BIG NEWS!

If you haven't noticed, our Christian Education Director, Ashley, along with her husband Geoff, are expecting a baby girl this coming November! Before that is possible, Ashley will be absent from church for maternity leave. Wednesday 9:00 am—1:00 pm. A Blood Pressure Clinic will be held

during this time as well.

What is a Parish Nurse? Well, a Parish Nurse is a licensed registered nurse who has the same basic duties and responsibilities of a registered nurse the only difference is the Parish Nurse mostly provides for patients within a faith community. Most Parish Nurses follow the same practice as Holistic Nurses whereby balancing body, spirit and mind health to achieve overall wellness.

So what does a Parish Nurse do: well, a Parish Nurse seeks to foster physical, emotional, spiritual and social harmony leading to a healthy and healing relationship with God, family and faith community.

So let us look at the role of a Parish Nurse:

H: Health Advisor

E: Educator on Health Issues

A: Advocate/Resource Person

L: Liaison to Faith & Community Resources

T: Teacher of Volunteers, Staff and Faith Community Members

H: Healer of Body, Mind, Spirit and Community

The Parish Nurse is accountable to the Pastor, congregation and the Session, through the Administration and Personnel Committee.

Please call me and let me be available to help you so to convey the healing presence of Christ through words, deeds and prayers.

I plan to offer an issue every month to provide educational materials for your convenience.

OCTOBER IS BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH:

What You Need to Know

Cancer is a disease in which cells in the body grow out of control. When cancer starts in the breast, it is called breast cancer. Except for skin cancer, breast cancer is the most common cancer in American women.

Breast cancer screening means checking a woman's breasts for cancer before she has any symptoms. A mammogram is an X-ray picture of the breast. Mammograms are the best way to find breast cancer early, when it is easier to treat and before it is big enough to feel or cause symptoms.

Most women who are 50 to 74 years old should have a screening mammogram every two years. If you are 40 to 49 years old, or think you may have a higher risk of breast cancer, ask your doctor when to have a screening mammogram.

Some things may increase your risk

The main factors that influence your breast cancer risk are being a woman and getting older. Other risk factors include-

- * Changes in breast cancer-related genes (BRCA1 or BRCA2).
- * Having your first menstrual period before age 12.
- * Never giving birth, or being older when your first child is born.
- * Starting menopause after age 55.
- * Taking hormones to replace missing estrogen and progesterone in menopause for more than five years.
- * Taking oral contraceptives (birth control pills).
- * A personal history of breast cancer, dense breasts, or some other breast problems.
- * A family history of breast cancer (parent, sibling, or child).
- * Getting radiation therapy to the breast or chest.
- * Being overweight, especially after menopause.

Symptoms

Some warning signs of breast cancer are—

- * New lump in the breast or underarm (armpit).
- * Thickening or swelling of part of the breast.
- * Irritation or dimpling of breast skin.
- * Redness or flaky skin in the nipple area or the breast.
- * Pulling in of the nipple or pain in the nipple area.
- * Nipple discharge other than breast milk, including blood.
- * Any change in the size or the shape of the breast.
- * Pain in the breast.

Other conditions can cause these symptoms. If you have any warning signs that worry you, call your doctor right away.

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PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE

PNC at Work

Since the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) was elected at the Special Congregational Meeting on September 10th, the committee has met twice and plans to meet at least weekly on Monday evenings to review Personal Information Forms (PIF's) from candidates that have been referred to the committee thru the denominations computer matching system that matches the information provided in our churches Ministry Information Form (MIF) with the information in a candidates PIF. Thus far we have reviewed and evaluated a list of 23 candidates that were referred from the matching system and have requested that an additional group of 25 be sent forward for review and evaluation. From that group of 50 candidates we hope to conduct further evaluation of those identified for further consideration, and then proceed to schedule interviews with those highest ranked candidates that are interested in an interview with us. In the meantime we will continue to accept referred PIF's until we believe that we have identified the candidate(s) that would best fit the needs of our church and a candidate wishing to become our next pastor.

While we attempt to move efficiently and swiftly through this process, we continue to seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit as we understand that He will eventually lead us to the person He is leading toward us. We ask that you keep the PNC in your prayers as we continue to work.


The gallery opens at 9:00 a.m. sharp Saturday and will offer treats in the Parlor Coffee House featuring caramel rolls by the Westminster Chimes in the morning and the Church Ladies' Apple Crisp in the afternoon. 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CHILD CARE CENTER VISION SCREENING

Twice each year, usually in the spring and again in the fall, members from the Lions Club come to the FPCCC and provide vision screenings. The parents have been very receptive to these screenings, with approximately 50% participation each visit. During the two years that we've offered the service, three referrals have been made. It has been such a wonderful experience partnering with the Lions Club to offer this important service to the children in our care.

Reaching out to communities to save sight

Eighty percent of all visual impairment can be prevented or cured. The first step to prevention is awareness. The second is early detection through vision screening. Around the world, Lions partner with medical professionals and community leaders to screen young children, primary school students, and adults to identify those at risk for vision loss. The venue for Lions' vision screenings varies from schools, to workplaces, to community health fairs, and the screening methods depend upon the age group. But the results are always the same. Early identification leads to timely referral, professional treatment, and improved or restored sight.

CLERK'S REPORT

Session approved the request from Cleo and Vern Kersey for removal from the membership roll. A thank you letter was read from Boy Scout Troop 6, expressing appreciation for the generous contributions to the trailer wrap fundraiser. Presbytery of Northern Plains will meet Oct. 6-7 in Hallock, MN. Jim Skaret will attend as a Commissioner from our church.

The deaths of Elizabeth Brostrom and Diana Cofell were noted; membership is 502.

The Clerk attended a Sessions Records meeting in Jamestown. The Register and Session minutes were approved with no exceptions.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Session will continue to begin meetings at 6:00 pm.

Session approved a special Session meeting on Saturday, November 18 to discuss "What's Next" – part of the Designated Pastor Call and Covenant.

Pastor Reiter is working with Administrative and Personnel Committee to determine a completion date for his ministry. He will be away October 9-18 and October 30-Nov. 3.

COMMITTEE REPORTS (from meeting and committee minutes)

Administrative and Personnel—Review of the membership roll should be completed by December. The committee recommended a 2% increase in staff salaries for 2018. The CE Interns will remain at \$12.00 per hour.

Session approved the facility application for use of Ramstad Hall and the kitchen for Thanksgiving Day Meal sponsored by Ministry on the Margins with assistance from the Outreach Committee.

Business and Finance—Dan Mayer reviewed the investment portfolio with the committee. Total value is \$1,681,000. 37% of the portfolio is fixed income with a return of 4.2%; 63% is invested in equities with a return of 13.9%. The committee will decide the funding source for the sidewalk repair after billing by the city.

Christian Education—The 3 Interns will divide the hours with funding coming from the Richter-Chapman Memorial Fund. As of Sept. 11, \$122 has been donated for the church plates. Committee members will be prayer partners for the children of the church. The committee

approved using up to \$2000 for the PresbyTeen Badlands Retreat Oct. 21-22. During Ashley's maternity leave, Jan Gilchrist, Jody Bachmeier, the Interns and others will have some of Ashley's duties.

Membership—Dinners for Eight sign up is on the volunteer board. Jerry Wilson is organizing the bridge players. The committee is sponsoring a table of 7 for the Bridging Cultures: Building Connections Cultural Competency Seminar.

Session approved the committee request to partner with Ministry on the Margins to help plan and seek outside funding for the Thanksgiving dinner. Volunteers will be asked to sew Love Bears to give at the dinner.

Stewardship—Visiting stewards will have training September 28 at 7:00pm.

Property and Equipment—Matt Engel will check with Lindtech to see if the temperature can be more consistent during the daytime and nighttime hours. Concrete work is being completed by the west doors. Stained glass from the original church building has been donated by the Taylor family and Sue Sorlie will find ways to display them.

Worship and Music—Organ and pianos will be tuned this fall. Once Jan Candee leaves for the winter months, the church will need a substitute organist/pianist.

Nominating—One elder and one deacon are needed to complete the nominees for 2018.

Board of Deacons—New chair/co-chairs will be needed for 2018.
