

Through the months of June, July and part of August, we will be continuing our current sermon series titled, "How the Church Should ACT today." This series is based upon the first Church (*body of believers*) that was formed following the day of Pentecost when Jesus (God) sent the Holy Spirit to dwell in the hearts of all the believers as they were waiting in Jerusalem.



The Bible is clear concerning the mission of the Church. It is not complex; it is actually quite simple:

NRS **Matthew 28:19** Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰ and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.

Jesus added another dimension to serving God:

NRS **Matthew 22:37** He said to him, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' ³⁸ This is the greatest and first commandment. ³⁹ And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

The primary vehicle by which God has chosen to spread this message on earth is His church (the body of believers.) After the day of Pentecost and the formation of the early Church, God tells us exactly what the functions or purposes of the church should be:


NRS **Acts 2:41** So those who welcomed his message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added. ⁴² They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. ⁴³ Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. ⁴⁴ All who believed were together and had all things in common; ⁴⁵ they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. ⁴⁶ Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, ⁴⁷ praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

From those verses come five functions the church needs to perform:

Salty Service (Acts 2:47) Extravagant Generosity (Acts 2:45) Radical Hospitality (Acts 2:41) Passionate Worship (Acts 2:46) Intentional Discipleship (Acts 2:42)

I hope these functions sound familiar to you. If they don't, then let me tell you a little bit about the 5 pillars of the Methodist Way. Stay tuned next month for more information about the Methodist Way. ©



Meditation and Prayer Time "Waiting on God"


Every great movement of God, through the Holy Spirit, has been preceded with the church investing the time of waiting and praying before God. Here at Burton, it should be no different. As we are going through our current sermon series, "**How the Church Should ACT Today**", I am excited about what will happen here at Burton and the community around us. However, given that we have acknowledged the Apostolic church "waited" and "prayed" before the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, it should be no different for us. After all: *The people in the Bible are a lot like us and we are a lot like the people in the Bible*.

I find it hard, if not seemingly impossible, to wait on the Lord. Perhaps you have the same struggle.

The Lord said there would be times when we would gather that would not have a specific structure. We are to gather and wait before Him. We are to wait until the Holy Spirit empowers us. Waiting makes me nervous. Waiting makes me feel vulnerable. I don't like it and I struggle to do it.

Seeking and Obeying

Before Jesus had appeared to all of His disciples, the Bible tells us in John 20:19 where you could find them. They were hiding in a room behind locked doors. Jerusalem was a dangerous place for Christ's followers. Because they had just crucified Jesus, who knew which disciple would be next?



Jesus came with a message to His followers. What do you think that message was? None of the disciples had been able to pray all night with him in Gethsemane. Peter had denied Him 3 times, and every disciple (except John, the Beloved) had abandoned Him. What do you think Jesus was going to say to them?

Surprisingly, He did not chide them nor was He angry with them. As a matter of fact, He comforted them by saying, "Peace be unto you. As the Father has sent me, even so, I am sending you." Could God's grace get any better?

Now we come to Acts 1. Jesus is alive. He has shown them by many proofs and He invested 40 incredible days talking about the Kingdom of God. What do you think the disciples wanted to do? No doubt they were ready to proclaim Jesus to the world. I can't imagine their excitement. Notice how verse 4 reads. He "ordered them not to depart from Jerusalem **but to wait**..."

We are an impatient culture. If we are not careful, our lack of patience will find its way into our walk with Christ. Is the Church supposed to wait to be empowered by the Holy Spirit today as it was in the Book of Acts? I think to a large degree, WE ARE!



That is why I am excited to announce that we will be providing members of our church and community an opportunity to start the work week off with some much needed "meditation and prayer time" at Burton Memorial. Every Monday, June through August, we will be opening the Sanctuary from 7:00 am to 9:00 am for silent meditation and prayer. WE WILL BE WATIING ON GOD!


I hope to see you there as we "wait and pray" for the power of the Holy Spirit here at Burton.

Getting right in the Way connects me to what my idea of God is all about. God is everything. A concept so vast, I am humbled in my awareness that I cannot comprehend it all. After all, the known universe alone is boggling, and reason suggests there are multiple universes beyond our own.

God is all that. And more.

Both physical and metaphysical.

That is what my faith is based on. The appreciation of what I experience, and a belief in things not seen.

My friendship with Jesus gives me a goal, a purpose, and hope. Hope that I may be a faithful follower, and an active traveler on the Way.

Hear Ye! Hear Ye!

Come to the

Burton Community Conference

Sunday, June 3, 12:30pm Fellowship Hall

We will look at and discuss several issues being brought to the Florida Annual Conference, June 6-9, in Lakeland.

As the Lay delegate representing Burton Memorial, I want to hear what you think about the issues reflected in the summaries described below.

Due to an error made in the language of a constitutional amendment, from the 2016 General Conference (held every four years), a re-vote on the amendment will take place at our upcoming Annual Conference. The subject of the constitutional amendment is discrimination against women and girls. If adopted, by a 66% of the delegates to all the Annual Conferences, language would be added in the **Book of Discipline** that would direct the United Methodist Church to "confront and seek to eliminate discrimination against women and girls, whether in organizations or in individuals, in every facet of its life and in society at large." This would become the new ¶6, and the current ¶¶ 6-61 would be renumbered as ¶¶ 7-62.

Annual Conference delegates will also consider two Resolutions.

One of these, entitled "Valuing God's Gift In Difficult Circumstances," seeks to recognize unborn children as our "neighbors" (Mt.22:30NRSV) and as "strangers" (Mt.25:35NAS) whom we are to welcome as "the least of these" (Mt.25:40). It further resolves to encourage and urge "all pregnant mothers and fathers to recognize their unborn children as persons worthy of love, value, and life, and to do them no harm," offering to those women, who experienced unintended pregnancy, our compassion during and after their pregnancies.

The other Resolution, entitled "**Affirming Unity In Diversity**", seeks to "affirm unity in our diversity, to challenge in love all that divides, and to proclaim God's offer of saving grace through Jesus Christ." It calls for prayer to "resist schism and express openness to diverse perspectives in matters of sexual identity and practice."

I look forward to hearing from you, and to being your representative at the 2018 Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church.
