

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
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Welcome one and all to your 2018 NEMO Fair,

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
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



GENERAL RULES

1. **TRAFFIC REGULATIONS:** Absolutely no parking on roadway. Any person obstructing any fire lane, drive or street with any vehicle will be requested by the police to remove the vehicle immediately. Failure to do so will result in expulsion from the grounds and/or arrest. **PARKING IN FRONT OF EXHIBIT BUILDINGS, EXHIBITS, GRANDSTAND, AND MIDWAY CONCESSIONS WILL NOT BE TOLERATED. AMPLE PARKING SPACE IS PROVIDED FOR ALL VEHICLES. SPECIAL AREAS HAVE BEEN DESIGNATED FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS, CAMPER, EMPLOYEES AND OFFICIALS. ALL VIOLATORS WILL BE TOWED AT OWNER'S EXPENSE.**
2. **RECREATIONAL AND OTHER VEHICLES:** No person shall be allowed to bring or use upon the Fairgrounds, any motor scooter, motorbike, motorcycle, coaster sled, skateboard, roller skates, rollerblades, bike, ATV, golf cart or diminutive vehicle upon the Fairgrounds during the period of the Fair without the approval of the Fair Board. Such policy does not include wheelchairs or other medically necessary devices or vehicles to be used by Fair Board directors in their duties.
3. **TRAILERS:** Livestock trailers must be parked in designated area. Violators will be towed at owner's expense.
After unloading livestock, check with superintendents for instructions on parking trailers.
Parking is prohibited in the livestock area between 2 pm and 9 pm Monday through Saturday. (Only exception is for loading and unloading livestock.) Vehicles in violation will be towed at owner's expense.
4. **GROUND REGULATIONS:** No outside coolers, cans, or bottles will be allowed on the Fairgrounds except as may be used by campers in the campgrounds. Coolers, cans and bottles will be confiscated at the gate. Proper clothing must be worn on Fairgrounds. Patrons must wear shoes and shirt, or risk expulsion from the grounds.
5. **ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES:** Alcoholic beverages, except as may be used by campers in the campgrounds, will be permitted only in the beer barn and grandstand areas and must be purchased from vendors on the Fairgrounds.
6. **PETS:** Absolutely **no pets**, including any type of animal, shall be allowed on the Fairgrounds during the period of the fair without the approval of the Fair Board. Animals for the handicapped are excluded. **This includes the campgrounds.**
7. **SOLICITATIONS: Solicitation of any type**, including the distribution of trinkets, flyers, pamphlets, baubles, or other merchandise or material shall not be allowed without having been requested or invited to do so and approved by formal action of the Northeast Missouri Fair Board.
8. **VAGRANCY:** Vagrancy is not allowed on the grounds.
9. **OVERNIGHT:** Persons staying on the grounds overnight must present a ticket or entry pass when asked to do so by the Fair Board.
10. **SMOKING:** NO SMOKING in livestock barn by order of the City Fire Marshall.
11. **CLAIMS FOR INJURY:** No claims for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted, nor suit instituted or maintained against the NEMO Fair, or its officers or their agents, representatives, volunteers, or employees. If any damage, loss, or injury to person or property shall be caused by reason of any neglect or willful acts of any persons, firm, or corporation or their agents, representatives, volunteers, or employees having license or privilege to exhibit on said fairgrounds, or occupying a space thereon the NEMO Fair shall, in no manner, be responsible therefore, and in case it be subject to any expenses or liability all persons causing same or liable therefore, shall indemnify the said NEMO Fair.
UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES WILL THE NEMO FAIR BE RESPONSIBLE FOR DEATH, THEFT, DAMAGE, OR INJURY TO ANY PERSONS, ANIMAL, ARTICLE OR VEHICLE.
12. **RESERVATION OF RIGHTS:** The NEMO Fair Association Board of Directors reserves the right to do the following:
 - a. Reject any entry.
 - b. Continue, discontinue, or cancel the fair due to bad weather, unfavorable, or unavoidable conditions.
 - c. Suspend, amend or add general rules/regulations without notice.

Camping Rules and Procedures

1. Camping spots not paid by March 31st will be released to the general public. Reservations may be made by calling Jim Keim at (660) 341-5310. **PAYMENTS: Must be mailed to P.O. Box 287 Kirksville, MO 63501, Jim Keim: 17151 West Lone Pine Dr., Queen City, MO 63561 or brought to the Fair Office by Appointment.**
2. Camping spaces will be numbered and specific spaces may be requested. Campers will be assigned a numbered space and must be parked in that assigned space.
3. The camping rate will be \$160.00 (30 amp campers), \$180.00 (50 amp camper).
4. Campers moved onto the grounds before July 14, 2018 will be assessed an additional fee of \$20.00 (30 amp) and \$25.00 (50 amp) **per night**.
5. Campers must be removed no later than 5:00 P.M., July 22, 2018 or additional nights can be purchased at \$20.00 (30 amp) and \$25.00 (50 amp) **per night**. Pets must be removed by July 15, 2018.
6. No stock trailers are allowed in the campgrounds unless equipped as campers. All stock trailers must be parked in the designated area or be subject to a fine.
7. You may purchase 1 extra tag for \$20.00. Vehicles parked in the campgrounds **MUST** have a hang tag or be subject to towing at the owner's expense. **NO REPLACEMENT HANG TAGS WILL BE PROVIDED.**
8. No advertising, sales, flea markets, solicitations, etc., shall be allowed in the campgrounds without prior approval by formal action of the Fair Board.
9. Campers are responsible for rules concerning the campground under General Rules. Please contact Jim Keim at (660) 341-5310 with any camping questions when on the Fairgrounds.
10. Campers or anyone going to the campgrounds must use **Gate 2 from 12 pm - 11 pm ONLY**.
Gate 1 from 11 pm - Noon the following day.

PETS: ABSOLUTELY NO PETS, INCLUDING ANY TYPE OF ANIMAL, ARE ALLOWED IN THE CAMPGROUNDS DURING THE PERIOD OF THE FAIR. NO DOGS WILL BE ALLOWED IN THE CAMPGROUNDS STARTING JULY 15, 2018.

RECREATIONAL & OTHER VEHICLES: No person shall be allowed to bring or use upon the Fairgrounds, any motor scooter, motorbike, motorcycle, coaster sled, skateboard, roller skates, roller blades, bike, ATV, golf cart or diminutive vehicle during the period of the Fair without the approval of the Fair Board. Such policy does not include wheelchairs or other medically necessary devices or vehicles to be used by Fair Board Directors in their duties.

POOLS: DUE TO INSURANCE LIABILITY, ABSOLUTELY NO POOLS OF ANY KIND WILL BE ALLOWED IN THE CAMPGROUND.

GROUND REGULATIONS: No outside coolers, cans, bottles will be allowed on the Fairgrounds except as may be used by campers in the campgrounds only. Coolers, cans and bottles will be confiscated at the gate. Proper clothing must be worn on Fairgrounds. Patrons must wear shoes and shirt, or risk expulsion from the grounds.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES: Alcoholic beverages, except as may be used by campers in the campgrounds, will be permitted only in the beer garden and grandstand areas and must be purchased from vendors on the Fairgrounds.



Casey Donahew

Monday, July 16, 2018

If you build it, they will come. This might be the mantra of one of the greatest baseball movies of all time, "Field Of Dreams," but it's also a pretty accurate description of the career of Texas music sensation Casey Donahew.

The Burleson native, (with the help of his wife Melinda,) has painstakingly carved out an impressive niche for himself on the country music scene over the past decade, attracting a solid base of loyal fans who flock to his legendary live shows. Building his career from the ground up one show

at a time, he's managed to perform on countless stages night after night in front of thousands, topped the Texas music charts several times, released four albums independently to critical acclaim, and forged a path all his own through the music scene without the aid or muscle of a major record label or power-suit management company. And the release of his latest CD, "Double Wide Dream," may just push him to heights he never could have imagined when he first plugged in on stage at the Thirsty Armadillo bar back in Fort Worth's Stockyards in the Fall of 2002, and began constructing his own field of musical dreams.

Though he seems like a born natural when it comes to performing, Casey actually fell into music gradually. He grew up on a farm the first few years of his life and quickly grew to love riding and team roping, a sport he still enjoys today. His grandfather, who loved to play and sing, gave Casey his first guitar growing up, but it wasn't until college at Texas A&M that he first began to teach himself to play and really focused on writing songs. A big fan of 80's and 90's country, Casey had always admired the storytelling in the songs of that period, and when a wild-eyed Oklahoma boy named Garth Brooks began swinging from the rafters and employing all sorts of crazy, rock show antics during his concerts, Casey was immediately hooked.

"I've just always liked the country songs from the 80's," says Casey. "It seems like a time when there was a lot of great songwriting going on, and I just enjoy people who can tell a story with a song. And I've always been a big Garth Brooks fan, since the beginning. First there was George Strait, and then here came this guy from Oklahoma, Garth Brooks. And you'd see George standing there playing guitar, but then Garth comes along running all over the stage, playing guitar and singing all these songs that he wrote. And the thing I was always most enamored with about Garth was that he wrote most of those songs. He was just one of those guys who did it all. And he started in Stillwater, not too far from the Red Dirt scene. You could really take a lot of Garth Brooks songs and put 'em on a record of mine, and I think it would fit right in."

It was during his college days that Casey also discovered another rowdy artist who was forging his own path across the Lonestar state in a big way, Pat Green. When his fraternity hired Pat to play one of their parties back in those early days, Casey was instantly inspired by Pat's way with a song and his ability to connect with an audience. "Pat Green was really the guy who started it all for me in college. He just did a great job connecting with fans, and later on when we started playing, we really tried to mirror how he did that. He was one of those guys who I thought was a great entertainer, and really told stories that people wanted to hear and could relate to, and I think that's what made him so popular."

Transferring to the University of Texas/Arlington, Casey began traveling around with his girlfriend/future wife Melinda to catch shows by Pat, Randy Rogers, Cross Canadian Ragweed, and other acts who were bubbling up just above the surface on the burgeoning Texas music scene at the time. And it wasn't long before he was testing the waters himself, playing a regular acoustic gig at Fort Worth bar the Thirsty Armadillo, trying out the songs he'd been writing since high school.

"I had moved back and was going to UTA, and just started following some of those guys around," he recalls. "We'd go see guys like Randy play at the Thirsty Armadillo when he was just starting out and the scene was just barely beginning to go anywhere out here. Pat was selling Billy Bob's out, and we'd go see him, and Ragweed was just starting to break in that timeframe too.

I had also discovered Matchbox 20 during that time, and I don't know what it was exactly, maybe the timing of that first CD when it came out it, but that whole record just speaks to me. It's one of those records I still listen to...something about the way he writes songs translates to the way I felt in life at the time, and it still does. And that's something you try to capture and recreate and hopefully through your writing you help people through hard times or get people through situations in life. I don't know if there was ever a specific point where I said, 'Hey I'm gonna do this for a living,' but I just enjoyed writing songs and playing. It was a way to get my feet wet -- and I learned a lot playing at the Armadillo. And it was a way into the industry and to see how other people did it, and we learned a lot of stuff in those first couple of years."

Within a few years Casey had conquered the small club circuit and was packing out larger places like the Fort Worth Horseman's Club. He released his first independent CD, "Lost Days," (which included the autobiographical nod to his home turf, "Stockyards,") and the song quickly became a huge hit for the new band, even among fans who had never visited the Texas city. "Stockyards is one of those songs we started out with. I've been to a lot of places, and I've

never been anywhere quite like the North side of Fort Worth. Its just one of those places...I grew up in all those bars, and there's such a history down there and it's something I think everyone can relate to. It's weird, it seems like we go far from Fort Worth and people still sing that song, it's one of those things people relate to -- everyone's got their own Stockyards if you will, their own place they grew up that they remember going to the bars and running the streets and getting into trouble, I guess."

Around this time, with his wife Melinda spearheading management and booking for the band, Casey impressed the owners of Billy Bob's enough to land a gig playing the legendary club where he'd attended so many shows as a fan himself. Within two years of his first show there, Casey was drawing nearly 4000 eager fans, and he's never looked back since.

In 2006 he released a second self-titled CD that included "White Trash Story," a raucous, redneck story tune that instantly became a fan favorite. He followed that up with a live CD recorded at Bostock's, (the Stephenville bar that gave Casey one of his first big breaks), then returned to the studio in 2009 to make, "Moving On," a project described as "rattling, rolling and rumbling like a youthful Robert Earl Keen fronting Reckless Kelly. That project sold an impressive 32,000 copies thanks to his growing legion of fans, as word spread like wildfire among the college crowd about this underground indie sensation. The fans have always been foremost on Casey's mind as he built his career, and he makes his music with them in mind. For Casey, it's never been about accolades, or awards, or even major label attention or fawning. It's simply about the music. And his fans recognize and appreciate that. Taking a page from the live performance playbook of one of his heroes, Pat Green, Casey fuses genuine, honest lyrics with a contagious, take-no-prisoners energy onstage, making sure everyone is along for the ride -- which, more often than not, is a wild one.

"I think we definitely make music for our fans...we don't worry about much else except making the fans happy and making ourselves happy, and we've been real lucky and fortunate in that I think we came along and started this band at a time when social media was really kind of starting to get some legs. And that really made it possible for a band that really didn't have a lot of radio support to thrive and succeed...you know we were able to keep people interested and with social media they were able to share it with their friends in such a fast way that it really spread the music to a large group of people quicker than it could have ever before."

His latest studio CD, "Double Wide Dream," is pretty much right in the wheelhouse of Casey's previous three...the songs contemplate all the highs and lows of real life, from the heartaches to the belly laughs and everything in between, and the CD is packed full of that unbridled, can-do indie spirit that has rocket-powered his entire career right from the start. From the straight-shooting, hilarity of the leadoff single, "Double Wide Dream," a redneck's declaration of love for his hot mess of a wife, to the heartfelt twist of "Give You A Ring," and the hotter-than-a-jalapeno, Texas-tinged smoker, "One Star Flag," the tunes on this new CD cover a broad range of material and emotions and showcase a maturity that can only be achieved through lots of living, loving, and losing -- things Casey has no doubt done his fair share of throughout his life and his budding career. And though he can work his way through a tearjerker with the best of 'em, for Casey, every song doesn't have to be brain surgery -- it's OK to laugh and have a good time and let your hair down, as in the case of the hilarious title track, or "White Trash Story II - The Deuce," a continuation of the tune that has become a fan sensation and instant singalong during his shows.

"Hopefully I've grown as a songwriter over the past few years, but I don't try to get too carried away with it, I don't want to try to be too serious about everything. "Double Wide Dream" is one of those songs that's just really fun. Those are songs that provide a little comic relief, and I want people to get out and jump up and down and have fun. Not every song has to change your life, there also has to be entertainment in the world. And I like to think we provide entertainment with those songs. And, I still think of myself as a redneck...I live in the country, I like to be outdoors, and shoot guns, and hunt, and drive trucks, so those are things we write about. This album is really not too far from what we've been doing from day one, just a continuation of it, really."

With the release of what will likely be his biggest album to date, Casey is gearing up for his biggest year ever, playing to packed houses throughout Texas and the Midwest. He's come a long, long way since those early days on that Armadillo stage, and he still loves to thrill crowds both big and small. But given the choice -- he'll take the flamethrower approach every time.

"I'm a Bon Jovi fan, and he's got a documentary called "When We Were Beautiful" that kind of captures Bon Jovi on a completely different level than anyone I even know. But a lot of the things he thinks about the music business translate, and it's crazy to see somebody who has the success he does have the same kind of anxieties and worries about his music that I think the common musician does. And he had a great quote in that. He's played lots of little intimate shows, but the shows he loves, are the huge ones. You know he says he'd like to play the desert and sell it out. That's always stuck with me...I don't want to play a small place, I want to play the desert and sell it out!"

And though his dream may soon grow much, much larger than a double wide, and reach heights even he couldn't have imagined, Casey is quite content with all he's accomplished thus far in this little career that could. "I don't see anyone coming to make a deal where we're gonna change what we do. I'm not sure how far we have left to go, hopefully forever, but you know nothing lasts forever, so I'm always mindful of that and prepared that one day this ride could be over. And I'm pretty proud of everything we've accomplished. I hope there's more, but if it were over tomorrow, I could look at my wife and say I was really proud of everything we've accomplished. I'm really excited about this record. I think the songs on here are great, and are a big step forward, and the fans, whatever their expectations are, I hope we blow em away!"

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
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Cody Johnson

When Cody Johnson's *Cowboy Like Me* debuted in the Top 10 on the Billboard Country Albums chart in January 2014, jaws dropped in offices all over Nashville.

"I got a lot of 'Who is this kid?'" Johnson says with a laugh two years later. "I love that. That was a new horizon. And I'm gonna work to make sure people know exactly who I am."

Johnson does that from the start in *Gotta Be Me*, a follow-up project that's loaded with solid country

instrumentation and winsome melodies. In the first minute alone, he paints himself as a cowboy, raised on outlaw country, who drinks too much, fights too much and won't apologize for having an opinion. By the time the 14-track journey is over, he's shared his rodeo history in "The Only One I Know (Cowboy Life)," demonstrated his woman's influence in "With You I Am" and paid homage to his gospel heritage in "I Can't Even Walk."

Johnson delivers it all with an uncanny confidence. His smoky baritone and ultra-Southern enunciations give him a voice as uniquely identifiable as country kingpins Jason Aldean or Tim McGraw. And he uses it to convey a Texas-proud swagger, a real-man charm and an unwavering honesty about who he is, where he comes from and where he hopes to go.

"I'm a God-fearin', hard-workin', beer-drinkin', fightin', lovin' cowboy from Texas," he grins. "That's about it."

The hard-workin' part is key. The other parts are easily found in his music. It's intense, focused, sincere. And when he takes the stage, there's a Garth-like conviction to his performances. Johnson inhabits the songs, recreates their emotions because they're so familiar. And he's willing to lay bare those emotions because he's always been willing to risk. He lives in the moment behind that microphone, the same way he rode bulls in an earlier day.

"That's a very, very rough sport to be in," Johnson notes. "It's very, very rough on your body. It's very rough on your mind, and it's scary. I mean there's not a professional bull rider that won't tell you it's not scary. If it wasn't scary, we wouldn't do it."

Johnson pauses for just a beat.

"I'm kind of an adrenaline junkie."

Needing a fix is part of the attraction in both the rodeo and music. In the former, there's always another buckle to chase, another bull to conquer for eight seconds. In the latter, there's always another fan to win over, another song to write. And in some ways, Johnson has been chasing something illusory, indefinable, since he first arrived on planet Earth in Southeast Texas.

Johnson grew up in tiny Sebastapol, an unincorporated community on the eastern shore of the Trinity River that's never exceeded 500 residents. Even today, it's more than 30 miles to the nearest Walmart, in Huntsville, Texas, a town best known as the headquarters for the state's criminal justice department. It's a rough and tumble area, and it comes through in the music. Willie Nelson, Merle Haggard, George Strait, Billy Joe Shaver – their songs were all essential to the local clubs, and Johnson was exposed to their mysterious allure even before he was old enough to get in.

"You could hear the music from those bars across that lake," he recalls. "I'd always hear somebody singing 'Whiskey Bent And Hell Bound' or something like that, and I always wondered what was going on across that water in those barrooms. It definitely intrigued me. I always wanted to go see what was on the other side of the tracks."

At a young age, Johnson was given the tools to eventually work in those clubs, though his official education was grounded in the church. His father played drums for their congregation, and that was likewise the first instrument that young Cody picked up.

"Learning drums first taught me about feeling the song – feeling that dynamic of when it's supposed to be big and when it's supposed to be soft," he says. "I think that still sticks with me as a songwriter and as a performer, and in turn it's helped me shape my band, because I know what I'm looking for on every front."

Johnson learned guitar next, and when a teacher heard him playing an original song, he convinced Johnson to form a band with a few other students enrolled in the Future Farmers of America. Just a few months later, that first band finished runner-up in a Texas State FFA talent contest, creating an internal buzz that Johnson would continue to chase.

He didn't necessarily think it would be a career. He briefly went to Angelina College in Lufkin, Texas, but traded that in to become a rodeo pro. Johnson did OK in that sport – the oversized belt buckle he wears today was won fair and square on the back of a bucking bull – but he broke a litany of bones: his right leg, his left arm, two ribs and his right collarbone.

Cody started recording his own music during that phase of his life, beginning with Black And White Label, which featured his dad, Carl, on drums. Johnson sold the CDs, pressed on his own CoJo imprint, from his pickup.

Eventually, Cody took a job at the prison to pay the bills. His band kept hitting the clubs on the weekend, with Johnson kept banging away on the guitar on Fridays and Saturdays while overseeing some very hardened convicts whose crimes had cut them off from humanity.

"There's a lonely style of music that a lot of those guys listen to," Johnson says. "I worked in the field for a while, and they sang old prison work songs. Some had kind of lost hope, and I can see now that you have to sing about people that don't have hope the same way you want to sing to give them hope."

Meanwhile, his weekend crowds began to grow, and Johnson started landing hits on the Texas music charts. After the release of his third album, he won New Male Vocalist of the Year in the Texas Regional Radio Music Awards.

The music thing started to look like maybe it could be a business, not just a sideline pursuit. He was stunned when his wife, Brandi, agreed.

"It was a moment when I felt like I wasn't on my own anymore," Johnson says. "To have my fiancée at the time say 'I'm behind you, no matter what we have to do,' it gave me a whole new level of confidence that some people might have thought I already had. But I didn't."

Even with her belief, the road wasn't easy.

"I sacrificed, and I worked my tail," he says. "I barely slept for years trying to make this thing happen, and me and my wife didn't have a lot of groceries. We didn't have a lot of things for a long time."

Johnson reached a new creative plateau when he enlisted singer/songwriter Trent Willmon, who wrote Montgomery Gentry's "Lucky Man," to produce an album in Nashville. That project, *A Different Day*, raised the bar on Johnson's barroom ambitions. The studio musicians he worked with challenged his own band. Johnson grew – and his bandmates grew – because they had to stretch themselves to live up to the album on the road. That pattern has continued through three projects as he continues to chase something illusory.

"It's that always-never-good-enough kind of attitude that gives us that drive," Johnson says.

When *Cowboy Like Me* broke onto the Billboard chart, it demonstrated that they had built an audience, but also gave them a little cache to push it even further. The band has broken beyond the red-dirt confines, drawing sizeable audiences in such far-flung destinations as California, Montana, Wisconsin and the Southeast, as Johnson wins over fans with his honest songs and on-stage ferocity.

And Johnson's built up a Twitter following of 73,000 fans – impressive numbers for a guy who's marketed and developed his career without the aid of a major label.

He approached *Gotta Be Me* with two major objectives: to make yet another advance musically, and to provide an authentic self-portrait to that growing fan base still trying to figure out who this Cody Johnson guy really is. He worked with some of Nashville's best songwriters – including David Lee ("Hello World," "19 Somethin'"), Terry McBride ("Play Something Country," "I Keep On Loving You") and Dan Couch ("Somethin' 'Bout A Truck," "Hey Pretty Girl") – while drawing on his own history, rich with its own compelling subject matter.

"Every Scar" draws a life lesson from all those rodeo bruises and broken bones. "Half A Song" blends his barroom experiences with the melodic and rhythmic sensibilities he picked up at his daddy's feet. The fiddle-rich "Wild As You" embraces a freedom-loving woman whose sense of adventure is as deep as Johnson's own. And that spacious gospel closer, featuring his parents on harmony, surrenders some of the rabble-rousing, adrenaline-raising pieces of his past into bigger spiritual hands.

In essence, *Gotta Be Me* documents the life of a guy who's lived in the fast lane as a beer-drinkin', rodeo-ridin' cowboy, but who's also seen just enough darkness to temper that wild streak.

"You're only a couple bad decisions every day from screwing your whole life up," he reasons.

With a good woman behind him and a whole lot of promise in front of him, that's enough to keep Cody Johnson in check. The energy he put into his rebel years now goes into his work. He's not sure what he's chasing, but he knows it's paying off. The "me" that Cody Johnson is becoming will continue to evolve, and it's his intent to share that journey in an honest, meaningful way. The same way that Haggard, Strait and Nelson did when they made their marks. When it's all said and done, the plan is mostly to reach the point where people are no longer asking "Who is this kid?"

"I don't want to be a blemish on country music," Cody Johnson says. "I don't want to be a dot. I'd like to be a mark."



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

RULES AND REGULATIONS


The NEMO Fair Pageant competition is held annually in Kirksville in conjunction with the NEMO Fair. Entrants agree to abide by all rules of the NEMO Fair Pageant that are in effect now or as announced later. Entrants agree that the time, manner and method of judging shall be solely at the discretion of the NEMO Fair and the decision of the judges will be final. Entrants agree to pay an entry fee of \$40.00.

1. Contestants shall be citizens of the United States and residents of the state of Missouri for no fewer than six months immediately preceding July 4, 2018.
2. The NEMO Queen/Teen Miss will automatically relinquish her title if she has a child, enters into a marriage contract, or chooses to cohabit with a male in lieu of a marriage contract. A contestant must have never been convicted of any crime or have any criminal charges pending.
3. **Royalty must be present for ALL obligations as determined by the queen committee including the Saturday before the upcoming fair regardless of any circumstances.**
4. Contestants for the Division of Queen shall be between the ages of 17 years old and 22 years old. Contestants for the Division of Teen Miss shall be between the ages of 13 years old and 16 years old. Contestants for the Division of Young Miss shall be between the ages of 9 years old and 12 years old. All of the above Divisions shall be as of September 1, 2018.
5. Entries shall be postmarked no later than June 15, 2018.
6. All entries shall be sent to NEMO Fair Queen Pageant c/o Cathy Houston, 25928 Benton Way, Kirksville, MO 63501.
7. A complete entry **MUST** include the following:
 - a) \$40.00 entry fee non-refundable.
 - b) Completed entry form.
 - c) One wallet size photo which will become property of NEMO Fair Association and will not be returned.*Failure to include all 3 items listed above will result in contestant being ineligible to compete in contest.*
8. Each Contestant/pageant division winner under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian during duration of the 2018 NEMO Fair, while representing the NEMO Fair Association.
9. Conduct deemed to be improper and detrimental to the NEMO Fair or the queen pageant will be reason for disqualification and dismissal by the queen committee.
10. If Miss NEMO Fair fails to complete her term, the title will be passed to the runner-up in the order of their rank, beginning with the first runner-up.
11. Selection of the division winners will be based on the following scoring basis: Personal interviews, 40 percent; public speaking or talent performance, 40 percent; evening gown, 20 percent. Talent is limited to 2 minutes.
12. The NEMO Fair Association will furnish the following for the contestant competing for Missouri State Fair Queen:
 - a) Entry fee for the contest.
 - b) One night lodging for the candidate and chaperone with the Sedalia Welcome Committee.
13. Missouri State Fair Queen contestant must provide her own chaperone per State Fair Queen contest rules.
14. NEMO Fair Queen Committee has the right to change rules to meet the needs of the contest.

July 20 • 2:30 registration • 3:00 pull time

Rules for a Sanctioned Pedal Tractor Pull

1. The Event will be for ages 4-12 years old.

There will be 9 divisions by age (mixing or not) boys and girls. It is incredibly important that you run the pull in the same way the State and National are run. It is unfair to kids to do otherwise.

**There should never be a use of the child's weight to make classes. This is unethical and unfair. This is usually a sign of inferior equipment. This has no similarity to further competition at the State or National level. Please think of the children first.
2. Children 3 years old may participate before the 4 year old competition, but will not be eligible for awards or sanctions. 12 year old competitors on the day of the pull may participate, but if 13 on or before the National Pedal Pull, the last Saturday in September, are ineligible for State. Not all sponsors allow time for 2 and 3 year olds please be patient with us it may not be our choice. Remember the event is 4-12 year olds.
3. Competitors will enter the division they are the day of the pedal pull, including State and National. State and National will require proof of age and proper sanctioning paper work from lower meets.
4. Each participant must register prior to the starting of their age group and have a parent or guardian's signature on the registration forms.
5. Rules of Conduct by Participants:
 - A. The child may not place their hand on the tractor tire at any time during their pull to help increase their pulling distance.
 - B. The child may not place one or both feet on the ground to push the tractor forward.
 - C. There can be no loss of forward pressure. In other words, they cannot hesitate or absolutely never jerk the equipment.
 - D. The child will remain in the seat at all times. If a contestant lifts off (losing contact with any part of or sliding over the back of) the seat the pull will be stopped and their distance will be measured to that point. The classic is standing to pedal like a bike while not touching the seat.**
 - E. All participants must be wearing shoes, no bare feet. (We would suggest tie or Velcro shoes that cover the foot and give traction on the pedal.)
6. Any arguing with the track officials by a contestant, parent, or guardian will not be allowed and could result in disqualification of the contestant. If you have a disagreement, please talk to us after the pull in private. We will display sportsmanship in all cases and should that not be possible the offender will be asked to leave. No one is perfect, but we will handle things in the proper way.
7. All rulings by track officials are final and may supersede any of the above rules. In the case of need, a sled may be re-weighted and the group may start over. If for any reason the tractor or sled malfunction causing an error in the results, there may be a rerun. If a tractor breaks in the middle of a division, we will most likely restart the division with the replacement tractor.
8. Sanctioning: We as pullers are sanctioned in Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, and South Dakota. 1st place and 2nd place boy and girl in each age group will qualify for State regardless of overall finish. In some States it will include the 3rd place boy and girl as well.
9. Two items of note; the sled will be given a tug to get the pedals moving, and therefore, there is no reason to set pedals any more, second the seat is set once for the whole age group - Never per individual.

** This seat issue was a question to us as Kayla seemed to get nipped by kids sliding up the back of the seat. Then last year the National advised us it was permissible to slide without losing contact with the seat. So the height of the seat is the limit to that slide. They can not sit on top of high seat or slide over the top. We were also told the same at International when asked.

A plaque with the winners names will also be presented to the NEMO Fairboard and to Mr. Jason Dimmitt for the Vo-Tech School.




 - Fitter will be asked to leave.
 - All entries are to be in place at times and dates specified in schedule
 - The superintendent in each department will be responsible for assigning space and arranging exhibits, and their directions must be followed. If you are in the wrong area/pen you must move and must clean the pen.
 - All exhibitors must clean their pens before they will be released by Superintendent. If pens are not cleaned **NO MONITORY** awards will be given until the pen is clean and superintendents can deny entry into the fair the following year.
 - Treatment of animals (livestock): If superintendent doesn't think you are taking care of your livestock, then you maybe be asked to leave.
 - Sick animals will be asked to leave.
 - No medicine can be administered unless by veterinarian.
 - If you are in the same immediate family and you only have 1 animal per child you will be assigned same pen as sex of animal allows.
 - If the fairgrounds office doesn't have a copy of your SMQA card you are not allowed to show.
 - **ENTRIES MUST BE POSTMARKED JUNE 25TH, 2018. ENTRIES POSTMARKED FROM JUNE 26TH, 2018 - JULY 5TH, 2018 WILL ONLY BE ACCEPTED IF ACCOMPANIED BY DOUBLE ENTRY FEES AND IF SPACE ALLOWS. ENTRIES POSTMARKED JULY 6TH, 2018 - FAIR WILL ONLY BE ACCEPTED IF ACCOMPANIED BY TRIPLE ENTRY FEES AND IF SPACE ALLOWS.**

General Livestock Rules & Regulations

1. **Entries must be postmarked June 25th, 2018. Entries Postmarked from June 26th, 2018 - July 5th, 2018 will only be accepted if accompanied by double entry fees and if space allows. Entries Postmarked July 6th, 2018 - Fair will only be accepted if accompanied by triple entry fees and if space allows.**
2. Application for entry must be made upon printed form found in this fair book. A check for entry fees must be enclosed with the entry form. Entries with no money, incorrect amounts or incomplete information will receive a phone call from the Fair Office and have to come to the office to complete. If after deadline, a late fee will be added. Entries from this Fair book are open to 4-H and FFA members in the State of Missouri. The NEMO Fair Association states that a Season Pass or Day Pass is required

for admittance onto the fairgrounds.

3. All entries must be sent to: Fair Entries, NEMO Fair, P.O. Box 287, Kirksville, MO 63501, by June 25, 2018.
4. All 4-H and FFA classes at the NEMO Fair will follow guidelines set forth by the Missouri 4-H Youth Development Program. For a complete listing of all rules and regulations please see the 4-H and FFA section in the 2018 Missouri State Fair Catalog. Some rules may be superseded by rules in this book.
5. Articles or animals will not be placed on exhibition unless entered in the Superintendent's Book and entry tag (if required) attached.
6. All entries are to be in place at times and dates specified in schedule.
7. **The superintendent in each department will be responsible for assigning space and**

arranging exhibits, and their directions must be followed. If you are in the wrong area/pen you must move and must clean the pen.

8. Exhibitors must accompany their animal/exhibit to the Fair, care for them, and exhibit them. If this regulation cannot be followed, a letter of circumstance must be submitted to the 4-H July Council Meeting. Superintendents may permit another 4-H/ FFA member to show an animal in case of illness or physical handicap.

9. Uncontrollable animals or animals which the exhibitor cannot handle alone may be disqualified by the Superintendent and required to leave the ring and/or grounds.

10. In cases where a member has more than one animal in a class another 4-H/FFA exhibitor must show the second animal.

11. Minimal assistance is allowed by another 4-H/ FFA exhibitor at the discretion of the Superintendent.

12. Showmanship classes will run oldest age category to youngest. There will be no master showmanship classes; exhibitors will not be required to advance to next age category after winning in their category. (ages as of 1/1/2018; 14 and over, 11-13, and 8-10 for beef, sheep, swine, poultry and goat)

13. Unless otherwise stated, no exhibitor will be allowed more than two (2) entries in an individual class and one (1) entry in a pen class in the beef, sheep, swine, poultry, rabbit, bucket calf, goat departments. Each exhibitor will be limited to four steers regardless of breed.

14. Each exhibit shall be owned by the exhibitor and shall represent work accomplished in a project in which the exhibitor was enrolled during the past year. A written statement by the leader, stating that the exhibit is bona fide work, must accompany each exhibit, if requested by the Superintendent.

15. No red ribbon entries for championship.

16. An Adair County 4-H & FFA Show will be held as well as a NEMO Fair 4-H & FFA Show.

17. Believing it is in the best interest of all 4-H/FFA exhibitors to maintain a reputation of integrity and to present a wholesome and progressive image, 4-H and FFA members are expected to conduct themselves according to the best traditions of their respective organizations. Inappropriate conduct (drinking, stealing, vandalism, and indiscreet behavior) **WILL NOT BE TOLERATED**. Any violation of this rule will be grounds for disqualifying the exhibitor and/or livestock involved. Further, any premium monies earned will be forfeited.

18. All non-exhibitors will be expected to vacate barns by 12 midnight each evening.

19. State Health Regulations will apply to all livestock entries, unless specified otherwise.

20. Exhibitors are not permitted to show the same breed in both 4-H and FFA. For example, if an exhibitor shows Chester White hogs in 4-H, he/she cannot show Chester White hogs in FFA, or if an

exhibitor shows market steers in FFA, he/she cannot show market steers in 4-H. Animals are designated (4-H or FFA) at the time of entry and may not be switched to another division after entries have been received prior to the Fair.

21. The Adair County Fair states that any exhibitor (4-H/FFA) may only show in one county fair as "in County" in one calendar year. If violated, the exhibitor will accept the punishment set forth by the Joint Fair Committee.

22. 4-H members may exhibit only in projects in which they are enrolled in the current 4-H year.

23. **All exhibitors must clean their pens before they will be released by Superintendent. If pens are not cleaned NO MONITORY awards will be given until the pen is clean and superintendents can deny entry into the fair the following year.**

24. **Missouri Show Me Quality Assurance (MSMQA): By June 1, 2018, all 4-H exhibitors enrolled in food animal projects including beef, sheep, swine, dairy cattle, meat and dairy goats, rabbits, and poultry must complete the appropriate level of MSMQA certification to be considered an exhibitor in good standing in that project.**

25. **If the fairgrounds office doesn't have a copy of your SMQA card you are not allowed to show.**

26. **Treatment of animals (livestock): If superintendent doesn't think you are taking care of your livestock, then you may be asked to leave. Sick animals will be asked to leave. No medicine can be administered unless by veterinarian.**

27. **If you are in the same immediate family and you only have 1 animal per child you will be assigned same pen as sex of animal allows.**

28. **NO FITTERS RULE: All animals are to be groomed by the 4-H or FFA exhibitor with assistance from immediate family or other 4-H or FFA exhibitors only. (Immediate family is defined as father, mother, brothers, sisters, step-parents, step-siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles and legal guardians of the exhibitor.) All animals will be groomed in the barns or immediately adjacent to the barns. If a Fitter or a person other than specified in above statement helps prepare the animal for the showing in any manner the child's animal and the child will be **DISQUALIFIED** and asked to leave. Fitter will be asked to leave.**

Judging - Competent judges have been secured for all departments.

1. No one shall act as judge for any class in which he or she is exhibiting.

2. A judge, at his/her discretion may withhold any or all premiums if an article or animal in his/her judgement is not worthy of award.

3. Decision of judges shall be final subject only to protest for good reason and under the procedure hereinafter described under the heading "Protest".

4. Anyone attempting to interfere with the judges during the adjudication, or publicly expressing

disapproval in the area or grounds of decision of the judges, shall forfeit premiums and be excluded from further competition.

Protest - ALL PROTESTS MUST BE MADE IN WRITING to the Joint Review Board. The protest should include the reason for the alleged ineligibility and the rule governing the case must be noted. All protests must be signed. Such protest must be filed with a Joint Review Committee by or before 8 a.m. the day following the date the award is made.

Liabilities of Exhibitors

1. In no event shall University of Missouri Extension, Adair County University Extension Council, University Extension Staff or Adair County 4-H Council, its officers, directors or members be held responsible for any loss or damage to the property of person or exhibitor or other persons while on the fairgrounds whether said loss or damage shall arise from accident or any cause whatsoever.

2. Entry form will serve as agreement that you understand and accept responsibility for following all guidelines and understand that failure to do so will result in dismissal from event or activity.

Release of Exhibits - With the consent of the division superintendent, exhibits may be released only in the event of an extreme emergency, or for the purpose of attending a conflicting show by showing the proper papers. Failure to comply will mean automatic forfeiture of all premiums due to exhibitor.

Payment of Premiums

1. Premiums awarded by the judges under the rule herein described will be distributed as soon after the Fair as possible. ALL payments will be made by check.

2. In making payment for premiums awarded, no evidence of award will be recognized except Superintendents Entry Book properly approved and signed by Superintendent and Judge of that department in which the exhibitor is entered.

Believing in the best interest of all exhibitors to maintain a reputation of integrity and to represent a wholesome and progressive image, all participants (adult and youth) must observe the following guidelines for conduct:

1. Participate fully in all sessions.
2. Show respect for property and facilities used during the activity.
3. Observe the established schedule.
4. Appropriate and courteous behavior is expected. Swearing and obscene gestures are not permitted. Smoking by minors is prohibited; smoking by adults is discouraged, and prohibited in the livestock arena/barns. All other participants, guests, and visitors should be treated with respect and common courtesy.
5. This event should bring out a "natural high". No alcohol, stimulants, or non-prescription drugs will be allowed.

(Further, any premium monies earned by a disqualified exhibitor will be forfeited.)

Entries with no money, incorrect amounts or incomplete information will receive a phone call from the Fair Office and will be required to come to the office to complete. If after deadline, a late fee will be added. Entries from this Fair book are open to 4-H and FFA members in the State of Missouri. The NEMO Fair Association states that a Season Pass or Day Pass is required for admittance onto the fairgrounds.
3. **NO FITTERS RULE: All animals are to be groomed by the 4-H or FFA exhibitor with assistance from immediate family or other 4-H or FFA exhibitors only. 4. Breeding cattle to be shown in a breed class must be recorded in an association recognized by the National Society of Recorded Associations, except that calves dropped this year must be eligible for registry. Registration papers may be called for at any time during the Fair. All registered breeding animals must show in their respective breeds class if that breed has a represented class. Breeding beef classes may be available for the following breeds: Angus,

- Chianina, Hereford, Limousin, Maine Anjou, Shorthorn, Simmental, All Other Breeds, and Crossbred/Commercial. Other breed classes may be available depending on number of entries in that breed. Must be 5 head per breed, per gender to show as breed class.
5. Breeds will be shown in alphabetical order by breed with crossbreds showing last.
 6. Each exhibitor shall parade his animals when requested to do so by the Superintendent in charge.
 7. Market heifers will show against steers in Champion Drive.
 8. In all championship classes the second place animal in the class from which the Champion is chosen will be eligible to show for Reserve Champion provided a blue ribbon has been awarded to the second place animal.
 9. Animals shown in group classes must previously have been shown in individual classes.
 10. Additional classes may be added at Superintendent's discretion.
 11. Bulls over one year of age must be shown with bull lead.
 12. No false hair allowed on show animals. All steers and market heifers may be wiped for discoloration.
 13. Heifers shown in the market heifer class will NOT be allowed to show in the breeding cattle class.
 14. Steers and market heifers will be limited to four head per exhibitor.
 15. Steers and market heifers must have been owned by and in the care of member under the name of exhibitor, not farm or family name by March 1, 2018.
 16. Breeding animals must have been owned by and in the care of member under the name of exhibitor, not farm or family name, by June 1, 2018.
 17. Group of 3 steers or market heifers class may be entered by a 4-H Club or FFA Chapter with only one entry per club/chapter.
 18. A group of 3 steers or market heifers will consist of three steers and/or market heifers without regard to breed.
 19. Not more than one (1) calf in the group may be owned by the same individual in the group of 3 steers or market heifer class. Every animal exhibited in the group must have been previously exhibited in the same division (4-H or FFA) as an individual.
 20. Beef Herdsmanship Award will be determined by a silent committee and will be based on the following: sportsmanship-25 points, cleanliness of area-25 points, conduct outside of show ring-25 points, and stall decorations-15 points.

General Rules

1. All sheep that are to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease. **HEALTH CERTIFICATES MUST BE PRESENTED TO SUPERINTENDENT.**
2. Market lambs will be shown by breed, with classes divided by weight.
3. Ewe lambs may be shown as market lambs, but ewe lambs shown as market lambs will not be eligible for breeding sheep show.
4. Crossbred market lambs will be divided into black face and white/speckled face.
5. Show order of market lambs will be alphabetical with breeds represented, crossbreeds will show last.
6. All Adair County market lambs must be present at the spring weigh-in for check-in. Weigh-in is optional for rate of gain.
7. Market lambs must be slick sheared to show, this includes all areas above the hock/knee and from the ears back.
8. Only 1 entry per exhibitor for pen of 3 market lambs class. Each animal exhibited in this class must have been previously exhibited in a NEMO Fair Market Lamb class this year.
9. Pen of five market lamb class is open to any 4-H Club or FFA Chapter with only 1 entry per club/chapter and no more than 2 lambs per exhibitor. Every animal exhibited in this class must have

been previously exhibited in the same division (4-H or FFA) as an individual in a NEMO Fair Market Lamb class this year. Premiums will be paid to club leader with ribbon awarded.

10. Breeding stock limited to 2 entries per class and 1 entry in group classes.
11. **NO FITTERS RULE:** All animals are to be groomed by the 4-H or FFA exhibitor with assistance from immediate family or other 4-H or FFA exhibitors only. (Immediate family is defined as father, mother, brothers, sisters, step-parents, step-siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles and legal guardians of the exhibitor.) All animals will be groomed in the barns or immediately adjacent to the barns. If a Fitter or a person other than specified in above statement helps prepare the animal for the showing in any manner the child's animal and the child will be **DISQUALIFIED** and asked to leave. Fitter will be asked to leave.
12. All breeding sheep must have been owned and cared for by exhibitor since July 1, 2018. Market lambs must be owned by and cared for by exhibitor since May 1, 2018.
13. Market lambs must be shown with all feet on ground. Placing lambs feet on exhibitor's shoe tops is not acceptable and will not be allowed.
14. Exhibitor must show their own animals, unless exhibitor has 2 animals in the same class.
15. Market lambs are to be weighed in under exhibitors name; NOT farm or family name.
16. Minimum market lamb weight 80 pounds. Refer to sale Rule #6. (For Adair County exhibitors only)
17. Only two market lambs per exhibitor may receive premiums in rate of gain class.
18. All sheep except market lambs and commercial ewes, must be recorded in their respective breed associations in exhibitor's name. Registration papers must be supplied at check-in.
19. **No ice, ice water, or alcohol may be used externally or internally as a fitting practice. No drenching of lambs.**
20. Must have 3 animals in a breed to be considered for a breed division. If not 3 animals, they can show in the all others breeds (AOB) division.
21. All animals exhibited in the Flock class must be owned by the same exhibitor, be the same breed and registered in that breed's association, and must have been previously shown as an individual in this year's NEMO Fair 4-H & FFA Sheep Show.

Sheep Classes

Any other breeds are not eligible for premium or trophies.
4. Birds must be in full mature plumage (chicks still in down are not eligible).
5. Birds must be from a Pullorum\Typhoid free flock. Current certificate is required. Testing of birds will be done at entry time. Testing must occur prior to caging. No early entries. Birds will be disqualified from entry if caged prior to testing.
6. Eggs must be boxed and tagged with the exhibitor's name. Only 1 dozen eggs (one entry) per person. No premium paid.
7. The exhibitor will be responsible for care of his/her own birds.
8. All reasonable care will be exercised to avoid mistakes, loss, damage or injury but the risk is the exhibitor's.
9. Pre-entry is required on Livestock Entry Form found in back of this book. All items brought must match entry form. If you have changes you must go to the office and register your new item. When entering a pen of 3, remember to enter the pen, 2 females, and the male. Only one entry per breed in each class. Exhibitor must provide their own pen for turkeys, large water fowl, and Guinea.
10. Premiums will be forfeited if birds are removed

prior to 11:00 a.m. Saturday without the Superintendent's approval. Birds sold at the sale on Saturday (Adair County exhibitors only) may not be removed prior to the sale.

1. Please bring all of your rabbits and your copy of your entry form to check in.
2. Please have your remark cards filled out before check-in (unless you need help to do so). Remark cards will be available in the NEMO Fair Office.
3. We will check all of the following at check-in: breed, variety, sex, tattoo, age/class, and health of your rabbit. **Please double check that your rabbits' tattoos are accurate on your**

paperwork before check-in.

4. Please tattoo all your rabbits before check-in.
5. At check-in please let us know if any of your rabbits are unable to show.
6. After you have checked in you may cage your rabbits, or take them home and bring them back the day of the show.

Caging of animals: You may only cage your rabbits after you have finished checking in and have had your rabbits examined for sickness by the Rabbit Superintendent or his/her designated assistants.

RULES

1. ARBA standards will be followed during the judging (the ARBA standards are in the Standard of Perfection).
2. All rabbits must be under the daily care and supervision of the project member by June 1, 2018.
3. All rabbits being shown must have a permanent tattoo for identification in the left ear (preferably 2 or more letters/numbers long). This number is used to ID the rabbit on the entry form.
4. Rabbits with the tattoos listed on your entry form are the only rabbits you may show.
5. Each exhibitor is allowed a limit of 50 entries.
6. All animals must be entered, exhibited, handled and shown by the project member.
7. All exhibited animals must be free from any visible signs of infection or contagious disease or parasites. Exhibitors will be asked to remove any project animal not in good health. Dismissal will be at the discretion of the superintendent or judge.
8. People attending the fair enjoy seeing animals. So, if at all possible, please leave at least some of your rabbits at the fair in the cages until Saturday at 11 a.m. There will be several fans to help keep the rabbits cool. If it gets dangerously hot for the rabbits, the rabbit superintendent will release all the animals early. Please mark under "reserve cage for the week" on the entry form to ensure a cage for your rabbit(s).
9. **Mixed Breeds:** We have a class for mixed breeds in case kids only have a mixed breed, however, only first-year 4-Hers may enter it after 2018 Fair..

Showmanship

1. You may use any purebred rabbit you own for this competition. It must be checked for disease at check in. For instance, a rabbit with known disqualifications (DQs) can be useful in this competition to show off your knowledge of DQs.
2. Once you have won in one age category, you must compete in the next higher category the

next year.

Meat Pen Rules

1. Only one meat pen entry is allowed per exhibitor at the NEMO Fair.
2. Meat pens shall consist of 3 rabbits, all of the same breed and variety (not necessarily from same doe and buck) (can be bucks and/or does.)



3. Clover Kids will have the opportunity to show their pet and speak with a judge regarding nutrition, grooming, or special behaviors. Clover Kids are encouraged to show the pet about which they did their pet poster.
4. All pets must come properly restrained or contained. Appropriate examples include on a leash or in a box, cage, or bowl.
5. An adult must supervise Clover Kids and pets at all times.
6. Animal health requirements must be followed for all species.
7. Any female animal in season cannot be shown.
8. As with all 4-H Clover Kids events, the pet show is non-competitive. Participants will receive a participation ribbon.

General Rules

1. **Each exhibitor shall be required to wear the official 4-H/FFA t-shirt of the Fair and their assigned exhibitor number at the time of all judging events.**
2. Items made by 4-H members should reflect the skills they have learned in their 4-H project during the current program year, the needs and interests of the 4-H'er, and quality workmanship. Use the 4-H project literature and the "Clover" for exhibit ideas and criteria. "4-H is an out-of-school education program. Consequently, articles made in school under the supervision of teachers and on which students receive school credit do not qualify as 4-H project work. This is a duplication of credit for single effort and to a large extent, prevents 4-H from achieving its full objectives."
3. **Exhibits are displayed at the risk of the individual 4-H/FFA member. The 4-H staff, FFA staff, University Extension Council or staff is not responsible for loss or damage to items.**
4. Only Adair County 4-H and FFA exhibitors may advance to the State Fair. Exhibits must be of blue ribbon quality to advance to the State Fair or to receive awards. Members are limited to two exhibits in the State Fair 4-H Building.
5. The number of exhibits per class that Adair County may enter is printed in bracketed numbers in the class listing. Those exhibits from outside Adair County will have had the opportunity for state fair evaluation in the home county of the exhibitor.
6. 4-H members may exhibit only in projects in which they are enrolled in the current 4-H year. **Items exhibited must be made in the current year and must be the work of the 4-H member submitting the exhibit. Scrapbooks made in projects other than class 315 will be displayed in the Library at the State Fair. Notebooks, recipes, binders should not accompany any exhibit.**
7. A member may enter up to three exhibit items per project. Each item must be listed on the Building Voucher entry form to avoid a late entry fee. **Registration Deadline is June 25th.** A late fee of \$1.00 per item will be assessed on all entries postmarked / turned in June 26th - July

5th, 2018. A \$2.00 late fee will be assessed on all entries postmarked/turned in July 6th, 2018 - Fair. Late building exhibitor entries accepted at the NEMO Fair Office until July 16, at 8:00 a.m. and judged last; as opposed to late additions to the building voucher which will be assessed the designated fee but will be judged according to the regular schedule. (See judging schedule).

8. The following items will be accepted/displayed at the Missouri State Fair in the Library which allows fairgoers to touch and examine the items: notebooks (three ring binders only) with county, region and youth name on spine, posters (flat only; do not fasten items to the poster), see additional poster rules in #9, file card systems. These items will be accepted from any project. Youths who exhibit notebooks, posters, or file card systems should understand that their exhibit will be handled.
9. Where the exhibit list states "any item made", the 4-H member may display any item made in that project. This includes notebooks, file cards, photo displays, posters or educational displays. Regardless of project, the following dimensions must be used. Items which do not comply with size or other specifications will not receive a premium or ribbon. Do not attach any items to an exhibit such as notebooks, pictures, etc.

Posters - No larger than 14" X 22", flat only, do not fasten items to the poster, except photos and colored paper.

Photo Display - Full State Fair guidelines and definitions are provided at the following link <http://4h.missouri.edu/go/events/statefair/photoguidelines.pdf>.

- * All photos should be mounted on a 8" x 10" mat board, photographers may mount the photograph to the mat board using an acceptable adhesive designed for permanent mounting of photographs.
- * A color single window mat (sometimes referred to as a frame) is acceptable, but not required.
- * Photos can be mounted either horizontally or vertically with no writing or labels on the mat board.
- * Photo stories must consist of no more than 4 photographs.
- * To protect exhibits from dust and moisture, photos must be placed in a clear photo bag available at the Adair County Extension Center. Do not put in a bag that's folded over, they are difficult to fit in the state fair display.
- * Exhibits not meeting these guidelines will not be judged, displayed, or receive premiums or ribbons.
- * Photo Editing - Photo enhancing is permitted. Photo Altering is not permitted. Please see

full state fair guidelines for definitions and examples of each.

Educational Display - A new product is now available to make educational displays easier to construct. The size is 18 inches in height, 6 inches in depth and 12 inches in width. When it opens and stands it has 6 inch sides and a 12 inch back. Must include three-dimensional items and stand-alone. **(Posters with items taped to them do not qualify as an educational display. Science fair display boards are too large.)**

Entomology or Geology Display Boxes - Box must be exactly no more than 18" long X 24" wide and 3 1/2" deep to fit in display racks at the Missouri State Fair. Plexiglas or plastic covers are preferred. No handles or knobs. Boxes are displayed in upright racks. For MSF, only 1 box per exhibitor will be displayed.

Working Models - These exhibits should show how things actually work (cutaway-sections of motors or computers) or can be used to help people identify parts such as parts of a motor or computer. Many times these exhibits are considered "hands-on" and can be handled by visitors. Working models should require floor space no larger than 14" x 22".

Decorated Cakes - No real cakes. Forms or pans are required. Must only use Royal Icing, Rolled Fondant or Commercial Product (i.e. DAPP) that will harden and preserve the decorated cake. Butter crème icing or tube/gel icing will not be accepted. Cake boards will not exceed 1" margin on each side of cake pan or form. Cakes must not exceed 13" in height or at the base (includes board).

Scrapbooking - Exhibits should be only 1 page 1 side representative of the complete scrapbook.

* No full books.

* Size not to exceed 12" x 12".

* All pages must be in clear protective sleeve or clear zipper bag. Do not frame.

10. Perishable items such as food, vegetables, crops, and home grown items will not be returned after the Missouri State Fair. Edible vegetables will be donated to a charitable organization.
11. The assigned point value must be used unless approved by the 4-H Superintendent.
12. **No early removal or check-out of exhibits is permitted. Exhibits which are removed before release times will not be awarded premium monies and/or ribbons or trophies.**
13. All dresses and similar items to be exhibited on hangers must be entered on hangers.
14. **Shooting Sports exhibits should contain no live ammunition and arrow points should be removed.**
15. If a member is unable to exhibit his/her project,

that member must have requested, in writing, permission from the 4-H & FFA Fair Committee to exhibit in absentia by June 25. Exhibits to be entered must be accompanied by written approval from 4-H & FFA Fair Committee.

16. Large/heavy objects, projects with glass, etc., may not be able to be shipped to the Missouri State Fair. Items too large for display in the 4-H Building will not be accepted for exhibit at the Missouri State Fair, but one photo of the item, no larger than 5 x 7, will be accepted. Photos are not a substitute for bringing or mailing exhibits.
17. **Conference Judging:** All 4-H exhibitors will confer with the judge in that project area while the judge examines the project. Entry and judging will take place simultaneously from 8:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. on Monday, July 16 in the 4-H & FFA Building. Please follow the schedule below. Exhibitors will pick up Vouchers & T-shirts at the NEMO Fair office in the Multi-Purpose building. Enter 4-H building through the North Doors for Judging. Entry is allowed up to 15 minutes prior to a club's scheduled judging time. The building will close at 1:00 p.m. or as soon as judging is completed, and will remain closed until all State Fair items and trophies have been selected and project displays finalized. All exhibits (including State Fair items) will be released Saturday, July 21, between 1-2 pm. State Fair & trophy winners should be ready to have a picture taken on Wednesday before concert (time will be posted in building.). All exhibits need to be picked up by 2 pm. Any item(s) not claimed will be left at the exhibitors risk and will be taken to the NEMO Fair Office. Item(s) will be kept for two weeks and then discarded.
18. Exhibit Tags must be picked up at the NEMO Fair Office when you register and **must be filled out and attached to exhibit prior to entering building on judging day.**
19. **All building awards and trophies are only given to Adair County exhibits.**

All entries must have been grown, produced by the exhibitor as a part of his or her supervised occupational experience program. All samples must have been produced during the year specified for the class. The exhibitor shall be keeping records of such entries in the approved Missouri Farm Business Record Book and reporting such enterprises on the departmental VA-3 (Report of the Students SAE Program) and have on file validating forms with the school's departmental records.

Only exhibits of high quality and purity will be judged as eligible for premiums. Only blue ribbon exhibits can be selected for a trophy or award.

FFA COUNTRY CURED HAMS EXHIBITS

1. Hams in this class must consist of hams that have been cured country style.
2. Ham weights accepted from 10 pounds to 22 pounds, inclusive.
3. Top FFA ham overall (Adair County exhibitors only) will be eligible to sell at the livestock sale.
4. The number of entries shall not exceed 2 per person.
5. Hams in this class will be divided by weight after they are entered into the show by the Superintendent to equalize class size.
6. Commercial hams in this class will consist of whole hams with bone in and may not be cut or sliced. Hams shall be cured mildly and may or may not be tenderized. This class is considered to consist principally of pumped hams.
7. To maximize the member's learning experience, members showing in youth classes are encouraged to do their own project work. The parent and child should decide how much the member is able to do on their own, but having someone else totally do the work for the member is inappropriate.
8. All hams in this class must be USDA inspected either at the origin or at the end of processing.

FFA AGRICULTURAL MECHANICS EXHIBIT




1. Adair County 4-H and FFA members may sell their premium from one of the following categories: market beef, market lamb, market hog, market goat, rabbit meat pen of 3, or poultry meat pen of 4. Exhibitor is required to be present the day of the sale to present their animal in the show ring. **Each exhibitor will submit their intent to sell form with their Fair entries and notify class superintendent the day of the show which species they intend to sell.**
2. Each exhibitor will select which species they intend to sell and will notify the class superintendent of their intentions by using the standardized form. Intent to sell must be submitted on the written form and submitted with their Fair entry. If the exhibitor exhibited animals in more than one species, the exhibitor is to notify the respective superintendent of each species when they will make their final decision as which species to sell. The final determination shall be made within one hour following the goat show.
3. **The sale will begin with the Sale of Champions (top two animals in each species) except meat pens, which will be champion meat pen only. The Sale Committee respectfully requests all sale orders be turned in as quickly as possible due to the short time for sale preparation.**
4. **Animals not in the Sale of Champions will be placed in sale order according to the placing in class by class then order of ribbon-blue, red, white.**
5. **Sale order identification: Swine-ear tag number, Sheep-ear tag number, Beef-ear tag number, Goat-ear tag number.**
6. **Weight limits: Sheep: minimum-80 pounds. Beef: minimum-900 pounds. Animals not within weight limits will sell at the end of the sale order.**
7. **Exhibitors MUST be present for buyer pictures. Failure to be present will mean forfeiture of his/her sale premium check and the sale will be voided. Emergency releases will be made only at the discretion of the Joint Fair Committee.**
