Feast of Epiphany Year A Matt 2:1-12



When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, He inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet: And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; since from you shall come a ruler, who is to shepherd my people Israel." Then Herod called the magi secretly and ascertained from them the time of the star's appearance. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and search diligently for the child. Eucharistic Renewal Meditation

"From all that we have said about the nature of the Liturgy it becomes clear that knowledge of the mystery of Christ, the decisive question for our lives, does not consist in a mental assimilation of some idea but in real existential engagement with his person. In this sense, Liturgy is not about "knowledge," and its scope is not primarily pedagogical, even though it does have great pedagogical value. (Cf. Sacrosanctum Concilium, n. 33) Rather, Liturgy is about praise, about rendering thanks for the Passover of the Son whose power reaches our lives. The celebration concerns the reality of our being docile to the action of the Spirit who operates through it until Christ be formed in us. (Desiderio #41)

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

Feast of Epiphany Year

Luke 2·16-21

Happy Epiphany! Why do I love that word so much? Epiphany, epiphany! The word means to 'reveal', 'show' or 'see through'. It has a close relation to such words as 'Enlightenment', Awakening' or 'Illumination'. Some great authors of literature, like James Joyce or Flannery O'Connor, are associated with the use of 'epiphany' as a literary technique in a story that provokes a sudden insight within the reader, (Hev. I just realized that they are both 'Irish' and 'Catholic'! That's an epiphany!) Since the word 'Epiphany' is associated with light, many people quickly assume that it refers to the bright guiding star that led the wise men to the child-King Jesus. But that is only the beginning! I sense that the Wise Men's epiphanyrealization wasn't just the marvel in the sky, but what is behind it all: the marvel on earth of God being born among us in Bethlehem! The Wise Men didn't just discover a star, but they discovered the Maker of all the stars. Jesus-God is the source of all such light, the True Light of the World. Nearly all the Christmas cards I received this year that had an image of the Nativity Scene on it, they all show light shining out from within the swaddled Child in the crib-manger, or maybe from the stable or cave itself! The light emanates from the center of the picture -Jesus-, and shines out to all the borders of card, that represents Christ's light shining to all the ends of the world. The scene wasn't lit by torches or lamps hanging around on posts or stakes. And it wasn't illuminated from above, with a light shining down like the moon or stars. No, the scene is lit up, by light rays shining out from the crib of the newborn Jesus. How fitting this is, that Jesus lights up the scene by His own light, since Jesus will say of Himself later, "I am the light of the world" (John 8:12 & 12:46). This reminds me of the popular 'painter of light' Thomas Kinkade who painted his every picture with no evident, external light source in his scenes. For example, the light always came from inside a home, a church, or a building (through windows lighted up from within). Even if there was light in the sky, you never saw it directly, such as if it was a sun (it always shined through clouds or over mountain ranges). Well, within so many Nativity Scenes, this same idea is at work, with the light source of the 'framed image' coming from within the crib where Jesus is found!

So, the greatest discovery of the Wise Men, is not some novel star in the sky to look up at and admire, but it is the source of all stars, God Himself. Jesus is someone to adore and worship: The True Light. I find the life-changing insight (epiphany) to be that the Wise Men recognize who their God is-Jesus the Savior of all people. And they do not only discover the true God, but they discover who they themselves truly are – Children of God. We are all children of the same God and Jesus came to save us all. Jesus is born for these foreign travelers, just the same as He is for all the native Israelites. The Wise Men's coming to Jesus, reveals the universal nature of Christ's mission of salvation for everyone. Early Tradition holds that the Wise Men represent the whole rest of the known world (Persia-Arabia, India and Africa). Whatever one's country of origin, Jesus came to save us all. Having come to know God, afterward, the Wise Men know themselves better too. I like how St Augustine teaches us that, apart from God, we do not know our true selves. Because of pride and the devil's taunting (fooling) us to claim more for ourselves than we actually are, sin distorts our view of ourselves and others. But God opens our eyes and reveals our true ourselves to us (John 8:32 "you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free"). In his Confessions, St Augustine says, "You are closer to me than I am to myself" (Book 3, chap 6). He is saying, "God you know me better than I know myself." So, in addition to the Wise Men discovering God and learning about themselves that they are true children of God, their eyes are opened also to Herod's true colors (his brutal ambition to control & demean his subjects). They may have been fooled by Herod's duplicity in faking benevolent interest in the newborn king Jesus in the beginning. But, after having met God in Bethlehem, now they see through Herod's tricks and avoid their follow-up visit to him (they have Herod's number). God's light leads the Wise Men away from the danger of Herod. Their eyes have been opened to be able to discern and know others and human nature better.

Jesus does that for us. He teaches us about ourselves. What we don't see clearly about ourselves, Jesus will reveal to us I think that is what is behind the new names that Jesus gives some people in scripture when he calls them, like Peter, James, John, Nathaniel & Matthew(?). Jesus gives an additional name to them, based on some quality they don't recognize in themselves before having encountered him. Jesus tells us that He is the "Way, Truth & Life" for us (John 14:6). He tells us that if we take His way upon ourselves, then we can rest in our true selves with Him (Matthew 11:29 "Take my yoke upon you and learn from meand you will find rest for yourselves" & in Matthew 16:25 "whoever loses his (*false-self*) life for my sake will find it (*true self*))." So, when we encounter Jesus, we not only learn about God, but we learn about our true identities-selves (as children of God) and gain insight into human nature (others as fellow children of God). What an epiphany! Peace, Fr Brian


