

Grace & Peace : From the Pastor's Desk

At one of the meetings I've attended within the past few months the idea of congregational vitality came up. Is the congregation thriving? Some of the marks of a thriving congregation as outlined by the Episcopal Church and the Presbyterian Church are: Lifelong Discipleship Formation, Intentional Authentic Evangelism, Outward Incarnational Focus, Empowering Servant Leadership, Spirit-Inspired Worship, Caring Relationships, and Ecclesial Health. I'd like to look at these seven areas in the newsletter and I am going to ask you to give me ideas on how we

can improve in the areas that we may come up short.

Yes, if you're wondering, this is the same article as last month. I received no remarks about this article. Either you believe our church is perfect, or, maybe you skipped it when the ELCA wasn't mentioned as a source for the characteristics mentioned? Since our church isn't perfect and the denominations mentioned are mainstream denominations, there is validity to the article. Please consider once again the area you believe our church needs improvement and shoot me an email at pastorkaren.immanuel@gmail.com, phone me, or speak to me in person."

Lifelong Discipleship Formation relates to how we claim and proclaim our identity as followers of Christ. Our actions and involvement in the community, giving to others, worshipping and practicing the teachings of Christ are markers, as are attending Bible study and growing in faith. (See Romans 8:1-17, Deuteronomy 11:13-21, Luke 8:11-18)

Intentional Authentic Evangelism is intentional sharing of the Good News of the gospel. It is connected to lifelong Christian Formation because it is through intentional spiritual practices in the faith community that we join God's story with our story and share how they interrelate. (See Psalm 96, John 3:11-21, 2 Corinthians 4:7)

Outward Incarnational Focus is being willing to share the Good News with anyone, anywhere. We cannot contain the transformational saving love of God through Jesus Christ to the inside of a church when the world is in need and hurting. Christ is already present wherever we go, we join with him to step out of our comfort zone. (See Matthew 8:18-23, Luke 9:1-6, 2 Peter 1:1-21)

Empowering Servant Leadership is using our spiritual gifts to serve the Lord doing our part as a member of the body of Christ. (See 1 Samuel 3:2, John 13:1-20, Ephesians 4:1-17)

Spirit-Inspired Worship brings us into the awesome presence of God where we hear the Word proclaimed and share as the Sacraments are celebrated. It is a time of teaching transformation conviction, where we are challenged and called into a deeper relationship with God and with

one another. (See Exodus 3:1-6, 1 Chronicles 16:7-36; Isaiah 6:1-13, Philippians 2:1-11)

Caring Relationships go beyond the being together with our friends it is an expression of true agape love, seeing all people the way Jesus sees them. It allows people to be real in sharing their story. It is confronting conflict, where conversations of forgiveness and reconciliation are experienced. It is a place of vulnerability and trust. It is about meeting all people of God where they are and sharing our Savior, Jesus Christ.)(See John 8:1-2, Acts 6:1-7, Galatians 6:1-10)

Ecclesial Health is about 1) why we gather as a church community 2) how we practice being church together. It is asking, "Are we who we say we are?" The factors of Ecclesial Health are prayerful discernment, decision-making process, health of pastors, stewardship of budget and resources, clarity in mission and ministries. It is about having a clear purpose, shared core values, a clear mission and commitment and loyalty to the life of the church. It is not a stagnant space but a living faith full of joy and gratitude where people are valued, where they gather, and are sent to be the Church in the world. (See Luke 24:13-35, 1 Corinthians 12:14, 24b -25; 2 Corinthians 5:11-21, Colossians 2:1-19)

Although it's not recognized as a federal holiday, Father's Day is celebrated each year on the third Sunday in June. This year if falls on June 16th.

The first Father's Day was celebrated in 1910, but it took more than six decades for the day to become official.

The holiday piggybacked off Mother's Day, which became a commercial holiday in 1908.

The country was slower to honor fathers on a particular day.

However in 1916, Wilson recognized Father's Day, and in 1924, President Calvin Coolidge urged states to observe the holiday.

Finally in 1966, <u>President Lyndon B. Johnson made the first presidential</u> <u>proclamation</u> that honored fathers, designating the third Sunday in June as Father's Day.

Sonora Smart Dodd, who was born in 1882, is recognized as the founder of Father's Day. Dodd, who died in 1978, was raised by a twice married, twice widowed Civil War veteran with 14 children. As a result, she wanted to honor "loving service" of fathers.

In 1910, she brought a petition before the Spokane Ministerial Alliance to recognize "the courage and devotion of all fathers" like William Dodd on June 5, her dad's birthday. As reported by History.com, the local clergy liked the idea of a special Father's Day service, but couldn't pull something together so quickly, so they settled for the third Sunday in June.

Flag Day is a celebration of the American flag that occurs each year on the anniversary of the flag's official adoption, June 14.

What we know fondly as the "Stars and Stripes" was adopted by the Continental Congress as the official American flag on June 14, 1777, in the midst of the Revolutionary War. Colonial troops fought under many different flags with various symbols—rattlesnakes, pine trees, and eagles—and slogans—"Don't Tread on Me," "Liberty or Death," and "Conquer or Die," to name a few.

The Declaration of Independence made the adoption of an American flag necessary. Previously, each colony or special interest had its own flag.

On that 14th of June, Congress made the Flag Resolution of 1777, stating: "The flag of the United States shall be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white, with a union of thirteen stars of white on a blue field ..." Official announcement of the new flag was not made until Sept. 3, 1777.

"Flag Day" was celebrated as a patriotic occasion for many decades, but it was President Woodrow Wilson who made the observance official by a presidential proclamation on May 30, 1916.

The origins of the Stars and Stripes have become part of American folklore. Although many people believe that Betsy Ross designed and sewed the first flag, there is no true proof of this.

However, records do indicate that Betsy Ross most definitely made ensigns and pennants for the Philadelphia Navy during the war, and she certainly inspired the design of the current flag.

Based on colonial folklore, it has also been stated that the American flag was first flown in battle during the Revolutionary War at the Battle of Cooch's Bridge in 1777. This may also be the <u>stuff</u> of legend. Flag Day, celebrated annually on June 14, is not an official federal holiday, but its observance is traditionally proclaimed each year by the president of the United States.

On June 6, 1944, the long-awaited Allied landing in northern France began. Facing Hitlers Atlantic Wall, soldiers of the United States, United Kingdom, Canada, and other Allied nations landed on beaches in Normandy, beginning a campaign which lasted until July 24, 1944.

It was the largest invasion ever assembled, before or since, landed 156,000 Allied troops by sea and air on five beachheads in Normandy, France. D-Day was the start of Allied operations which would ultimately liberate Western Europe, defeat Nazi Germany and end the Second World War.

A total of 4,414 Allied troops were killed on D-Day itself, including 2,501 Americans. More than 5,000 were wounded. In the ensuing Battle of Normandy, 73,000 Allied forces were killed and 153,000 wounded. The battle — and especially Allied bombings of French villages and cities — killed around 20,000 French civilians.

D-Day is not a federal holiday, but annually, ceremonies are held to observe D-Day and remember those who bravely stormed the beaches on D-Day—both the brave men who lost their lives and others who survived. Some visit important World War II memorials, including the WWII Museum in New Orleans



The Story of the Erie City Mission

In 1911 a group of community leaders--who cared enough about the crushing burden of hunger, homelessness, and addiction--rolled-up their sleeves and organized the Erie City Mission.

For over a century, the Erie City Mission has helped those impacted by the effects of addictions, poverty, homelessness, and lack of hope. Through five quality programs, the Mission has successfully met both immediate and long-term challenges of those in greatest need. The Mission has endured through two world wars, an international depression, many foreign war conflicts, and numerous recessions. Dedicated staff, financial donors, and volunteers have kept the doors open to meet the ongoing spiritual, physical, and emotional needs of thousands of people.

An extended history

The Erie City Mission's roots are founded in the ministry of Billy Sunday, the famous early 20th century evangelist. Sunday had a promising professional baseball career in the 1880s with the Chicago White Stockings and the Pittsburgh Alleghenys. However, because of a conversion experience, he turned his focus to ministry as a traveling evangelist. His rallies sparked the creation of a Christian social outreach project known today as the Erie City Mission.

Opening its doors in 1911 at its original location on 12th and Peach Streets, the Mission shared the gospel and provided music, food, and clothing to those in need, establishing itself as one of the most important social outreach centers in the city of Erie.

In the 1920s, the Bessemer Railroad Company bought the building, forcing the Mission to relocate to a retail building on East 9th Street, between State and French Streets. As a result of expanded outreach services and increased demand, the Mission relocated two more times (1117 Peach Street and 150 East 9th Street) before finding its permanent residence in 1978 at 1017 French Street.




Meals Prepared and Served 119,135 — the approximate number of meals prepared and served through the Erie City Mission's Public Meal Program. For many, the free public meal program serves as their main source of nutrition.

Average Cost Spent on a Meal The average amount spent on a meal by the food secure is \$3.13. It costs the Erie City Mission \$2.49 to provide a hot nutritious meal to the food insecure of our city.


Erie City Mission Trucks Run 40 Pick-ups Per Week Traveling as far as Girard, Waterford, Cambridge Springs, and North East for donations. Items donated through our Donation Center are distributed between our two Thrifty Shopper stores and sold at a reasonable cost or given away to those in need.



Service Hours Clocked by Volunteers 9,628 hours — the approximate number of service hours clocked by Erie City Mission volunteers. The value of these hours equates to over \$69,803 in savings.



Jalapeno Popper Deviled Eggs



- 1 jalapeno, seeded and chopped
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 10 hard boiled eggs
- 3 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 3 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon apple cider vinegar
- pinch of salt
- pinch of cayenne pepper
- jalapeno thinly sliced

Cook bacon in a nonstick skillet until crispy. Remove with a slotted spoon and set aside.

Discard all but 1/2 tablespoon bacon grease. Add chopped jalapeno and minced garlic to bacon grease and cook for 1 to 2 minutes.

Cut eggs in half and remove egg yolks. Place egg yolks in a medium bowl with cream cheese, mayonnaise, Dijon mustard, apple cider vinegar, salt and cayenne. Use a fork to mash the egg yolks up well and mix them together with the other ingredients until smooth.

Stir in jalapeno and garlic.

Set aside about 1/4 of the bacon and mix the rest into the egg yolk mixture..

Evenly spoon the egg yolk mixture into the egg whites.

Garnish eggs with remaining bacon and jalapeno slices.

Lutherlyn Environmental Education Program (LEEP)

LEEP offers learning adventures for all ages. It is renowned throughout western Pennsylvania for its high quality, science-oriented programs. Whether you are looking for a school field trip, an educator workshop, a church youth group activity, a scout program, a service project, or a family outing, LEEP has opportunities for you.

When youth attend summer camp at Lutherlyn, they participate in at least one LEEP nature activity during the week. They may visit the sustainable homestead at Terra Dei to learn about ways people can use less resources, with a focus on renewable energy. Campers might also visit the organic garden on site to learn about the importance of using fewer chemicals, habitat creation, and growing things in a way that works alongside natural systems instead of against them.

Throughout the week campers are also encouraged to reduce food waste (including helping with composting in the dining hall), conserve electricity and water, and to act in ways that don't damage the natural surroundings. Ultimately, this results in young people who are more mindful of the environmental implications of their lifestyles. LEEP hopes that all these experiences will make taking care of creation second nature to campers – something ingrained in their daily lives as well as something they can actively participate in and be passionate about.




