OUR CHURCH'S CHRISTMAS SEASON

commemorating the birth of Jesus Christ begins with the vigil Mass Sunday evening. For our Catholic Church Christmas is observed not just a single day but comprises an extended liturgical season of joy and celebration. It involves many symbols and traditions and biblical persons, special music, prayers by the priest from the Sacramentary and special readings proclaimed by the lectors from the Lectionary. Christmas is for us a season lasting 12 days and ends with the Sunday celebrating the Baptism of Jesus. The secular world, by contrast, commercializes the season starting after Halloween and ending it on Christmas Day, December 25th.

- Octave of Christmas
 - (8 days, Dec 25 – Jan 1)
- Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God
 - (January 1)
- Ends on Sunday of the Baptism of the Lord

speaker visiting parishes throughout the United States. About 95% of the donations for Food For the Poor, a 35 year-old international charity, directly help hungry poor families 16 Latin American countries as well as Haiti. FFO also helps to lift people out of poverty and build sustainable communities.

At the usual three Masses next weekend, Father Victor will provide more details about the FFP brochures (English / Spanish) available in the pews. After Mass, he will answer questions and collect envelopes with prayer requests, pledges or donations.

We welcome the stranger, the traveler, the guest, students home from college.


We welcome armed forces personnel home on leave. We welcome those who moved away but rejoin us over these Christmas holidays.

Pope Francis on Mary's "Yes"



"Mary first conceived Jesus in faith and then in the flesh, when she said "yes" to the message God gave her through the angel. What does this mean? It means that God did not want to become

man by bypassing our freedom; he wanted to pass through Mary's free assent, through her "yes". He asked her: "Are you prepared to do this?" And she replied: "Yes".



Do we think that Jesus' incarnation is simply a past event which has nothing to do with us personally? Believing in Jesus means giving him our flesh with the humility and courage of Mary, so that he can continue to dwell in our midst. It means giving him our hands, to caress the little ones and the poor; our feet, to go forth and meet our brothers and sisters; our arms, to hold up the weak and to work in the Lord's vineyard, our minds, to think and act in the light of the Gospel; and especially to offer our hearts to love and to make choices in accordance with God's will. All this happens thanks to the working of the Holy Spirit. And in this way we become instruments in God's hands, so that Jesus can act in the world through us."
