MY EDUCATIONAL PHILOSOPHY OF WISDOM, STRENGTH, AND HOPE

The function of the Negro college, then, is clear: it must maintain the standards of popular education, it must seek the social regeneration of the Negro, and it must help in the solution of problems of race contact and co-operation.

LOOK BACK CHRONOLOGY I - ORIGINS

- 1868 Born 23 February, Great Barrington
- 1884 Graduates, Great Barrington H.S.
- 1886- 1887 Teaches at Black school near Alexandria, Tennessee, two summers
- 1891 MA in history, Harvard
- 1892 Study at Friedrich Wilhelm University in Berlin, Germany on Slater Fund grant; 1893 Grant extended
- 1894 Teaching classics, Wilberforce U. Xenia, Ohio
- 1895 PhD in history. First Black PhD from Harvard
- 1896 Marries Nina Gomer, student at Wilberforce. Doctoral thesis, The Suppression of the African Slave-Trade to United States of America, 1638- 1870, published as first volume of Harvard's Historical Monograph Series

CHRONOLOGY II - ATLANTA U

- 1897 Professor of history & economics, Atlanta University
 - Founds American Negro Academy with Alexander Crummell
 - Begins editing the Atlanta University Studies (1898-1914)
 - First child, Burghardt Corner Du Bois, born in Great Barrington on 2 October
- 1899 The Philadelphia Negro published by University of Pennsylvania
- 1900 Attends first Pan-African Congress in London, declares that "the problem of the twentieth century is the problem of the color line."
 - Enters an exhibit at Paris Exposition and wins grand prize for his display on black economic development
 - Daughter Nina Yolande born 21 October in Great Barrington
- 1902 Booker T. Washington offers Du Bois teaching position at Tuskegee Institute, Du Bois declines

CHRONOLOGY III - NAACP

- 1903 The Souls of Black Folk
- 1905 Holds the first conference of Niagara Movement
- 1906 Atlanta riots, wife & daughter to Great Barrington
- 1909 The National Negro Committee, National Association for the Advancement of Colored People
- 1910 Moves to New York City to found and edit The Crisis, official publication of the NAACP. Appointed director of publications and research for NAACP; only black board member
- 1915 Booker T. Washington dies
- 1919 Organizes the first Pan-African Conference in Paris
- 1920 Publishes Darkwater: Voices from within the Veil
- 1927 The fourth and last Pan-African Conference is held in New York City

CHRONOLOGY IV - RACE & PEACE

- 1934 Resigns as editor of *The Crisis* and from NAACP. Accepts chair in sociology at Atlanta University
- 1935 Publishes *Black Reconstruction*
- 1940 Founds and edits *Phylon*, a quarterly magazine on black issues. Publishes autobiography, *Dusk of Dawn*.
- 1944 Despite his protests, he *is retired by* Atlanta University
- 1945 Consultant at conference that drafts United Nations charter, in San Francisco with Mary McLeod Bethune and Walter White
- **1948 Fired from the NAACP** after memorandum critical of Walter White and the NAACP board in *New York Times*
- 1949 Cultural and Scientific Conference for World Peace in New York City
- 1950 Nina Gomer Du Bois dies in July; 1951 Marries Shirley Graham, aged 45.
 - Indicted earlier that month as an "unregistered foreign agent" under the McCormick Act: Du Bois, along with four other officers of the Peace Information Center, is alleged to be agents of foreign interests. He is handcuffed, searched, and fingerprinted, released on bail in Washington, D.C. Five-day trial in Washington ends in acquittal

CHRONOLOGY V - TO AFRICA

- 1952 Publishes In Battle for Peace, an account of the trial. The State Department refuses Du Bois a passport. Demands statement declaring he is not a Communist Party member; Du Bois refuses
- 1958 Du Bois's ninetieth birthday at Roosevelt Hotel, NYC; 2,000 people attend. Begins The Autobiography of. Supreme Court allows passport
- 1960 Participates in Ghana's establishment as a republic. Travels to Nigeria for inauguration of first African governor-general
- 1961 Du Bois accepts Kwame Nkrumah invitation to move to Ghana and direct revival of Encyclopedia Africana
- 1962 Autobiography published in Soviet Union; Travels to China
- 1963 Becomes a citizen of Ghana. Turns ninety-five in February. Dies in Accra, Ghana, on 27 August, on the eve of the civil rights march on Washington; Du Bois is buried in a state funeral in Accra on the 29th
- 1968 The Autobiography of W. E. B. Du Bois is published in the US
- 1992 Honored by the United States Postal Service

- Darkwarter: Voices from Within the Veil (1920)
- Dusk of Dawn: An Essay Toward an Autobiography of a Race Concept (1940)
- Soliloquy: The Autobiography of W. E. B. Du Bois (1960)

ELEMENTS OF HUMAN RIGHTS

- Declaration of Independence (1776); Johan Galtung Peace Studies (1959); Cooper (1892 & 1925) Human Rights as "Progressive Peace"
 - Natural Conflict (Equilibrium of opposing forces, adjustment vs. suppression); Diverse (Harmony of racial differences); Divine (Birthright, "Singing Something" vs. Nordic)

• UN Universal Declaration (1948)
