2019 Vacation Bible School Offering

This year the offering received during Vacation Bible School will go to support the United Church of Christ USA Emergency Fund. This special fund has been set up to help with, as of mid-June, over 20 natural disasters that have been declared across the United States including severe storms, straight-line winds, flooding, landslides and mudslides. Millions of bushels of stored crops have been lost. Where water has receded, people are assessing the damage to their homes and deciding whether to rebuild, demolish or leave.

Congregational Meeting - 7.21.19

Bill Stoudt has been checking and evaluating the boiler, and has determined that it needs more than just tender loving care! Three out of seven sections of it have gone bad and need to be replaced. You might ask, why not repair them? Bill determined that it would actually take more time and money to do that. Even so, the preliminary estimated cost for the project is over \$38,000. In addition, the acidity of the water (which has been verified through multiple tests) has been contributing to the deterioration of the internal parts. Bill highly recommends that a water treatment system, at a cost of almost \$6,000, be installed in order to prevent future corrosion due to acidity. Keeping in mind that there can be unforeseen difficulties, we should be prepared to spend \$50,000 on the project, if necessary.

The high cost of the project is the reason this needs to be brought before the congregation for approval. The congregational meeting is scheduled to be held during the **8:00 am and 10:30 am** worship services on **July 21st**. If you have questions about the work or its costs, please ask Bill Stoudt or a council member prior to the congregational meeting so you are comfortable with your vote. Do try to attend either one of those services so we have enough for a quorum. It is imperative that this project move forward as soon as possible, in order to ensure that we have heat in the church this coming fall and winter!

Six Weeks of Prayer

Pastor's Article

Dear Christian Friends,

Do you ever wonder what God has in store for you, what God would have you do? You may be still in high school, or in your elder years, but God still has a plan for you if you are willing to follow it.

In the book of Acts, the apostle Paul has a clear call to go to Macedonia. Here is how the Bible tells it: *During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us."* (Acts 16: 9) How does Paul respond? The story continues, *"When he [Paul] had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them."* (Acts 16: 10) Paul received the call, then tried to do what God asked Paul to do.

Don't you wish your call were just as simple? God making it abundantly clear what God would like you to do, so that you might respond? Yet many Christians feel it's hard to know just exactly what God wants us to do. We sense this in the church. Does God want us to focus on bringing new people to Christ? Do we have the skills needed for this? Does God want us to focus on doing good deeds for those in need? Do we have the abilities for this? Does God want us to be a church known for its excellent worship, and just what should that worship look like? Does God want us to be known for our outreach into the community? Does God want something else of us? Shall we be a church that cares for children and families, or for older people who have lost family members so that we become their family? What is our calling? How shall we live it out? How do we help others discover the good news of Jesus when they don't come into our doors? How do we go out into the world to demonstrate the love of Jesus through our good deeds? How can we be motivated not to lose heart, when it seems no one cares about what we are offering them? How should we change and how should we stay the same?

How can we know what God wants? The best way to learn God's intention for Huff's Church, and for our members, is to pray earnestly for God's guidance, then to be open to following God's lead. Last month we talked about every church being a church in transition. We cannot sit and wait for people to discover us, but we need to be about finding ways to reach into our hurting world, with good news and practical help. Associate Conference Minister Sharon Morris tells congregations that the first step

is to be a church at prayer, and suggests taking a six week period to pray for discernment about God's will for Huff's Church. Seems like a great idea, especially since we are in our 275th year of celebrating the UCC congregation of Huff's Union Church. If the church had not kept changing with the times, we'd still be holding worship in German, singing hymns from the 1700's, lighting with lanterns, and hand pumping the organ. What has stayed the same is the deep and abiding faith that Jesus matters, and our lives are lived under his guidance, whatever that might mean, and wherever that might inspire us to go to show his love.

Let's take up that challenge to earnestly pray for God's guidance for Huff's future, and let God be the one who shows us where we are needed.

Pennsylvania Southeast Conference News: 2 Local UCC Pastors Honored

UCC Pennsylvania Southeast Conference Disaster Coordinator **Rev. Karl Jones** is National VOAD's Volunteer of the Year. He was presented with that honor recently (May 8) during the association's annual meeting, held May 6-9 in Nashville, Tennessee. National VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster) cited Jones' long-time partnership with people and communities in recovery following disasters, both within and beyond the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Member organizations of National VOAD work to mitigate and alleviate the impact of disasters.

Founded in 1970, the VOAD movement has grown to include more than 100 member organizations. Guided by the core principles of cooperation, communication, coordination, and collaboration, National VOAD works to foster more effective delivery of services to communities affected by disasters.

Here is the text from the award presentation: "The National VOAD's Don Hampton Volunteer of the Year is the volunteer that exhibited outstanding and unique volunteer service within the VOAD movement. Karl Jones, of UCC Disaster Ministries and recent chair of the Pennsylvania VOAD, has been a long time partner of people and communities in recovery following disasters, both within and well beyond the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania." "Karl's leadership and ability to collaborate with partners to creatively leverage resources available has been proven both in helping communities following severe flooding along the Schuylkill and Susquehanna River, and in response to evacuees of Hurricane Maria.

"For Hurricane Maria evacuee response, Karl leveraged HUD funds in partnership with the Philadelphia Housing Authority, identified partners from the Hispanic community for the Greater Philadelphia LTRC* and coordinated VOAD members, business, and all levels of government, to bring relief to evacuees." "In response to heavy rain events in August 2018, Karl liaised between VOAD members and emergency management to assist in the use of Crisis Cleanup for the first time, led efforts to develop and pilot the VALOR program in Pennsylvania, and found ways to mobilize unique resources, such as a donation of a cache of dehumidifiers." "Karl has been key in coordinating services to diverse communities from North Philadelphia, to tiny towns in rural Pennsylvania, with enough hope to

As she accepted the 2019 Life Improvement Ambassador award from Berks Connections/Pretrial Services, the **Rev. Megan Huesgen** encouraged those in the room to take a cue from a bunch of golfers in Kolkata who were frustrated with some nuisance monkeys.

Huesgen, pastor of Immanuel United Church of Christ in Shillington, said that the British built the golf course while colonizing India, but didn't factor in the monkeys, who would drop out of trees, scurry across the course and grab golf balls, only to later drop them wherever. After several unsuccessful attempts to get rid of the pests with fences, distractions and traps, Huesgen said a new ground rule was established: Play the ball where the monkey drops it.

"We each have a ball on this course we call life and there are those moments when the proverbial monkey moves our ball and we have absolutely no desire to play it where it is now placed," she said. "BCPS exemplifies day after day to keep swinging, keep playing the ball." Huesgen was honored last week during the 14th annual BCPS Life Improvement Awards Breakfast at the DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel in Reading. BCPS is a community-based organization that provides services to adult defendants, inmates, returning citizens and their families.

Thomas Rentschler, President of the BCPS board, said Huesgen served as a Board Member from 2016 to 2018 and has been an amazing advocate to help expand the organization's presence, especially in the faith-based community. "Megan promotes the importance of the community's role in providing hope and second chances," Rentschler said.

"Her passion for improving lives inspires others to get involved. Many volunteers and supporters attending this morning were introduced to BCPS by Megan." Huesgen said she's grateful to travel the course with BCPS, emphasizing the agency believes people can change and aren't defined by where their ball is today. New Ministry Leadership Program at Lancaster Theological Seminary

The Ministerial Institute is a three-year non-degree program with classes in a variety of subjects of interest to Christian leaders taught by experienced pastors. Classes are offered on-line September through April and in-person at the seminary for one week each July. Students may sign up for the entire program or take individual classes. Participants in the full program participate in a facilitated covenant peer group and serve a concurrent ministry placement. This is an ecumenical program focused on leadership in the local congregation.

2020 Mission Trip

The Pine Ridge Reservation of the Oglala Lakota people in South Dakota is one of the poorest areas in the United States. They are in desperate need of help and support. The reservation covers 2.8 million acres and is the second-largest Native American Indian Reservation in the US. The population has the second lowest life expectancy in the Western Hemisphere and staggering high rates of diabetes, alcoholism, and suicide.

Re-Member is an independent, registered non-profit organization on the reservation which coordinates the people and the volunteers to do projects on the reservation. This will be a 7-day working vacation. Three days will be spent working on projects such as: building bunk beds, trailer skirting, entry steps/ramps, decks and even outhouses. Another 2 days will be spent learning about the culture, history and spirituality of the Lakota people through travel, discussions and a possible Pow Wow.

Presently, there is a group of 10 people interested in going. Registration is in August of this year and an informational question and answer session will take place on **July 14 after 10:30 worship**. Matthew Haines, a member of our church, will be there to talk and answer questions. He has been volunteering with the Re-Member organization since 2010 and was on the Board of Directors from 2012-2018.

I am very much looking forward to this rewarding experience.

The spring meeting of the PSEC was held at West Chester University in West Chester, PA. It was attended by Pastor Kropa, Rachel Welch and myself.

This year's guest speaker was Mr. Brian McLaren and he talked about his book, *The Spiritual Migration*, which is about the future of the church and what needs to be done to keep it moving in a forward direction.

There was a recognition of Anniversary Churches, Our own church was one of two celebrating 275th and many other celebrating various years. The worship service Friday evening was led by Rev. Cean James and music was provided by a church from the Philadelphia area and had everyone standing on their feet and clapping along.

On Saturday, the regular business meeting was held where Rev. Bill Worley gave the State of the Conference Report. Also Pastor Anniversaries were recognized. There was one pastor there celebrating 70 years. He told the crowd he was turning 100 in October and was going for 125. He was given a standing ovation. This was my first spring meeting and hopefully not my last.

ELCA Meeting Summary - Submitted by Jane Arndt

On June 1, 2019, Pastor Kropa, Rachel Woodhead, and I attended the Northeastern Pennsylvania Lutheran Synod's annual conference. There was an uplifting service where we were all reminded to not dwell on how we got to where we are in our lives, but to dwell on Who is leading us throughout our lives. The larger message is "God's Word – Our Hands".

The several of the many ways in which our hands are used by the ELCA is in providing disaster relief where needed and providing transitional living quarters for abused women and newly released people from prison. Our Church provides a safe place where people can become stronger through classes which prepare them for a new life and by the kind and nurturing people who care for them. The ELCA also, has a strong ministry of caring and providing throughout the world.

A few of the most important messages the ELCA was expressing is for us to look to the National Lutheran Church that exists beyond the four walls of Huffs Union Church, carry God's message out into society to help foster credibility of our larger Church and lastly, to remain faithful to the Gospel, in a world that is desperate for this message.
