




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Gene McCarthy is our VP and Artist.

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The Frontiersmen by Gene McCarthy, Chapter VP

The frontiersmen were a hardy lot, living between settled and unsettled lands, between civilization and the unknown wilderness. They often cleared the land and built shelters for themselves and for others, they raised children and grew crops and helped to establish new nation. Men like Jim Bridger, Kit Carson, Jedidiah Smith, Lewis and Clark and Daniel Boone fit the description of frontiersmen, and so did my 6th Great Grandfather Colonel Richard Callaway.

Writers like Patrick Spero and James Fenimore Cooper and others wrote about the adventures of those who dared to explore uncharted lands. According to an article published by R. Alexander Bate, M.D. in The Filson Club History Quarterly [volume 29, no. 1. January 1955, Louisville, Kentucky], "Probably no single man accomplished more than did Colonel Richard Callaway in laying the foundation that culminated in the admission of Kentucky into the Union on June 1, 1792". Colonel Callaway was frontiersman, an adventurer, a militiaman, landowner, a builder and a member of the first legislature of Kentucky. They met under a tree.

According to a Richard Callaway bible entry, He was born June 14, 1717 to Joseph Callaway and Catherine Ann Browning somewhere in Essex or Caroline County Virginia. I don't have much information about young Callaway until 1745 when he married Frances Walton. To this union 13 children were born before Frances died. He later married Elizabeth Jones Hoy. To this union three more Callaway children were born.


Richard Callaway served with distinction during the period of the French and Indian Wars (1754 to 1763) and was promoted to the rank of Colonel of the Virginia Militia. He was tasked with the protection of three hundred and fifty miles of frontier wilderness and had command at Black Water Fort and became skilled at construction and defense of outpost forts.

Historical records indicate that Col. Callaway moved from Virginia to the Yadkin region (which is now north central North Carolina) where he became the neighbor and good friend to the famous explorer Daniel Boone. His association with Daniel Boone and with Col. Henderson of the Transylvania Land Company would eventually result in the founding of Boonesborough. He and about 28 other pioneers marked and cut out a road to the place of their destination - Boonesborough. They were attacked by Indians, one man was killed and another wounded, but they pursued on with their mission in what would one day become known as Kentucky.

On July 14, 1776, two of Colonel Callaway's daughters and one of Daniel Boone's were kidnapped by a Cherokee Shawnee raiding party near the fort. Both Boone and Callaway led two separate search parties and within two days the girls were rescued. This event is said to have been the inspiration for the book "The Last Days of the Mohicans, by James Fenimore Cooper and books and movies, and an oil painting, titled: "*The Abduction of Boone's Daughter by the Indians*", by Charles Wimar. While working on a ferry with a companion, Colonel Richard Callaway was killed, scalped and burned on March 8, 1780 by Shawnee Indians. When it was founded in 1822, Calloway County, Kentucky, was named in honor of Richard Callaway. **RIP Grandfather**.
