, I, Benjamin Franklin, aka Poor Richard, aka Benjo Freezus, set my sights towards the future of our great nation and hope that future generations will remember to celebrate America's independence." Franklin got his wish. We continue to celebrate in 2019.

During the summer, we celebrate in so many different ways. We celebrate family events - reunions, weddings, wedding anniversaries, birthdays, class reunions, etc. This summer our Synod is celebrating 3 events. The LWML just finished celebrating their 38th Biennial Convention in Mobile, AL with over 3000 coming together. Over 25,000 youth will be in Minneapolis in July. During the five days of the Gathering, youth will spend time together in God's word, worship, service, and fellowship with others. Under the theme "JOY:FULLY LUTHERAN – Rejoice. Pray. Give Thanks.", our Synod will gather in convention in Tampa for the 67th Convention. There certainly is a time for business and worship but also a wonderful time for many to reconnect and celebrate with old friends and classmates.

The Lord's Supper is a celebration of Christian fellowship. As it states in the Formula of Concord: "After the Last Supper, as he was about to begin his bitter passion and death for our sin, in this sad, last hour of his life, this truthful and almighty Lord, our Creator and Redeemer Jesus Christ, selected his words with great deliberation and care in ordaining and instituting this most venerable sacrament, which was to be observed with great reverence and obedience until the end of the world and which was to be an abiding memorial of his bitter passion and death and of all his blessings, a seal of the new covenant, a comfort for all sorrowing hearts, and a true bond and union of Christians with Christ their head and with one another (FC SO VII, 44)." This celebration takes place in many churches every Sunday.

There are church celebrations as well. St John's, Edgar is celebrating their 150th anniversary. Seven congregations are celebrating the installation of new pastors that just graduated from the seminary. Two new pastors are being installed – pulpits are being filled. St. Paul, Pine River (Merrill) just threw a party for their neighborhood – "Party on P"!

Celebrating and getting together is not only good for families but also for the church. I believe it is good for congregations to plan for some type of celebration, to bring the congregation and neighborhood together. Find a reason to celebrate – mission festival; anniversary of your pastor, teacher or DCE; church anniversary; dedication of something; VBS or whatever your creative mind can imagine. It takes some planning and work but the celebration for the congregation is worth it. Celebrate!

"This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it" (Ps 118.24 ESV). We are God's baptized people. We are sinful people who have been redeemed by the blood of Christ on Calvary and through faith in Him we will be saved. We have reason... so plan your celebrations & CELEBRATE!



NWD Church Workers' Annual Golf Outing



Serve in Peru?



Counselor Corner

THE SHIFTING SAND OF ADDICTION

It is the desire of the human heart to have a stable life. We aspire to have a solid foundation for a meaningful life. God desires the same--with love as the most significant element of such a fulfilled life.

Addiction is the antithesis of such a life. As a progressive condition, addiction steals stability, solidarity and meaning. Love is its greatest casualty. Indeed the destruction of love is a key, defining aspect of this progressive, corrupting force—

"When the relationship to the addictive experience brings harm to love relationships repeatedly."

This brings to mind a paraphrase of Romans 13:10—"In love, no one gets hurt." Addiction progressively brings harm, especially to close relationships. Comments like the following now apply—

"He use to be a loving husband...he was a great father. Now his absence brings relief."

The addictive behavior becomes the "god" that is "worshipped." Life is defined by the sacrifices made to support that which holds no gain. Pain is the replacement.

There is also an eroded relationship with Triune God. His judgment is feared. Like Adam---there is a lot of "hiding" going on (Genesis 3:8b). Addiction has a central, spiritual core.

The ultimate outcome of active addiction is death, in its many forms. There is the "death" of relationships... "death" of self-esteem... "death" of hobbies and interests... "death" of hope. Physical "death" is the final loss for all-too-many addicts.

Yet there is an alternative. The addict's life can be transformed. Stability, solidarity and meaning can be restored. Love can be regained. God plays a central role.

A pivotal, summary verse is found in Romans 12:2—

"Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will."

Core elements of this God-guided work are—honesty, humility and hard work. Repentance, confession and absolution is central as God holds #1 status.

"Active Stewardship in the Rural Parish"

Where I serve, people are conservative. I don't mean that they watch Fox News and listen to Rush Limbaugh (although plenty of them do). I'm talking about the deep-down conservatism that always asks the question, "Pastor, if we've been doing it this way for so many years, why would you ask us to change? Is the risk of messing up what's been working just fine really worth whatever little marginal gain you think your new way of doing things will give us?"

That question may not always be put into so many words, but after 13 years in rural ministry I've learned that that's what people are thinking pretty much any time I make a suggestion for doing something new or different in our church. And I've come to appreciate the question. People are most conservative about the things they know best — and for good reason. Human life is short, and we humans are slow learners. The traditions we've been given by previous generations represent the distilled wisdom of the ages. So it's a good question.

But wisdom, alas, is not the only thing handed down by our fathers, nor is it the only thing we are preparing to hand down to our children. If we're not careful, we can also pass on our bad ideas, our laziness and our mistakes.


So, to turn to the topic at hand, how are things in your congregation financially? How's the stewardship of the people? Do you find yourself running short in the summer months? Do you run bulletin announcements asking people to dig a little deeper and put a little more in the plate to catch up to the budget in October, November and December? Do you worry about closing the school, cutting a staff position, getting the roof fixed, or even being able to afford your own pastor?

I get around the Synod a lot, and I can tell you that I've rarely found a rural parish that doesn't struggle with things like that. Indeed, that's how I got into stewardship ministry in the first place: I had to face those challenges in the parishes I still serve.

So if what we're doing is not working out, maybe it is time to learn and change. Maybe there are deeper, even more conservative traditions to follow when it comes to our stewardship: instructions from God's Word on how to be active, faithful, generous, Gospel-centered stewards of God's good and gracious gifts.


