The event is put on by the Webster Pond Association as a way of thanking our veterans for their service. About 20 to 30 VA Hospital residents are expected to partake in the event, usually with the help of an aide or a family member.

"I'm happy to be helping to support such a wonderful event which gives local veterans the opportunity to enjoy the beautiful resources we have in our community," said Assemblyman William Magnarelli, D-Syracuse. "Fishing is a pastime many veterans enjoy but are unable to schedule as they are recovering from their physical ailments. • On Saturday night, May 3rd, at the Liverpool Holiday Inn, Senator John "Pit Bull" DeFrancisco duked it out with "Sugar" Ray Rinaldi, to raise money for the youth centers run by Rinaldi located at 507 Pond Street and 307 S. Geddes Street. Assemblyman Bill Magnarelli was an assistant in Ray Rinaldi's corner and Common Council President Van Robinson assisted in Senator DeFrancisco's corner. Assemblyman Magnarelli co-sponsors the Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Business Act

Assemblyman Magnarelli announced that a bipartisan agreement has been reached by the Assembly, Senate and Governor to implement the "Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Business Act." The act sets a 6-percent

participation goal in the awarding of state contracts to service-disabled veteran-owned businesses.

New York is home to more than 900,000 veterans, 72 percent of whom have served during periods of conflict. Approximately 88,000 New Yorkers served in Afghanistan or Iraq. Additionally, the state is home to approximately 30,000 active duty military personnel, as well as 30,000 National Guard and Reserve personnel. In addition, 1 in 7 veterans are self-employed or small-business owners. With passage of the Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Business Act, New York will join 44 other states and the federal government in implementing a program to help self-employed service-disabled veterans gain more state contracts.

Assemblyman Magnarelli said, "The leadership qualities and specialized skills our troops learn help make them successful business owners stateside. The beauty of this program is we're spurring job creation while helping veterans and their families get ahead and honoring the sacrifice these brave men and women have made for our country and our state."

Mayor Miner thanks NYS legislative delegation

Mayor Stephanie A. Miner thanked members of Syracuse's New York State legislative delegation for their efforts in securing \$234,995 in additional Consolidated Local Street and Highway Improvement funding (CHIPS) in the state budget. The funding will be used to support fixing potholes and other street improvements after the recent challenging winter.

"I want to thank Senator DeFrancisco, Senator Valesky, Assemblyman Magnarelli and Assemblyman Roberts for delivering this important funding for our community," said Mayor Miner. "Everyone who drives on city roadways understands potholes are a serious problem. The delegation has assured me there is more funding available and we will be partners in securing that money for Syacuse."

Assemblyman Magnarelli helped launch Governor Cuomo's Citizen Preparedness Corps Training Program

The Citizen Preparedness Training session was held at Onondaga Community College on April 12th. The training program will train approximately 100,000 New Yorkers during 2014 in the proper preparation for emergencies or disasters. The program seeks to provide citizens with the tools and resources to respond to emergencies and recover as quickly as possible to pre-disaster conditions. The training was led by the New York National Guard who worked with experts from the Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services' Office of Emergency Management and the Office of Fire Prevention and Control, and local county emergency management personnel. Assemblyman Magnarelli a supporter of the Central New York's Stewards of Children Campaign

"If you're an adult in Central New York, you need to take this course," said Linda Cleary, Executive Director

of the McMahon/Ryan Advocacy Center. This includes you if you are a parent, or if you work with kids, or if you're just a responsible person who cares about our community. You have the power to save a child – maybe your own – from the lifetime of pain that child sexual abuse can cause."

One in 10 children in Central New York will become a victim of sexual abuse before they turn 18. It's a shocking statistic that holds true regardless of the child's race, neighborhood, family income level. Every child is at risk. Most victims never report the abuse. Most abusers go out of their way to appear trustworthy. That means you probably know a child who is being victimized.

Darkness to Light, a national nonprofit, has developed an award-winning, evidence-informed course, Stewards of Children, to educate adults about the steps they can take to prevent, recognize and react responsibly to the reality of child sexual abuse. It emphasizes that preventing child sexual abuse



is an adult responsibility, because young children aren't equipped to fend off sexual advances from a relative or family friend.

The CNY Darkness to Light Collaboration plans to ignite behavior change by training a critical mass of 18,000 adults – 5 percent of the adult population – in Onondaga County by 2020. To reach that tipping point, the collaboration is asking local companies, agencies and non-profits to dedicate resources to provide Steward of Children training.
