The Rev. Dr. Leon C. Mozeliak Jr. Easter Sunday sermon (abbreviated)

As they were hiking, three men found themselves at a violently raging river. They needed to get across to the other side, but had no idea how to do it. The first man prayed to God saying, "Please, God, give me the strength to cross this river. Poof! God gave the man big arms and strong legs, and he was given the ability to swim across the river in about three hours.

Seeing this, the second man prayed to God, saying, "Please, God, give me the strength to cross this river. Poof! God gave him a rowboat and he was given the ability to row across the river in about two hours.

The third man, seeing how things had worked out for the other two, also prayed to God, saying, "Please, God, give me the strength, and intelligence to cross this river." And Poof! God turned him into a woman; she looked at the map, then walked across the bridge.

























All humor aside, the prominence of women as the initial people to experience the power of Easter cannot be denied. "As the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. And suddenly there was a great earthquake..." (Mt. 28:1-2), And an angel appeared like lightning and said to the women, "Do not be afraid: I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been raised." (vv. 5-6)

These two Marys were among the brave women who watched Jesus die his agonizing death (27:56) and who prepared his lifeless corpse for burial in the place where it was entombed by Joseph of Arimanthea (Luke 23:55)

The legitimate question follows: where were the men at the same time? When Jesus needed them the most, why had they left him completely alone? Why hadn't they the nerve to suffer with Jesus; doing as these women from Galilee risked?

Jesus had died the loneliest of deaths. Seemingly abandoned by the God he had proclaimed with uttermost certainty, and deserted by the disciples he had spent years teaching-those with whom he had shared his abundant life.

Now they were nowhere to be found. Interested only in saving their own skins. And with his death, the cause of Jesus, the mission of Jesus, the validity of Jesus also ceased to exist.

So, what happened? The Resurrection-unlike the crucifixion-is never depicted or described in the Gospels. No one witnessed it. No one expected it; at best, the disciples were reluctant believers who were worried or doubtful after they saw him.

Yet, in the Easter event, we uncover the paramount nature of love, revealed in the Resurrection of Jesus. Deserving the worst, the disciples are given the best. God raises Jesus up into their community despite their cowardice and betrayal. In human relationships desire is the cause of love, here in the Resurrection, we see love is the cause of desire. God's love reigns, regardless of human failure.
