Reporter Front Page Editorial

During the past four weeks, the citizens of Dorval have been exposed to the programmes and platforms of every potential office seeker in the Dorval municipal elections. The citizens have made their judgments and elected a Council who are committed to try to carry out specific programmes for the development of our city.

We believe that all seven of our newly elected representatives will strive to work in complete harmony, to promote the orderly growth of Dorval in accordance with the wishes of its citizens who must always have the final say as to the character of the city in which they have decided to make their home.

We do not propose, at this early date, to examine the promised programmes or the performance of the seven elected representatives in relation to those promises. We do, however, serve notice to Council and public alike that we shall, from time to time, review Council's performance in the light of the commitments made to the citizens.

In this way, we hope to fulfill our role of keeping the public informed so that in three years time the voters may judge our Council on its record.

Many members of the new Dorval Municipal Council have stressed, during their election campaign, the urgent need for recreational facilities, especially for our teen-age youngsters. We agree with this as far as it goes.

In our judgment, however, there is in Dorval an urgent need for the type of recreational facility that can be availed of by a broader section of our population.

We refer to the sorry lack within our city boundaries of decent public parks where our senior citizens may rest awhile as they enjoy the pleasures of nature. We would like to think that our mothers with young children would have a quiet spot where they could push their strollers and, when tired, be able to sit on a park bench and watch the little ones play in absolute safety on the grass.

It would be nice, too, if our expectant mothers had a pleasant parkland in which to derive the benefits of fresh air and exercise.

Our youngsters and our teen-agers could find much joy in such a park.

As we see it, the City of Dorval should provide two such parks on the waterfront - one in the East end of the city and one in the West end, which could, over a period of years, be developed into beautiful waterfront parks for all the citizens to enjoy.

NOEL JUDGEMENT WITH TEN DAYS

In an interview with the newly elected Chairman of the Police and Fire Commission, Alderman Paul Carriere, the Reporter learned that Judge Rene Lippe will hand down his recommendations in the Police Chief Noel enquete within ten days. Alderman Carriere told the Reporter that he had spoken personally to Judge Lippe earlier, and had learned at that time out of the early release of the findings.

Mr. Carriere pointed out that as Chairman of the Police and Fire Commission, and as a lawyer, he would unhesitatingly recommend to Council that they accept the findings of the Judge who heard the enquete and that they act in accordance with the verdict.

NEW COUNCIL START WORK



Dorval City Council, sworn in at a special session called by outgoing Mayor John Pratt Monday, has made two top administrative changes which met with no opposition other than a suggested "go-slow" on one by Ald. W.G. Milsom.

The changes are a return to the old commission system of local government, discarded by the previous council in favor of the committee-of-the-whole, procedure, and the appointment of a new legal advisor.

Alderman Milsom suggested that the return to the commission system, while he had "no particular objection to it", should be studied further so that one commissioner was not saddled with too great a workload.

Incoming Mayor Sarto Desnoyers suggested, and Council finally agreed, that time should be given for the system to work. If the workload was found to be too heavy, changes could quite legally be made later.

The selection of Maurice Marcotte to take over the duties of legal advisor was accepted without much comment; Alderman Glencross abstained from voting on this

appointment. His terms of reference, however, will be different from those of his successor, Roy Ameron.

Mr. Marcotte, an expert on municipal law, will be appointed "at the pleasure of Council", which means he can be dismissed at any time. His salary will be at the rate of \$6,000 per year, the same rate as his predecessor for which he or his deputy, will be expected to attend all meetings in committee and a maximum of 24 open Council meetings. For each Council meeting over 24 he will be paid at the rate of \$50 per meeting. In addition to attendance at meetings to offer legal advice when sought, he will, among other things draft all bylaws, assist the staff and review the minutes. Outgoing legal advisor Roy Ameron did not attend public meetings, except on rare occasions.

The remainder of the small agenda was quickly disposed of, with Council passing, without any objections, the appointments of the auditors, a board of three assessors, and members of the board of revision.

In addition it approved the

amendment of bylaws forming part of the bond issue amounting to \$1,833,000. On this last, Mayor Desnoyers pointed out that Council was "not rushing through anything. This matter is cut and dried by the law and we have been advised to act accordingly."

Only one matter was put back to allow new members of Council further study. That concerned business taxes, now set at eight per cent. Deadline for passage is May 1.

The meeting began half an hour after the set time of 7 p.m. because two older members of Council had mistaken the time for starting. All former members of Council or at least a quorum, were required to attend to pass the minutes of their last meeting.

In opening the first session of the new Council, Mayor Desnoyers spelled out the way he would like the business to be conducted for future meetings. "Let us agree from the start", he said, "to act in a parliamentary manner. Needless discussion can be dispensed with if we follow the rules and proceed in a dignified manner..."

Strathmore Curlers Plan Closing Party

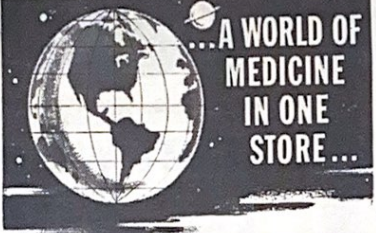

Beyond The Pale
 by Jonathan Moriarty

Moriarty recently had reason to travel to New York, and
 betook some basic research into the cost of getting there.
 Air fare was in the region of \$50 (a disgraceful amount in this
 day and age) with additional cab fare at either end.

The railroad happened to be offering a special... roughly \$19
 return, city centre to city centre. Counting airport cab fares this
 was a saving of almost \$40 and Moriarty considers \$5 an hour
 for sleeping on a rail coach pretty good payment.

At last, here was the chance for the railroad to show up its
 most vaunted advantages. To show itself at its best to a holiday
 crowd that could well contain high repeat customers. A chance,
 in other words, to score.

When Moriarty arrived at Windsor station the crowd was
 acting like a convention of linebackers. No orderly lineup. No
 orderly lineup. No reserved seats. No crowd control. Just open
 the doors boys, and let em go...ooooo. I spent the first ten
 minutes looking for the ball. A grey headed old lady next to me
 was showing a 200 pound youth that its quality not quantity
 that counts, and was picking her 'pushing points' with the
 expertise of a black belt Judo champ.

Eventually I got on to the platform, and went belting down the
 platform. I didn't want to go belting down the platform, but I
 had little say. It made the Klondike rush look leisurely.
 Eventually aboard, a quick glance at the interior of the coach
 convinced me it was the most luxurious the passenger could
 hope for...round about 1867.

So Moriarty took out his billets to find out whose fault all
 this was. This research turned up a positive United Nations
 setup. Canadian Pacific had sold the ticket. It was Canadian
 Pacific equipment. But the railroad running the trip and manning
 the train was the Delaware and Hudson, which in turn was work-
 ing it in conjunction with the New York Central.

"Refreshments" said a note on the seat were available in
 the dining car.

Hal And for good measure Ha Hall
 Moriarty arrived at the single car with about three thousand
 OTHERS; All intent on getting dood, beverage or both. After
 three quarters of an hour I managed eventually to get to the
 counter where chaos was the guy's middle name. A lineup in
 two directions clogged a two foot six gangway, with those served
 trying to back out with coffee and hot dogs over a floor littered
 with the sausages of the less successful.

There was no proper counter. You paid one man, who refused
 to give you a receipt, who then shouted over the heads of the
 crowd to another who was fishing the products out of a stock
 room. He pointed at you, yelled what you'd paid for and you
 struggled through just hoping the guy remembered. In the
 middle of this melee, waiters were attempting to prise off
 bottle caps while jammed between the clientele...a fine spray of
 brewery products often serving to whet the thirst of all in sight.

A quietly passed opinion that the company deserved hanging
 drawing and quartering for such organization brought a protest
 from the - pardon the expression - Maitre D' that all would be
 well if the public co-operated.

Railways - and it is no good apportioning blame according to
 company for in the public's eye they are all blamed collectively
 as a mode of transport - has fumbled the ball. And
 Moriarty may add - after having more than his share of that
 percentage of discourteous ticket collectors who have a Hitlerian
 approach to their uniform - fumbled it again.

It is a sad story. We see the advertisements, and the attempts
 to up the image of train travel. How relaxing and safe it is,
 etc, etc etc.

And on a prime occasion like this they make such a horrible
 botch of the whole thing.

Save the money on these glossy ads. Invest it in service. And
 they may get somewhere.

Meanwhile back at the runway, sit the airlines.
 Already they have learned their lesson on the transatlantic
 route where reductions of fares have swollen seat sales this
 year beyond their dreams. But still they persist in overcharging
 on domestic routes.

The disparity between the cost of trips to New York by air
 and other forms of transportation is out of all proportion. If it
 were brought down to somewhere like \$30, then the few dollars
 extra investment would be sound for the traveller...and their
 percentage seat sales would soar sufficiently to support it. But
 no. The airlines seem to be scared of starting such a cycle.

So what happens to the consumer? Well, mate, you either
 pays the full shot by air or you go into training. (Major in
 crowd pushing, with food balancing as a minor subject.)
 It comes down to the old axiom. You can't win.

And to end it all...a real lulu of a reply from a taxi driver in
 New York when stopped on Fifth Avenue and told where to go.
 Said he: "Where's Grand Central Station Mac?"
 So we told him some place else he ought to go.

Your government is issuing Social Insurance Number Cards in place of the unemployment insurance numbers that most employed people have had until now. The new numbers will help government to use modern office methods for greater efficiency in handling unemployment insurance, and also other social benefits such as proposed pension plans.

For these reasons, you are invited to apply for a Social Insurance Number, even if you are not a contributor to the unemployment insurance plan.

If you haven't yet applied, here's what you do.

IF YOU ARE AN EMPLOYEE your employer will give you an application form. Fill it out and return to your employer promptly.

IF YOU ARE UNEMPLOYED and drawing benefit you will complete an application form when you report to the Unemployment Insurance Commission in person or by mail.

IF YOU ARE AN EMPLOYER registered with the Commission, you will receive application forms automatically. If NOT registered with the Commission, please get in touch with your local U.I.C. office and application forms will be sent to you. Distribute application forms to your employees, have them completed and return them together, not individually, to the Commission.

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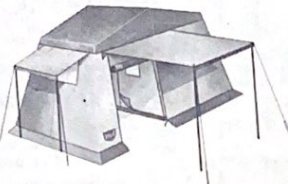

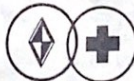

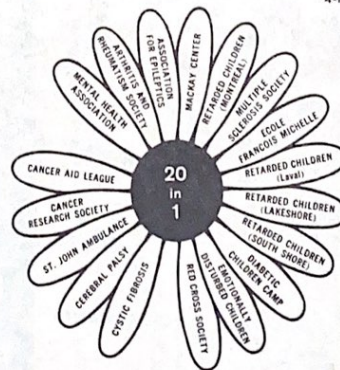

A versatile new family sports car, the Mustang, was introduced today by the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited. It joins the Falcon-Fairlane - Ford - Thunderbird group and will be sold by Ford dealers.

AN INTRODUCTION TO PHILOSOPHY, by Daniel J. Sullivan; 288 pages; \$4.50; published by The Bruce Pub-

lishing Co., 400 North Broadway, Milwaukee, Wisconsin

An Introduction to Philosophy, the book that found equal acclaim by the scholars as well as the general reading public, has been revised and

updated by author Daniel J. Sullivan, a philosophy professor at Fordham University.

Originally intended as a text, the book was so readily accepted by the reading public that several book clubs used it as a monthly selection. The book traces the main contours of the various philosophical disciplines and relates them in a most interesting style.

Majority of the revisions are in the first two of four divisions of the book between the introduction and conclusion. The first part on The Historical Rise of Philosophy, has been greatly expanded, with more attention given to the Pythagoreans, Atomists, Sophists, Parmenides and Heraclitus.

In the second division, The Making of Man, the author has made many minor changes in the text in the chapters devoted to metaphysics. The third part deals with The Making of Man, Cosmology, and the fourth division The Universe of Man. A brief recapitulation of the perennial philosophy of man serves as the conclusion.
