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

THE FLORIDA SANDHILL CRANE (GRUS CANADENSIS PRATENSIS)

Sandhill cranes are tall, gray birds with a long neck and legs, and a bald spot of red skin on the top of its head. In flight, they extend their neck and head, making them different from herons, which tuck their neck in on their back. There are five canadensis) in North America. Only two survive.

subspecies occur in Florida. Our resident sandhill crane (G. c. pratensis) is non-migratory and occurs throughout peninsular Florida. The other Florida subspecies (G. C. *tabida*) is a "snowbird" and migrates north.

The Florida sandhill crane is the smallest population of the five subspecies and is listed as Threatened on the Florida Endangered and Threatened Species List. The with a wingspan around 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ '.

Sandhill cranes are monogamous and thought to mate for life. Their distinctive, rattling calls can be heard from far away. The sexes appear identical except the male is slightly larger. They eat a variety of plants, insects, invertebrates, and small animals. They have one brood (1-3 eggs) per year; their young may remain with adults for ten months. Courtship dances in late winter and spring involve bounding 6-8 feet in the air with wings half-spread and calling loudly.

Unfortunately, like other wild animals, sandhill cranes evolved without vehicle traffic and many are killed by such every year. Their dull gray color and slow stride across roads and highways result in being hard to see, and they will not hurry nor react to honking horns. Other threats include habitat loss and heavy pesticide use in urban lawns - young sandhill cranes have died from pesticide poisoning. Last year, as part of some research I conducted for the Hernando County Port Authority, I came across among other things the original documents that Mr Sasser, the original developer of Hernando Beach had filed declaring his intentions to develop what us Floridans affectionally referred to as "Swamp Land" in the day. Today referred to as "wild life habitat" "marsh areas" and "protected areas". Back in the 1950's-1960's, the State of Florida was actively trying to populate the state. Remember WWII had just ended in 1945. If you think about it, even today, in excess of 50% of the state population lives within 15 miles of either the west or east coast. Of course, the original platte documents are limited in detail, given that this was a time before cell phones, the internet, Twitter, Facebook, etc. What did we do before all the electronic toys?

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

Old Business – Barbara Gossett will be stepping down from secretary, (Continued on page 20)


