### PUBLIC PLANNING INQUIRY PINS REF: APP/03115/W/23/3323268 ORIGINAL PLANNING APPLICATION P22/S4643/0

#### 150 RESIDENTIAL DWELLINGS OFF OF THAME ROAD, CHINNOR

The Public Planning Inquiry heard closing arguments on Friday 20 October. These were presented by the barristers for Sydenham & Chinnor Parish Councils (the "Rule 6" Party); SODC and the Appellant, Gleeson Land.

The Rule 6 Party's case was four-fold, that (a) Chinnor has been significantly over developed; (b) As a result, there is insufficient capacity in nursery and primary education, healthcare, retail, and amenities; (c) Moreover, the Proposed Development is unsustainable from a transport perspective and will drive a significant increase in reliance on cars; and (d) The Proposed Development negatively impacts the AONB.

SODC's barrister lead on the point that allowing the planning application would "do considerable violence to the credibility of the Chinnor NP" as well as arguments on unsuitability of the site on landscape term and that the development would be contrary to the locational policies of the South Oxfordshire Local plan.

The closing arguments are published on the planning application page on SODC's website under reference P22/S4643/O.

Throughout the inquiry Sydenham & Chinnor Parish Councils provided a lot of detailed evidence as to the potential negative impact of the proposed development. The strength of opposition to the proposed development shown by a significant number of villagers, demonstrated by attending the inquiry, signing the petition, answering questionnaires and writing objections, was palpable. Thank you to everyone who contributed! We now have to wait while the Planning Inspector concludes his report and makes his decision about the application, expected before the end of the year and possibly in the next few weeks.


#### SYDENHAM NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Our Sydenham Neighbourhood Plan (SNP) was "made" in May 2021 and as it is now over two years old, it is not considered "current". The SNP working group are currently investigating ways to update the plan to keep it current, and will keep the village updated on progress.

# parish COUNCIL INSIGHTS cont

#### **B4445 CHICANE**

After years of campaigning by the parish council and a successful joint venture with Chinnor PC we're delighted that the chicane is now in place. It is demonstrably slowing traffic approaching from Chinnor and making it safer for traffic leaving Sydenham at the junction. The data from the VAS sign has shown this very clearly!




Before the chicane was installed, the VAS sign recorded 67% of traffic going past at 35mph or over, and 17% travelling at 45+mph, whereas now only 20% of traffic passes the sign travelling at 35mph or over, and only 1% at 45+.

#### **BROOKSTONES TREE**

The perished oak tree in Brookstones has been taken down for safety, with permission from the Council Tree Officers. As the tree is in the Conservation Area it has to be replaced, and the new tree to be planted will be a Sweet Chestnut. We are also adding a bench.

#### **NEW SALT BIN**

There will be another salt bin near the Emmington junction for use on the road leading up to the junction and around Plough Corner. Oxfordshire County Council hopes to have this in place by Christmas at the latest.



#### DRAINAGE

The exceptional recent rainfall did lead to flooding in the usual places however, there have been notable improvements where the roadside gutters and pipes under the road have been cleared. The parish council continue to work at keeping the drainage ditches throughout the village operating as well as possible with a thorough maintenance schedule and by liaising with local authorities. The flooding by the chicane on Sydenham Road is mainly caused by the pipe under the road near Slade Farm being too small. We have cleared out the ditch on the south side of the road which improves things but cannot do the same on the north side as the gas main virtually runs in the ditch. We are starting to investigate solutions with both OCC highways and SGN.

#### **PLAYGROUND**

The hedges have been cut and the ditches dug out. New hedging is to be planted on the road side of the playground in the next few weeks.

#### **NEWS FROM THE WI**

We have had a very busy couple of months so have pleasure in reporting on a selection of our activities.

We are a very friendly bunch of all ages and warmly welcome new members. In addition to a summer walk followed by supper at the Crown, theatre visits and more we also welcomed some varied and interesting speakers.

#### WHO WERE THE MITFORD FAMILY?

In June, WI members listened to a very interesting and informative talk by Muriel Pilkington on the colourful Mitford family.

References to the family go back to the Middle Ages; later writings mention family members such as John Mitford who designed the first Royal Exchange and Exbury House in Hampshire. Another John Mitford (1748-1830) was briefly the Speaker of the House of Commons, the Lord Chancellor of Ireland and the 1st. Lord Redesdale who inherited Batsford House, Moreton-in-Marsh, Gloucestershire, through marriage. Batsford House was then inherited by Algernon Bertram Mitford (1837-1916), known as 'Bertie'. He had lots of children (10 - no wonder he had no money!) including, Clementine who was to marry Winston Churchill.

Bertie's son David (1878-1958) inherited, but not a great deal - so maybe the eggs of his 500 chickens helped, sold at Harrods of course, David sold Batsford House and bought Asthall Manor, married Sydney Bowles and had one son, Tom (who died in 1945 in Burma at the age of 36) and six daughters. The infamous Mitford sisters: Nancy (born 1904), Pamela (1907), Diana (1910), Unity (1914), Jessica (1917) and Deborah (1920). Apart from Tom who went to prep school, lessons for the young Mitfords were in the library. They had numerous pets and activities included riding, fishing, gardening, Girl Guides, visits to Stratford Theatre and skating in Oxford (Deborah at 16 was invited to be in the Olympic skating team but her mother would not allow it). In 1926 the family moved to Swinbrook House, designed by David.

Although it was large enough for each child to have his/her own bedroom, it was a cold house and disliked by the children. The Mitfords owned three other houses, one on Mull, one in London and one - the Old Mill Cottage, in High Wycombe.

Nancy became noted for her witty novels of upper-class life including The Pursuit of Love and Love in a Cold Climate: she started the use of the terms 'U' (upper class) and 'non-U'. Pamela is perhaps the least well-known of the Mitford sisters. Diana married into the Guinness family but left him, and her children, for the 'Black Shirt' (British Union of Fascists) Sir Oswald Moseley. Diana was incarcerated during the war and then put under house arrest. She later moved to Paris and became friends with Edward VIII. Unity also had extreme right-wing views. On leaving a Munich finishing school in Munich, she stayed in the city and was introduced to Adolf Hitler. It was rumoured that she was Hitler's mistress although her sisters refuted this, Jessica (Decca), in contrast had extreme left-wing views. She moved to the US in 1939 and joined the Communist Party in the 1940s in New York. Her first husband died in 1941 and she married Bob Treuhaft in 1943, the civil rights activist and lawyer. Like her sister Nancy, Jessica was an author; one of her books, Hons and Rebels, describes her childhood and early adult life and was recommended by our speaker. The youngest of the Mitford sisters, Deborah, married Lord Cavendish in 1941 and became the Duchess of Devonshire.

Together they established Chatsworth as a visitor attraction and charity.

An extraordinary family!

The series were based on a series of novels written by Colin Dexter who wrote 13 books between 1975-1990's. The books were a mix of fact and fiction. Colin Dexter also made a cameo appearance in all but three episodes.


There were 33 episodes of Morse and Lewis but 36 of Endeavour. 39 different colleges were used with a third filmed in Middx and Herts. All three series were shown in 120 countries!

The red jaguar in the series was in fact not in good shape, always breaking down and needing much work. Eventually the car was given away in a promotional raffle with tickets selling at £5 each. The winner of the car then went on to sell it for £20,000. It was then refurbished and sold for over £100,000 pounds!


