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"For What Do You Hunger?"

As you read this, I would guess that Halloween is over. As we end October and begin November, food seems to be the focus. It's funny at times that we begin this season with gorging on candy, move to more savory dishes of meat and potatoes, then end with sweet Christmas cookies (or pies if you're like me). As we start this stretch of colder weather, the body seems to know it needs more calories to stay warm, or at least that's what I tell myself to make myself feel better.

I find myself hungrier during these months, which got me thinking much about hunger. As we gather around family tables, those meals that satisfy our earthly hunger, we start November with the observation of All Saints' Day. It is a day in which we reflect and are reminded of the reality between the saints in heaven and the all the saints on earth. We feast at our earthly tables and at the same time long to share that table with those whom we currently only share the heavenly table. We pine for the time to sit again with them, and enjoy a wonderful meal together.

As great as these earthly meals are, it will not take too long and we will be hungry again. The daily bread given by God is wonderfully given daily, as our bodies do need the calories and the energy to continue to do the work that God has wonderfully given us to do.

As we recall the lives of the saints, as we listen to their stories, look at their lives, and contemplate our own, we hear from Jesus, "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied." ¹ Righteousness. Being right, doing right, this is the aim for all of us. To be righteous, to be right, is not something that we can accomplish on our own. Try as hard as we might, the perfection of the 10 Commandments, the perfection of the Holy Law of God is not something that we are able to fully comply with, nor in our sin, do we really want to.

To hunger and thirst after righteousness is to be driven after what God says is right, holy, and just. The Law of God is good and wise, and sets God's will before our eyes. There are many competing theories and ideas about who or what is right and wrong, ethical or unethical, holy or unholy, just or unjust.

This is much like my snack cupboard at home. If I am hungry for a granola bar, I go the cupboard and what do I see? I see fruit snacks, various kinds of fruit, granola bars, chips, cookies, and candy. Among all of those choices, which one am I going to reach out for? The granola bar! Why? Because that is what I was hungry for.

It is not just food that we are hungry for, there are many things that we are hungry for in this world. Our sinful pride, our bodies, our minds, our friends, our families, our jobs, our schools, our world, many times will drive us away from God's pure Word. There are many things that attempt to replace what God's Word clearly says is right and wrong. Sometime, carefully read, pray, and reflect upon the depth of each of the 10 Commandments. You will find in the pew racks at Immanuel a helpful document on how to do this. How many ways do the world, the devil, and our own sinful flesh try and fill a desire apart from the clear commands of God Himself? How easy is it to shy away from God's clear Words and try to muddy up the waters? How many phrases has the devil given to us to speak against the Word of God? "Did God really say?... Everyone else is doing it... It is a different time today... That was true only back then, we have grown up now...We live in a different world...Can't we just let it go this one time..."

Brothers and sisters in Christ, for what are you hungry? If you hunger and thirst after righteousness, if you are hungry for doing and for being right, as God has clearly defined it, when you come to the cupboard of understanding, you are only going to reach for one thing to satisfy your hunger. It is not what the world says. It is not what I think or you think, or I feel or you feel. It is not even how it can be redefined. The question is, "What does God's Word say!"

In God's word, we will truly be satisfied. Why? Because there is not one person who is without sin. All of sinned and fall short of the glory of God. Each one of us begin the Divine Service with the confession of sins. Each of us fall short of the perfection that is demanded and required by God. In our midst is the very Lamb of God, Jesus Christ. He was obedient to death, even death upon a cross, and He did it all for you.

He gave His life to pay for our misdeeds, for our imperfection. He died and rose again to give us life! He promises us that we shall be satisfied. We hunger and thirst for righteousness, and He gives us His righteousness through His same body and blood, in, with, and under bread and wine in the Holy Sacrament of the Altar. We poor sinners, come to this Holy Table to be fed with the bread of life. Here we are satisfied by the body and blood of Jesus Himself.

Here we feast with all the saints, we share the Holy Meal with those saints in heaven who surround the throne of God, who have the Lamb in their midst, who is wiping every tear from their eyes.² We feast with them, as Christ is also in our midst. He feeds us and prepares us for whatever trials we may face as we leave this building. He feeds us with the life-giving, much needed calories that our souls need to do the work that He has wonderfully given us to do.

Thanks be to God for the meals He provides. Both here through bread for the forgiveness of sins, and the daily meals we consume for the good of our bodies. Two meals that work for us, that are needed by us, and both prepared by the wondrous, and generous hands of our God. Meals that point us to the reality, "See what kind of love the Father has given to us, that we should be called children of God; and so, we are." We have a God, who salvation lasts forever. Even as our bodies wither and decay, we have meals, we have heavenly and earthly food, we have a God who proclaims, "Lift up your eyes to the heavens, and look at the earth beneath; for the heavens vanish like smoke, the earth will wear out like a garment, and they who dwell in it will die in like manner; but my salvation will be forever, and my righteousness will never be dismayed." As we walk through this time of eating, join me in singing:

The golden evening brightens in the west; Soon, soon to faithful warriors cometh rest; Sweet is the calm of paradise the blest. Alleluia! Alleluia!



President's Piece for Peace



While there we spent one day in Branson with all its entertainment and festivities. The weather was still quite warm, so we spent some time doing outdoor things. I am proud to say I remain the miniature

golf champion of the household. We ate at a legit 1950's diner where they waiters were singing performers at local shows in the evening. They would come to our table while singing and offer the microphone to us to sing along if we wished. I wished not! I didn't want to spoil anyone else's lunch.

The main attraction for us was a show presented at the Sight and Sound Theater. It is well known for offering biblically based musicals. We have previously seen Samson and Delilah, Noah, Moses, and this time we saw The Life of Jesus. The talent is phenomenal, the music is well done, and the story lines follow scripture very well. Of course, from time to time they have to take editor's liberty for narrative sake but nothing that contradicts the Word of God.

The pageantry by which they carried out scenes like the crucifixion, the burial, the resurrection, and the ascension was first class. I was quite impressed. Until the end, that is. I do not speak of anything in the show itself that was in error. They even finished with Pentecost and sending of the Apostles to the world. The message of justification by grace through faith was clear. The emphasis on the Apostolic Mission to preach the Good News was unmistakable. So, what was it that I found appalling?

It was after the show. The curtain had come down, the actors were out in front taking bows as the crowd applauded. The lead actor who played Peter then extends an altar call. The message of the show, two hours in length, was undermined by a three-minute discourse on how you are to decide for Jesus. And there would be people standing up front to help you make that decision. Even if you were already a member of The Faith, you could still come forward if you desired a closer relationship with Jesus. All would be accomplished by a visit up front to those waiting to help you.

You are all good enough theologians that I don't have to go into the biblical evidence addressing the false doctrine of such an invitation. I simply want to point out how such a small moment of false doctrine can undo such a long presentation of biblical truth. That is why we comb over our sermons and bible class instruction, as well as our class prepara- tion for the students under our care. When even one microbe of a tainted element is placed in pure water, the water is no longer 100% pure.

We are Called and installed into our vocations to teach the Word of God in all its truth and purity. We do not need to make it more dynamic or enhance it. It is already all the power and authority God needs to carry out His will on earth. The Church is the mouthpiece of God for His Word to be heard by the congregation and students we tend. I know there is not one worker in our district who does not believe this. I also know you make detailed effort to keep the message straight while getting the message out (to quote a predecessor of mine, Dr. Alvin Barry). We do this because we trust what God has given us for the sake of the Church. That is why it is good for us to take extra steps and put in extra effort to make sure what we preach and teach is what has been given to the Church. It is the power of God unto salvation for all who believe it.

When a loved one dies by suicide, the ones left behind, the survivors, are dealing with a loss that's traumatic. The loss can come with stigma, real or perceived. The grieving person or family can feel isolated from people they considered their support. This all can result in survivors being stuck in their grief for years, missing out on support that can help them heal from the loss. How can we extend care to survivors?

Dispel the myths and stigma that can come with the topic of suicide. Plan an activity for survivors on International Suicide Survivor Day, which is the third Saturday in November. Hold a workshop on suicide prevention for all in the community or host an event that includes a panel of suicide survivors to share their stories. Have materials available that give accurate information about suicide prevention and how to show support to those grieving from a suicide-related loss. Convey the message that you are approachable on this topic, that you aren't afraid to talk about suicide and the resulting grief.

Encourage their participation in a support group or connect them to other survivors. Survivors can be at higher risk for dying by suicide. Learn your local suicide prevention crisis lines and put the number in your cell phone contact list. This will make it easier to share the number with others or to make the call when you need guidance for someone you're helping. 988 has been designated as the new three-digit dialing code that routes callers to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. This dialing code that started in July 2022, is available to everyone across the United States.

Keep educating yourself on suicide prevention and on supporting suicide survivors. Stay current on available resources. God is faithful and will equip you to share the message of love and hope with those who are struggling with thoughts of suicide and with survivors who are struggling in their grief.

May our Lord Jesus Christ himself and God our Father, who loved us and by his grace gave us eternal encouragement and good hope, encourage your hearts and strengthen you in every good deed and word.

St. Paul wrote to Church of Christ in Corinth: "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:7). God loves a cheerful giver. But who is a cheerful giver?


Abel was. By faith, he gave the firstborn of his flock, and it was acceptable in God's sight. Abraham was. By faith, he prepared cakes and a tender choice calf for God and entertained angels unaware. So also were David and Solomon. By faith, David would not make a sacrifice to God that cost him nothing, so he paid Araunah his due. By faith, Solomon built a house for God, where his name would dwell and thereby where He would dwell to be Israel's God and they His people.

What more shall we say? For time would fail us to tell of all those who gave not simply for the joy of giving but for the joy of knowing the One to whom they gave.

So also, our Lord, who for the joy set before Him, gave everything – yes, even His life – enduring the cross and scorning its shame. He gave to the shedding of His blood, willingly and resolutely setting His face toward Jerusalem to die for the life of the world. Though He was rich in every way, He became poor, so that by His poverty, we might be rich beyond measure.

So then, let us like Abel and Abraham, like David and Solomon, and even like our Lord Jesus Christ, give cheerfully to God for the work of His kingdom in our midst. Like them, let us decide in our heart for the joy set before us. It's the joy of knowing the One to whom we give is the One who gives us all good things.
