



Community Partnerships

Domestic Harmony is grateful for the unyielding support that we receive each year from multiple organizations, community groups, corporations and individuals in Hillsdale County. We would like to highlight a couple of groups who helped us maintain our facilities this past year. Domestic Harmony was the recipient of a \$20,000 Mary Kay Grant. With the grant we were able to replace flooring in the bedrooms, bathrooms, and kitchen. The grant was also used for a new handicap assessable ramp in the front of the shelter. Volunteers from Hillsdale College came to the shelter during spring break and helped with spring cleaning and organizing of the shelter.

Community Prevention Education

Domestic Harmony provided prevention education for dating violence, domestic violence and sexual assault to schools in Hillsdale County reaching 178 students.

Survey results from our High School students:

- 17% have witnessed domestic violence in their families.
- 34% have witnessed teen dating violence
- 9% report they have been a victim of dating violence.

Donations

Domestic Harmony could not meet the needs of our clients without the help from many community groups and individuals. Each year churches, civic groups, and individuals gather items to donate to the shelter. These items include; food, paper products, cleaning supplies, diapers, clothes, etc. In the last fiscal year we received a total value of \$12,974 in donated goods.

Volunteers

Domestic Harmony also benefits from committed volunteers who give their time as shelter volunteers and to provide maintenance on the shelter. This year we had 33 volunteers who gave their time and talents to Domestic Harmony. Each shelter volunteer works five-hour shifts answering the crisis line at the shelter. Hours volunteered at the shelter total 1,147 this fiscal year.
