25th Sunday Ordinary Year C Luke 16:1-13



"Jesus said to his disciples, "A rich man had a steward who was reported to him for squandering his property. He summoned him and said, 'What is this I hear about you? Prepare a full account of your stewardship, because you can no longer be my steward.' The steward said to himself, 'What shall I do, now that my master is taking the position of steward away from me? I am not strong enough to dig and I am ashamed to beg. I know what I shall do so that, when I am removed from the stewardship, they may welcome me into their homes.' He called in his master's debtors one by one. To the first he said, 'How much do you owe my master?' He replied, 'One hundred measures of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Here is your promissory note. Sit down and quickly write one for fifty.' Then to another the steward said, 'And you, how much do you owe?' He replied, 'One hundred kors of wheat.' The steward said to him, 'Here is your promissory note; write one for eighty.' And the master commended that dishonest steward for acting prudently. "For the children of this world are more prudent in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. I tell you, make friends for yourselves with dishonest wealth, so that when it fails, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings. The person who is trustworthy in very small matters is also trustworthy in great ones; and the person who is dishonest in very small matters is also dishonest in great ones. If, therefore, you are not trustworthy with dishonest wealth, who will trust you with true wealth? If you are not trustworthy with what belongs to another, who will give you what is yours? No servant can serve two masters. He will either hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and mammon."

Of all the parables of Christ this one may be the toughest for those who think it treats their views of honesty the roughest. But it's a comment on the fact that being shrewd and clever can win one many friends, for sure. It has been thus forever. The steward had mismanaged all the holdings of his master. He knew when it was found out, he was heading for disaster.

He called his mater's debtors and made sure they would be willing to take him in when he was fired, by lowering their billing. He told each one to write down less than what each had been owing. The master praised his steward for the prudence he was showing!

Then Jesus said, "You, too, make friends, but not by being greedy. And as good stewards, use your funds to help the poor and needy. "By kindness you will make friends now and have their salutation, when they receive you into God's eternal habitation.

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

25th Sunday Ordinary Year C Luke 16:1-13

Busted! Whatch ya gonna do when they come for you? This dishonest manager is about to be fired by the boss for bad (corrupt?) performance. He comes up with a comfortable 'exit strategy', including a pension plan for himself (Is this what Corporate CEOs do when they wreck companies, get fired by their Boards of Directors but not before taking a 'golden parachute' out the door with them?) Well, this manager obviously is either cheating customers on the front end, or cheating his boss on the back end by this drastic reduction of invoices? Bible Interpreters suggest two possibilities for his invoice adjustments. Some propose that he had exorbitantly padded his customer's invoices with 'handling' or 'processing' fees for himself, so that when he was fired, he went back and took off his pricey commissions, benefitting his clients (maybe they would remember him back later). Other interpreters have suggested that he may have burnt the owner, by just writing down the bills to a fairer market price, instead of gouging them as the owner directed him to by always demanding the highest bid possible. (Is this what we see when a hospital bills for \$5,000, and accepts the insurance's offer of \$300?-something is out of proportion). I'm sure we have all seen work-estimates padded with all kind of extra & multiplied costs. Well, something like that must have been going on in this parable, either by the owner or by the manager. But either way, it is always the little customer who ends up paying! UNTIL, in this case the manager quits, and refunds the excess back to the customers. Jesus tells us that the owner even 'commended' the manager (Luke 16:8). I suspect that the owner (as one shark recognizes another) is impressed with the clever and creative response of the manager to his situation. The boss still fires him, but maybe remembers why he hired him years ago: because of the worker's innovative problem solving! Since Jesus is telling this parable, He seems to be commending the shrewd manager's reaction to his plight as an opportunity for conversion-change of life. When the manager realizes that he is about to be unemployed and back on the street, he appreciates again the importance of good relationships. So, he desperately tries to create some good will and make connections, doing good for his customers (probably 'for once' in his life). I think Jesus is telling all us that life is not about how much stuff we own, but that life about how much we relate to other people by connections and associations with them. Our wealth is measured by our relationships and not our real estate. People and not properties are what make us rich. The manager explains his motive for writing down the bills, by saying he wishes to be "welcomed into their homes" (Luke 16:4). That speaks to me of being in good and ongoing relationships to them (that hey keep welcoming him back to their homes). Jesus Himself summarizes the point of the parable, when He states, "make friends for yourselves with worldly wealth..." (Luke 16:9). He is saying that stuff (money & riches) stays here on earth. But the good & strong relationships we build by using our stuff to help/support/benefit other people, then those bonds benefit us for eternity by holding us close to God, and to all of God's family. This spiritual wealth lasts for eternity- this is what we refer to as the 'communion of saints' (the eternally lasting bonds created by shared resources to bring about the 'commonwealth of heaven'?)

I know we will hear more about Zacchaeus in a couple of weeks (31st Sunday) so I will save more comment on him for later, but I can't help but think of Zacchaeus when I read this parable. Why? Well, as Zacchaeus encounters Christ and converts, he commits that "half of my possessions, I shall give to the poor, and if I have extorted anything from anyone I shall repay it four times over" (Luke 19:8). That certainly sounds like he is *writing off many inflated fees* that he extorted from clients and may still be collecting interest from afterward. Zacchaeus wants to divest himself of ill-gotten gains, by handing half of his accumulated resources over to the care of the poor (and befriending then this way). I suspect that since Zacchaeus has to resort to climbing a tree by himself to see Jesus, (instead of being offered a room with a view, a ladder or a spot on the road alongside someone else--that tells me he has no friends-he only cares about money!) So, as he meets Jesus, Zacchaeus discovers true wealth in the love found in genuine relationships, when people love one another for simply who they are, instead of possessions they have. This is the lasting spiritual treasure that Jesus lavishly gives to us all-belonging with Him, and always being welcomed into his heavenly home with fellow children of God, all of us loved uniquely for who we are and not what we have. I find such lasting and loving fellowship expressed in the Zacchaeus story by the fact that Zacchaeus' house is filled with people that night as Jesus and everyone enjoy dinner and each other's company. That is a lasting investment! Peace, Fr Brian


