Sermon Sunday May 14, 2023

Acts 17:22-31; Psalm 66:7-18; 1 Peter 3:13-22; John 14:15-21.

Sisters and brothers in Christ,

Have you ever thought of yourself as God's Advocate? Have you ever thought of yourself as the one who gives existence to God's insistence for your own life or the life of another? And what if each one of us started living like that? What might this advocacy look like in your life?

"I will not leave you orphaned." At some point we all want or even need to hear these words. They speak directly to some of our greatest fears and challenges; abandonment and isolation, loneliness, vulnerability. They remind us that we are not destined to walk this earth without an identity or direction. We do not stand alone. To be sure there are seasons of life, moments, when the transitions, changes, and tragedies can leave us feeling as orphans. Whether spoken or unspoken the questions begin. What will I do now? Where do I go? What happens next? Who will love, nurture, and guide me? Who stands on my side? What will become of me? Those are the orphan's questions. Those are the questions I imagine running through the heads and hearts of the disciples into gospel.

Today all mothers should feel that they're valued and appreciated by their families. If you're a mom I hope that will be the case for you. On Mothers' Day it's good to express our love and gratitude to our mother. But do we also express appreciation to our mother during the rest of the year? Our words, or our lack of words, can have powerful consequences. Often the only words we say to our mother are unkind or hurtful words. I've known mothers who soldier on, caring for their children and praying for them each day, only to receive words that wound. Perhaps even more often it's not just cruel words, but indifference and silence. Our mother goes on loving us and supporting us, but we treat her with coldness and hostility. I'm not pretending mothers are perfect, and never make mistakes. But most mothers deserve far more praise and thanks than they receive.

The Bible passage, in Proverbs 31, describes a woman who is a godly wife and mother. It details her noble character, her support for her husband, her vigorous work to provide for her family, her generosity to the poor and needy, her business enterprises, her strength and dignity, her wise counsel and instruction. Quite a description! Let me read the final verses: 'Her children arise and call her blessed; her husband also, and he praises her: Many women do noble things, but a woman who fears the Lord is to be praised. Give her the reward she has earned, and let her works bring her praise at the city gate' (Proverbs 31:28-31).

Let me pray: Heavenly Father, we thank you for designing families. Thanks for the care and devotion of our mothers, despite their imperfections. We are grateful for the many ways your love and goodness has been shown to us through our mother and mother figures. Help each mom and those who have mothering roles today to feel appreciated and loved, and to grow in their relationship with you. We pray you through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen! Happy Mother's Day to all our noble mothers!

It is the last supper. Disciples have been fed, feet have been washed, the betrayer has left. It is night, dark, and Jesus announces he is leaving. The one for whom they left everything now says he is leaving. "We do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" "Show us the father." More orphan questions. We all need an Advocate. We all need to be reminded, especially when the future is uncertain, life has been turned upside down, and we're afraid or overwhelmed. We need to be reminded when we're angry or frustrated. We need to be reminded when we are sad and grieving. We need to be reminded when we're busy, successful, and self-sufficient. We need to be reminded when we're lost and don't know the way. We need to be reminded when we feel like an orphan – alone and lonely, on our own, having to look out and fend for ourselves.

Advocacy always looks like love and affirms life. When your heart breaks for the pain of the world, when you reach out in compassion, when you weep over another's loss you are the Advocate in that moment. When you offer or seek forgiveness, when you refuse to judge, when mercy rather than condemnation is your way, you are God's Advocate. When another encourages and stands beside you, says exactly what you need to hear, or shows up at just the right time you are experiencing God's advocacy. When

someone listens to your life, celebrates your joys, or cries over your losses, the Advocate is with you. When you love or are loved the Advocate is there. When another speaks a truth or offers guidance that helps you change your life she or he is advocating on your behalf. When you speak words of hope, hold another's needs and concerns as important as your own, or pray for another you are their Advocate. Advocates sit at the bedside of another. They care for the sick and dying. They console the bereaved.

This Advocate does not, however, just remind us of what Jesus said, Google can do that. And the Advocate is not some formless, invisible, eternal essence floating high above the earth. It is a life lived in and with the spirit of God. This Advocate insists we give existence to Jesus' words and life in our lives through our thoughts, words, and actions. The Advocate is felt as the rumblings and restlessness of our heart, insisting, calling, luring, and soliciting our response in the concrete conditions of life. The Advocate shows up every time you and I embody God's life and spirit

We fear becoming orphaned. That fear points to the deeper reality that by ourselves we are not enough. It is not, however, because we are deficient. It is rather because we were never intended or created to be self-sufficient. We were never intended to stand alone as individuals. We were created to love and be loved, to live in relationship as persons giving themselves to each other, to dwell, abide, and remain within each other even as the Father is in Jesus and Jesus is in the Father; the antithesis of being orphaned. "I will not leave you orphaned." That is the promise. Regardless of the circumstances of our lives, storms, death, separation, we have never been and will never be orphaned by God. How strange that must have sounded to the disciples. In the same conversation Jesus tells them that he is leaving and coming. Leaving and coming sure sound like opposites. If we are not careful, we will get struck trying to reconcile or figure this out. It is not, however, something to figure out. It is rather a means to see and live in a different away. Leaving and coming. Presence and Absence. These must be held in tension, not as mutually exclusive. That is what Jesus has set before us in today's gospel. That tension confronts us with the question of whether Jesus, for us, is a past memory or a present reality, a sentimental story that makes us feel good or a living experience that challenges, guides, and nurtures our life.

Wherever there is love, there is the Advocate. Wherever there is life and more life, there is the Advocate. Life and love are the advocacy of God. Look around. Look at the concrete conditions of your life, relationships, and world. Look for the places of pain, diminished life, or disconnection. What advocacy is being asked of you? Every time we expand the boundaries of our love, we push back the orphanages of this world creating space within us where the Father and Jesus make their home. **Amen!**
