Holy Name Society: Meets on the Monday evening after the second Sunday of the month. President, Dan Panik



OUR GOD, SO UNLIKE HUMANS

There's a word in my language called Maduabuchukwu. It means that we human beings are nothing like God. This is good news but might seem



like bad news to us in some situations. Scripturally, there are lots of passages that address this good news. In today's first reading God states categorically "My thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways My ways" (Isaiah 55:6-9). That's from Old Testament time, from the Prophet Isaiah, centuries before Christ. All through His ministry Jesus' actions exemplified this truth. To place even more emphasis on it, and to really drive it into our thick minds and

mindsets, Jesus came up with the parable of the workers in the vineyard (Matthew 20:1-16). It's a very beautiful and challenging story for everyone involved.

Let me just highlight one of such challenges for many of us. "But that's not fair" is a phrase we have heard and used many times. Sadly, we take it to heart so much so that it beclouds our Christian reasoning, judgment and values, the same way it beclouded those of the workers hired earlier in the day. Like them, we get all emotional and hyped up, and rather than counting our good fortune, we count and recount our misfortunes, some of which exist only in our distorted imagination.

We sense unfair treatment when we have done something and conclude that we deserve a certain reward or payment and don't get it. We even feel unfairly treated if we feel we put in more effort than others but got the same reward. It's mostly about entitlement. That's sooo human and sooo unlike God! Good news or bad news - depends on who's involved. If I am the last worker, it will definitely be great news for me, but if I'm one of the earlier workers, it will most probably be sad news for me. Fortunately, God is smarter than all of us put together; and more generous, and more compassionate, and more extravagant, and fairer, than the most loving parents. His grace and blessings are not and will never be on the basis of merit! When, and if that ever happens, we're all doomed, from the workers that labored from the first hour to those that labored just for the last second.

Fortunately, Maduabuchukwu. His thoughts are not our thoughts, nor are ours ways His ways. What's actually fair is that we rejoice and be happy with everyone, no matter when they were hired and whether they merit the pay or reward or not.

VINCENT DE PAUL PRIEST (1580?-1660)

SEPTEMBER 27TH



The deathbed confession of a servant opened Vincent's eyes to the crying spiritual needs of the peasantry of France. This seems to have been a crucial moment in the life of the man from a small farm in Gascony, France, who had become a priest with little more ambition than to have a comfortable life.

It was the Countess de Gondi (whose servant he had helped) who persuaded her husband to endow and support a group of able and zealous missionaries who would work among the poor, the vassals and tenants and the country people in general. Vincent was too humble to accept leadership at first, but after working for some time in Paris among imprisoned gallery slaves, he returned to lead what is now known as the Congregation of the Mission, or the Vincentians. These priests, with vows of poverty, chastity, obedience, and stability, were to devote themselves entirely to the people in smaller towns and villages.

Later Vincent established confraternities of charity for the spiritual and physical relief of the poor and sick of each parish. From these, with the help of Saint Louise de Marillac, came the Daughters of Charity, "whose convent is the sickroom, whose chapel is the parish church, whose cloister is the streets of the city." He organized the rich women of Paris to collect funds for his missionary projects, founded several hospitals, collected relief funds for the victims of war and ransomed over twelve hundred gallery slaves from North Africa. He was zealous in conducting retreats for clergy at a time when there was great laxity, abuse and ignorance among them. He was a pioneer in clerical training and was instrumental in establishing seminaries.

Most remarkably, Vincent was by temperament a very irascible person even his friends admitted it. He said that except for the grace of God he would have been "hard and repulsive, rough and cross." But he became a tender and affectionate man, very sensitive to the needs of others.

Pope Leo XIII made him the patron of all charitable societies. Outstanding among these, of course, is the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul, founded in 1833 by his admirer, Blessed Frederic Ozanam.

COMMENT: The church is for all God's children, rich and poor, peasants and scholars, the sophisticated and the simple. But obviously the greatest concern of the church must be for those who need the most help - those made helpless by sickness, poverty, ignorance or cruelty. Vincent de Paul is a particularly appropriate patron for all Christians today, when hunger has become starvation, and the high living of the rich stands in more and more glaring contrast to the physical and moral degradation in which God's children are forced to live.

QUOTE: "Strive to live content in the midst of those things that cause your discontent. Free your mind from all that troubles you, God will take care of things. You will be unable to make haste in this [choice] without, so to speak, grieving the heart of God, because He sees that you do not honor Him sufficiently with holy trust. Trust in Him, I beg you, and you will have the fulfillment of what your heart desires." (Saint Vincent de Paul, *Letters*).
