## PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE AND THE HBPOA

The Board of the HBPOA, in order to better understand its responsibilities and enhance its effectiveness in leading the association, will participate in training in various areas, including parliamentary procedure and the duties and responsibilities of directors of Florida not-for-profit corporations.

The Bylaws of the HBPOA require that the association, including the Board and all committees, follow parliamentary procedure as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, 12th edition. (RONR). For those not familiar with RONR, the most recent edition is 714 pages and may seem overwhelming to a first-time reader. It is not difficult to obtain a basic understanding of parliamentary procedure if it is done in small segments. Parliamentary procedure, in a nutshell, is a set of rules that help an association run in an efficient and civil manner.

Set forth below are some possible areas (there are more) for parliamentary training. The Board will decide what training best meets its needs and how it wants to conduct that training.

1. Running a meeting

The agenda may be adopted (made binding on the Motions that bring a question back meeting), or it may simply be a guide to keep the meeting on track. Adopting an agenda is a good idea because it gets everybody in agreement with the meeting plan at the beginning of the meeting. If HBPOA follows the standard Order of Business, there is no need to adopt an agenda at the beginning of the meeting. However, many groups do adopt the agenda. It takes a majority vote (more than half) to adopt an agenda, and the question can be debated. Once an agenda is adopted, it takes a two-thirds vote to change it later in the meeting. One advantage to adopting an agenda is that it allows any member to help keep the meeting on track. HBPOA rules can be disciplined. According to RONR, discipline can include censure, fine, suspension, or expulsion. If an offense occurs during a meeting, the assembly, having witnessed it themselves, can vote on a punishment without the need for a trial. The presiding officer has no authority to impose a penalty or to order the offending member to be removed from the hall, but the assembly has that power.

If the HBPOA follows its Bylaws and RONR, the association will be able to conduct its business in a straightforward and civil manner - all members will have the opportunity to be heard and all matters will be debated on the merits.


#### **HOSPITALITY COMMITTEE**

#### **TURNING 65 – NOW WHAT?**

Most Americans, upon turning 65, know they will be eligible for Medicare. But many are confused about the process. Their mailbox is overflowing with information that only adds to the confusion.

For those who are receiving Social Security, enrollment in Medicare is automatic. They will get their red, white, and blue Medicare card showing they are now

enrolled in Part A and Part B. But if you are delaying your Social Security, you will need to enroll for Medicare by going online to <a href="https://www.ssa.gov">www.ssa.gov</a>, calling Social Security, or doing it in person at the Social Security office.

And if you are covered under an employer group plan and still working, you may not need to enroll in Medicare. A group health plan through your employer may be your best option. Talk to your employer and consult a licensed insurance agent to evaluate your best planning options.

Medicare does not cover all healthcare costs. Now that you are enrolled, you will need to decide what type of supplemental plan you need to pay for the "gaps" in Medicare. Perhaps a Medicare Supplement plan and a separate drug plan works best for you, or you might choose a Medicare Advantage Plan (Part C) that combines Part A and Part B and Part D for drugs.

But don't act too quickly. Talk to an independent licensed insurance agent, one who works with several companies, to find the plan that works for you.

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

Hello again neighbors and friends!

Frank Santo here reminding you that the HBYC Christmas boat parade is fast approaching and is ready to amaze you once again with bright lights, enthusiastic participants and some of the most creative designs for boat decorations you'll ever see! We may live in a small community but we're big on expression! This year we are involving the public as part of our parade by encouraging those watching from shore to donate Toys for Tots. How can you do this? Well, it's very simple. As the parade passes, watch for the "TOYS FOR TOTS" boat that will be trailing the parade. It will have a sign lit up spelling out TOYS FOR TOTS and will have a flashing light above. Simply flash your house lights on and off when you see the boat coming or use a bright hand held flashlight turning it on and off to get the boats attention and let them know you have toys to donate. They will then approach your dock or seawall with a net on a pole to receive your generous donations. For larger toys or parties donating multiple toys, they can come up to your dock and load up. 
