May Program Presentation: U.S. Glass and Tiffin

Presenters included: Christian Bordelon, Keely Stockman, Lou Read, Gloria and Ronnie Broadbent, Carol LeBell, and Astrid Muissett.

Christian Bordelon began the program with a history of US Glass. US Glass was a group of 15 or more companies that combined in 1891 in Pittsburg PA and were located in the former Ripley Glass facility. It was designed to help with supply and demand during trying time for these companies.

After combining they built two new plants. One was an automatic facility and was constructed at <u>Gas City</u>, <u>Indiana</u>. The other was a hand-worked glass operation and was in <u>Tiffin</u>, <u>Ohio</u>. The plants all received a letter designation.

In 1892, A.J. Beatty joined the huge glass conglomerate. From that point forward, the Tiffin Plant was referred to as Factory R. Tiffin Factory R produced mostly pressed glass until 1914 when the tide started to change and blown glassware was becoming more popular. Tiffin produced quality glassware with delicate etchings. They were known for their use of color.

In 1938 US Glass office moved from Pittsburg PA to Tiffin OH.

The Gas City branch produced machine made kitchenware and dinnerware in colored glass throught the 1930s. The Pittsburgh facilities were known for their decorating of lamps, tableware and large line of colored glassware and crystal.

Tiffin's popularity kept US Glass afloat until 1963. The other locations had already been slowly closing leaving Tiffin Factory R and the Glassport PA location as the last ones to close in 1963.
