There is an old saying that goes, "Sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me." The one who came up with that was never hit with a dictionary.

James writes, "Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. 2 For we all stumble in many ways. And if anyone does not stumble in what he says, he is a perfect man, able also to bridle his whole body. 3 If we put bits into the mouths of horses so that they obey us, we guide their whole bodies as well. 4 Look at the ships also: though they are so large and are driven by strong winds, they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. 5 So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great things.

How great a forest is set ablaze by such a small fire! 6 And the tongue is a fire, a world of unrighteousness. The tongue is set among our members, staining the whole body, setting on fire the entire course of life, and set on fire by hell. 7 For every kind of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by mankind, 8 but no human being can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison. 9 With it we bless our Lord and Father, and with it we curse people who are made in the likeness of God. 10 From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers, these things ought not to be so. 11 Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and salt water? 12 Can a fig tree, my brothers, bear olives, or a grape-vine produce figs? Neither can a salt pond yield fresh water.

13 Who is wise and understanding among you? By his good conduct let him show his works in the meekness of wisdom. 14 But if you have bitter jealousy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not boast and be false to the truth. 15 This is not the wisdom that comes down from above, but is earthly, unspiritual, demonic. 16 For where jealousy and selfish ambition exist, there will be disorder and every vile practice. 17 But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, open to reason, full of mercy and good fruits, impartial and sincere. 18 And a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace by those who make peace. (James 3:1-18)

James reminds us of one small organ of our bodies that we don't think about too much, but it does have a great influence; not just in our lives, but in others' lives as well: the tongue. James likens our tongue to the rudder of a ship. Just as a massive ship is steered through the water by a seemingly small and insignificant piece of the ship, so we are steered and defined by our tongues. How's that for an image?

How much time and effort do we put into being defined by our jobs, our brains, our bodies, our images? We diet, we exercise, we lift weights, we study, we pour over our income vs. expense ratios, we clean and up-date our homes, our cars, our wardrobe, get make-overs, and hair-cuts, and spend money on make-up and farm equipment, and campers, and four-wheelers, and motorcycles, and on and on and on; how much time do you spend on your tongue? James reminds us that our tongues direct and lead us, so it begs the question: Where are you going?

Words can hurt. Words contain much power, and we often don't think of the power that they truly do carry. Words have the power to tear down, and sometimes it doesn't take much. During political season, we see this in the world, do we not? Words are thrown back and forth like arrows and bombs, trying to cut the other own down so far that one can win just a few more votes. It is there that we see what James is talking about when he says, "No human being can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison." (James 3:8)

But if no human being can tame the tongue, we cannot just stop at analyzing our politicians. We too have troubles with this piece of our human anatomy. Our tongues are full of poison that spews out towards our enemies; those who would do use harm, but what about our family? Do we use this poison against our families? We are not supposed to even use it against our enemies, that is sinful in and of itself. But our restless poison cannot be contained; we turn the venom of hurtful words against those we love the most.

We call curses upon them, we call upon God to damn them to hell, we cut down and hurt them until what? Until we somehow have won a particular argument? At what cost? Is winning an argument over the dishes or garbage or some bill or anything in our day-to-day lives worth tearing down another person, another person who was made in the image and likeness of God? When you talk with others, it is not like the conversations in my house, where I am a saint and my wife is the sinner. It's ok. She knows that. Right? No, we are both sinners, and we are both forgiven children of God.

Words have power, right? Through the power of the Word all of creation was called into existence. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. All things were made through Him, and without Him was not anything made that was made." (John 1:1-3) This Word you know "became flesh and dwelt among us." (John 1:14) This Word in the flesh was God and Man, Jesus Christ. In our inability to control our tongues, He came and did it for us. As our poison leaves us deserving of going to one place, hell itself, Jesus became flesh, and died. This most powerful Word spoke from the cross, "It is finished." One Word in Greek. Why should you care? Because this one word shows up again in James! James writes, "If anyone does not stumble in what he says, he is a perfect man." (James 3:2) The word for perfect is the same as finished, or completed, or whole.

Through Jesus' death on the cross, the antidote for your poisonous thoughts, words, and deeds, the tonic for your venomous tongue was completed, finished, perfected, made whole. Because of the Word made flesh, that suffered and died for you, your sins are forgiven. You are made whole. You are washed in His powerful Word joined with water. His Words fill your ears and your mouths. His Words are yours!

For your tongue of fire, here it is quenched. As you drink the blood of your Lord Jesus Christ, that fire is put out. The spring flowing forth from the Mount of Calvary flows into your mouth, your body. His blood here cleanses you, perfects you, makes you whole. Where is your tongue leading you? Here! To His altar. It is His Word, His blood that will steer you right through this life. With Him at the helm, you have nowhere to go but to eternal life with Him.

As He has made you whole and complete, you drink the very blood of life. The Word joined with these earthly elements of bread and wine. Here feeding you the very life of Jesus. Where are you going? Our tongues are led to the great altar of God where we proclaim together, Alleluia! Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

Sunday School has begun where there might have been a summer hiatus. Bible Classes are being scheduled during the week along with Confirmation Catechism instruction. I pray all is going smoothly with you as we transition from summer rest to fall full-go.

The more we interact, the more Gospel we have the privilege to teach and discuss. The more we teach and discuss the more Satan wants to interrupt this process and interfere with the work of the Church. His greatest tool of disruption is distrust of one another and negative opinions with those with whom we may differ. Did someone say something we may not like? Did someone's desires interfere or conflict with your own? Do we have concerns over fellow workers' performance, effort, attitude, etc.? If so, let not Satan get in the way! Here is how to prevent that. What I am going to write here may seem overly simple, and maybe it is. Yet, it is very effective in "getting Satan behind us." I will use a simple formula that makes use of the letter C.

Concerns: we have them. There is nothing wrong with having them. They may be valid, or they may not. There is only one way to find out if the concerns are warranted.

Clarify: we may not have heard correctly what we think we did. Ask the speaker to clarify what they said. You can even voice the concern you have, so you ask questions to make sure you heard correctly. Take the time to ask if they have given thought to how it sounded or might be taken by others.

Clarify: someone has written something in the bulletin or newsletter that may not articulate the point clearly. Again, take the time to ask the writer what point they are making. Suggest something easier to understand

for the sake of clarity and understanding. After all, if someone has something important to say or write, they need to be hearable and readable.

Conclusion: going from concern to conclusion without clarifying is where Satan makes the most of his effort to disrupt the work of the Church among her members. It is also a serious failure of Luther's explanation "to put the best construction on everything." Conclusions that are most fruitful for the Church come when complete clarity is comprehend-

ed of what was said or written. It only takes love for the speaker or writer along with the time and courtesy it takes to ask questions out of appreciation and respect.

The Church does not jump from concern to conclusion without clarity. It is the way of the Reformers who spent endless hours writing, asking questions, and pleading with Scripture for the sake of correcting errors. Luther did not jump from concern to conclusion. He took at least 13 years between the posting of the 95 theses until the Augsburg Confession. The Augsburg is an accurate conclusion to the doctrines Scripture reveals. Not everyone listened. But at least he demonstrated love for the Word, for those who have gone astray, and those who needed to hear what he had to say. He had something important to say. So, he was hearable and readable. We must do the same. God be with you all.

Stewards, Called to Forgiveness

Human beings were created and redeemed to be stewards. Bearing the image of God (Gen. 1:26–28), the steward was created to reflect the Creator within creation. In a way, stewards are simply mirrors. Mirrors cannot do anything to the image that is placed in front of them.

A mirror was the first item in creation that embodied the computer term GIGO. "Garbage in, Garbage out." In a computer, if you enter good data, you get a good result. You enter bad data; you will get a garbage result.

In photography, you can run an image through a filter, which can remove imperfections. Myriad apps allow for the option to cut people out, add people in and change backgrounds all in an attempt to make the perfect image. Mirrors cannot do that. They do not provide anything new. Mirrors are created to reflect, not process, an image. They simply reflect the person standing in front of them.

Stewards are like this. Created to reflect, a steward will reflect the God in front of them. The steward will either reflect a godly stewardship that holds that God is the owner of all things (Ps. 24:1) and is the One to whom they are accountable, or they will reflect the god of self and see the created order as something to be possessed, used, and in far too many cases, abused. It is not a question of IF the steward reflects, it is really a question of WHO is being reflected.

For this reason, the Lutheran Service Book has included a necessary hymn worthy of meditation: "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788). Its first verse reads:

Forgive us, Lord, for shallow thankfulness, For dull content with warmth and sheltered care, For songs of praise for food and harvest press, While of Your richer gifts we're unaware. This is a fitting call to repentance for every steward. Our thankfulness is so often shallow. We get comfortable with the overflowing blessings we have entrusted to us by the Lord. These trusts are so many that the steward often forgets the One who entrusts them. Worse, with so many physical trusts evident, the steward loses sight of the greatest trust: the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The failed steward sees so much plenty that they lose sight of the treasure: Jesus!

So, we confess our shallow thankfulness. In absolution, the imperfections of the failed steward are wiped away and a new image is sent into the world. We release our hold on stuff. We rethink our relationship with the created order and recall that it is all to be used FOR JESUS! This keeps the richer gifts in view, for us and for those we know and love who need Jesus.
