A CALL TO FORGIVENESS ON 9/11

Sirach 27:30-28:7; Psalm 103:1-4, 9-12; Rom. 14:7-9; Matt. 18:21-35

Where were you on September 11, 2001? It was exactly ten years ago this Sunday, when terrorists hijacked airplanes and flew them into the twin-towers in New York City and the Pentagon, causing the death of nearly three thousand innocent people. Today, we gather as a faith community to commemorate the tenth anniversary of this heinous attack on US soil. As Christians we have the responsibility to pray for the repose of the souls of those who died in the attack – to pray for lasting healing on every family that lost loved ones. We also pray for the men and women in the military who have died since 9/11 in the war on terror, and for their families as well.

Many of us are still emotionally and spiritually wounded as a result of the attack. It is difficult for some to get over the emotional pain that the attack has inflicted on their ego. For many, ten years later, they find it very hard to forgive the perpetrators of the terrorists' attack. When the US Navy Seals, on May 2, 2011, killed Usama Bin Laden, the mastermind of the 9/11 terrorists' attack, many people across the country, including the president, rejoiced. Yes, as a nation, we felt relief that the individual who caused the worst attack and pain on our country was dead. As President Obama put it, "Justice has been done!" Undeniably, the thought of a world without Usama Bin Laden would bring some sort of peace of mind; but this is cumbersome. There may not be any easy answer to the many questions that followed after 9/11, but one thing we know for sure is that it is not the *Christian way* to rejoice in the suffering or the loss of any human life.

Thus, it is ironical that on the Sunday that marks the 10th anniversary of 9/11, the theme of our readings is *mutual forgiveness*. The first reading from the Book of Sirach exhorts you and me to practice mutual forgiveness, because "The vengeful will suffer the Lord's vengeance...Forgive your neighbor's injustice; then when you pray, your own sins will be forgiven." In other words, if we desire forgiveness, we must forgive those who hurt us. This is the commitment we make each time we pray the Lord's Prayer: "Our Father... forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us..." In other words, whenever we say this prayer, we are recommitting ourselves to forgive others their trespasses so that when we ask for forgiveness the Lord will forgive us.

Judaism, until Jesus' time, taught that a person had the duty to forgive an offender up to three times and no more. Because of Jesus' teaching on forgiveness, Peter's enthusiasm led him to ask: "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive? As many as seven times? Jesus answered, I say to you, not seven times but seventy-seven times." Peter may have thought that he was generous in forgiveness, but Jesus' response, "seventy times seven" teaches us that there is no limit to the number of times we must forgive those who offend or harm us. Thus, on this 10th anniversary of 9/11, you and I are challenged by Jesus' teaching to forgive our enemies and those who harm us. Like Peter, we might ask: How many times are we going to forgive these terrorists? For how long are we going to put up with them? Should we ever forgive them at all? To these, Jesus gives you an answer: My child, I know how difficult it is to forgive your enemies; I have been there. You will gain nothing in holding back; instead, you will hurt yourself all the more. Forgive and let go and you will experience true happiness. True happiness can only be gained if you are willing to forgive and open your heart for healing. This is a challenge that we must take because forgiveness is not an option but an obligation. Forgiveness heals - it builds bridges - it strengthens relationship – it restores hope and confidence.



The ALTAR CANDLES and SANCTUARY LAMP for this week will be lit in loving memory of Frances Nanoia.


