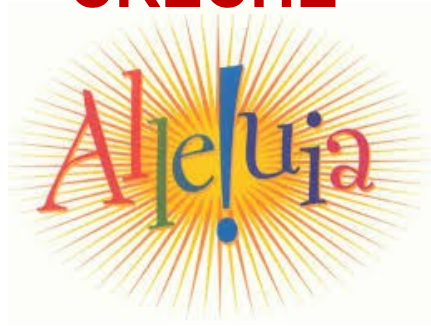

Vicar's Notes



Alleluia. Christ is risen!

Recently, someone mentioned that the energy at church was feeling "up," and I reflected on this observation in light of both congregations - Holy Family & Good Shepherd, and how in many ways it does feel like we are feeling the building of some energy that is exciting to feel.

As we move into the season of resurrection and read about those early encounters with the risen Jesus, I hope we can share that sense of energy growing in and among us. Can we embrace it and let it embrace us, even as we still have discernment work to do about where the Holy Spirit is guiding us out into widening circles of friendship. Will we encounter joy and wonder in this growing energy that leads us deeper into the mystery and revelation of God's love, holy love that brings renewal and life. Will it take new form in our lives, in the way we live our faith among the people around us - our family and neighbors, our friends and strangers? Is this the power of resurrection at work in our communities, in our lives?

One of my favorite collects of the Prayer Book is offered at the Great Vigil, and also at ordinations, as well as other occasions in the life of the church:

O God of unchangeable power and eternal light: Look favorably on your whole Church, that wonderful and sacred mystery; by the effectual working of your providence, carry out in tranquillity the plan of salvation; let the whole world see and know that things which were cast down are being raised up, and things which had grown old are being made new, and that all things are being brought to their perfection by him through whom all things were made, your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

This collect hangs on my mind and heart as I pray about our common life as churches anchored on the Coastside and in Belmont, and I believe in the power of the renewal and reinvigoration promised in its hopes. We are in resurrection time now, a time in which God is inviting us to be made new, to rise up and live, to move closer to the heart of God, the perfect source of all life and love.

Telling the story of the risen Lord and singing our Alleluias!, let us celebrate the new life opening itself within us, opening us up, increasingly emanating from these two communities of the Good Shepherd and the Holy Family.

He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

Julia sets off on Easter Sunday, April 5th, after a blessing at the Great Vigil. Susan will be making the Camino with her daughter Rebecca, embarking on April 14th. We will give her a pilgrim's blessing, also! Please keep them in your prayers, that Christ will be their companion in the Way, that their feet may not fail them, and that all bed-bugs shall be banished from before their path!

We look forward to hearing pilgrim tales upon their return home.

The blessing of a pilgrim:

Holy one, you led your people, night and day, by fire and cloud, so lead Julia, Susan, and their companions, by the light of your love. Go before them to prepare a safe path. Stay beside them to instill purpose and joy in their mission. Follow after them to leave peace in the wake of wherever they have stayed. Give your angels charge over their journeys. At their returning, may all they have seen be engraved on their heart, and their sense of home enlarged forever; through Jesus Christ our Savior and Guide. Amen.

The Camino de Santiago is a series of paths leading along ancient and modern routes across Europe and through Spain to Santiago de Compostela, in Galicia (northwest Spain). The Cathedral began as a small shrine to St. James the Greater, whose body was believed to be discovered there in ninth century, and in the Middle Ages, was one of the most popular pilgrimage routes, behind Jerusalem and Rome. While there have been pilgrims ever since, there has been a period of renewal along the Camino (way/path), and over the past three decades, as many as several hundred thousand pilgrims have made their way to this place where countless have knelt in prayer. The practice of pilgrimage is venerable among many faiths, and the spiritual benefits procured in the practice of pilgrimage are innumerable. Blessings on Susan and Julia in this undertaking.

46 folks from Holy Family,

Good Shepherd, Resurrection (Pleasant Hill), St. Elizabeth's (South City), St. Andrew's (San Bruno) and friends joined together for the outing to Alcatraz to see the Ai Wei Wei exhibit. Thanks to Peggy for helping organize sign-ups, and thanks to all who joined us, for your participation and the depth of your reflections on all we experienced.

Here are a few reflections and photos from those who made the journey with us:

While looking at the display of lego portraits on the floor of the "new industries building", I noticed what appeared to be a family grouping, of three people with the same last name. Afterwards I read the internet postings about the exhibits and learned that the three were actually a mother and two daughters, from Korea, I believe. Their father had emigrated to Europe to set up a business there, but he did not succeed in bringing these family members to his new home. Instead the three were imprisoned.

For me, the "new industry" created by my compassion is to pray for that family, for the release of the mother and two girls; and also to pray for all other innocent victims of political actions. I had been thinking that political prisoners were all people who had willingly chosen their risks. Those people who are swept up unwillingly, as all victims of genocide, fall into special emotional circumstances which can affect their relationship to the goodness of God as they know God. -- Elizabeth

The juxtaposition of the Ai Weiwei's art in such an iconic prison setting was very powerful. It was a major workout for me as a parent to try to explain so much to my kids—political persecution, Apartheid, Guantanamo Bay, Indian boarding schools— injustices foreign and domestic; historic and current. It was made all the more meaningful that we made the trip as part of a larger pilgrimage with our church community. Many thanks to Rev. Michael for organizing this journey that still fills my mind with images, thoughts, and prayers.

Freedom Summit, America's largest community-based anti-human trafficking event is happening on May 9th, 2015 at Levi's Stadium - the new home of the San Francisco 49ers. The event will feature prominent local and national trafficking experts, survivors, Congressional delegates, athletes and musicians.

The Freedom Summit is a biennial conference that serves as a catalytic event to bring San Francisco Bay Area abolitionists, communities and organizations together around the issue of Human Trafficking.

Our goal is to illuminate tangible stories of personal sacrifice and commitment by victims and heroes that will serve to motivate, educate and activate all ages in attendance towards deeper engagement in the abolitionist movement. We believe that raising up an informed "citizen brigade" in the fight against human trafficking will be done largely by connecting the issue to personal realities and spheres of influence—where we shop, eat, do business, and play.

The Freedom Summit is organized by the Bay Area Anti-Trafficking Coalition, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. The mission of the Bay Area Anti-Trafficking Coalition is to delete slavery in the SF Bay Area and beyond by equipping individuals, empowering communities, and engaging non-profits to work together in the fight against human trafficking. While human trafficking is a 365 day, 24/7 problem, the Bay Area hosting Super Bowl 2016 is the call to action needed for everyone to get in the game to say this won't happen here... NOT IN OUR TOWN!

The Reflection Tree is blooming! On Ash Wednesday, we met a stark, leafless tree. Through Lent, we "leafed" the tree with reflections on the questions from the Baptismal examination. During Eastertide, we will reflect on the Beatitudes as found in Matthew, consider how a life of Resurrection can be embodied here at Holy Family and Good Shepherd. The responsive reading of the Beatitudes we are using is adapted from Common Worship, a liturgical resource of the Church of England:

Blessed are the poor in spirit.

for theirs is the reign of heaven.

Blessed are those who mourn,

for they shall be comforted.

Blessed are the meek,

Blessed are the pure in heart,

for they shall see God.

Blessed are the peacemakers,

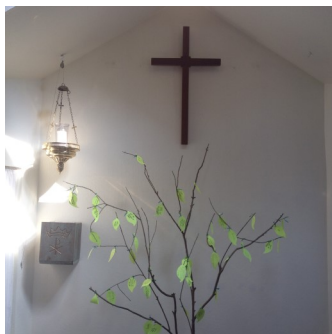
for they shall be called children of God.

Reflections on the Watch

The Watch, or the vigil of Maundy Thursday, is a night-long vigil in remembrance of Jesus' time of prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane (on the Mount of Olives). After Jesus' last meal with his friends, he went and prayed, and bid the disciples to keep awake and watch with him in prayer.

Here are some reflections from those who have kept the Watch in past years:

The quiet time spent reading & reflecting is enriching spiritually & emotionally. It allows one to focus on God & what his love truly means & what his sacrifice gives us. There used to be a donkey in the pasture next door & I recall the braying of the donkey at midnight. And also the the light of the full moon shining thru the skylights. Talk about the Magi following the star, so was I.

I find it a very stimulating time for me because I take the opportunity to read the prayers out of the Prayer Book and reflect on what they say. Some of those prayers I have heard since I was a child and others are new to me but both can be very meaningful.

Every year, my Lenten practice is to listen intentionally for what God wants me to learn and practice this year. When I keep the Vigil, I often bring specific music or readings that will help me stay focused on this intention. Sometimes, I just sit in silent meditation the entire time to see what comes. Often, I know what God's message is for me, and I listen for how I can identify and overcome barriers with respect to my own feelings and engage more fully in what God is asking or challenging me to do. I have had some very powerful experiences of "Aha" moments and deepening awarenesses. At other times, I have chosen not to focus on my own journey at all during the Vigil, but to enter as fully as possible into Jesus' feelings and experiences as he traveled the journey during Holy Week. One year, I had a very powerful awareness of Mary's experience as she prepared to let go of the child she loved, and I have had equally powerful awarenesses of others who traveled the Holy Week journey with Jesus. Last year, during Michael's first year with us, I had very powerful memories of all of those who have been part of the Holy Family community, and the walls seemed to come alive with their presence in the room. I reflected on community, both within our own congregation, and the community of all who have gone before us in Christ's fellowship throughout the ages.

I never know for certain what will surface during this time, but I always know it will be powerful and lasting. I urge anyone who wants to deepen their faith experience to sign up for an hour and help us keep watch with Christ. You will come away feeling enriched and inspired!

In the Communities

Palm Sunday

The reaction to this year's Palm Sunday service was universal! "That was the best Palm Sunday service we've ever had! Can we do it the same way again next year?" What was it that made it so special???

Although our annual tradition is to walk the journey to the cross with Jesus on Palm Sunday, the service format this year brought the familiar story to life in a way that transformed it into a personal and reflective experience for each of us. The Passion story was broken into segments which were read throughout the service by various people in story format, using the modern translation of the Bible called *The Message*. Each segment of the story was followed by a reenactment of that part of Jesus' journey toward the cross.

As we read of the woman who anointed Jesus with precious perfume, Michael offered prayers and anointing with oil for those in need of physical and emotional healing and those who wished to affirm their desire to accompany Jesus along the journey. As we read about Jesus' last meal with his disciples, we participated in our own meal with him, using sacraments from the reserve. Solemn hymns and anthems brought new awareness of Jesus' anguish and the failure of the Disciples to understand the magnitude of what was taking place. As the story of his crucifixion came to a close, we held silent vigil, followed by a meditative clarinet solo of "Were You There When They Crucified My Lord?" We ended the service with the words of this beloved hymn:

My song is love unknown,
my Savior's love to me,
love to the loveless shown
that they might lovely be.
O who am I,
that for my sake
my Lord should take
frail flesh, and die?

I cannot think of a better way to enter into this holiest of times in a spirit of deep reflection, prayer and new spiritual growth.

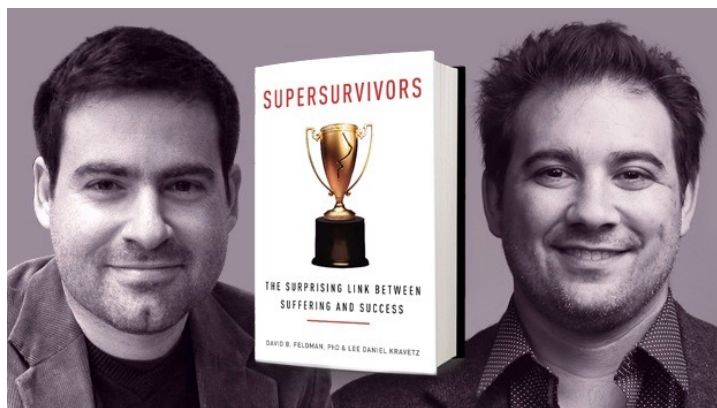

SUPERSURVIVORS: The Surprising Link Between Suffering & Success
May 3, 3:00pm at Good Shepherd, Belmont

David B. Feldman, PhD, and his co-author, Lee Daniel Kravetz, authors of *SUPERSURVIVORS: The Surprising Link Between Suffering & Success*, will celebrate the release of the paper-back edition at Good Shepherd on May 3rd at 3pm. Members of both Holy Family and Good Shepherd are invited to come, meet the authors, and learn more about their work.



From their website, a description of the book:

A New York businesswoman struck by cancer changes her life and becomes an international rock star. A man loses his eyesight and attempts to become the first blind person to row a boat across the Atlantic Ocean....and succeeds. A young basketball player, mangled in a horrible car wreck, rebuilds his body becomes one of Hollywood's most successful stuntmen.

Five billion people worldwide will survive a trauma in their lives. Most experience inner growth even as their outer lives return to normal. But sometimes, survivors do more than bounce back. Sometimes they bounce forward.

SUPERSURVIVORS: The Surprising Link Between Suffering & Success explores extraordinary accomplishments in the wake of catastrophic trauma to help us understand how ordinary people can achieve extraordinary things. *Supersurvivors* offers a bold new vision for understanding and harnessing resilience through the lens of positive psychology. In so doing, they transform the meaning of their personal tragedies by making them the basis for dramatic and long-term life change, often discovering hidden parts of themselves and contributing to the world in ways they never thought possible.
