PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE:

The Changing Church: Civil Religion and the Call of the Gospel

150 years ago, when Father I.O. Sloan stepped off the train in Bismarck, he declared that his mission was to "make peace out of pandemonium." His ally, the prolific Linda Slaughter, went to local businesses (even some of the more disreputable ones) and asked them to donate, telling them that the presence of a church in Bismarck would be good for the city and attract more people (hence more customers!) Both of them revealed a common belief of their day, one that dates back to some of the earliest colonial settlers – the role of the church is to encourage the establishment of a societal order of civility for the common good.

The relationship between the church and society has undergone a lot of changes since their day, the church on the corner is no longer the central arbitrator of social value and structure. Some say this is a bad thing – I recently read, "Alienated American" by Tim Carney who claims, "The unchurching of America is at the root of America's economic and social problems," and, "almost, he persuadest me" (Acts 2:28 KJV.) Others take a different view – they maintain that it is actually better for the church's calling to be decentralized from society, that we are compromised when we allow ourselves to be a tool for the culture, that we were not created to serve an earthly society, but a heavenly one, and that the best thing we can do is hold ourselves apart – what the church needs most is to "simply be the church." Of course, there are variations in the debate I do not have the space to spell out here.

My purpose for mentioning this as we head into our 150th anniversary is to make a point that I think could otherwise be lost: that is, that this church, its high times, its low times, its current functioning and its future goals has been the beneficiary and the victim of this changing conversation. Our story has followed the pattern of many mainline churches, we have ebbed and flowed with the changes to the culture outside our doors. Every generation is challenged anew to respond to the changing dimensions of the role of church to the larger culture. Adaptation is everything.





PASTOR'S MESSAGE CONTINUED:

150 years of faithfulness is nothing to sneeze at — we have done many things right for a very long time. The question for us is this: what is God calling us to be now, today, in our world as it is. We can no longer rely on our status as a societally necessary downtown church to draw people to us — we must adapt, we must seek souls for the kingdom. We must go to them. Outreach is the call of the day.

As we thank God for the 150 years of holy faithfulness, let us turn our attention to prayer for "marching orders," inspiration and resources for the next 100 years. As Jesus said, Matthew 9:35-38 Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and healing every disease and sickness. 36 When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. 37 Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. 38 Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field."

14-Year-Old Saves Day

nurch Robbed While Trustees Meet

While the board of trustees discussed financial affairs in the church parlors, a burglar alipped into the First Presbyterian Church here last night and stole off with \$818.37.
If it hadn't been for 14-year-

old Gerald Imus, he might have gotten away with it.

But because Gerald, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Imus, 313 econd St., had his eyes open nd his Dick Tracy instinct orking, Hugh Ryan, 62, Seatwas in the city jail here

Gerald was playing on the

the corner of Thayer Ave., and Second St., when he noticed a "mispicious looking" character enter the building.

He called his father and told him, and when the man reemerged from the church the father agreed that the departing stranger might bear investigating.

So while the father kept an eye on the visitor, Gerald called the police.

When the man walked hastily away, Imus got in his automobile and followed him.

At one point, he saw him toss what looked like a billfold to the ground.

Meanwhile, the police car ar-rived and Gerald got in with the officers. At the corner of Fourth St. and Rosser Ave., they overtook the quickly retreating stranger and made the arrest.

On his person, said Acting Chief of Police Gordon Kern, they found \$318.37 in checks, and cash, a large part of it money intended for the buildof a church educational

Kern, the man identified him-self as Hugh Ryan of Seattle, Wash., and admitted the theft.

In justice court here Friday, Ryan waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to Burleigh County District Court on a charge of grand larceny. Bond was fixed

Back at the church, Gerald

was acclaimed as a hero. State Highway Patrol Chief Clark Monroe, a member of the board, helped take up a \$10 collection from members as a reward for Gerald's vigilance.

After they gave him the \$10, Mrs. E. C. Tressler, 3081/2 Boulevard, dug up an extra \$5 to show her personal appreciation. As the congregation's fi-nancial secretary, she felt especially grateful.

The money had been taken from a safe situated in the church office on the main floor. The safe, explained Mrs. Tressler, had been left open after papers needed for the trustees' meeting had been removed.

The Rev. James Payson Martin is pastor.

Ryan Gets Five **Year Sentence** For Church Theft

Hugh Ryan, 62, Seattle, Wash, who robbed the First Presbyterian church of Bismarck July 19, has been sentenced by Burleigh County District Judge Charles L. Foster to five years in the state penitentiary.

Ryan plead guilty to rifling the church safe of \$838. Only \$30 of that amount was in cash, the remainder being checks.

Ryan was arrested after having been spotted entering and leaving the church by 14-year-old Gerald Imus, 313 Second street,

Ryan, who was charged with grand larceny, admitted walking into the church while the board of trustees was meeting and taking the money from an open safe.

Foster notified the defendant he could apply for parole after he served two years of the sentence.

Records indicated Ryan had served time for similar offenses in several state penitentiaries.


