

At this shoot I noted there was almost no water in McGowan Creek. This creek has always had a robust year-round flow. The drought combined with upstream clear cutting has had a drastic effect on the drainage. The EEGC newsletter has this to say about the water issue:

WATER CONSERVATION: The well that services the Public Range and Caretaker Residence has never supplied an overly abundant flow of water. This year, due to the extraordinarily dry conditions, we are experiencing occasional interruptions in that flow. There have been several instances when the Clubhouse and the Ogg family have been without water for several hours while the water in the well "catches up". Please help by practicing common sense conservation measures. The Multi-purpose/classroom building uses a separate well. Please use the restrooms there when possible. If you are filling buckets, jugs, etc., please use this water supply.

CLUB PICNIC AT DORRIS RANCH

I joked there were more yellowjackets than club members in attendance. The yellowjackets were more interested in the table of goodies than in bothering us. Happy diners were Sara Smith, Lorraine Hayden, Bob and I, and Walt and Diana Evens and 3 members of their family. A good time was had by all and the setting was delightful.

SHOOTER'S CORNER (from a very old publication, name unknown, in my files):

Question: My Lyman Great Plains Rifle has Double Set Triggers and the salesman told me that the two triggers were a safety device in that the rifle could not be fired without setting the trigger. Is this true?

Answer: Yours is not the first time I have heard that question, so the belief must be widespread among new muzzleloaders that the double set triggers are something of a safety. NOT TRUE!!!

The type of trigger your rifle is equipped with is called a double acting double set trigger and can IN NO WAY BE CONSIDERED A SAFETY: The sole function of the rear trigger is to set (that is to say spring load) the front trigger so that only a slight pressure will fire the rifle. I can assure you that the front trigger WILL FIRE THE RIFLE BY ITSELF without the rear trigger ever being set. That is what double acting set trigger means. The rifle can be fired with or without setting the rear trigger.

HARVEST MOON ENCAMPMENT IS OCTOBER 7-10, at Fort Umpqua in Elkton. There will be a camp potluck @ 5:30-6 pm Saturday night and club members are invited to participate then as well as visit anytime during the event, period clothing optional, as is the public who wander in and find us, to their delight. ACROSS THE WIDE MISSOURI: Bob and I have just returned from an adventure in the midwest, a trip inspired by a desire to visit The Museum of the Fur Trade in Chadron, Nebraska. After flying to Kansas City we stayed 3 days with Bob's cousin and her husband, then 3 days with another cousin and his wife near Fort Scott, south of KC, followed by 3 days in a rental car looping from Rapid City SD into Nebraska and back.

Experiences included a visit to the sternwheeler Arabia museum in KC, visiting historic Fort Scott in Kansas, breakfast at Wall Drug in Wall, SD, driving through Badlands National Park, seeing so many prairie dog towns I lost count and free range buffalo herds (one fellow was 3' from my car door), being stopped at the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation boundary by a team of native youths checking visitors' vaccination status (we passed), giving a ride to another youth whose truck ran out of gas several miles from town, stopping to pay our respects at Wounded Knee and touring the Mammoth Site in Hot Springs, SD, where there is an actual excavation inside a building. The Museum of the Fur Trade was amazing. When you are able, Google the Arabia Museum in KC and the Mammoth Site.

You know you are in the midwest when half the businesses in a small town are closed (except the ones whose names end in "Bar and Grill"), there is fly paper in your motel room and the people are the friendliest you've ever met.

OAKRIDGE HISTORY

As a hike leader, camper/backpacker, archaeology dig participant and instigator of a canoe-in rendezvous (Bog Waller – a fall take-off of Frog Holler) over the years, I have spent a lot of time up the Middle Fork, with many trips through Oakridge. I have also been fascinated by the story of The Lost Wagon Train (which wasn't really lost, just in trouble) led by Elijah Elliot. The McKenzie area is (was) prettier, but my heart has ever been up the Middle Fork. FUML member Deanna Hadley is secretary of the Upper Willamette Pioneer Museum in Oakridge and sent this.

The first settlement in this area was a band of about 20 Indians. During events with other tribes as many as 100 Indians made camp on what we know as First Street in Oakridge.

In 1860 a man named Josiah Sanford and his two sons settled here and named their property the Circle Bar Ranch, located where the golf course now stands. They raised cattle and the area was known as "a 1,000 acre cow pasture".

In 1866, George Larison and Stella Pengra were married and built the first home on the present site of Oakridge.

About 1872 David Kitson built a log cabin on the north side of Hills Creek and developed the springs as a health resort. The first school house was located at the Sanford ranch in 1875. People camped in tents near the school so their children could attend the three-month school term.

The first logging was done above Deception Creek about 1875. Wages were \$1.25 a day.

In 1909 Eldon Templeman built the first store in Westfir. In 1911 he moved the store to Oakridge.

The railroad came in 1911. It was first known as "The Slow and Easy". Often the passengers pitched in to help with the loading and unloading along the way to in order to speed up their destination arrival time.
