Memories of a Car Guy by Hap Schadler

[Editor's Note: This is Part Four of a serial article by one of our own club members, Hap Schadler, chronicling his love of the automobile and some of the a many interesting cars he has owned.

When we left Part Three, Hap had just finished describing his modifications to his 1973 Mustang Coupe]

The '73 Mustang was a nice car and I drove it on several long trips down south and daily to Springfield for my summer intern job with White Motors. I also drove it in a number of autocrosses which culminated in a SCCA autocross at Powel Speedway. Powel Speedway had been a paved race track. It could be rented out for club events which the local SCCA did for the Columbus area.



The track was a combination of a quarter mile oval inside a half mile outer oval. The inner oval feeding into the main straight used by the outer oval. Both ovals were banked, but the condition of the asphalt was getting bad and the inner and outer edges of the track were rough and in some cases fell away from the asphalt. The SCCA had set up a course that started on the inner oval and then transitioned onto the outer oval by means of a hair pin turn where they met up. The course then ran on the outer oval to the finish where the two courses met up again. This made for a nice long course, but one where the turns were in many cases off camber. I had run this course a couple of times before, but in this instance while negotiating a turn at the top of the banking on the outer oval I went into a slide which spun the car around and down the banking. There was a ditch at this point on the inside of the track which I hit going sideways. This popped the inside two tires off their rims and the car rolled over onto its roof. I wound up upside down in the car still buckled into my seat. I shut off the car's engine, released my belt, and crawled through the door window which was luckily down. Everyone came out to look at the car, but my mood wasn't helped by the young woman who drove a Porsche that said "Well at least you didn't wreck anything worth some money". The SCCA corner marshals helped me to roll the car back over. They then helped pop the two tires back on their rims and inflated the tires. I climbed back in the car and it started so I drove it back to the pit area and called my parents. They drove out together in the '65 Mustang to see what they could do to help me. This gave me time to check the car out. The roof had been flattened a little, and nearly every body panel had some damage to it. Some acid from the battery had leaked out and eaten through the paint on one fender. The front window had cracks running all through it, but had one area in the driver's line of sight that was about as big as a pizza pan without a crack in it. I topped off the battery with some water, checked the oil and brake fluid, and checked the tires and their air pressure. It appeared that the car was operable.

About this time my parents arrived. I was of course very upset and apologized for having to call them about what had happened. My Dad checked the car out as well and suggested I just drive it home. He would lead and I could follow him. My mother would ride along with me. With this plan in place we left for home. My Dad set a rather fast pace considering the condition of my car and with the traffic we ran into he soon had disappeared from sight. This led to my mother cursing my father out in front of me. One of the only times I ever remember her doing so. I soldiered on peering through my little piece of uncracked glass until we had covered the 40 miles back to our house. The following day I called my insurance agent about my accident and was grilled by several insurance investigators over the following several days on what had happened. One of the older drivers at the autocross had coached me on what to say to them. "Never say you were racing. Say you were in a timed noncompetitive event". I held to this story and whether for this reason or due to my insurance being with the same agent as my Dad's insurance they agreed to fix my car. Off it went to a Lincoln Mercury body shop near where we lived. They cut off and replaced the roof, replaced fenders, and repaired damaged body panels. A new windshield and a complete paint job brought the car back to its former condition. In today's world they probably would have just totaled the car, but in those days if the repair work could be done for around half of the cars value they would fix the car. Unfortunately the car never seemed the same after I got it back and I decided to trade it in on a 1975 Mustang 2.

The Mustang 2 was a smaller car than the '73 Mustang. It also had a much better suspension and front disk brakes. The model I wanted had the V6 and a four speed transmission. It was a silver Hatchback with a silver grey interior with red accents. It also had manual steering, manual brakes, and an AM-FM radio. No air conditioning. After trading in my '73 Mustang and incurring additional debt, it was mine. This became my new school and work car. I of course also auto crossed it
