Oct 24, 1955	Lt General Samuel T. Williams replaces General John W. O'Daniel as senior U.S. Army officer in Vietnam and as commander of MAAG-Indochina, he renames it U.S. Military
	Assistance Advisory Group-Vietnam. MAAG will concentrate on preparing the South
	Vietnamese armed forces for a conventional attack from North Vietnam.
Oct 14, 1962	An Air Force reconnaissance flight photographs nuclear armed Soviet missiles in Cuba,
	causing a major showdown between President Kennedy and Soviet Premier Khrushchev
	that results in what will become known as the Cuban Missile Crisis.
Oct 1 1964	U.S. Fifth Special Forces Group deploys to Vietnam from Fort Bragg, North Carolina, to
	oversee Special Forces operations in country.
Oct 7, 1964	Former Vice President Richard Nixon claims that Vietnam will be lost within a year and all
	of Southeast Asia within three years if the U.S. does not quickly change it policy.
Oct 1, 1965	The 1st Infantry Division deploys to Vietnam from Fort Riley, Kansas; it will initially be
	stationed in Bien Hoa Province, III Corps. U.S. Navy establishes support base at Danang.
Oct 6-Nov 19, 1965	In the first large scale operation since arriving, the 1st Air Cavalry Division (Airmobile)
,	joins with South Vietnamese marines to conduct Operation Happy Valley, a search and
	clear operation conducted in Binh Dinh Province, II Corps
Oct 1, 1966	The U.S. Air Force 834th Air Division and 483rd Tactical Air Lift Wing deploy to
,	Vietnam. U.S. Navy begins Operation Sea Dragon to interdict enemy supply vessels in
	coastal waters off North Vietnam.

Making Service Dogs Available to Veterans

Dog Chow has launched their 3rd annual Service Dog Salute campaign, which donates to organizations dedicated to providing trained service dogs to veterans free of charge. Because of restrictions like cost and training time, less than 1% of veterans in need of a service dog can obtain one, according to Purina's Dog Chow. The end goal of this campaign — which starts in September, National Service Dog Month, and runs through Nov. 26 — is to create a future where "every military hero in need can find a canine hero of their own. Bag a specially marked bag of Dog Chow to support this. Dog Chow wants to ensure that service dogs are available to all veterans who need them. Along with bringing back the Service Dog Salute campaign, Dog Chow and Purina are also working with members of Congress in support of federal legislation that would provide training and service dogs for veterans. The PAWS for Veterans Therapy Act (HR4305) would create a pilot program in the VA to give veterans access to treatment derived from working with service dogs. The bill has been approved by the House, but still awaits passage in the Senate.

Nov 11 Veterans Day Parade—cancelled

The Veterans Day Council of Indianapolis, Inc., a voluntary non-profit organization fostering a wholesome relationship between the community and veterans of our Armed Forces, is today announcing the cancelation of the annual Veterans Day breakfast and parade. "The Veterans Day Council board of directors have been closely monitoring conditions concerning public health," said Jill Druskis, President of the Veterans Day Council of Indianapolis. "The Council's decision to cancel its in-person events was taken out of a great abundance of caution for safeguarding the health and well-being of spectators, participants, and volunteers."

In place of the annual events held near The American Legion Mall in Downtown Indianapolis, the Veterans Day Council will present a Veterans Day virtual service and awards ceremony to honor veterans. The virtual service will be live streamed online at 11:00a.m. on Veterans Day.

"The Council invites Central Indiana and now American's worldwide to join us as we honor our military veterans for 'their patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good'," said Druskis

May Add to Presumptive Agent Orange Conditions List

The House and Senate passed their own versions of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2021 in July. Each bill includes adding bladder cancer, hypothyroidism and Parkinson-like symptoms or Parkinsonism. Both version omit hypertension. The bill would also remove Confederate symbols and names from U.S. military installations. The House and Senate have to settle on a final version of the DOD budget.

Legislation Passed for Mental Health Care at VA

In August the Senate passed The Commander John Scott Hannon Act of 2019. This bill was named in honor of the late Cmdr. John Scott Hannon, a retired Navy Seal who committed suicide. This bill will give the VA authority to hire more mental health professionals, increase the number of locations veterans can access VA telehealth services, study and invest in alternative treatment options, and improve management of suicide prevention resources.

Three Bills Sent to President to Support Troops, Veterans and Families

GI Bill Work Study Improvement Act of 2019—would eliminate VA from having to process work study claims. It would authorize schools to make payments to students who are enrolled in the VA work study program.

Ryan Kules and Paul Benne Specially Adaptive Housing Improvement Act of 2019—would expand Specially Adapted Housing grants for blind and seriously injured veterans. It would allow the veteran to double the number of grants to six per veteran. This bill is names after two Army retired veterans who used these grants to adapt their homes for their disabilities.

Amend Servicemembers Civil Relief Act S.3637 –would protect military members who were issued a stop movement order from the Department of Defense in the middle of changing their duty stations during the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. The stop movement order caused many troops to have house and car leases in different locations.

VA completes digitization of archived Vietnam-era deck logs

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) announced today (Sept 28) completion of an interagency effort with the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) to digitize declassified deck logs to process claims faster for eligible Vietnam-era Veterans. The U.S. Navy and Coast Guard deck logs within NARA contain helpful information being used to validate claims for Blue Water Navy (BWN) Veterans who served in the offshore waters of the Republic of Vietnam, to establish presumption to herbicide exposure for service-connected disability benefits.

Data contained in deck logs is used when deciding VA benefit claims. Also known as ship logs or captain's logs, information was manually inputted to chronologically document the daily activities of a navy ship or unit. VA provided the digital images of deck logs to NARA, available in the National Archives Catalog.

"Digitization of all available Navy deck logs for ships that served in Vietnam were completed in December 2019, while Coast Guard deck logs were completed in September.

Veterans, dependents and surviving spouses may contact approved Veterans Service Organizations for assistance in filling a claim. Learn more about Agent Orange or call 800-827-1000 for more information.

The Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2019, signed into law by President Trump June 25, 2019 and effective January 1, extends the presumption of service connection for certain diseases associated with herbicide exposure. To date, VA has collectively awarded \$641 million to more than 22,524 Blue Water Navy Veterans or survivors. From VA Press Release
