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LCU TEACHER EDUCATION STUDENTS PRESENT RESEARCH AT NATIONAL

CONFERNCE: Four LCU teacher education majors conducted research on effective teaching practices and developed instructional materials for use in elementary and secondary classrooms. They then presented their research at the National Council for the Social Studies Conference in Washington, DC. LCU and The CH Foundation assisted with student travel to the conference, and the South Plains Foundation provided support for the historical photographs obtained from the Southwest Collection. Sydney Kennedy and Katie Turnipseed developed a simulation focusing on the qualifications of presidential candidates. Claire Bruffey and Brooke Pendergrass created local history resources highlighting life in Lubbock and national events during The Progressive Era and World War I. EDUCATION JOURNAL: LCU education undergraduate students Sydney Kennedy and Katie Turnipseed worked with Dr. Sam Ayers to develop an educational simulation for use in social studies classrooms. The research project was sponsored in part by The CH Foundation. The research resulted in development of two simulations that could be used with upper elementary or middle school students. The materials require students to consider personal and professional qualities when evaluating candidates for political office and to focus on these qualifications. "Qualified to be President: Identifying the Best Candidate" was printed as a lesson plan in the Summer 2016 issue of The Social Studies TEXAN, the official publication of the Texas Council for the Social Studies. TEACHER AWARD NOMINATIONS: The Lubbock Christian University School of Education has again partnered with The Knowledge Center to recognize the Distinguished Educators of Lubbock County. The <u>CH</u> Foundation and The Community Foundation of West Texas are also partnering to support this initiative. Public school districts with attendance areas located within Lubbock County were eligible to nominate one outstanding teacher. Nomination materials were provided to area superintendents. The Distinguished Educators of Lubbock County each receive an engraved brass teacher hand bell and \$100. The top two teachers as selected by the Blue Ribbon Panel receive the 2017 Lubbock Christian Award for Excellence in Teaching and \$1,000 each. The deadline for completing all nomination and reflection materials was December 2, 2016. A reception honoring the nominees is scheduled for March 21, 2017 at the LCU Baker Conference Center.
