SEEK CHRIST, YOUR LIGHT!

(Is. 60:1-6; Ps. 72: 1-2, 7-8, 10-13; Eph. 3:2-3a, 5-6; Matt. 2:1-12)

This Sunday is the eighth day in the Octave of Christmas; and it is the feast of the Epiphany. Its etymology comes from the Greek word, epiphanein, which means appearance, showing or *revelation*. It was used to describe the appearance of a god among the people, a theophany. The Eastern Greek-speaking Church found it natural to use the word to describe the appearance of the true God in flesh. Epiphany is the Christmas feast among the Eastern Christians, Orthodox or Uniate. Originally, in the Western Church, Epiphany celebrated the three manifestations of the divinity of Christ - His Birth, His Adoration by the magi, and His Baptism.

At Epiphany we celebrate God Who reveals Himself to us through the incarnation of His Son, Jesus Christ. Thus, St. Paul testifies, "Christ is the image of the unseen God..." (Col. 1:15-20). Epiphany celebrates the manifestation of Christ to the magi, traditionally called the three kings. It celebrates the manifestation of Christ to all the people of the world including the Gentiles unbelievers. Christ makes Himself known to all peoples -Buddhists, Christians, Hindus, Jewish, Moslems and pagans. Indeed, He is made manifest to you and to me. By this Feast, Christ reveals to us that every person, even "the Gentiles (pagans/sinners) are coheirs, members of the same body" (Ephesians 3:6). The unbelievers also are copartners in the promise of eternal life won for us by Christ's death and resurrection. Thus, Christians must be willing to be active agents of Christ's Gospel of salvation by being the star that leads those who are yet to be baptized and the lapsed Christians back to the true faith in Christ.

Today's first reading from prophet Isaiah envisages the return of the Israelites from exile and how all nations will join them in a pilgrimage of celebration to Jerusalem. This will be a pilgrimage to see the Light. Isaiah exhorts Jerusalem to "Rise up in splendor" because "Your light has come." On the other hand, in the gospel reading we see the magi who faithfully and diligently followed the star which led them to discover Christ, the Light. They were not deceived by the tricks of Herod, and were committed to their mission of discovering where and Who Christ was. Their star led them to Christ, whom they worshipped, offering expensive gifts. Unlike Herod, they searched for Christ for the right reason. They sought Him so that they could worship Him Who is their King and Lord. Herod sought Him because He wanted to kill Him. He hated the light; hence He sought to do away with the Author of light.

For you who sit in darkness - for you who are put down by the wiles of Satan - for you who are burdened by the difficulties of life - for you who are sick - for you who are depressed and stressed for you who are suffering due to the bad choices you have made in life, the Lord exhorts you, "My child, rise up in splendor," because "Your light has come," and "the glory of the Lord shines upon you." The Lord shines His glory upon you through the birth of Christ. As we begin this New Year, Christ wants you to search for Him, not for the wrong reasons but for the right ones. He wants you to receive Him in the Eucharist - hear Him in the Gospels see Him in the community of worshippers. If you do, He is going to make light your burden and will shine His light upon you throughout this year and always.




