"Planting the Water"

**Utilizing Rainwater Harvesting Techniques
in Habitat Restoration**

Any landscape project, whether it's a small back yard garden or a vast wildlife preserve, benefits when the water is planted first. Mike Gaglio will take us on a tour of some his landscape and restoration projects, highlighting the importance of rainwater harvesting as a basis for building a living and regenerative landscape. Mike will demonstrate how you can do the same in your very own yard.

Mike Gaglio is a biologist and owner of High Desert Native Plants LLC. Mike has also been doing habitat restoration and wetland construction and focuses on rain water harvesting principles to establish self sustaining and regenerative landscapes that provide beauty, habitat, and function for replenishing water resources. He is a 4th generation native El Pasoan, has B.S. and M.S. degrees in biology from UTEP, is an outdoor enthusiast, and a strong advocate for land and water conservation.

The veterinarians and administration at the zoo agreed to take on this responsibility but funding for food, medicine and supplies has to come from donations. EPTPA is excited to help with this opportunity to give to such a worthwhile endeavor.



AT FEATHER LAKE

Except for a very modest and brief inflow of water in early January, Feather Lake has been dry thus far in 2016. The basin was completely dry throughout February for the 6th consecutive year and completely dry throughout March for the 5th year in the last 6.

Our next workday at Feather Lake will be **Sat., April 16**, starting at **2 p.m.** We'll be back at work on the diverse array of trash that washed into the basin on the few occasions it received storm runoff last year.

Bob Johnson was a stalwart member of our Audubon chapter for many, many years. Bob held many official & unofficial positions and roles over the decades...chapter president, rare bird finder, field trip leader, newsletter collator aide, bird sightings reporter, Christmas Bird Count compiler, Hueco Tanks & Keystone Wetlands guide, bird identifier, teacher & cheerleader...you name it & Bob did it, and usually with a sense of purpose & a sparkle in his eyes.

Bob was a great friend to a number of us, and a great friend to the birds. If you had known Bob, hopefully the following memories will bring a smile to your face [and If you hadn't, it may make you wish that you had].

Memories of Bob Johnson

Bob was a great friend, no matter where we were & whatever the occasion. Whether we were out in the field birding & searching for a rare bird, celebrating Christmas together with friends, teaching a Life-Long Learning class, conducting some sort of 'rescue operation' [for each other, a bird or someone else], or leading a week-end Audubon field trip, Bob was an excellent & steady influence over the course of many, many years. Bob was an organizer, a bird data compiler, & someone who always made sure that inclusiveness was a key to what he was involved in. Bob was almost always able to put on a 'best face' despite his physical condition of the past few years, and always remained interested in the latest bird, people & places info we had to share with him on our regular visits. Bob was a military man, a sportsman in his later years via regular medaling in the local Senior Games, and a very, very good man who is already missed.

Bob Johnson was my friend and neighbor. Bob was a kind man. He was always there for me when I needed help. He helped me out more times than I can remember with rides and making and fixing things. Some things I remember is that Bob was a great long-term field trip leader that went way out of his way to teach people about birds. He was easy-going and had a good sense of humor. Bob loved Zimba, my dog. He had some loveable quirks like driving off the side of the road while birding. He talked a lot and I would get impatient because he took a very long time to tell a story. I birded with Bob regularly for almost 15 years. He was my "birding buddy." I accompanied Bob over the years while he monitored "Hawk Alley" and the "Fred Harvey Wastewater treatment plant." We birded all over El Paso, SE Arizona, NM, Fort Davis, Big Bend, Hill Country, and the Coastal Bend, etc. many times over.

Bob Johnson was pivotal in my journey into serious birding. I had always been a passionate naturalist and outdoorsman but upon meeting Bob and seeing birds through his eyes, my interest in listing and traveling to see specific birds really took off. We had many chases together, Bob usually sleeping in the back of his van. He also had the best system I've seen for keeping a bottle of wine upright and stored properly, and always quick with a story around happy hour. Bob had what I call the "hunter's eye". If there was any movement within his field of vision, he was on it immediately. A great birder, a great friend and mentor. I miss him greatly.

Birdathon counters are already "in training" in preparation for Birdathon 2016.

What is Birdathon, you might ask?

One thing is for sure, it's not your average bird count or fund raiser! Birdathon is unusual and different: a wild weekend of birding and our organization's most important source of income for conservation and education programs.

CHAPTER OPERATIONS

Your support allows our chapter to work alongside other organizations to support conservation & education.

RIO BOSQUE WETLANDS PARK

Each year, this site along the Rio Grande becomes more valuable as habitat for birds and other wildlife.

AUDUBON TEXAS

Our support helps keep National Audubon's state office an effective voice for birds, other wildlife and their habitats in Texas.

EL PASO ZOO

Our support helps injured or young birds to be rehabilitated and released back into the wild.

How Birdathon Works

On the weekend of **April 30 - May 1**, our dedicated Birdathon counters will be busy scouring the countryside, trying to find as many bird species as possible, in a single 24-hour blitz. These hardy, energized and intrepid individuals will start early, stay out late, visit varied wildlife habitats and give their eyes, ears and bird knowledge a full workout. Why do they push themselves so hard? For the pleasure of a day in the field, for a test of their birding skills and **most importantly, for a better West Texas environment.**

Each counter will be backed by sponsors who pledge either a given amount for each species seen or a fixed total amount. Most counters will identify 50 to 100 species. A pledge of, say \$0.50 per species for 60 species would result in a contribution of \$30. 95% of Birdathon income goes to the programs and projects; 5% to fundraising (printing, paper and postage).

When I first moved to El Paso twenty four years ago, Bob was the face of the local chapter. Whether it was Audubon or UTEP basketball, he was an energetic and loyal supporter of that which he loved. Bob was most in his element at a chapter function, like a Birdathon potluck, where he was quick with a story or joke and eager to hear about what others had seen. A strength was his ability to include others. He has been missed.

In early years of the ROADRUNNER the collating and folding was done entirely by hand, a time-consuming task, and often a solo one. Bob was really good about coming to my house to help out. He used a tool from his wallpaper business to make a sharp crease on the edge of the newsletter before I stapled them. I was happy for his company and help.

Bob and I were good birding friends. He was my mentor. I was the eyes and ears so I would find the bird and he would identify it. I learned a lot about birding from Bob. We made a good team. He was kind enough to pick me up and take me to the Audubon meetings and bird tours when I was not old enough to drive. He was the president of the El Paso/Trans Pecos Audubon chapter for several years and field trip leader and organizer. People would call and report birds and he and I would go check out the sightings. Sometimes we would find it was just an unusual looking rock dove, other times it would be a yellow billed loon or three long tailed jaegers at the NEOP. He did not talk much about his time as an officer in the Army. About all I knew was he worked with the Nike missile system. He volunteered as a bird tour guide at Hueco Tanks state park, and I was his assistant. Now I volunteer at Hueco Tanks, so his influence lives on.

Goodbye to Bob Johnson, Power Birder, Guide, Photographer, Lecturer, Friend. Devoted UTEP Sports Fan. Generous with his time & energy, and knowledge of birds. On one of Bob's East Texas T.O.S. trips, I saw 99 lifers. I still have that list, somewhere. Bob strived to help all Birders add to their list and know birds personally. 'Hawk Alley' was one of his favorite places. We could call it 'Bob's Hawk Alley. Hawks are always there.

We shared season tickets to Miner basketball in the same small section of the Don Haskins Center as Bob for many years. We looked forward to seeing him at each game we attended and chatting with him. Our conversations ranged from how we each thought the Miners were doing & how they could improve to the most recent birding news. He always greeted us with a friendly smile and enthusiasm. Section RR hasn't been the same without him. He will be missed.

Bob Johnson didn't earn the nickname "Wild Birder" by accident...but it was by almost-accident. On an Audubon field trip in Hudspeth County in the late 1980s, the caravan of vehicles was stopping when interesting birds were seen. At one stop, Bob, his focus on the countryside and potential birds, nearly bumped the vehicle ahead. Art Arteaga, startled but always quick with a quip, commented, "That Bob Johnson, he's a wild birder!" Not surprisingly, Bob enthusiastically adopted the moniker. Gradually, it began to appear on name tags, on business cards, in outgoing phone messages, in field-trip announcements and, once email became prevalent, in Bob's email address. And, given his boundless energy and wild enthusiasm for birds, it truly was the perfect nickname.

TEXAS NATURE TRACKERS TRAINING HOW TO DOCUMENT AND LEARN ABOUT YOUR OBSERVATIONS IN NATURE

Cullen Hanks, TPWD Texas Nature Trackers Biologist, and Michael Warriner, TPWD Rare Species Biologist, will be giving a training and leading a participatory field trip for Texas Master Naturalists and members of the public interested in observing nature. The Texas Nature Trackers Program, a citizen-science monitoring effort is designed to engage the naturalist community and contribute data on species of concern in Texas. DIRECTIONS: Heading East on Interstate 10, exit Right on Highway 375 South (Americas). Go south and take the Socorro / Pan American exit. Pass Socorro Road (middle lane), turn Left on Pan American Drive. Continue on Pan American, pass Winn Road, cross the canal bridge and turn Left at the entrance to the Bustamante Wastewater Treatment Plant along the levee road alongside the canal. Continue down the levee road to the Visitor Center entrance off the Right just short of the intersecting road & bridge.
