St. Gertrude the Great was a 13th-century German nun, writer, and mystic who was graced with many heavenly visions, including being one of the earliest mystics to whom Jesus encouraged a devotion to his Sacred Heart. It is recounted that Jesus showed her a vast number of souls entering heaven from purgatory as a result of her faithful and frequent recitation of this prayer.

We should note, however, that while this prayer has long been a part of our Catholic tradition, it is not officially *indulgenced*. This means that the Holy See has declared that we should reject any claims that a *specific number* of souls are released from purgatory with the recitation of the prayer. Nonetheless, the Church has always encouraged fervent prayer for those suffering in purgatory because our prayers help to alleviate their suffering.

Our response, then, should be to simply pray with fervor, and let God take care of the details!

CLERGY COLUMN

Happy Lord's Day!

The month of November is dedicated to the Holy Souls in Purgatory.

We might not hear much about Purgatory in today's Church culture. For some reason, Catholics don't seem as zealous about praying for their beloved dead. There could be a number of reasons for this: a lack of belief in Hell (despite the overwhelming evidence of it in the Bible), a lack of awareness that we will be judged by the Lord, a lack of understanding that "nothing unclean shall enter [heaven,] nor any one who practices abomination or falsehood, but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life" (Revelation 21:27) and what that means, etc. It's so common for people today to immediately assume a person's dwelling in heaven upon the moment of their death, which is not a Catholic notion, that we neglect our prayers for the deceased. It might feel offensive to suggest that a deceased person is not immediately brought into the joys of heaven, but it actually makes the most sense.

Read this quote from CS Lewis, the author of a number of great Christian books, including *The Chronicles of Narnia:*

Our souls demand *Purgatory, don't they? Would it not break the heart if God said to us, "It is true, my son, that your breath smells and your rags drop with mud and slime, but we are charitable here and no one will upbraid you with these things, nor draw away from you. Enter into the joy."?*

Should we not reply, "With submission, sir, and if there is no objection, I'd rather be cleaned first."

"It may hurt, you know."--

"Even so, sir."

I assume that the process of purification will normally involve suffering. Partly from tradition; partly because most real good that has been done for me in this life has involved it." (Letters to Malcolm, Letter XX)

CS Lewis was a Protestant Christian who understood that the reality of Purgatory makes the most sense for us. We look for things like this frequently. When you are out working in the garden, in the fields, in the shop, etc, what is something you know that you need to do before sitting down to eat? Wash your hands, of course. Or if you're going out somewhere to eat, what do you do in that case? You take a shower. If a person doesn't make sure they have cleaned their hands or their entire body in these situations, it's generally considered rude and/or gross. Wouldn't it be even more the case for a soul upon entering into Heaven? Wouldn't we feel out of place in the situation CS Lewis writes about in the narrative above? I'll spend some more time in future bulletin articles this month writing about how our prayers can assist those who are being cleansed in Purgatory. And maybe I'll write about how we can begin our own cleaning here and now.

What is Purgatory?

The Catechism of the Catholic Church defines <u>purgatory</u> as a "purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven," which is experienced by those "who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified" (CCC 1030). It notes that "this final purification of the elect . . . is entirely different from the punishment of the damned" (CCC 1031).

The purification is necessary because, as <u>Scripture</u> teaches, nothing unclean will enter the presence of God in heaven (Rev. 21:27) and, while we may die with our mortal sins forgiven, there can still be many impurities in us, specifically venial sins and the temporal punishment due to sins already forgiven.

What Happens in Purgatory?

When we die, we undergo what is called the particular, or individual, judgment. Scripture says that "it is appointed for men to die once, and after that comes judgment" (Heb. 9:27). We are judged instantly and receive our reward, for good or ill. We know at once what our final destiny will be. At the end of time, when Jesus returns, there will come the general judgment to which the Bible refers, for example, in Matthew 25:31-32: "When the Son of man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on his glorious throne. Before him will be gathered all the nations, and he will separate them one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats." In this general judgment all our sins will be publicly revealed (Luke 12:2–5).

Is Purgatory a Catholic "Invention"?

Fundamentalists may be fond of saying the Catholic Church "invented" the doctrine of purgatory to make money, but they have difficulty saying just when. Most professional anti-Catholics—the ones who make their living attacking "Romanism"—seem to place the blame on <u>Pope Gregory the Great</u>, who reigned from A.D. 590 to 604.

But that hardly accounts for the request of Monica, mother of Augustine, who asked her son, in the fourth century, to remember her soul in his Masses. This would make no sense if she thought her soul would not benefit from prayers, as would be the case if she were in hell or in the full glory of heaven.

Nor does ascribing the doctrine to Gregory explain the graffiti in the catacombs, where Christians during the persecutions of the first three centuries recorded prayers for the dead. Indeed, some of the earliest Christian writings outside the New Testament, like the *Acts of Paul and Thecla* and the *Martyrdom of Perpetua and Felicity* (both written during the second century), refer to the Christian practice of praying for the dead. Such prayers would have been offered only if Christians believed in purgatory, even if they did not use that name for it. St. Gertrude the Great (pictured above) was a Benedictine nun and mystic who lived in the 13th century. According to tradition, our Lord promised her that 1000 souls would be released from purgatory each time it is said devoutly. Whether or not this is actually the case, this is a great prayer for focusing on helping the Holy Souls in Purgatory nonetheless:

Eternal Father, I offer Thee the Most Precious Blood of Thy Divine Son, Jesus, in union with the Masses said throughout the world today, for all the holy souls in purgatory, for sinners everywhere, for sinners in the universal church, those in my own home and within my family. Amen.
