As the staff travel to the schools to discuss domestic violence, they have identified a need for children's underwear and socks of varving sizes. They have also adopted some families to help as well. If you have items of clothing (clean and in good condition), children's books, etc. to donate please place them in the blue bin located in the pantry. Check out the clearance section at Walmart next time you go shopping.

Stacy can always use some small tote bags and small travel size items to fill them with, e.g. travel size shampoo and conditioner, toothbrushes, tooth paste, travel size deodorant, hand sanitizer, etc. She is having difficulty finding small bottles of hand sanitizer so next time you go shopping pick up a few bottles..

Please contact the REACH office staff if you have furniture you want to donate to arrange pickup by the Thrift Store volunteers. They also ask for cooking utensils for helping them start over. So, if you have something you no longer want, they could use them. Often the victims leave home with only the clothes on their back, so they are given clothes, furniture, and items for the home from the Thrift Store until they can get back on their feet. They also can use items to help their self-esteem and pass the time until they can be placed in a safe environment. You can provide puzzles (500 pieces or less), adult coloring books, reading material, make -up, nail polish, hair clips, etc.

The 2023 National Women's History Theme: "Celebrating Women Who Tell Our Stories"

Women have long been instrumental in passing on our heritage in word and in print to communicate the lessons of those who came before us. Women have set records in nearly every industry and area of life, they include Olympians, Oscar, Emmy, Grammy, SAG, Tony winners, and music

awards, politicians, scientists, and leaders of all kinds. These changemaking women are bound to inspire you.

Anna May Wong (1905-1961)

Despite dealing with racism that plagued her career, Wong is still considered Hollywood's first-ever Asian American movie star.

Melinda Gates (1964-) Former wife of Microsoft founder Bill Gates, Melinda Gates is an American philanthropist who is known for her work helping those in need and fighting for women's empowerment and equality.

Margaret Thatcher (1925-2013)

Becoming the first female Prime Minister of the United Kingdom in 1979, Margaret Thatcher bravely led Britain through some of its toughest years. Thatcher wrote about her experiences in <u>The Downing Street Years</u>, <u>The Path to Power</u>, and <u>Statecraft</u>.

Shonda Rhimes (1970-) is a famous and highly influential American television producer and screenwriter. She is praised for diverse storytelling and representation, both of which have changed television for the better. In an interview, Rhimes said: "We still comment when we see a woman of a different size on television. We still comment when a main character is a little bit older than we're used to seeing, or if somebody is differently abled. We still comment on somebody of a different ethnicity. It's not the norm. But in the real world, that is the norm. You look around, and you see people of all kinds. And right now, you don't see women of all kinds on

television." Read Rhimes' memoir, <u>Year of Yes</u>, to learn more about her.

Kalpana Chawla (1962-2003) In 1997, after being named a mission specialist on the Space Shuttle *Columbia* by NASA, Chawla became the first woman of Indian descent to fly in space. In 2020, Northrop Grumman, an aerospace, defense, and security company, named a spacecraft after Chawla in her memory.

Wilma Mankiller (1945-2010) In 1985, Oklahoma native Wilma Mankiller became the first woman to be Principal Chief of the Cherokee Nation, leading the largest tribe in the United States. During her decade-long chiefdom from 1985 to 1995, "tribal enrollment grew, infant mortality dropped, and employment rates doubled," according to Time. In 1998, she was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom by Bill Clinton. Read Mankiller: A Chief and Her People to learn more about her.
