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A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR ROBERT.....



Brothers and sisters in Christ.

2020 has been called a lot of things, most of which people find too inappropriate to be printed in a church newsletter so I will not write them here. Instead I will introduce a new label for 2020...The Advent Year. Normally we would celebrate the season of Advent during the four weeks leading up to Christmas. This is meant to be a season emphasizing patience and preparation as we await the celebration of Christ's birth on Christmas morning. Unfortunately (or maybe fortunately depending upon one's perspective) this past year we have had to endure what it may be like to have the season of Advent stretched out to encompass an entire year, rather than just the customary four weeks where we light a candle at the end of each week.

This past year nearly all of us have had our eyes glued to our TV/computer/phone screens waiting to hear about when we would be able to return to the normalcy that we had experienced prior to this pandemic descending upon our world. As we waited we did our best to pass the time and may have even tried to plan for what we might do once we were able to move around freely. For many of us, our patience has been tested in ways we had never conceived of before as we struggled with the decisions that our leaders made on both the local, state, and national levels.

Yet here we are, a vaccine for this terrible disease has been tested and approved for distribution. Emergency care workers and nursing home residents have begun receiving shots, and by the time you read this they may have opened the vaccine up

to all people over the age of 65 (and hopefully our school teachers). Hope and increased anticipation for the end and that return to some form of normalcy is once again on the rise, yet we must still be patient and not jump too far ahead of ourselves. It is true, it looks like we are reaching the seventh inning stretch of this long and painful ordeal that we have been forced to endure, but that also means that we need to sit back and wait just a little bit longer.

Here at Burke, as our nation and the world have endured this pandemic, we have been undergoing a transformation to our own beloved community. This summer we witnessed the move of our beloved sanctuary and the construction/remodel continues on at this very second as I write these words. In some ways the knowledge that we did not have a sanctuary to gather in has made this inability to gather as church community easier to bear. Yet now as we are entering into the final stages of our construction project while vaccinations continue their rollout, I am asking everyone to be patient. This trial that we have all endured to greater and lesser degrees is nearing its end. I don't know when exactly construction is going to end, when we will all be vaccinated and able to gather without fear of the pandemic but I know it is going to happen soon and before you know it we will all be back together breaking bread, quilting, playing cards, sharing meals, and of course worshiping together.

Presidents Report 2020

Remember 1993's comedy *Groundhog Day*? Phil, played by Bill Murray, is a cynical weatherman sent to cover Groundhog Day in Punxsutawney, PA. Phil gets caught in a blizzard and finds himself in a time warp where he relives the same day repeatedly until he gets it right.

As a result of this film, Groundhog Day becomes a part of our English language. It means to describe a monotonous, unpleasant, and repetitive situation or a situation in which events that have happened before, happen again, in what seems to be the same way.

In many ways, 2020 was our Groundhog Day. We worked at getting it right. We made the most out of our days as we began wearing masks, being quarantined, working from home, and more. The monotonous, unpleasant, and repetitive situation of the pandemic remained. Despite all this, 2020 gave some people more family time. It introduced new games to children. Pastor's Report 2020

On March 15th, we held our last indoor in-person worship service at Burke Lutheran Church of 2020. It was our 4th worship service held in the fellowship hall of our brand new building, following a procession at the end of the service on March 1st officially closing down our old sanctuary in order to begin prepping it for the move this past Summer. We held two Lenten services with soup suppers on March 4th and 11th and two Sunday Services on March 8th and the 15th in our makeshift worship space in the new fellowship hall. The two Sunday Services could not have been more different, on March 8th we all gathered in hopeful expectation as we christened our new temporary home. Almost a hundred people gathered into our new fellowship hall, this included many visitors and many long term members excitedly looking toward the future. On March 15th the mood was much different. The day after our last Lenten service lockdowns began to go into effect and kids were sent home from school. Less than thirty people showed up for worship that Sunday and we did everything we could to lessen human contact and everyone quickly left following the service as we cancelled our usual coffee hour. We had no idea that this would be our last time using the fellowship hall for worship in 2020.

Up until March 15th everything seemed to be going as planned as we continued moving forward on our building project while simultaneously conducting worship services, Sunday school, outreach ministries, and providing pastoral care for those in need. Since March 15th I have had to learn how to do online worship, and I still don't think I have mastered it or even do it well. At first as we were dealing with a the full lockdown, I recorded the remaining Lenten services from my home and worked out of the office when able. For Good Friday we were able to put together some readings recorded by various members of the congregation and on Easter we were able to use our temporary worship space to record an Easter service with special music recorded by Eleri Beal. After Easter and for the next few months I often had to retreat back to my office or home to record worship services due to the ongoing floor odyssey that was a constant headache for many of us still working in and around our new building as the floor had to be torn up and repaired several times by multiple individuals. Meanwhile construction in other places continued moving forward as the building began its move on June 20th, and arrived on its new foundation on June 25th. Online worship continued until August 30th when we had our first drive-in Worship service which was attended by over a hundred people. It was very successful due to the help of Dennis Steward and his expertise in setting up a sound system that we could use for these services. These services continued with one held on the last Sunday of September, then the first Sunday of November when we finally confirmed Abby Harris, Clara Neubert, Danni Queiser, and Carter Truitt (who were supposed to be confirmed last spring, meanwhile we have begun an on-line confirmation program with Norway Grove Lutheran Church in DeForest). We would continue having drive-in Worship services for the next two weeks in November until we once again were forced to shut down due to weather and another government lockdown due to the pandemic. We would have one more drive-in worship service on Christmas Eve but the extreme cold resulted in us being plaqued by technical issues (though Karl and Sheri Patzer did their best to hold everything together) and a very cold pastor.

Meanwhile in 2020 we also lost some beloved brothers and sisters; Ron Brantmeyer (6/1/2020), Cheri Krisher (8/29/2020), Mary Skinvik (9/7/2020), Marvin McCoy (10/31/2020), and Rudy Nielsen (12/7/2020). Due to the pandemic we were forced to get creative in celebrating these lives yet in the end I believe we were successful and I hope that the families were able to find some peace. In general pastoral care has been very frustrating over these past 10 months. One of the key aspects of my position here at Burke has been visiting people who had limited mobility in their homes. This year those visits had to stop and many of those I once visited on a regular basis were cut off due to various circumstances. As of now the vast majority of my interactions with people is via phone, Zoom calls, and in person with masks and social distancing. If I haven't called or talked to you recently know that I really hate phones but I love to hear from all of you so if you have a moment drop me a line. It has been truly heartbreaking to only be able to visit people via phone, and unfortunately that was not able to work in many instances. For many of our members the isolation brought on by the pandemic has been very hard to bear and it has taken a great toll on their mental and physical health. It is a powerful reminder to us all that if you are able to reach out to someone, please do.

As construction continues to move forward on our building, and the government slowly rolls out the vaccine it is my hope, and the hope of many others that we will be able to gather again as a congregation really soon, until then may God continue to bless you and keep you all your days. Amen.
