Peace, Blessed Peace I Give You

God offered the Israelites freedom from slavery and peace that they had not experienced for over 400 years. Once they found this freedom, instead of finding peace, they started grumbling and complaining and turning to other gods. Fifteen hundred years later, the people see Jesus and all the wonderful healing He has done and the many other miracles he performed, and yet they yell, "Crucify, Crucify Him!" [Luke23.20].

What gets in our way of accepting Jesus and this blessed Peace? I am reminded of the famous picture of Jesus standing at a closed door. The door has no handle on Jesus' side of the door. The door can only be opened from the inside. In other words, we have to open the door and let Jesus and this Blessed Peace into our hearts, and that involves making some changes in our lives.

Well, how do we make these changes? First, I believe it starts with His **WORD**, The Bible. We need to read His word and study it. This is the way Jesus travels from an idea in our head to living in our heart. We internalize His Word as we seriously study that Word. A lot of people read or hear His Word but don't let the Word into their hearts and live it. It needs to be there as a compass that guides what we do and say, not just some book sitting on the coffee table or a bookshelf.

When we allow the word into our hearts and believe it, we live the word and walk the walk. We begin to have a personal relationship with Jesus our Lord and Savior. As we live His word we begin to **PRAY** more, which is our second step in our journey to receiving God's Peace. Praying is not just rattling off a list to God of things we want. Prayer involves listening, taking the time to hear what God wants to tell us. In our prayers we need to be still and listen for God to speak to us. His message comes in many different ways as the Holy Spirit leads us. What is God saying to you?

The third part of this growing a personal relationship with the Lord that brings peace is WORSHIP. We are drawn to worship, for in worship we hear God speaking to us through His Word in the liturgy, the hymns and music, the scriptures, sermons, and the Holy Eucharist [the Lord's Supper]. We are called to worship by God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. And God is there to meet us and welcome us to this holy place. When we worship, we grow our relationship with Jesus, especially in His meal when we truly realize that He has died for us. This is personal, for Jesus takes away our sins and makes us whole. In this holy meal we receive His body and blood. Am I worthy to be saved? NO. What have I done to deserve this? I have done nothing but believe, and through faith we receive His Grace and Peace. Jesus has set us free just as the Israelites were set free.

The fourth part of this journey with Jesus is **DBEDJEMCE**. As we read the Bible, we see clearly that God saves His people and expects obedience in return. God expects that there be no other gods, no misuse of God's name, and no failure to keep the Sabbath holy. And as Jesus said, we must "love one another as I love you." Keeping these four disciplines on our journey is not easy, but when we take them into our hearts, they become easier and we begin to realize the truth in the psalmist: "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" [Ps.119.105].

Yes, we celebrate Easter again with the familiar announcement, "Christ Is Risen, He Is Risen Indeed!" Many of us hear that announcement as we carry burdens and in the midst of storms, looking and searching for peace just as the disciples were that first Easter night. They were gathered together in Jerusalem and the risen Lord walked through the closed door and said, "Peace be with you" [Lk.24.36].

The southern gospel group, The Gaithers sing a beautiful song called "Because He Lives." The chorus calls us to the source of all peace:

"Because He lives, I can face tomorrow, Because He lives, all fear is gone; Because I know He holds the future, And life is worth the living, Just because He lives!"



Good morning, Everyone. We are back home in Findlay, Ohio after a relaxing vacation beside the Atlantic Ocean. I so enjoy the people we meet in the Florida Keys. The men talk about the fish they caught, the ones they almost caught, and the ones they hope to catch. The women swap recipes, talk of grandchildren and books, and we laugh lots. The women, and a few men, also are involved in daily crafts and art projects. One of our camper friends provides the Karaoke machine and then we have nights of laughter <u>and</u> song.

I do read voraciously while on vacation (it only takes five minutes to clean the entire house. The outdoor sitting area another five.) Thought I would share a few titles with you of books I strongly recommend. I recently finished <u>The Magician's Assistant</u> by Ann Patchett, who is better known for <u>Bel Canto</u>. When Sabine's husband dies of an aneurysm, only then does she learn the truth of the magician who recreated himself as well as his history. The book explores what she learns, who she meets and tries to answer the question, "do we need to know the past of a person to appreciate him or her in the present?"

<u>The Weird Sisters</u> by Eleanor Brown tells of three women unlucky in everything in their lives. They each turn to the only place where they feel comfortable – home. They of course find there more than they needed.

<u>Townie</u>, a memoir by Andre Dubus III, author of <u>The House of Sand and Fog</u>, relates Dubus' story from when he and his siblings raised themselves while their mother worked, to his days training in boxing which will lead to his lifetime of writing.

<u>The Secret History of the Mongol Queens</u> by Jack Weatherford narrates how the daughters of Genghis Khan rescued his empire as they ruled the largest empire in the thirteenth century.

<u>The Story Sisters</u> by Alice Hoffman involves three girls stolen from the faerie world and now living with "mother" on Long Island, or so the eldest girl tells her sisters. An interesting take on horrors children face.

<u>The House by the River</u> by Greek writer Lena Manta is an emotional story of five daughters itching to leave their small town in Greece after World War II. They will all learn that the only constant is home.

<u>The Question of Red</u> by Laksmi Pamuntjak tells the story of two lovers, Amba and Bhisma caught up in the Communist purges in Indonesia between 1965 and 1968 during which nearly a million people were killed and 12000 were imprisoned on an island of no escape and facing no written charge.

<u>The Same Kind of Different As Me</u> is a true story told by the two men involved Ron Hall and Denver Moore. Hall and his wife volunteer at a mission in Fort Worth, Texas and save their marriage with the help of one homeless man whom they befriend. I was forced to examine what pitiful amount of help I give the homeless when compared with the work of the Halls.

Last Train to Istanbul by Ayse Kulin tells the story of Selva who marries a Jew prior to World War II and they move to Paris. When the Nazis invade France and begin rounding up the Jews, brave diplomats hatch a plan that will risk many lives in an attempt to free those destined for death.

<u>Rule of One</u> by Ashley and Leslie Saunders is set in near-future Texas where the policy of one child per family is strictly enforced. Ava and Mira are twins taking turns in the upstairs world until a commander's son falls in love with one and begins to notice little differences.

<u>The Light of Fireflies</u> by Paul Ren involves another family living in a basement. Here, a baby boy is born in the basement and as he grows he learns that there was a horrific fire that has damaged all of the family members and then, of course, there are the family secrets.

<u>River in Darkness</u> by Mashaji Ishikawa relates the true story of forty years of one man's life in North Korea and his daring escape to the south.
