



A long history

With a wide array of buildings and artifacts still intact throughout the area, history comes to life in Sandoval County. The area has a historically and culturally rich past, with artifacts suggesting its beginnings as a dwelling site long pre-dating what we know of modern-day civilizations. **Centuries before Don Francisco** de Coronado explored what is now known as Sandoval County and camped near modern-day Bernaillo in 1540, the area was already a thriving and established community. Prehistoric artifacts suggest that cave dwellers once called Sandoval County lands home.

Centuries later, the land was explored by the Spanish, and the area consisting of modern-day Sandoval County was included in one of two partidos, or districts, created in the New Mexico territory. Sandoval County was first established as a separate entity on March 10, 1903, nine years before New Mexico's statehood.

In its present configuration, Sandoval County encompasses 3,716 square miles of diverse geography and people. Over the years, the county has evolved from a primarily rural and sparsely populated area to the home of more than 130,000 people.

On the county's southern edge lies the city of Rio Rancho, a





vibrant municipality that has been among America's fastest-growing cities for more than two decades. This still-budding urban hub is bordered by Corrales, Placitas and Bernalillo, communities that exude semi rural, small town charm.

Moving north and west into the county's outer reaches, you'll find the most scenic open spaces you're ever likely to see. These parts of the county encompass numerous Native American communities, as well as thousands of acres of National Park and Forest Service lands, which are a recreational playground.

Those of us who are fortunate enough to live in Sandoval County appreciate its diversity, both in geography and culture. We welcome visitors to come and experience this truly wonderful place.

One you start to explore it, you'll be amazed by the rich history of this area and its cultural significance to New Mexico. The more you explore, the more you'll want to stay.

Kasha-Katuwe Tent Rocks National Monument

Whether you're looking to study and observe one of nature's most fascinating outdoor laboratories or to hike in fascinating scenery, a visit to the "Tent Rocks" is a must. The cone-shaped rocks are the result of ancient volcanic eruptions and have been formed from wind and rain over the years. Be sure to pack hiking shoes and a camera, and spend some unforgettable time outside. The site is a favorite for those with inquisitive minds, as well as for outdoor enthusiasts.

The Monument is located 55 miles northeast of Albuquerque and 40 miles southwest of Santa Fe, with the most direct access from Interstate 25. Dogs are not allowed on the trails at **Kasha-Katuwe Tent Rocks National Monument**. www.blm.gov.

J&R Automotive Museum

View automotive history in one of Rio Rancho's treasured attractions. Home to a variety of classic cars dating back to the early 1900s, the museum brings to life the history of cars with a display of around 70 vehicles, auto-related memorabilia and a bookstore. www.jrvintageautos.com.

Sandia Lakes

Owned and operated by the Pueblo of Sandia, **Sandia Lakes** offers several options for visitors who enjoy the outdoors. With three fishing lakes, two miles of walking trails, wildlife, and large grassy areas, it is an outdoor playground, full of adventures for any family or group. **Sandia Lakes** is also available for rental for special events, such as weddings or family gatherings. www.sandialakes.net.

Ojito Wilderness

Perfect for hiking, sightseeing or camping, the **Ojito Wilderness** is a desert treasure, complete with hoodoos, steep-walled mesas, and deep arroyos. Bands of multi-colored shale, sandstone, and limestone draw attention to cliff sides. Piñon and juniper are dotted throughout the Wilderness, and rare stands of ponderosa pine can be found tucked into shady recesses. The **Ojito Wilderness** is a popular destination for mountain bikers and is open year round. www.blm.gov.





Coronado Historic Site

Located in Bernalillo, Coronado Historic Site is a site rich in the history and culture that shaped New Mexico. It features the ruins of the Kuana Pueblo, first settled around 1325. The site was originally occupied by Pueblo Indians, and was the northernmost of the Tiwa villages. The Tiwas assistance is said to have sustained Francisco Vasquez de Coronado and his men on their quest for "Seven Cities of Gold," before being abandoned. Murals which were uncovered in a ceremonial kiva on the site were painstakingly restored and are on display. These murals represent some of the finest examples of Pre-Columbian art ever found in the US. www.nmhistoricsites.org.

Hot Springs

Natural hot springs provide the perfect opportunity to slow down and relax while surrounded by scenic beauty. Sandoval County has several natural springs worth visiting, including Jemez Springs, Spence Hot Springs, San Antonio Hot Springs, McCauley Warm Springs, and Soda Dam and Springs.

The **Jemez Springs Bath House** is a non-profit, owned and operated by the Village of Jemez Springs. This historic bath house reflects the tranquility of the Jemez Valley by nurturing the health and well-being of mind, body and spirit. Unwind and rejuvenate with cool or hot natural mineral spring soaks and healing massages by licensed therapists in private treatment rooms. There are unique gifts, clothing items and handmade lotions in the gift shop.

Also in Jemez Springs, you'll find **Giggling Springs**, abundant in several beneficial minerals with healing and therapeutic traits. The pristine waters captured in an outdoor pool well up from the depths of the Valles Caldera—the extinct volcano 17 miles north of Jemez Springs. The location adjacent to Jemez River gives you the chance to cool off. There's a gift shop, beverages and changing rooms on the grounds. www.gigglingsprings.com.

Casa San Ysidro: The Gutiérrez/ Minge House

This historic museum provides a glimpse at the region's unique heritage. Now considered one of the world's most comprehensive collections of New Mexican art and furnishings, Casa San Ysidro shows how ordinary people created extraordinary things. The c.1875 home, restored and expanded by Dr. and Mrs. Ward Alan Minge, combines traditional building techniques and architectural features that evoke New Mexico's Spanish Colonial past. This museum is listed on the State Register of Cultural Properties and El Camino Real de **Tierra Adentro National Historic** Trail. Personalized, guided tours and special programs reveal how family, faith and farms have endured through the centuries in New Mexico. www.cabq.gov/ casasanysidro, 505.898.3915.

Fenton Lake State Park

The Jemez Mountains provide the backdrop for this stunning year-round retreat surrounded by beautiful ponderosa pine forests. **Fenton Lake State Park** is a mellow mountain escape. The Rio Cebolla flows through the park, and there is a fishing

and canoeing lake too. The park also attracts campers, hikers and cross-country skiers. There's even a fun playground for the kids.

Stocked with rainbow trout from fall through spring, the lake is home to German brown trout, an ideal spot for flyfishing. Although most anglers prefer the warmth and comfort of summer, there is also winter ice fishing. Find food and fishing supplies in nearby La Cueva. www.emnrd.state.nm.us.

Seven Springs Fish Hatchery


The Hatchery is located about 22 miles north of Jemez Springs and 4 miles north of Fenton Lake. Built in 1936, the hatchery is responsible for the production and distribution of native Rio Grande cutthroat trout, New Mexico's State Fish. Visitors are welcome at **Seven Springs Fish Hatchery** near Cebolla Canyon. The Ice Pond is stocked by the hatchery and open to fishermen ages 12 and under and 65 and older. www.wildlife.state.nm.us.


Jemez Historic Site

A short drive from Albuquerque and Bernalillo, and just north of the Village of Jemez Springs, the Jemez Historic Site is one of the most beautiful prehistoric and historic sites in the Southwest. The site was listed on the National **Register of Historic** Places in 1973, and in 2012 it was designated as a National Historic Landmark. It includes the stone ruins of a 500 year old Indian village and the San José de los Jemez church dating to 1610. The village of Giusewa was built in the narrow San Diego Canyon by the ancestors of the present-day people of the Jemez (Walatowa) Pueblo. The name Giusewa refers to the numerous natural hot springs in the area.

In the 17th century, the Spanish established a Catholic mission at the village. The mission was shortlived, and in time, the people abandoned the site and moved to the current location of Jemez Pueblo. The massive stonewalls were constructed about the same time the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock. The heritage center contains exhibitions that tell the story of the site through the words of the Jemez people. A 1,400-foot interpretive trail winds through the impressive site ruins. There are Educational Programs at the **Jemez Historic Site** and rangers on duty if you have questions.

Cochiti Pueblo

Cochiti is home to the breathtaking **Kasha-Katuwe Tent Rocks National Monument**. Cochiti Pueblo owns and operates the **Pueblo de Cochiti Golf Course** and a nearby convenience store and pizza restaurant. **Cochiti Lake** offers boating, campsites, scenic overlooks and picnic areas. RV camping, a nature trail and a visitor center can be found at the **Tetilla Peak Recreation Area**, just east of the lake.

Jemez Pueblo

Jemez Pueblo is home to the Walatowa Visitor Center. The Visitor Center, located at the Jemez Red Rocks scenic area, provides information on the area, national forests and the Jemez Mountain Trail National Scenic Byway. The Red Rocks Trail is open for guided hikes which must be scheduled.

The center's gift shop and museum focus on the history and culture of Jemez Pueblo. For snacks, gas, or to shop for crafts, visit the **Walatowa Convenience Store**.

There are 100 RV spaces with electrical hook-ups and an RV waste disposal site right next to the 24-hour San Felipe Travel Center, which has a restaurant, gift shop and truckers lounge.

The Bien Mur Indian Market **Center** has authentic Indian arts and crafts, and the nearby Travel Center offers gas, diesel, a deli and convenience store, discount cigarette sales and a car wash. Sandia Resort and Casino has gambling, a conference center, spa, fine dining and live entertainment in its outdoor amphitheater. Visitors can also enjoy teeing off at the scenic Sandia Golf Club.

Santa Ana Pueblo

(I-25 Exit 242) Santa Ana Pueblo is located on State Road 313, off US

550 in Bernalillo. Santa Ana owns and operates the Hyatt Regency Tamaya Resort and Spa and the Twin Warriors Golf Club. Nearby is a sister golf course, the **Santa** Ana Golf Club. and the Prairie Star Restaurant. Santa Ana Star Casino features gambling, live entertainment and bowling. The Warrior Gas Station & Convenience Store has everything you need to get you on your way, and nearby Jemez Canyon Dam Overlook has day picnic sites.

Santo Domingo Pueblo

(I-25 Exit 259) Santo Domingo Pueblo, on State Road 22, is known for its beautiful turquoise jewelry and its pottery. Be sure to stop in during Labor Day weekend for the Annual Santo



Domingo Arts & Crafts Market, where artisans from throughout the area sell beautiful pieces of traditional artwork.





Jemez Mountain Trail Scenic Byway

Jemez Mountain Trail Scenic Byway is one of the six scenic routes in New Mexico designated as a National Scenic Byway—an honor given to only 55 routes in the nation!

Historical and cultural stops along the way, combined with the breathtaking scenic beauty and unique activities, make this road trip one to remember. Beginning in the **Village of San Ysidro** the only surviving settlement of the original "Pueblos de los Jemez"—follow the course of the Jemez River to the majestic mesas of Cañon de San Diego and **Jemez Pueblo**.

As you continue north, you'll want to have a camera ready to capture the crimson-colored formations known as **Red Rocks**. Options abound on the road ahead with **Ponderosa Winery**, the **Gilman Tunnels**, and the village of **Jemez Springs**. At **Jemez Springs**, you'll find restaurants, art and craft galleries, natural springs, and several bed and breakfast lodging options. Horseback tours, cross country skiing




and snowshoeing trips can be arranged nearby.

The fun continues at the **Jemez Historic Site** featuring educational exhibits, a self-guided tour and expansive picnic areas. Stop and marvel at **Soda Dam**, a unique and spectacular natural dam that blocks the Jemez River.

At this point in your excursion, the trail continues in both

directions. To the east lies one of the largest volcanic calderas in the world, Valles Caldera National Preserve, and Bandelier National Monument, which provides an opportunity to explore Ancestral Pueblo dwellings. To the west is Fenton Lake State Park and the town of Cuba which leads to the beautiful Santa Fe National Forest. Jemez Historic Site







Placitas

It's a pleasure to hike or bike one of the numerous trails in the Sandia foothills surrounding Placitas. Enjoy a meal at a locally owned restaurant, take in a Friday night wine tasting at the grocery store, visit Anasazi Fields Winery, stroll through our galleries and fall in love with the peacefulness. Take a drive on SR165 to explore Sandia Man Cave and travel to the top of the Sandias to take in magnificent views of Albuquerque with colorful aspens or snowy slopes, depending on the season. www.placitaschamber.com.

Corrales Road

The Village of Corrales offers visitors a chance to step back into the history and culture that shaped New Mexico, set amid a rich and gorgeous agricultural community. The seven-mile stretch of road provides old-style New Mexico charm, complete with diverse shops, art galleries, historic buildings, scenic beauty, and one-of-a-kind restaurants.

Visit Casa San Ysidro: The Gutiérrez/Minge House for a glimpse into the region's unique heritage. Now considered one of the world's most comprehensive collections of New Mexican art and furnishings, this c.1875 home shows how ordinary people created extraordinary things.

The lovely **San Ysidro Church** is a historic church on Church Road in Corrales. It was built in 1868 and added to the National Register in 1980.

In addition to traditional New Mexican architecture and experiences, Corrales is home to the **Rio Grande Bosque Preserve**, where you can observe wildlife,

Route 66

While Route 66 is associated with the diners and motels of the decades past, parts of this historic road in Sandoval County have preserved history of centuries past. Surrounded by rural communities, farming and ranching culture, and beautiful scenery, the stretch of road that was included in the original Route 66, prior to 1938, meanders circuitously through Sandoval County and allows travelers to immerse themselves in the pages of history.


Just off the beaten path between Albuquerque and Santa Fe, take exit 248 to Algodones, a scenic rural community, and head south to the town of Bernalillo, which showcases El Zócalo, an historic 1874 convent listed on the National Register of Historic Places and Our Lady of Sorrows Chapel. See the artwork of Edward Gonzales, Mateo Romero and others at the **Gathering Artists Gallery**. This stretch of Route 66 is sure to provide a reminiscent glimpse into the history of the region. www.historic66.com.



El Camino Real

Meaning "The Royal Road," this historic and scenic byway follows the Rio Grande from the U.S./Mexico border to Santa Fe. Utilized for over 300 years as the Southwest's main road for travelers, portions of the road along the Rio Grande Pueblo Indian Trail were in use since before the arrival of Spanish explorers.

To explore the parts of the road within Sandoval County, follow NM 16 west to **Cochiti**. Go to **Peña Blanca**, and then to NM 22 toward **Santo Domingo**. In **Santo Domingo** take NM 16, and then travel NM 313 to **San Felipe** and Algodones. The path will take you through three pueblos—**Cochiti**, **Santo Domingo**, and **San Felipe**.

Biking in Valles Caldera

Hiking

Kasha-Katuwe Tent Rocks National Monument provide one-of-a-kind hiking experiences amongst rocks formed by ancient volcanic eruptions. Santa Fe National Forest hikes are as plentiful and diverse as the life zones of the forest. With so many elevations and habitat types, there is year-round access to hiking trails in the forest. Popular hikes include Battleship Rocks, Jemez Falls, Las Conchas Trail, McCauley Hot Springs, San Pedro Parks trails and Dome Wilderness. (www. fs.usda.gov/santafe). The Sandia Mountains, close to Albuquerque and Placitas, offer a convenient chance to connect with nature. www.fs.usda.gov/cibola.

Biking

Cyclists will find a peaceful ride in the shade of cottonwoods on a trail that winds through the **Rio Grande Bosque** near Corrales. Intermediate and advanced riders can explore **Guacamalla and Paliza Canyons**. www.newmexico.org/true-outdoors.

Fishing

Sandoval County is the perfect destination for those who love the outdoors and enjoy fishing. San Pedro Parks Wilderness is home to native cutthroat trout. Fenton Lake offers picnic areas, wheelchair accessible platforms and even ice fishing in the winter. San Antonio Creek offers plenty of catch-and-release fishing opportunities. Fly-fishing enthusiasts can enjoy the Rio Cebolla in the Jemez Mountains.

Visitors are welcome at **Seven Springs Fish Hatchery** near Jemez. The Ice Pond is stocked and open to children 12 and younger and adults 65 and older. At **Cochiti Lake**, catch catfish, crappie, bass, bluegill and perch. The **Sandia Lakes Recreation Area** offers several ponds stocked with trout and other fish. www.wildlife.state.nm.us.

Hunting

There's more than 30 million acres of public lands open to hunting in New Mexico, with a comparable amount of private land also available. **The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish** publishes the annual Proclamation of Big Game and Furbearer Seasons in late January or early February with specifics for hunters.

A current list of active outfitters or guides can be obtained from New Mexico Council of Outfitters and Guides, www. nmoutfitters.com or by calling 505.522.9845. Hunting is also allowed on certain tribal lands. Navajo Nation Department of Fish and Wildlife, 928.871.6451.

Nearby **Twin Warriors Golf Course** is part of the Hyatt Regency Tamaya Resort & Spa. **Cochiti Golf Course** was designed by Robert Trent Jones Junior and **Club Rio Rancho Golf** is popular with the locals as well as guests. www.newmexico.org/golf.

Water Activities

The gentle waters of the **Rio Grande** offer family-friendly adventures like kayaking, floating or paddleboarding. Spring is a great time to take a guided trip with **Quiet Waters Paddling Adventures**. You can sail, windsurf and swim at **Cochiti Lake**, which is popular year-round.

Winter Activities

Forest areas throughout the **Santa Fe National Forest**, including wilderness areas, are open to Nordic skiing and snowshoeing. Generally, the higher the elevation, the better the snow. An easy 2½ mile loop trail starts near Redondo Campground in the Jemez, but cross-country aficionados will thrive in the challenging **San Pedro Parks Wilderness Area** or the open space at **Valles Caldera**.

Telemark skiers can practice on the west side of **Corral Canyon** and **Upper San Antonio Canyon**. Try the open mountain trails on the east side of **San Antonio Creek**. www.newmexico.org/ski.

Hot Air Ballooning

Year-round hot air ballooning in Sandoval County includes competitive events the third weekend of every month sponsored by Top Gun, the local division of the Balloon Federation of America. The Albuquerque **Erostat Ascension Association** hosts the Friends and Lovers Rally in February (the weekend before Valentine's Day) as well as the Jingle Bell "Non Rally" in December. Our neighbor and partner, the City of Albuquerque, is host to the Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta, the world's largest, held annually in October.

Rio Rancho Sporting Options



Corrales Bistro Brewery has food and live music almost every night of the week. Whatever your tastes, you're sure to find a beer that makes a lasting impression.






Dining Options




