

Bronze Sculpture of 'America's First War Dog' to be Housed at the AKC Museum of the Dog

The American Kennel Club Museum of the Dog is pleased to announce that the official bronze statue of Sgt. Stubby, a distinguished World War I war dog will be housed permanently at the AKC Museum of the Dog. The sculpture will be unveiled on May 23, 2019.

The statue, "Stubby Salutes," created by renowned sculptor Susan Bahary, is a life sized bronze of the bull terrier mix. Stubby is widely regarded as the U.S Army's first service dog. His service began in 1917 when he wandered on to the camp of the 102nd Infantry Regiment of the 26th Yankee Division at Yale. He formed a bond with a young solider named Robert Conroy who named him "Stubby." Conroy subsequently smuggled Stubby on his ship when it was time to ship out. Stubby served in France for 18 months and a total of 17 battles. His heroic feats included: warning his unit of looming mustard gas attacks, locating wounded soldiers on the battlefield and sitting beside them until help arrived, and capturing a German spy by grabbing at the seat of his pants. Over the course of his service, he was injured by mustard gas and a grenade. Stubby is remembered for his bravery and also as a treasured mascot who brought joy to embattled soldiers. As a veteran, he was awarded a medal for his bravery by General John J. Pershing and met three presidents.

This April marked the 100th anniversary of Stubby's return to the US to a hero's welcome.

"We are very excited to welcome "Stubby Salutes" to our Museum collection," said Alan Fausel, Executive Director of the AKC Museum of the Dog. "His courage and dedication to our country has laid the foundation for today's military working dogs and we look forward to sharing him with the public and educating them about his place in history."

Susan Bahary, an internationally acclaimed artist, was commissioned by the descendants of Robert Conroy to memorialize Stubby in his rare salute pose, a pose which won him the favor of his fellow soldiers and officers. Her other works include "Always Faithful," the United States first official war dog monument that commemorated the 25 dogs who perished in the taking of Guam during World War II. "Always Faithful" is a part of the Museum of the Dog's collection.

"It has been an honor to create this bronze monument to commemorate Sgt. Stubby," says Bahary. "His right paw represents his deeds for our country and his left paw represents his friendly and giving nature. His contributions to our military, along with his loyalty and bravery are symbolic of all the wonderful working dogs that protect us and service animals that benefit and enrich our lives today."

The AKC Museum of the Dog, founded in 1982, was originally housed in The New York Life Building located at 51 Madison Avenue as part of the AKC Headquarters. In 1987, the Museum was moved to West St. Louis County, MO. The Museum made its return to New York City in a new location in February 2019 and houses one of the largest repositories of canine art in the world, including paintings, porcelains, bronzes, trophies and digital displays. The Museum is dedicated to education and preservation of purebred dogs.

The original casting of the sculpture is on permanent display at the "Connecticut Trees of Honor" Memorial at the Veterans Memorial Park In Middletown, CT.

Again, unfortunately I Lead In with a sad note. Bob Hetherington recently lost his long battle with cancer. Our condolences to Jean and the family.





AKC REUNITE SHARES DISASTER PREPAREDNESS TIPS

Raleigh, NC – With Hurricane Dorian bearing down on the east coast, AKC Reunite, the largest non-profit pet identification and recovery service provider in the United States, is concerned for pets and their owners in the forecast path of the storm.

Local first responders should have shelter plans to accommodate families and pets. The AKC Pet Disaster Relief program has donated disaster shelter equipment to emergency management agencies to ensure pets have a safe place to go. There are 76 AKC Pet Disaster Relief trailers around the country, including in the states in the path of this storm.

AKC Reunite shares the following tips to help keep pets safe when disaster strikes.

- Emergency Supplies. Create an easily portable and waterproof tote with emergency supplies and provisions that can be easily accessed if evacuation is necessary. Remember to fill waterproof containers with a week's supply of food, medications, and drinking water. Also include a backup leash, collar, and ID tag, as well as food and water bowls.
- Organize Information. Make sure all necessary is information written down and ready to go in case of an emergency. Have a recent photo of the pet and owner together, a description of the pet, as well as an any proof of ownership, veterinarian contact information and medical and/or insurance records and feeding schedule information.
- Microchip. AKC Reunite recommends permanent identification by a microchip, along
 with enrollment in a pet recovery service. This can help reunite owners with their pets in
 the case he/she is displaced during a natural disaster. If your pet is already
 microchipped, be sure that the information associated with it is up to date. Visit
 http://www.akcreunite.org/ to learn more about microchips and AKC Reunite's pet
 recovery service.
- Take Action. Remember, the safest place for pets is with their owners. Be prepared to
 take action during an evacuation by having a sturdy, safe, comfortable crate or carrier
 ready for transporting. Always ensure pets are wearing collars with securely fastened,
 up-to-date information.

 Evacuate. Never leave a pet behind. Most evacuations last only a few days, but sometimes it is not possible to return home quickly. Call hotels and/or shelters ahead to confirm pets are welcome. Download a <u>Pet Emergency Planning Guide here.</u>

PAMLICO COUNTY AKC PET DISASTER RELIEF TRAILER DEPLOYED IN WAKE OF HURRICANE DORIAN



With Hurricane Dorian bearing down on the east coast, expected to impact areas of Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, and North Carolina, the Pamlico County **AKC Pet Disaster Relief trailer** was deployed to assist with animal sheltering efforts. The trailer is deploying today, September 4th at **Pamlico County Community College** located at *5049 NC-306, Grantsboro, NC 28529*. The shelter will open to the public September 4th at 8pm ET. Neighboring Craven County is directing its residents that need emergency sheltering with their pets to this location, as well.

The trailer houses supplies that create a safe, temporary home-base for at least 65 pets immediately after a disaster is declared. Materials can be used at co-location shelters where people evacuate with their pets, or at stand-alone emergency animal shelters for displaced animals. The trailer is equipped with AKC Reunite microchips and AKC Reunite universal microchip scanners, as well as bowls, collars, and leashes, among other essential supplies

The trailer was purchased by more than \$22,000 in donations and grants from local and national dog organizations and AKC Reunite, the nation's largest non-profit identification and recovery service.

Peak Lab Rescue in North Carolina is continuing its mission to provide support and supplies to North Carolina shelters in need. AKC Reunite has made a \$5,000 donation to provide them with funding to help clear shelters in Dorian's path and provide emergency pet sheltering along with their other pet-related disaster response efforts.

News for our Obedience Judges & Clubs

The AKC Board of Directors approved four ways to improve the time it takes to complete obedience trials to reduce the extended days for clubs, judges and exhibitors. The obedience Brace class eligibility has also been changed. This information is also available on the Obedience News & Updates page.

EFFECTIVE SEPTEMBER 4, 2019 Must be compliant no later than JANUARY 1, 2020

Items 1-4 are effective for all trials held on or after 9/4/19. However, if clubs are using software that requires programming changes to meet these requirements, all clubs have an extension to complete the necessary changes. All clubs must be compliant with changes #1-4, for all obedience trials held on or after **JANUARY 1, 2020.**

1. <u>Judging Programs/Scheduling Judges</u> – Obedience Regulations, Chapter 1, Sections 3 & 26 – The Regular and Preferred Open classes and the Regular and Preferred Utility classes require the same ring set-up. Clubs currently have the option to schedule dogs by their jump height in ascending or descending order. The Regulation change will require dogs to be scheduled by jump height in either ascending or descending order and will require the Regular Open and Preferred Open classes to be combined for judging. It will also require the Regular Utility and Preferred Utility classes to be combined for judging. This will establish one set-up for Open and one set-up for Utility, reducing the time it takes to judge the classes and to keep the trial moving along smoothly.

There is a new "Awards Placement Sheet" on the AKC Downloadable Forms page on the website to attach as the last page in the Judges' **Book** that will replace the placement boxes on the bottom of the forms. This placement sheet is to be used with all current stock of Judges' Books until those forms are gone. Follow the directions on the form. Once your current stock of Judges' Books are gone, please use the newest template available on the AKC website which can be found under the downloadable forms page.

- 2. **Judge's Ring Assignments** Obedience Regulations, Chapter 1, Section <u>26</u> – the judging program establishes the classes that will be run in a ring throughout the day. Sometimes when a judge arrives at their scheduled ring the classes in the ring from an earlier assignment may be running behind schedule causing the judge to wait to begin their assignment. However, there may be other rings available that meet the same ring requirements, where the class could move to in order to begin the judging on time. The Regulation change will allow the judge's assignment to be moved to another ring, if one is available and it meets the original ring's requirements.
- 3. **Combining Walkthroughs** Obedience Regulations, Chapter 1, Section <u>26</u> – The Regulations require a walkthrough for several classes at the beginning of the class. However, some classes have the same set-up structure and by having the walkthrough at the beginning of each class can be redundant and add time to the day. Combining the walkthroughs for the classes that have the same structure will provide a savings of time throughout the day. The Regulation change will require walkthroughs to be combined if the same judge is judging classes with the same set-up structure when there are less than 20 combined dogs entered; and the same start time

will be published for both classes.

4. Load Balancing Entries – Obedience Regulations, Chapter 1, Section 28 – At closing often times the entries for judges on the panel are unbalanced with one judge having more dogs than another. Requests have often been made to balance the load of entries amongst the judges on the panel, or to reduce the number of judges, to have the trial run more efficiently and to facilitate a smooth-running trial. The Regulation change will allow clubs to load balance the entries after closing with 1) the approval of the judge, outlining any fees that may be required, and 2) the approval of AKC prior to publishing the judging program.

EFFECTIVE SEPTEMBER 4, 2019 For all trials held on or after 9/4/19

1. Obedience Brace Class Eligibility – Obedience Regulations, Chapter 20, <u>Section 5</u> - The requirement to have two dogs of the same breed for the Obedience Brace class has been removed. The Regulation change will allow two dogs of any breed, including dogs listed with AKC Canine Partners, that are of similar height at the withers to be entered in the Brace class.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Date: June 11, 2019

Communicating the AKC mission to the public is one of our most important goals as an organization. Our leadership and staff are dedicated to sharing our message about purebred dogs, the work and expertise of the AKC, and responsible dog ownership as broadly as possible on a daily basis.

Last year, the Communications department generated 22,937 dips and mentions, appraised at approximately \$20 billion in media value by our independent monitoring service. In the last 10 years, the total audience of people who have read or heard about AKC in the media has grown from an average of 1.3 billion per year to an average of 17 billion per year. We distribute press releases, media alerts and content on national, state and local levels. Targets range from national publications like ABC, CBS and the New York Times, to local publications that promote AKC Sports and Events.

Our key messaging includes:

- -The work of the AKC and how it benefits all dogs
- -Value of the pure bred dog and registration
- -The importance of breeders and choice of petacquisition
- -Promoting the sport and its value to dog owners
- -The benefit of AKC's expertise to dog owners
- -Responsible dog ownership

In 2018, the Communications department secured placements in key publications including NBC News, USA Today, The Associated Press, Reuters, Fox News, People Magazine and hundreds more. Through expert interviews and TV segments, the AKC is consistently positioned in the media as an expert voice with credibility and authority. Additionally, the department ended 2018 and began 2019 by mounting an aggressive campaign to announce the AKC Museum of the Dog's return to New York City, which resulted in more than 1500 articles and videos internationally in 14 languages.

Other efforts include:

- Executing impactful PR campaigns around the AKC National Championship, AKC Meet the Breeds, Responsible Dog Ownership Days, AKC's Most Popular Breeds announcement and many others
- Distribution of over 110 press releases and media alerts (on a verage per year)
- Creating 52 weekly articles for syndication to over 600 newspapers
- Create a weekly newsletter "AKC Communicates" that goes to 86,000 people
- Developing PSAs for the 501 (c) 3s that airin major markets
- Managing media relations for AKC Museum of the Dogand AKC Reunite
- Building content with AKC's Chief Veterinary Officer for distribution on akc.org and on social media, while increasing AKC's presence at weterinary conferences and schools.

The AKC marketing department's purpose is to bring the mission of the AKC to consumers in ways that engage, connect and spuraction. Specifically, marketing focuses efforts on three primary goals:

- 1. Increasing owners hip and registration of pure bred dogs
- 2. Increasing a wareness of and participation in AKCs ports and events
- 3. Improving dog lover's perception of the AKC (which will in turn help achieve goals 1 and 2)

We use **multiple tools** to achieve the above goals.

AKC.org

The AKC website received a significant overhaul and relaunched in March of 2018 which can be a major disruption. However, 2018 dosed on a high note with AKC.org December traffic +10% versus 2017 and the site now has an aggregate of 8 million users per month. Other important measures like organic traffic also improved to record-setting levels. (Organic traffic measures the number of sessions generated by people who find our website after using a search engine like Google or Bing and is an important indicator of overall health of a website).

Our content team is focused on optimizing existing and creating new content that aligns with key audiences in our constituency, including puppy seekers, breeders, dog sports enthusiasts, and dog lovers. The team is collaborating with subject matter experts from a cross AKC to produce helpful and inspiring pieces that showcase our mission.

Marketplace.AKC.org

AKC Marketplace traffic has been fairly steady at about 2.5 million sessions and 1.6 million users per month. Breeder opt-in continues to rise, now at over 22%. Litter listings are also growing -every month in 2018 beat the same month in 2017 and total litters listed in 2018 were +26% vs 2017. The marketing department continues to innovate features to ensure breeders (and puppy seekers) continue to have the best experience using the site.

Email Marketing

In 2018, AKC marketing sent 137.6 million emails across 1,018 campaigns which was +10% over 2017. A good portion of this increase was in support of critical new developments like the AKC Museum of the Dog and AKC.TV. The department continued to support important initiatives such as multi-sport event promotion, Parent Gub membership drives and AKC National Championship.

Social Media

Our social media presence continues to grow even as the overall usage of some platforms is plateauing. AKC Facebook began 2018 with 3.81 million followers and ended 2018 with a total of 3.91M followers. This represents a 2.6% increase year over year. AKC Instagramended 2018 with a total of 272K followers, which is up 4.2%.

In 2019, our social media strategy continues to expand, emphasizing creation of compelling, shareable videos, deeper coverage of sports and events, and daily engagement with our fans and followers. Our 2019 year-to-date engagement across platforms has increased year over year by 30%, and we still have more innovative social media programming yet to roll out this year.

Other highlights

In Q3 of 2018, marketing piloted a brand-new program called *Pups & Pints* as a grass roots effort to educate millennials about purebred dogs, responsible dog ownership, and the AKC. Over 550 of our target consumers engaged with 27 different breeds and learned from 25 breeders/dub members in a new and unexpected way, all while generating a donation of almost \$10,000 for AKC Humane Fund. The real win though is the amplification of the event across social. On Facebook well above 400k consumers read about the events and learned more about AKC.

The Marketing and Communications departments and other teams at AKC are committed to furthering the mission of the AKC through ongoing efforts and outreach to many different audiences. As we continue to expand our reach to dog lovers everywhere, we are successfully communicating the value and important work of the AKC on a greaters cale than ever before. We are feeling the impact of this work in many ways, including increased brand awareness, stronger presence in the media, an enhanced corporate reputation and measurable public understanding of how AKC serves dog lovers everywhere.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE RULES APPLYING TO DOG SHOWS

CHAPTER 7, Section 12 – Judges

The AKC Board has endorsed the following amendment to **CHAPTER 7, Section 12,** of the *Rules Applying to Dog Shows*, based on a proposal by the AKC Board and endorsed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee. This will be voted on at the September 10, 2019 Delegates Meeting.

CHAPTER 7

SECTION 12. Any club or association that holds a dog show must prepare, after the entries have closed and not before, a judging program showing the time scheduled for the judging of each breed and each variety for which entries have been accepted. If a substitute or additional judge has been approved Chapter 7, Section 8 or Chapter 7, Section 13, as appropriate, will be quoted listing the changes. The judging program shall indicate the number of dogs entered and state the time for the start of group judging, if any. The program shall be based on the judging of about 25 dogs per hour by each judge. Each judge's breed and variety assignments shall be divided into periods of about one hour, except in those cases where the entry in a breed or variety exceeds 30. The final segment of a ring schedule may be expanded but may not exceed 50 dogs unless the entry is in a single breed or variety. The total number of dogs assigned each judge will be indicated. The remainder of the section is unchanged.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE RULES APPLYING TO DOG SHOWS

CHAPTER 14, Section 2 – Measuring, Weighing and Color Determinations when Factors of Disqualification in Breed Standards or Eligibility Under Conditions of a Class or Division of a Class Cancellations of Awards

The AKC Board has endorsed the following amendment to **CHAPTER 14, Section 2,** of the *Rules Applying to Dog Shows*, based on a proposal by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee. This will be voted on at the September 10, 2019 Delegates Meeting.

CHAPTER 14

SECTION 2. Any club or association <u>holding</u> a dog show must provide armbands displaying the catalog number of the dog being exhibited <u>which must be worn by each exhibitor while</u> in the ring. <u>No exhibitor in the ring may display any identification of the person or the dog. Identification includes the name of the breeder, owner, kennel name or past awards the dog has won. Lapel pins denoting membership in local, national or charitable organizations are permitted.</u>

The AKC Board has endorsed the following

amendment to **CHAPTER 14, Section 9,** of the *Rules Applying to Dog Shows*, based on a proposal by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee. This will be voted on at the September 10, 2019 Delegates Meeting.

CHAPTER 14

SECTION 9. If an award in any class is canceled, <u>including non-regular classes</u>, <u>groups</u> and Best in Show, the dog(s) judged next in order of merit in all placements of that class shall be moved up. The award(s) to the dog(s) moved up shall be counted the same as if it had been the original award. If there is no dog of record to move up, the award shall be void.

Letters concerning judges and provisional judges should be addressed to the Judging Operations Department at PO Box 900062, Raleigh, NC 27675-9062. Letters concerning Agility, Obedience, Rally, Tracking, and VST applicants should be addressed to the Companion Events Department in North Carolina.

The American Kennel Club will, at the request of a judge or judge applicant, provide that individual with copies of letters received regarding their judging qualifications. As a result, it should be understood that any such correspondence will be made available, upon request, to the judge or judge applicant.

AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB, INC. DELEGATES MEETING JUNE 11, 2019

Mr. Sprung, President in the Chair, called the meeting to order at 10:02 a.m.

Mr. Sprung reminded the Delegates in attendance to sign in at the computer stations outside the meeting room.

The Chair introduced the persons seated with him on the dais: William J. Feeney, Chairman; Patricia M. Cruz, Vice Chair; Joan Corbisiero, Professional Registered Parliamentarian; Gina DiNardo, Executive Secretary; Todd DeSimone, the Court Reporter.

Mr. Sprung reported the passing of Louis Auslander on May 6, 2019. Lou was a Miniature Schnauzer and Whippet breeder. In 1969, he became a Judge. He held various officer roles with the International Kennel Club of Chicago, including being Delegate from 1982 to 2009. An advocate for benched shows, Auslander believed in this opportunity to educate the public about dogs. Mr. Auslander joined the AKC Board in 1983. He

was Chairman from 1987 to 1992 and also was President in 1991 and 1992, the only person to ever hold both positions.

The Chair offered condolences for the passing of Dr. Robert Smith on May 25, 2019. Bob was the Delegate for the Huntington Kennel Club from 1996 to 2002, then for the Memphis Kennel Club from 2008 to 2013 and most recently the Virginia Kennel Club since 2018. He was a breeder of American Foxhounds and Welsh Terriers, and he won several Owner-Handler Best in Shows. He was actively involved with local clubs across the country, as well as the American Foxhound Club, the Welsh Terrier Club of America and the American Brussels Griffon Association. Dr. Smith was an All-Breed judge since 1969, he served two terms on your Board of Directors from 1997 to 2002 and 2009 to 2013.

Mr. Sprung delivered the President's report in which he called upon Brandi Hunter, our Vice President of Public Relations and Communications, and Melissa Olund, Director of Digital Marketing, to share firsthand information with you on the Chairman's message.

expertise. They want a quote from our chief veterinary officer. They are citing the breed if they are talking about particular breeds and stories. So, they are still using our information in the stories. This, please don't try and read it, it is not going to be beneficial to try and read it, but this is what I look at and our team looks at on a regular basis. This is what for Q1 of 2019 our sentiment looked like. We are a little higher in our positivity and our neutrality. Our negativity is very low. That red line you see across the bottom means that we are not being targeted, we are not being written about in a negative space, we are not being accused of anything, so we are not seeing a high volume of media talking negatively about the AKC at all. This is another view of sentiment. As you can see, the bulk of our stories are specifically about the AKC and then we have our most popular announcement which gives us a lot of traffic. The Museum of the Dog which has done really well this year and we are happy to have that back, Canine Health Foundation, government relations, compliance, and other topics make up the remainder, but for the most part people are writing about the AKC. That's where most of our clips are coming from specifically. Here are some high-level numbers for some events. As you know, we hold three major ones, well, two major ones really and that's a major announcement for us. So, our numbers are really high. Over 3 billion impressions for national championship, our

media value is high, our clip volumes are high. By contrast, if you look at the average nonprofit or not for profit, they are mentioned about 31 times per day nationally in a high news cycle. We average about 63 at this point. So, we are doing well above the curve. We are doing it in a positive manner and we are getting our information out there and our expertise out there to the proper audiences. Here are some of the places we are being seen. This is just in about the past 90 days as a matter of fact. New York Times, CNN are really high level, but we also do a lot of local and regional press as well, specifically around shows, legislation, we help GR out a lot to ensure that our message is reaching down and we are going down the funnel. So, if you are not consuming these at a high level but you are consuming it at a regional or local level, we are still making an impact. Here are some of the ways in which we are being covered. Again, don't try and read this. But we honored George W. Bush's dog Sully for the Paw of Courage. We got a lot of high-level national press on that. It also put us in some different conversations about how we celebrate working dogs which was really great. Pet disaster relief trailers are always excellent stories of how we are out there for dog owners in times of turmoil. The Museum of the Dog got a lot of coverage, and the Southern Living clip you see in the bottom here, that is a lot of how we get covered, how often should you feed your dog, how often should you wash

your dog's bowl, best leashes for your dog, best practices, how do I train my dog. We get a lot of requests like that that come through our experts, so we are able to add ourselves to a very useful conversation for dog owners who are not necessarily in the sport. So far in Q1 we have had our national championship winner on Good Morning America for the second year in a row. They have already invited us back for a third. We are really excited about that. We have executed a major press campaign for the Museum of the Dog, over 1,500 articles on the museum in 14 different languages around the world and we are still counting. We are still seeing an average of 15 to 20 clips on the museum a day. So, we are really excited and we are about to start full court press for the next exhibit. We are up almost 3,000 clips from this time last year. So last year we were at 9,223. This year we are at over 12,000. We are trending ahead for the year. We announced new breeds and had the largest number of clips surrounding AKC Meet the Breeds in 2019. We were up about 7 percent there. We began to syndicate our content with our Chief Veterinary Officer, including him in our McClatchey, which is an article we create every week and serve to 600 media outlets. He is being viewed as an expert there and solidified him as a trusted resource in all things dog. He has actually told me he has 20 or so requests a week and he is trying to get through them as fast as he can, so he is doing a lot of good work for the AKC. Built

new relationships and working with national outlets. There were some roadblocks we had before. We don't have them now. We have seen a lot of volume with places that two years ago even we weren't able to get a response from. We are very encouraged there. AARP was one of them, The Today Show was one of them. So, we are breaking some good ground. Other accomplishments. We distributed over 110 press releases and media alerts for the year 2018. This year we will be a little bit higher. We will be at about 140. 52 weekly articles to over 600 newspapers. We create a weekly newsletter that goes to 86,000 people and helped developed content for The Nibble which goes to over 1,000,000 users per month. And we also manage media relations for the AKC Humane Fund, Museum of the Dog, and Reunite, as well as building content with our chief veterinary officer that goes on our social properties, AKC.org. And we are increasing his presence at veterinary conferences, so we are adding our voices to those conversations as well. And that is all I have for you guys today. Now I will turn it over to Melissa Olund, our Director of Digital Marketing, for her presentation.

Ms. Olund: Hello. This is my first time speaking to a room this large of dog people, so a little positive reinforcement at the end would be lovely. I'm speaking to you today about AKC Marketing and what we do. We have three key goals in the AKC Marketing

Department. I'm just going to go ahead and read them to you. Number one, we want to increase ownership and registration of purebred dogs. We want to increase awareness and participation in AKC sports and events. And we want to improve dog lovers' perception of the AKC, generally, both part of the fancy and the average person who has a pet dog at home. There are three key things that we do in order to sort of advance those goals, one of which, probably one of the most important, is breed education. So, sharing our breed expertise as the AKC is key to driving that ownership and registration of purebred dogs. We want to engage people with messaging that connects them, spurs them to action, when it comes to the world of purebred dogs. We want to reach them while they are searching for the right breed for their lifestyle and educate them and connect them to responsible breeders and inspire them to do more with the dogs that they end up acquiring. AKC.org is one of the key ways that we do this and that is our website for everybody who has been there. We average 8 million users per month and that's a lovely number that is increasing. Our organic search traffic on AKC.org is up nearly 40 percent year over year. So that speaks to how we are really doing a great job of reaching people while they are in that behavior of looking for information about dogs and about breeds and about what to do with their dogs. And just a few examples of how we have kind of brought

this great education to life, our puppy pack, we have two photos here, Gideon on top and then Nymeria on the bottom, they follow the lives of these puppies in their first year and show all the different things that go into raising a puppy of the different particular purebreds. I have a short clip here, there is no audio, but it is an example of how we are doing more on Instagram to really drive the breed of the day program that we run. That is a little trivia about Pembroke Welsh Corgis. So people, you know, who follow us on Instagram, they may not know that much about Corgis or they might feel they are an expert on Corgis, but either way, when they get done with our trivia they will have engaged with and learn information about Pembrokes and learn something new. Sports and events really allow us to bring some exciting and inspiring stories to our constituency, both the fancy and the average pet dog owner. It is a rich source of digital content for us, whether we are at an event, whether we are, you know, seeing things that people are posting on social media about their participation in an event. It really is one of those things that you can't really replicate. You've got to see it to believe it sometimes with dog sports and events. So, a lot of the video that we do on social media and on site is based on sports events, and we can see that, you know, with 28 million just year to date video views on Facebook alone, it is a really rich way for us to reach people and get them excited about doing more with their dogs. Some

examples of how we bring this to life, our videos, as Doug mentioned, there is explainer videos that kind of serve to demystify some of our different sports so that people can see something, say my dog can do that, you know, and learn how to get involved. I'm one of them. I just did my first Fast CAT over the weekend, so hooray. We also do some live coverage of our National Championships. We went to the Rally and Agility and Obedience championships and did live coverage with all the people who were participating, sharing the results and interviewing the winners as they came out of the ring. They were all very excited to be featured and shown to our social media audiences. So, I'm going to show you right here a quick, video of one of our junior handler spotlights. This is a program that we are also doing every month. We are featuring a different junior handler. This young lady, when we met her, she was 11 years old, she is 12 now I believe. Her name is Brielle. We met her at the Progressive Dog Club Toy Specialty Show. And I think you will enjoy this video.

Ms. Olund: I'm glad you enjoyed that. Brand perception is another key way that we in the Marketing Department are aiming to increase the profile of AKC. As we continue to expand our reach to dog lovers everywhere we are successfully communicating the value and the important work of AKC on a greater scale than

ever before. I think one key thing that is really, really important for everybody to understand is that our social media reach is growing. It is bigger than it has ever been. We just broke the 4 million mark on total followers, and that's a huge number. But the key thing to know about that is that some social media platforms are actually plateauing. So, they are not growing at the same rate that we are. We are growing faster than their user base is growing. So that's a very positive signal as to how engaged people are when we are speaking to them on social media. Email also targets our core constituency. I know Doug mentioned this as well. Our email reach grew 10 percent in 2018 with 138 million emails sent across over 1,000 campaigns. Other areas where we are growing the brand perception is by increasing our social media community management. That means we are out there answering people's questions on social media, we are talking to people, we are giving them tips and tricks and making sure that they know how to find the things that they are looking for. So, we are not just letting people talk about us, we are actually talking with people, and we see a lot of great feedback when we do that. We are also expanding Facebook groups. That's a key part of how Facebook is moving forward and so we want to be on that cutting edge with them. That's all I've got. Actually, one more slide, my fault. Positive reinforcement. We know the Marketing and Communications Department impacts the

AKC in many ways beyond our key goals. We have increased our brand awareness, we have enhanced our corporate reputation, and we have measurable public understanding of how AKC serves dog lovers everywhere. Just as a side example, our social media sentiment, the positive sentiment is 88 percent on average and that's an incredibly strong number. That means when people are talking about us, they are talking about us in a positive way, sharing things that they have done over the weekend, a new title that they won. So, it really has a great impact on that, you know, social sentiment that we see out there. And that's all I've got. Thank you so much.

Chief Financial Officer, Joseph Baffuto, gave the Financial Report as follows: Good morning to you, the AKC Delegate body. It is with great privilege and pleasure that I present to you our unaudited financial results through April 30, 2019. It has been an efficient and productive first four months of our fiscal year and I am confident that we will be able to continue our successes moving forward through the remaining balance of 2019. Let's begin with a summary of our revenue and expenses. Our income statement reflects just under \$25.7 million in total revenue and \$23.8 million in total expenses, for an impressive operating income of \$1.78 million. During the first four months of the 2018 year we recorded \$25.1 million in revenue, with \$24.3 million in expenses, for

\$819,000 of operating income. From our summary, now let's reflect on our core registration volumes. We continue with positive upward trends for both litters and dogs at a 3 percent and 2 percent mark respectively. Thanks go to our remarkable staff supporting the registry and the mission of the AKC. Focusing next on the revenue side of our operational equation, we are representing a \$555,000 increase in total revenue as of the four months ended April 30, 2019. Subsequently, we can drill down into this 2.2 percent increase. With a concentrated and targeted focus from our Board of Directors and executive management, our registration programs are succeeding. Most particularly, dogs, litters and pedigrees have each had positive variances of approximately \$200,000 this year to date over prior year results. Also, our core concentration of sports and events have been highly successful to date this year, outperforming last year's revenue results by approximately \$347,000. Registrations and sports and events are what we do and in 2019 we are continuing to do it right. Transitioning to the expenses side of the equation, we have controlled our costs this year by \$414,000, in comparison to the period ended April 30, 2018. There are a handful of contributing factors to this 1.7 percent favorable decrease, so let's further evaluate. First off, payroll and benefits. Our current full-time equivalent head count of 354 has increased by 4 percent since last year. However, we have been able to

decrease our total payroll and associated benefits by \$151,000 in 2019 measured against 2018 levels. Next, our consulting costs have decreased by \$515,000 in a year over year comparison. Several functions and programs throughout the organization have contributed to the year to date decrease, including our New York office relocation activities from 2018, along with the timing of some of our marketing and technology efforts this year. Next, our equipment and maintenance and rental costs. Equipment, maintenance and rental have dropped by \$129,000 or more than 30 percent in comparison to the same period last year. This can be attributed mainly to our purchasing efforts and technology operations team working hard to negotiate favorable maintenance contracts for services and equipment. Lastly, our postage costs have decreased by about \$75,000 or almost 8 percent below last year's level at the same time. We regularly conduct internal reviews of our division level spending and we expect to closely monitor our costs through the remainder of 2019. Observing our financial results independent of our operating activities, we can note our investment performance year to date which presented significant unrealized gains. The portfolio had a 10.7 percent rate of return in the first four months of 2019 which valued at approximately \$10.8 million and outperformed our benchmark for the period by a full 100 basis points. Our balance sheet indicates the long-term fiscal power of our

organization. As of April 30, 2019, we are exhibiting total assets of \$180 million, with \$109.7 million in total liabilities. As we can see here, these are both significant multimillion dollar increases over the prior year. The difference between our total assets and total liabilities are our unrestricted net assets. Let's take a deeper dive into the composition of the unrestricted net assets. Our operating reserve of just under \$42 million represents approximately 50 percent of our operating budget, while solidifying the functioning continuity of our business if there were a significant disaster impacting our capabilities to operate the organization for an extended period of time. Our investment in property, plant and equipment of \$25.4 million represents the value of our technology equipment, furniture, fixtures and leasehold improvements. You will note this has increased significantly by more than \$15 million since 2018 due to the completion of our new headquarters at 101 Park Avenue in New York, along with completed renovations to our operations facility in Raleigh, North Carolina. The underfunded status of \$60.5 million for our pension and post-retirement plans represents the combined shortfall from our long-term liabilities to these benefit plans. Lastly, the \$63.4 million of our AKC Board designated funds allows us to make long-term decisions which will continue to help us succeed in supporting our core mission. The complete deck which I have presented to you

here will be available on the Delegates Portal by the close of business tomorrow for you to communicate to your clubs. Also, if there are any questions, please note my e-mail address and feel free to contact me. Have a wonderful summer season and we will see you again in September.

Mr. Sprung: Thank you, Joe.

The first vote was on Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 11, Section 4 - Dog Show Entries, Conditions of Dog Affecting Eligibility, which would only change the format of the section. The amendment was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. There was a vote with two-thirds in the affirmative and the amendment was adopted.

The next vote was on the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 11, Section 12 - Dog Show Entries, Conditions of Dog Affecting Eligibility, which would change the italicized portion of the section to be part of the rule. The amendment was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors.

The Chair recognized Sue Goldberg, Delegate for the Lewiston-Auburn Kennel Club, who spoke as follows:

Ms. Goldberg: Sue Goldberg, Lewiston-Auburn Kennel Club. Before the vote is taken, I have been asked to read an excellent statement that is a clarification written by our own staff liaison, Gina DiNardo, that is designed to clarify and alleviate any misconceptions or misunderstandings. It reads in part: "There is no change to the verbiage, interpretation or the enforcement of the policy as it exists today. An individual serving as a show secretary is not a superintendent and is not held to the 30 days before or after a show restriction. The reference in Chapter 11, Section 12, references the eligibility of a show secretary or superintendent to exhibit as agent or handler for any dog owned or co-owned by them to be entered in the event." The last three paragraphs of this section are clear that they apply only to superintendents, employees of superintendents, and those household members of the aforementioned individuals. Thank you.

The amendment was moved to the floor. There was a vote with two-thirds in the affirmative and the amendment was adopted.

The third vote was on the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 11, Section 13 - Dog Show Entries, Conditions of Dog Affecting Eligibility, which would change the section to be gender neutral, changes the first two paragraphs of italics to become part of the rule and adds clarification. The amendment

was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. There was a vote with two-thirds in the affirmative and the amendment was adopted.

The next vote was on the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 14, Section 8 - Measuring, Weighing and Color Determinations When Factors of Disqualification in Breed Standards or Eligibility Under Conditions of a Class or Division of a Class Cancellations of Awards, which would reword the section only. The amendment was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors.

There was a vote with two-thirds in the affirmative and the amendment was adopted.

The fifth vote was on the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 16, Section 6 -Championships, which would change the italicized portion of the section to be part of the rule. The amendment was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors.

There was a vote with two-thirds in the affirmative and the amendment was adopted.

The last vote was on the Field Trial Rules and Standard Procedure for Retrievers Chapter 14, Section 4, which would end the possibility for

dogs to run as the first dog of a series more than once at the same stake at the same trial. The amendment was proposed by the Retriever Field Trial Advisory Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. There was a vote with twothirds in the affirmative and the amendment was adopted.

The Chair called on the Executive Secretary to read the proposed amendment to the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 7, Section 12 -Judges.

Ms. DiNardo: This amendment is to the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 7, Section 12 -Judges, which allows clubs to efficiently close out a ring on the day. This amendment was proposed by the AKC Board of Directors, endorsed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. It will be published in two issues of the AKC Gazette and you will be asked to vote on it at the September 2019 meeting. The full text is on the worksheet previously e-mailed.

The Chair called on the Executive Secretary to read the proposed amendment to the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 14, Section 2 -Measuring, Weighing and Color **Determinations When Factors of** Disqualification in Breed Standards or Eligibility Under Conditions of a Class or

Division of a Class Cancellations of Awards.

Ms. DiNardo: This amendment is to the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 14, Section 2 -Measuring, Weighing and Color Determinations When Factors of Disqualification in Breed Standards or Eligibility Under Conditions of a Class or Division of a Class Cancellations of Awards, which would reword the section to incorporate broader language regarding the display of identification by a person or dog exhibiting. This amendment was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. It will be published in two issues of the AKC Gazette and you will be asked to vote on it at the September 2019 meeting. The full text is on the worksheet previously e-mailed.

The Chair called on the Executive Secretary to read the proposed amendment to the Rules Applying to Dog Shows, Chapter 14, Section 9 - Measuring, Weighing and Color Determinations When Factors of Disqualification in Breed Standards or Eligibility Under Conditions of a Class or Division of a Class Cancellations of Awards.

Ms. DiNardo: This amendment is to the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 14, Section 9 -Measuring, Weighing and Color Determinations When Factors of Disqualification in Breed Standards or Eligibility Under Conditions of a Class or Division of a Class Cancellations of Awards, which permits move-ups to occur when an award has been disallowed in non-regular classes and also in groups; it further reiterates that this will occur when Best in Show is cancelled. This amendment was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. It will be published in two issues of the AKC Gazette and you will be asked to vote on it at the September 2019 meeting. The full text is on the worksheet previously e-mailed.

The Chair called on the Executive Secretary to read a list of vacancies for the Delegate Committees that are to be filled in September. Ms. DiNardo: These are the vacancies on Delegate committees that are to be filled at the September Delegate meeting: All-Breeds Clubs Committee: Four, three-year terms.

Bylaws Committee: Four, three-year terms and one, one-year term.

Canine Health Committee: Four, three-year terms and one, two-year term.

Companion Events Committee: Four, threeyear terms and one, two-year term.

Delegate Advocacy and Advancement Committee: Four, three-year terms and one, one-year term.

Dog Show Rules Committee: Four, three-year

terms.

Field Trial and Hunting Test Events Committee: Four, three-year terms. Herding, Earthdog, and Coursing Events Committee: Four, three-year terms and one, one-year term.

Parent Clubs Committee: Four, three-year

Perspectives Editorial Staff: One, one-year term and six, two-year terms.

Mr. Sprung announced that the Delegates would be e-mailed self-nomination forms by the end of June. The self-nomination form must be returned to the Executive Secretary by Friday, July 19, 2019. Questions on the procedures to be followed should also be directed to the Executive Secretary. Delegates may only self-nominate for one committee, except that a member of the Perspectives Editorial Staff may also serve on another standing committee. In August, the Delegates will be e-mailed the nominees for each committee and their qualification statements with the September Delegates meeting notification.

The Chair called on Sheila Goffe, Vice President of Government Relations, to make a special presentation.

Ms. Goffe: I am very pleased this morning to read to you a resolution honoring David Helming. Whereas, David Helming joined the AKC Board of Directors of the American

Kennel Club Political Action Committee in January 2011 and served through March 2019. Whereas, David Helming first joined the AKC Delegate body in 2006 representing the Hutchinson Kennel Club and was again elected as a Delegate for the Newfoundland Club of America in 2013.

And Whereas, David Helming has been active in the American Kennel Club for many years as a breeder of Newfoundlands, Portuguese Water Dogs and Norwich Terriers.

Whereas, in 2005 he was elected AKC Breeder of the Year after being chosen as the AKC Working Group Breeder of the Year in 2002. And Whereas, David Helming is an honorary member and past president of the Newfoundland Club of America, served as vice chairman of the NCA Charitable Trust Management Board, and currently serves as of the NCA's Delegate to the American Kennel Club.

And Whereas, he is a member of the Somerset Hills Kennel Club, Westchester Kennel Club, Kennel Club of Philadelphia, Westminster Kennel Club, and the Morris and Essex Kennel Club, and has served these clubs in various capacities including president, director, show chairman, and treasurer. And Whereas, David Helming's leadership, knowledge and experience in matters pertaining to legislation and public policy have been of great value to the AKC PAC Board.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the

Directors of the American Kennel Club Political Action Committee honor David Helming's service and dedication to the American Kennel Club and its Political Action Committee and extend to him their grateful appreciation and best wishes for his future endeavors. Thank you, David.

The Chair informed the Delegates that the Tuesday, September 10, 2019 Delegates meeting would be held at the Doubletree Newark Airport Hotel. The Conference and Travel Department will place the hotel information on the Delegates Portal when the block of rooms becomes available.

Mr. Sprung reminded the Delegates that lunch would be served following the meeting on the Terrace, and to leave their badges at the registration desk following lunch.

The following Delegate spoke during New Business as follows:

Frances Stephens, Delegate, Puyallup Valley Dog Fanciers:

Frances reported on the case of misconduct by the club's former treasurer who was convicted in April 2018 of felony theft, after the club filed charges with the county. She requested that AKC review the member/registration status of the individual and provide appropriate action.

Sylvia Thomas, Delegate, Kennel Club of Riverside:

Sylvia thanked the Delegates for their faithful readership and support of Perspectives. She reported that the June issue was very well received, as evidenced by the number of article reprint requests. She encouraged the Delegates to share the content with a wider audience and provided the instructions – the Delegate sends an email to her with the article(s) of interest, she gets permission from the author, she creates a PDF and returns to the Delegate for distribution. Recent approved republications were Carl Ashby and Carmen Battaglia's respective articles on Sustainability, Robin Foust's article on Service Dogs, Joyce Dandridge's article on Ring Stewarding, and Jon Green's wonderful article on FSS Open Shows, which will also be published in a future issue of the Gazette. Changes to the coordinator position for the upcoming issues were noted - Don James switched to the December issue and Gino Sisneros volunteered for the September issue. Articles for the September issue are due to Mr. Sisneros by the July 15, 2019 deadline. It was revealed that the baby in the June issue feature, You Must Have Been a Beautiful Baby, was Dick Blair. Delegates were asked to discretely send a baby picture to Sylvia in order to be featured in an upcoming issue. Lastly, she offered hard copies of Perspectives to the attending Delegates at the meeting.

Herman Tietjen, Delegate, McKinley Kennel Club:

Herman expressed gratitude to the Delegates and "dog people" who offered condolences on the passing of his late wife both on social media and otherwise.

Jeffrey Ball, Delegate, Ramapo Kennel Club: Jeffrey updated the Delegates on New Jersey Lobby Day at which a state dog for New Jersey, the Collie, was proposed. The selection was based on the history of the Collie in New Jersey.

The New Jersey Federation of Dog Clubs had 20 people participate, and they met with 57 of the 120 legislators. The Collie resolution is now moving forward with bipartisan legislative support. He thanked AKC Reunite, represented by Megan Ault and the Philadelphia Kennel Club for their assistance. There are two current trailers, two more have been confirmed and work is being done for two more. A breeder of merit in attendance for the first time was impressed with the opportunity that the event offered: to speak to the legislators, to educate them and make a difference. Jeffrey urged the Delegates as those with the most knowledge, to use the programs that AKC has established to reach out to the public and educate them as leaders. Efforts of the Delegates at the local, county and state level are needed in addition to the media.

Glenda Stephenson, Delegate, Space Coast Kennel Club of Palm Bay:

Glenda stressed the importance of microchipping dogs/dog litters as she reflected on her experience approximately 12 years ago, of having one of her microchipped dogs returned to her after being lost in Texas. She was able to have the dog's sperm analyzed by Dr. Mary McDaniel, a fellow Delegate, for future breeding, which tested positively. The detailed account of her story is featured in her article The Dreaded Telephone Call in the June issue of Perspectives.

Betty Winthers, Delegate, Olympic Kennel Club:

Betty proudly shared details about Olympic Kennel Club's 75th Anniversary show in August, which will be a 5-day event including Conformation, Obedience, Rally, Dock Diving, Agility, Disk Dog, and Fast CAT. Three different group clubs will also be participating.

Dominic DiBalsi, Delegate, Lehigh Valley Kennel Club:

Dominic suggested an AKC sponsored program for children on Sunday afternoon before the Delegate Meeting, having noticed a large number of that age group at the hotel.

Karen Gunzel, Delegate, Trenton Kennel Club:

Karen offered an invitation to attend Trenton Kennel Club's 100th show in May 2020.

Features of the event will be Conformation, Lure Coursing, Canine Good Citizen and Trick Dog.

Hearing no further business, the Chair adjourned the meeting.

This memo is to explain how the election of Delegate Committees will be conducted at our meeting on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>September 10</u>, <u>2019</u>.

In order for the election to be official, we must call the Delegate Meeting to order. Ballots will be handed out as you sign in at the registration desk. **The Delegate Meeting will be called to order at 9 a.m. to begin voting for the Delegate Standing Committees.** After those present at that time have voted, we will recess the Delegate Meeting to begin the Forum.

The Forum will run for approximately one hour. The reconvened Delegate Meeting will begin following the conclusion of the Forum. Anyone who had not yet voted for the Standing Delegate Committees will be given the opportunity to do so, then the polls will be closed.

Once the polls are closed, the ballots will be electronically tabulated and results of the election to the Standing Committees announced during the regular meeting or during lunch.

Voting

This year, no election is needed for: Companion Events or the *Perspectives* Editorial Staff. There will be an election in (8) Committees. The election for these Committees will be as follows:

All-Breed Clubs: you may vote for a maximum of four (4) Delegates.

Bylaws: you may vote for a maximum of five (5) Delegates.

Canine Health: you may vote for a maximum of five (5) Delegates.

<u>Delegate Advocacy and Advancement</u>: you may vote for a maximum of <u>five (5)</u> Delegates.

Dog Show Rules: you may vote for a maximum of four (4) Delegates.

<u>Field Trial and Hunting Test Events</u>: you may vote for a maximum of <u>four (4)</u> Delegates.

Herding, Earthdog and Coursing Events: you may vote for a maximum of five (5) Delegates.

Parent Clubs: you may vote for a maximum of four (4) Delegates.

Organization of the Committees

Once the ballot results have been tabulated, the organizational meeting of all committees will take place either immediately upon conclusion of the regular Delegate Meeting or after the luncheon. The sole purpose of this meeting is to elect the committee chair and secretary. Meeting places for each committee have been reserved. AKC staff will be available to guide committee members to their meeting places.

Organization of the Coordinating Committee

As soon as the chairs of the Standing Committees have been elected and those committees organized, the chairs of those nine committees may meet to organize the Coordinating Committee. If the Coordinating Committee does not organize at this time, then it must at the next regular Coordinating Committee meeting. The *Perspectives* Editorial Committee is not involved, as it falls under a different standing rule.

THE AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB ALL-BREED CLUBS COMMITTEE

JUNE 10, 2019

The meeting was called to order at 1 PM by Committee Chair, Nancy Fisk, at the Doubletree Hotel, Newark, NJ.

Committee members present: Cathy Rubens, Larry Libeu, Terrie Breen, Jon Greene, Fran Stephens, Mike Houchard, Bill Ellis, Margaret DiCorleto. Absent: Susan Sholar and John Ronald. Also present: Karolynne McAteer and Thomas Powers, AKC Board Liaisons, and Mari-beth O'Neill, AKC Staff.

There were 87 guest delegates present.

Committee members introduced themselves and newly seated delegates introduced themselves and were welcomed.

The minutes of the March 2019 committee meeting were approved as posted.

Committee member Mike Houchard gave a power point presentation of results from the Community Outreach survey conducted by the Best Practices subcommittee. There were 292 responses to this survey. Of concern was that 34 clubs don't see Community Outreach as important. On the positive side, many clubs offered creative ways that they show their presence in their communities. Involving public officials is an excellent way to get good publicity and establish important relationships. It was recommended that more clubs offer an AKC Responsible Dog Owner event. Mike stressed that Community Outreach is tied to the survival of dog sports and that clubs need to establish a strong presence in their communities by being "proactive rather than reactive." Delegates were encouraged to look at the long list of "other" responses in the survey results which might give them ideas for community involvement. Best Practices will be presented at the September meeting.

At the March meeting, the committee heard a request from Richella Veatch, Delegate for the Tennessee Valley KC, who presented a problem to the committee and asked for help in bringing the matter of lost show revenue and restitution to the Board's attention.

There was an incident at her club's show site by an exhibitor that resulted in damage amounting to \$3,500.00. In this incident, a handler's assistant was brought before a Bench Show Hearing, fined and suspended while employed by the handler. Although the individual responsible for the damage was fined and suspended by AKC, the club was responsible for paying the cost of the damage. This amount of money was the total net income from the club's conformation and obedience shows for 2018. Unfortunately for the club, there was no expectation that the person responsible for the damage be liable for restitution to the club.

Since this was seen as a situation that could affect any club, the committee agreed to send a request to the Board to review the procedures and policies related to imposed suspensions. This was done and Nancy Fisk thanked the subcommittee that drafted the request and the Board for taking action. Karolynne McAteer reported that the accused individuals will make restitution to this club and in the future, no suspensions will be lifted until restitution is made.

Mari-beth O'Neill gave an up-date on Juniors. Twenty AKC scholarships have been awarded. The possibility of receiving a scholarship might be an incentive for youngsters to enter juniors and join a club. Pee Wee classes are not attracting new kids. Pee Wee entries are typically children or grandchildren of exhibitors. 4-H outreach at state fairs is an excellent way to connect with children. AKC provides necessary forms for getting a Junior number and dog registration. 4-H groups can be invited to club shows and Juniors can act as hosts. Junior Showcases are a good way to engage Juniors.

A question was raised about how to encourage Juniors to become breeders not just handlers.

Jon Greene read a memo from the Austin KC which proposes a revised championship point system that would help alleviate the problem of finding enough dogs in ones breed to complete a championship. This proposal adds the awarding of points to group placements in addition to placing Group 1. In essence, "if you are awarded Best of Breed but are the only entry, you earn no points but if you place first in your group, you earn the highest amount of points that was allotted to any of the dog breeds that you have defeated in your group. If you placed 2nd, 3rd, or 4th in the group you will be allotted the highest amount of points given to any of the breeds that you have defeated in your group." If you win Best in Show, "you will be awarded the maximum points awarded to any breed in the show-only 5 points can be awarded to a dog in one day. Only one major acquired by this method can be counted toward your championship. Your second major must still be achieved by defeating the specific number of ones own breed that constitutes a major according to AKC rules. Minor points awarded in this manner will still count toward your championship. This change will still adhere to current AKC rules acquiring 15 points that constitutes the title of Champion. The only change is the ability of exhibitors dogs being awarded minor points and only one 'Major' from group placings."

Sheila Goffe, VP Government Relations, gave an update on legislative issues and highlighted some of what the Government Relations Department does. At the state and federal level, over 2100 bills are tracked and monitored. Sometimes the GR response is just a message that the bill is good; sometimes it may be a notice if there is an urgent need. There is a federal lobbyist who can work with state lobbyists when necessary. Sheila reminded everyone of the various newsletters and notices that come from her department and encouraged people to go to the GR website www.akc.org/government-relations. The department is always available and willing to help with dog related issues. Email is <a href="majorated-dogsac-dogsa

There is a new multidisciplinary GR Task Force on Anti-Breeder Harassment or Retaliation. Breeders who are involved and outspoken in the community are increasingly likely to suffer retaliation such as surprise kennel inspections or having their dogs seized. Breeders are encouraged to "be careful and be smart." Using a PO Box instead of a street mail address might be a good idea, especially for exhibitors who are concerned about confidentiality in show catalogs.

A National Legislative Conference will be held June 23 and 24 in Washington, DC.

Mike Houchard shared a copy of the Georgia Farm Bureau Magazine which featured 5 working farm dogs, 4 of which are pure-bred. He said this is a good community resource.

Dan Petko, KC of Niagara Falls, gave a personal example of how a change in local community leadership resulted in changes to the kennel license renewal process. He was given unacceptable options such as move, get rid of his dogs, or apply for a variance which was denied. After a legal hassle, his kennel was grandfathered in.

There was discussion of struggling clubs and the effects of clusters. Karolynne McAteer said that clusters take shows out of the local community which has a financial and visibility impact. She stressed that club community outreach and involvement then become even more important. Comments from the floor included that huge shows don't always attract new people and working people often cannot attend midweek shows. The importance of community involvement was stressed. It was suggested that maybe there should be more outdoor shows. Maybe AKC could assist clubs to establish stable locations by helping them buy show property. There was agreement that AKC should seriously consider the impact of clusters on small shows.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:20 PM.

Chairman Gretchen Bernardi called the meeting to order at 9:00 AM.

The committee members and liaisons introduced themselves.

The minutes of the March 2018 meeting were reviewed and approved as corrected (Paveza/Coxwell – unanimous).

Chairman's Report: Gretchen welcomed everyone attending the meeting. She also commented on her very positive observation of so many Delegates who are actively exhibiting and attending dog shows

Gretchen began the business with the first agenda item, the value of the Nominating Committee and whether it should be eliminated. She asked Dominic Carota who is chairing an Ad Hoc Committee on the Nominating Committee. Dominic provided some details and history for its purpose.

- To streamline the Nom. Comm. Activities
- To provide education to the Nom. Comm.
- To utilize previous documents provided by Gretchen Bernardi & Bylaws Comm.
- To make Nom. Comm. Activities open & transparent
- To have this committee's activities useful for this election cycle

There was further explanation of David Hopkin's failed amendment regarding the picking of the Nom. Comm., its complexity and why it failed. There was further passionate discussion about the election process and changes, with regard to its value and whether it should be eliminated.

Pat Cruz was asked and then provided some further history on this Ad Hoc Committee, why it was formed and explained that the Board has no input into the Nom. Comm. or its function, other than its choice in composition.

Dr. Tom Davies was asked for his opinions and he again suggested that there may be no need for a Nom. Comm. with the success of individuals running from, the floor.

The Bylaws Committee decided unanimously to await the findings and suggestions of the Ad Hoc Committee for proceeding with any further activities.

The next topic dealt with a return to a discussion of Term limits for Directors. This was brought forth due to a number of Delegate requests. Gretchen provided history and the Committee members each gave opinions. Again, we discussed the present situation, attempts to increase the length of term off the Board, a permanent exclusion after two terms or a revocation of the current term limits. All have failed to reach the 2/3 majority needed to pass. The Committee had no interest at the current time to pursue the topic of Term Limits.

Greg suggested what I want to refer to as The Praveza Rule, that once this Committee considers a subject and makes a decision, we will not discuss it again for one year. The Committee will consider this.

The third issue was to be a report on the use of DNA in identifying and registering dogs. In the absence of Dr. Pam Rosman, there was no report. Gretchen told us of a Board appointed Ad Hoc Committee on DNA and General Health. Pam is a member of that committee and we will await a report.

The was a brief discussion of AKC approval of club bylaws and the differentiation of Parent Club, Member Club and Licensed Club

After a brief break, the Committee took up a discussion of Registration of dogs of unacceptable colors for their breed. This led to a discussion of the issues of esthetics and genetics and the health problems that are associated with some unacceptable colors. There was tremendous visitor input and participation. It seemed obvious that in many breeds, the unacceptable colors come about because of out-crosses to other breeds, making the colors possible.

Glenda Stephenson, Space Coast KC of Palm Bay provided information about these issues in the Australian Shepherd and the associated DNA findings. Barbara Shaw, Greater Colin KC gave information about a study of the Merle gene by the American Spaniel Club (http://AmericaSpanielclub.org/about-the-breed/Merle-color-in-Cocker-spaniels).

There were many questions in this topic, including whether DNA can identify individual breeds and whether it can be used to validate the Stud Book Registry.

Again, there was reference to the High Volume Breeders Committee Report from nearly twenty years ago.

With there being no further business to discuss, there was a motion to adjourn (Paveza/Coxwell – unanimously approved) 11:35 AM.

Chair Susan Hamil called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

Minutes of the 11 March 2019 meeting, as amended and published on the Delegate Portal, were approved.

Dr. Diane Brown distributed copies of the 2019 AKC Canine Health Foundation Research Grants Portfolio, Volume 3. Abstracts of 38 new grants, representing 2.5 million in funding are presented in 23 project areas. Also included are all currently active CHF research grants, for a total of \$10.3 million in active research. Although published quarterly, the list is updated continuously on line: http://www.akcchf.org/research/our-research/ Click on the addendum to the 2019 Research Portfolio.

Copies of the 2018 *Annual Report* were also distributed. AKC/CHF has nearly doubled research grant funding since 2014, with \$2.7 million in 39 grants awarded in 2018 alone. In 2018 five clinician/scientist/fellows have been supported as have six theriogenology residents. Bios of these individuals as well as a Foundation financial report are available at: http://www.akcchf.org/about-us/Financials/

The first prospective study on the suspected association between diet and dilated cardiomyopathy has been funded. A multi-institutional team of veterinary cardiologists and nutritionists will prospectively screen a large population of apparently healthy dogs for dilated cardiomyopathy and will compare the frequency of heart disease occurrence with the

frequency of boutique, exotic ingredient, or grain-free diets. See http://www.akcchf.org/research/research-portfolio/2661.html

Previous research initiatives in tick-borne infections and epilepsy are continuing. New grants have been awarded for atopy and for immune-related hemolytic anemia. These subjects are of greater pertinence to small breeds. A clinical trial, stimulated by the finding that propranolol may enhance the effectiveness of chemotherapy in human angiosarcoma, will investigate the applicability of this approach to hemangiosarcoma in dogs. Preliminary findings are encouraging.

Recipients of emails from AKC/CHF are opened at a frequency of 41% as compared with an average for non-profit veterinary health foundations of 15%. This demonstrates the recipients' engagement with the topics addressed and the appropriateness of their content to the target audience.

Another positive quality measure is the maintenance of a 4-star rating from Charity Navigator.

Registration is now open for the 2019 AKC Canine Health Foundation Conference, 9-11 August 2019 in St. Louis. This year registration is open to anyone interested, subject to availability. Register at: http://www.akcchf.org/news-events/events/educational/national-parent-club-canine-1.html 200 registrants have already signed-up. 30 veterinary students and all current theriogenology residents will attend.

Dr. Brown has been reaching out to Parent Clubs, and especially to the younger people. She attended a Spinone Italiano national and was pleased to be contacted by juniors who were being educated by that club. The club asked students to discuss some topics with her and have her sign-off on attendance sheets. At an English Springer Spaniel event, following the show, the juniors and attendees were asked to review a series of educational posters and answer questions on each.

Clubs who wish to have materials specifically designed for their breeds or health interests may contact the AKC/CHF and have these materials shipped to them. Stat sheets on various infectious diseases and other health issues can be downloaded and reprinted (with permission and attribution to the AKC/CHF). http://www.akcchf.org/canine-health/top-health-concerns.html The health liaison newsletters are sent out quarterly.

Alan Kalter, Delegate and former AKC Board Member, reported on the ad hoc sustainability committee meeting held the evening prior. Between 2008 and 2018 there has been a 25-30% decrease in the number of litters being whelped yearly, representing a decrease of approximately 30,000 available puppies. The number of breeders has decreased due to cultural and financial issues as well as time available and government regulations. He stated that 2/3 of puppies being registered today are from first-time or "casual" breeders. More people need to be breeding dogs, and he advocated that educational efforts be directed to breeders or potential breeders, like those used to educate judges. Breeder education committees established by Parent Clubs would help promulgate best breeding practices to potential and first-time breeders. Canine Health Committee Marcy Zingler suggested that the sustainability committee send a letter to all Parent Clubs asking what have proven to be

successful elements in their Breeders Education Committee efforts. This would be a good beginning for ongoing communication on this topic.

Dr. Carmen Battaglia presented additional data on the steady decline in AKC conformation entries as well as the steady increase in limited registrations. Breeders set an all-time 25-year record in 2017 by registering 121,227 puppies with limited registration. 26% of breeders in the fancy, 69% of other breeders, but only 5% of commercial breeders used this option. He believes that this may well result in two different "types" of a breed depending on who is doing the breeding and that the overall quality and genetic variability of the breed will therefore decrease.

AKC Executive Vice President Mark Dunn commented on AKC Board Chairman William Feeney's creation of an ad hoc committee for exploring additional testing opportunities which might be offered to AKC registrants as a result of a change in the AKC genetic testing platform. This change would allow testing for the potential risk of appropriate genetically based health issues, in addition to the current one for determining parentage. Dr. Gerald Bell of Tufts will chair the committee. Committee members include Dr. Michael Green and Dr. Julia Allwood, a post-doctoral scientist at N.C. State University, who is currently working for the AKC. Canine Health Committee members on the new Board committee include Susan Hamil and Eddie Dziuk. The committee intends to produce a white paper on the subject within one year.

Eddie Dziuk reported on the 4th International Partnership for Dogs (IPFD) workshop held in Windsor, England last week. He and Susan Hamil attended, as did Dr. Diane Brown from AKC/CHF. Also attending were Dr. Gerald Bell and delegates from the OFA. Rather than lectures by experts, the workshop consisted of reports developed by groups assigned to one of 5 topics.

The first topic was "Concept of Breed," meaning the sustainability of low-litter, low-entry breeds. The European approach seemed to be creating genetic diversity by occasional crossing other breeds into the line.

The second topic was "Supply and Demand." Dr. Courtney Croney, a livestock expert from Purdue, gave a well-received presentation on her research into the best practices for commercial breeders.

The third topic, "Phenotypic exaggeration," rapidly degenerated to a discussion of the "brachycephalic" breeds and the occasional accompanying "Brachiocephalic Obstructive Airway Syndrome (BOAS)." The "animal welfare" representatives are pushing for the elimination of brachycephalic dogs through a breeding prohibition.

The fourth topic concerned the development of breed-specific health improvement strategies and the fifth, the ongoing "harmonization of genetic testing" project.

Eddie Dziuk gave a brief CHIC update. More than 1000 DNA samples have been collected and submitted to the OFA from various spring national specialties. He stated that it was likely that an echocardiogram would soon be required for the advanced cardiac clearance of a dog, in addition to the clinical exam now required.

AKC Executive Vice President Keith Frazier presented a report on veterinary outreach activities under the direction of Mari-Beth O'Neill. Mari-Beth and Dr. Sharon Albright from the AKC/CHF attended the Student AVMA Symposium 9-11 March at the University of Georgia. Future appearances will be at the Therio Conference 2019, 24-27 July in Savannah, GA; the AVMA meeting in Washington, D.C. 2-6 August; the 2019 Canine Health Foundation National Parent Club Canine Health Conference in St. Louis, MO, 9-11 August; and the N.Y. Veterinary Conference 2019 in NYC, 7-8 November, to be held at the Javits Center.

AKC will provide \$25,000 to offset the hotel and meal costs for veterinary students and theriogenology residents attending the St. Louis National Parent Club Canine Health Conference. \$35,000 has been awarded to veterinary students during 2019 in the form of scholarships ranging from \$1000 to \$5000 each for students attending 12 different veterinary schools.

16 "lunch and learn" sessions were held at various veterinary schools during 2018. 12 have been held thus far this year with 6 more being planned.

A variety of suggestions were then offered by committee members and guests as to how to grow the outreach to veterinarians.

AKC Board Member Steven Hamblin suggested that program templates be developed for the education of veterinary students as well as local veterinarians and securing their involvement by inviting them to attend and hosting them at local dog shows.

Canine Health Committee member Eddie Dziuk suggested that such a presentation be extended to agricultural students as well as veterinary students. This idea was applauded by committee member Dr. Joellen Gregory.

Canine Health Committee Dr. Sophia Kaluzniacki suggested that veterinary technician students and vet techs be included as well.

Chair Susan Hamil asked that the various current forms of veterinary outreach be described in detail accompanied by the educational methods and materials used and that information be submitted to her for review and consolidation by the Canine Health Committee. Mari-Beth O'Neill/Keith Frazier were to provide information on the "lunch and learn" and veterinary conference presentations, Eddie Dziuk on his work with veterinary students, especially involving their attendance at dog shows, and Anne Bowes on her work with Ladies' Dog Club members in educating Tufts veterinary students at dog shows.

An appeal was then made to members of the Canine Health Committee to consider working on the organization of this material so that it could be documented and promulgated.

Chair Susan Hamil suggested to Board Member Steven Hamblin that the various brachycephalic breeds might consider working together to create a proactive presentation which would accentuate the positive health aspects of these breeds. This would place the airway problems in a more realistic framework. Considerable discussion by the committee, staff and guests ensued.

Chair Susan Hamil adjourned the meeting at 11:17 a.m. Guests were excused, and the Committee entered a brief Executive Session.

Freestyle Obedience Status Report: Gail reported that a Sub Committee has been formed, comprised of Patty, Larry, Maureen, and Gail. Bob suggested watching the Freestyle Events at Westminster.

Doug continued with the Staff Information Handout

Staff will propose the following changes to the Obedience Regulations at the July AKC Board Meeting: 1) Require Clubs to arrange entries in jump height order

- 2) Preferred Class will be judged with the Regular Class, in jump height order.
- 3) When the same Judge is judging Beginner Novice A and B, and and there are less than 20 combined dogs entered, the same start time will be listed, and the Walkthrough will be combined.

 (A correction was made....Beginner Novice can't be combined)
- 4) After entries have closed, the club may elect to change Class assignments to facilitate a smooth running of entries between Judges. (Load Balancing). Clubs may remove judges from the panel if entries are low, and both the Club and the Judge agree n writing.

Larry moved that the Committee support the 4 items above, as prepared for Board approval. Second, Bob. Unanimous.

The Committee also supported the staff to Board recommendation to allow any two dogs of a similar height to be entered as a brace in the Non-Regular Obedience Brace Class.

Companion Events Committee Newark NJ June 10 2019

Agility-Allow Dogs with Coloring to participate in Agility on a one year pilot basis. Coloring will be limited to no more than 1/3 of the dog. Following the Agility Advisory Committee, the fancy was surveyed. There were over 7,000 responses; 84 % of the respondents approved of permitting Coloration in Agility.

Maureen moved that the Committee support Coloration in Agility, Second Betty. The Committee did not support the proposal. Aye 3, Nay 6, and 1 Abstention.

Premier Agility Cup. This first-time event took place on April 25th, in conjunction with a major Horse Event. Highlights will be aired on AKC.TV, Date TBA.

Two Recommendations from the Agility Advisory Committee. Will be made to the Board in July. Both are being proposed as one-year pilot Programs. Staff to evaluate.

- 1) For Exhibition Only (FEO). Only allowed in T2B, and FAST Classes. A Toy can be taken in the ring, but not thrown. The Judge will watch, to ensure safety. A run may be declared FEO on the day of the Trial. In the case of Trials that don't fill, this may encourage some additional entries. Several other Agility venues offer this option.

 Joyce moved for committee support of the FEO proposal, Second Maureen.
 Unanimous
- 2) Fix and Go on. After an error has been made, the exhibitor may go back a couple of obstacles, and re-work the sequence. This will then be non-qualifying, and the Judge will continue to watch, to ensure safety.

Maureen moved for Committee support of the Fix and Go On proposal. Second Joyce. Approved Aye 6, Nay 3.

Purpose Bred Dog and Versatile Dog Programs. A Draft Handout was distributed.

Purpose Bred Dog. A Titling program which acknowledges 1) Proper Confirmation 2) Ability to perform its Function. 3) Appropriate Temperament.

The Versatile Dog Program. Acknowledges dogs that succeed at a variety of activities. Encouraging owners to try different sports. There will be three levels: 10 Versatile Dog (VSD), 2) Versatile Dog Advanced (VSDA), 3) Versatile Dog Excellent (VSDX).

The Committee members introduced themselves. Cindy Miller invited the guests to speak on items being discussed once the committee members concluded their discussion.

Item 1 - Housekeeping Items and Items sent to Board

Chapter 3, Section 22 – The Committee sent its recommendation to the Board for approval of the amendment to Chapter 3, Section 22, which would allow foreign bred and registered dogs to participate in the Miscellaneous Class prior to AKC registration being completed. A response was received advising the Committee that this is on hold pending Parent Clubs Committee input. [Note: The PCC approved the changes at their morning meeting.]

Cindy Miller also reminded the members whose terms expire in September to self-nominate if they wish to run for another term on the Committee. Those members are Linda Flynn, Sue Goldberg, Barbara Schwartz and Cindy Stansell.

The deadlines for the September meeting were announced:

Agenda is due to Paula by August 1 Committee requests for Bri Tesarz and staff by July 30 Committee agenda finalized by August 15

Cindy then noted the items to be voted and read at the Delegates' meeting. Barbara Schwartz raised the need to clarify the amendment to Chapter 11, Section 12. The subcommittee proposed adding a Section 12A. Gina DiNardo reported that she had checked with the parliamentarian, who confirmed that this would be outside the scope of the amendment as read, so the change could not be made. The options would be to withdraw the amendment and resubmit, or read clarifying language prior to the vote. The consensus was to read the clarification prior to vote.

Item 4 - Chapter 11, Section 2

Barbara Schwartz reported that this amendment was sent to the Board and the Board voted not to approve it. She felt there was some misunderstanding regarding the intent of the amendment. The italics subcommittee reviewed the amendment and proposed that for consistency it be moved to Chapter 17 (Submission of a Show's Records to AKC) as a new Section 3. The third paragraph would remain in italics and the first sentence would be deleted. Barbara confirmed that staff has concurred with these changes. **Upon motion by Johnny Shoemaker, seconded by Robert Scroll, it was unanimously voted to submit to the Board for consideration an amendment to move Chapter 11, Section 2 to Chapter 17 as a new Section 3, which would read as follows:**

Section 3. At every show held under the rules of The American Kennel Club, a recording fee not to exceed 50 cents may be required for every dog entered. This recording fee is to help defray expenses involved in keeping the show records, and applies to all dogs entered. If a dog is entered in more than one class at a show, the recording fee applies only to first entry. The Board of Directors shall determine, from time to time, whether a recording fee shall be required, and the amount of it.

The event-giving club shall assume the responsibility of collecting all Event Service Fees for the American Kennel Club. That fact shall be stated in the premium list. These event service and recording fees shall be forwarded to the American Kennel Club along with all other required event results within seven (7) days of the close of the event.

The American Kennel Club will collect a \$3.00 Event Service Fee for the first entry of a dog and a \$3.00 service fee for each additional entry of the same dog in the regular and non-regular recordable single-entry classes, in all AKC licensed and member club events. (There

is no recording fee or event service fee for sweepstakes, futurities, brace/team, multi-dog classes, or special attractions.) The current 50 cent recording will continue to be collected.

All recording and event service fees will be submitted to AKC in accordance with AKC Board Policy.

Chapter 14, Sections 1, 2, 3 and 4

There was some discussion about the proposed amendments with respect to language about a dog previously measured or weighed at the show. **Upon motion made by Robert Schroll, seconded by Johnny Shoemaker, it was unanimously voted to submit to the Board for approval, the amendments to Chapter 14 to read as follows:**

Section 1. In those breeds where certain heights are specified in the Breed Standard as disqualifications, or in any class specifying height limits, the judge has the authority to determine whether any dog measures within those limits, provided the dog has not been previously measured during any competition at that show, excluding Sweeps, Futurity and other Special Attractions.

If, in the opinion of a competing exhibitor in the ring, the height of a dog in that ring appears to be outside the limits of the Breed Standard or the conditions of that class, such exhibitor may, before every dog has been individually examined and individually gaited, request that the judge measure the dog and the judge shall comply provided the dog as not been previously measured during any competition at that show, excluding Sweeps, Futurity and other Special Attractions.

If the judge finds that the dog's height is within the Breed Standard or the conditions of the class, s/he shall mark and initial the judge's book "Measured in." If the judge finds that the dog's height is outside the allowable limits of the Breed Standard, s/he shall disqualify the dog and mark and initial the judge's book "Measured out - disqualified."

A dog that has thus been disqualified by three different judges may not again be shown.

If the judge finds that the dog's height is not in accordance with the conditions of the class, s/he shall mark and initial the judge's book "Measured out - ineligible." A dog thus declared ineligible for its class shall be considered entered incorrectly and cannot be transferred to any other class at that show. A dog thus found ineligible by three different judges may not again be shown in that class. In subsequent shows, this dog may be entered in another class for which the dog meets the height limit or transferred to an eligible Open Class per Chapter 11, Section 6.

In all cases, the judge shall use a wicket that meets American Kennel Club requirements.

Section 2. In those breeds where certain weights are specified in the Breed Standard as disqualifications, or in any class specifying weight limits, the judge has the authority to determine whether any dog weighs within those limits, provided the dog has not been previously weighed during any competition at that show, excluding Sweeps, Futurity and other Special Attractions.

If, in the opinion of a competing exhibitor in the ring, the weight of a dog in that ring appears to be outside the limits of the Breed Standard or the conditions of that class, such exhibitor may, before every dog has been individually examined and individually gaited, request that the judge weigh the dog, and the judge shall comply, provided the dog has not

been previously weighed during any competition at that show, excluding Sweeps, Futurity and other Special Attractions.

If the judge finds that the dog's weight is within the Breed Standard or the conditions of the class, s/he shall mark and initial the judge's book "Weighed in." If the judge finds that the dog's weight is outside the allowable limits of the Breed Standard, s/he shall disqualify the dog and mark and initial the judge's book "Weighed out - disqualified."

A dog that has thus been disqualified by three different judges may not again be shown.

If the judge finds that the dog's weight is not in accordance with the conditions of the class, s/he shall mark and initial the judge's book, "Weighed out - ineligible." A dog thus declared ineligible for its class or division shall be considered entered incorrectly and cannot be transferred to any other class at that show. A dog thus found ineligible by three different judges may not again be shown in that class. In subsequent shows, this dog may be entered in another class for which the dog meets the weight limit or transferred to an eligible Open Class per Chapter 11, Section 6.

In all cases, the judge shall use a scale with a platform of sufficient size as determined by the American Kennel Club to safely accommodate all applicable breeds. Section 3. In those breeds where certain color(s), pattern or markings are specified in the Breed Standard as disqualifications, or in any class or division of a class where certain color(s), pattern or markings are required, the judge shall determine if a dog is to be disqualified or declared to be ineligible for the class provided that such determination has not been previously made during competition at that show, excluding Sweeps, Futurity and other Special Attractions.

If, in the opinion of the judge, the dog's color(s), pattern or markings require disqualification, the judge shall disqualify the dog, and mark and initial the judge's book "Disqualified - Color (or Pattern or Markings)".

If, in the opinion of the judge, the dog's color(s) pattern or markings do not meet the requirements of the class or division of a class in which the dog is competing, the judge shall declare the dog ineligible to compete in that class or division of class, and, s/he shall mark and initial the judge's book, "Ineligible - Color (or Pattern or Markings)".

If, in the opinion of any competing exhibitor then in the ring, the color(s), pattern or markings of a dog in the ring are disqualifications under the Breed Standard or do not meet the requirements of the class or division of a class, such exhibitor may, before every dog in the ring has been individually examined and individually gaited, request that the judge render an opinion of the dog's color(s), pattern or markings, and the judge shall comply provided that such determination has not been previously made during competition at that show. If the judge finds that the dog's color(s), pattern or markings are disqualifications under the Breed Standard, the judge shall disqualify the dog and mark and initial the judge's book "Disqualified - Color (or Pattern or Markings)". A dog that has thus been disqualified by three different judges may not again be shown.

If the judge finds that the color(s), pattern or markings of the dog do not meet the requirements of the class or division specified by the breed standard, s/he shall mark and initial the judge's book, "Ineligible - Color (or Pattern or Markings)".

Any dog thus declared ineligible for its class shall be considered entered incorrectly and cannot be transferred to any other class or division at that show. In subsequent shows, this dog may be entered in another class for which the dog meets the requirements or transferred to an eligible Open Class per Chapter 11, Section 6.

Section 4. In those breeds where certain physical traits (ear carriage, coat length, etc.) are specified as a condition of a class or a division of a class, the judge has the authority to make a determination as to whether a dog meets those requirements. If the judge finds that the dog does not meet the requirements of the class, s/he shall mark and initial the judge's book, "Excused, ineligible for class." Any dog thus declared ineligible for a class or division of a class shall be considered to have been incorrectly entered and cannot be transferred to any other class or division at that show. In subsequent shows, this dog may be entered in or transferred to another class for which the dog meets the requirements or transferred to an eligible Open Class per Chapter 11, Section 6.

Chapter 14, Section 5

There was some discussion regarding this proposed amendment. Cindy Stansell proposed that the third sentence which states the number of wickets should be in italics. If more breeds are approved, more wickets may be needed. She suggested this be put in italics as policy so the Board can adjust the number as needed. **After additional discussion, it was agreed to table this proposed amendment until the September meeting.**

Item 5 - Chapter 3, Section 22

This item was submitted to staff for Board approval following the March meeting, and put on hold pending Parent Clubs Committee input. input. [Note: The Parent Clubs Committee approved the changes at their morning meeting.]

Item 6 - Chapter 11, Section 8

Cindy Stansell read the subcommittee's report on the request submitted by the Basset Hound Club of America to allow altered animals to compete in performance-based classes at independent specialties (attached as Exhibit A). She presented the key points from the report to the Parent Clubs Committee, and Cindy Miller reported that the Parent Clubs Committee rejected this proposal at its meeting. **Upon motion made by Cindy Stansell, seconded by Barbara Shaw, it was unanimously voted not to proceed with this proposal.**

Item 7 – Definition of Show Secretary

Bob Eisele, Suffolk County KC spoke on the need for definitions in the Dog Show Rules for a "day of show" secretary and an event secretary in Chapter 9. Discussion ensued on the distinctions. Cindy Stansell would like to see the breakdown of how many are used at shows. There was discussion about expanding the number of shows that can be superintended by show secretaries. Superintendents are required to provide, such as financial stability, trained personnel, insurance, equipment, etc., while show secretaries are not and there is no protection for the club. Cindy Miller will email Bri Tesarz and Gina DiNardo and ask them to research the trend of package shows versus traditional.

<u>Item 13 – Proposed Changes to Chapter 9</u>

Susan Hamil from the Canine Health Committee presented the proposed amendment to Chapter 11, Section 9. She noted that after an extensive review and discussion, it was agreed that every disease and diagnosis cannot be named. There could be an addendum to Best Practices in the Show Trial Manual to address more detailed information. It was noted how unwieldy and unenforceable this section is, and it was agreed that it is impossible to cover all possible situations. Guest veterinarians responded to questions and discussed the

issues and ramifications. An article in Club Resources, *Health Promotion and Infection Control Recommendations Applying to Dog Shows*, was mentioned, and it was agreed this should be added to the Show Trial Manual. Cindy Stansell felt there may be conflicts with Ch. 10, Sec. 5 and Ch. 15, Sec. 1 that needed to be reviewed and addressed prior to voting on this amendment. A subcommittee consisting of Cindy Stansell, Dr. Christensen, Dr. Gregory and Barbara Schwartz was appointed to review these issues and report back in September. The subcommittee will also review item 11 on the agenda, *Situations Regarding Dog Health at an AKC Event*.

<u>Item 8 – Bred by Exhibitor Puppy Class</u>

The request from the Rockford-Freeport, Illinois KC to add a Bred by Exhibitor Puppy Class was read. It was noted that the Committee has considered this proposal many times. The comments on this included if the puppy is good enough to win, he should be entered in the Bred by Class; the puppy still has to compete against adults to win the points. One suggestion was to add an extra box on the entry form that the breeder/owner could check so the points would count towards the BBE Medallion. **Upon motion by Robert Scholl**, **seconded by Johnny Shoemaker**, it was unanimously voted not to take any further action on this proposal.

Item 9 – Wickets and Scales

This was addressed under Item 4 – Chapter 14, Section 5

Item 10 - Judges Stewarding

Johnny Shoemaker discussed the policy in *Rules, Policies and Guidelines for Conformation Dog Show Judges* which prohibits judges from stewarding at shows they are officiating. He felt it should be allowed in certain situations; for example, when a judge is judging at an allbreed show, but an independent specialty show needs a steward and each show has a separate catalog. The judge would not have access to the all-breed catalog. **After some discussion, upon motion by Johnny Shoemaker, seconded by Barbara Schwartz, it was voted to request the Board consider amending the Judges Guidelines to allow judges to steward at an event with a separate catalog from an event the judge will officiate (five in favor, two opposed).**

Item 12 – Chapter 3, Section 17 - Brace/Team Class Ownership Requirement
There was discussion on the request of the Cairn Terrier Club of America to eliminate the requirement to have at least one common owner. Upon motion by Barbara Shaw, seconded by Cindy Stansell, it was unanimously voted to take no further action on this request.

Item 14 – Streamlining Premium Lists

Joy Brewster of Greenwich KC submitted a request to review AKC required information for premium lists in an effort to reduce the number of pages and the costs for duplicative information. Donna Gilbert discussed the issues on behalf of Joy. Bri Tesarz has requested information from the superintendents on what they believe is required by AKC to be included in the premium lists. It was agreed that the Committee should wait until Bri has recommended changes after her discussion with the superintendents. Cindy Miller will discuss this with Bri.

<u>Item 15 – Suggestions to Shorten Processing Time for Entries, etc.</u>

Cindy Miller read the email from Janet Mitchell of Channel City KC. There was discussion on entry closing dates, preparation of the judging program and dealing with overdraws, which all impact the closing date. Overloads can have a significant impact on processing the judging schedule. There were some suggestions on ways to shorten time. A number of suggestions were discussed. Day of show entries were mentioned. Cindy Miller noted that once counts were out, there would be double entries. If a change of judge, you could enter under one you like that day. We have no control over day of show entries – that would be up to staff and superintendents who will drive this type of change. One recommendation was to develop a pilot program. Cindy asked if anyone was willing to look at this, and will table it until we hear from Janet Mitchell. Duane Butherus felt there needs to be a working group over time – AKC staff, experienced show chairs, superintendent experience and technical support. He sees a future with no paper. Cindy will contact Bri Tesarz and let her know that Kenny Saenz, Dr. Garvin, Carmen Battaglia and Duane Butherus will begin discussion on exploring possibilities for the future.

<u>Item 16 - Eligible vs Entered - Chapter 11, Section 11</u>

This item was presented by Ann Lettis, Grand River KC. The request was to consider changing the word "eligible" to "entered" in Chapter 11, Section 11. Cindy Miller noted that she discussed this with Bri Tesarz, who was not in favor of this change. One of the concerns expressed by Ann Lettis was prohibiting spectators from attending a dog show with their unentered dogs, as well as the potential liability posed by unentered dogs. It was noted that the premium list can be worded "no unentered dogs" on the grounds.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:30 p.m.

Re: Altered dogs in "purpose-bred non-regular" classes at Independent

Specialties

This concept came to the both the Dog Shows Rules Committee and the Parent Club Committee via Sports and Events Staff on February 14, 2019. A rule change to Chapter 11, Section 8 was suggested by Sports and Events staff. We were informed that this was generated by the Basset Hound Club of America. Interestingly, the delegate for the Basset Hound Club of America has **not** come to the Dog Show Rules Committee to support this concept.

The March 2019 DSR Committee formed a subcommittee to consider the issue. The suggested Rule change would be to Chapter 11, Section 8: Neutered dogs and spayed bitches would be allowed to compete in Veterans and purpose-bred non-regular Classes only at independent specialties...

The Subcommittee is opposed to this rule change for the following reasons:

- 1. The slippery slope continues to erode the purpose of dog shows "to evaluate breeding stock." The exhibition of altered dogs and spayed bitches does not evaluate breeding stock.
- 2. Another venue exists to showcase these dogs. Specialties may have special attractions that showcase these dogs.
- 3. Dog Show Rules Committee has considered similar concepts in the past. We thank Linda Flynn who kindly provided the subcommittee with the many times when the DSR committee has considered this concept.
- 4. In some breeds, such as the Siberian Husky, the sled dog classes are closely scrutinized by breeders looking for future generations of working/showing dogs. The fact that those dogs are eligible for the class due to their parent club title shows that they actually have the ability to perform the original function. To allow altered animals in this class, defeats the main purpose of the class, which is to present outstanding working dogs who may be selected to produce future generations like themselves.
- 5. What is a "purpose-bred non-regular class"? Sheila Goffe in her response to the question stated that "this should not extend to classes that highlight companion events such as agility or obedience that are open to all breeds."
- 6. There is no definition of a "purpose-bred non-regular class." In order to have a Rule, there **must** be a definition. This cannot be readily nor easily answered.

One definition could be AKC prefix titles such as Amateur Field Champion, Field Champion, Grand Field Champion, and Herding Champion. Yet prefix titles would also include Agility Grand Champion which Sheila Goffe said should not be included. The same problem occurs with AKC suffix titles. Neither of these include Sled Dog which Sheila cited as an acceptable inclusion. This is found in non-AKC Parent club titles. We looked at Parent club titles and did not find consistency there either. The Siberian Husky Club has sled dog titles and the Basset Hound Club has man-trailing titles on this list. However, 32 breeds have "temperament testing" as a Parent Club recognized title. Since temperament testing is open to all breeds, Sheila recommends that things open to all breeds should not be included.

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7. This rule would unfairly discriminate against the Toy and Non-Sporting breeds. We believe that rules should be written so that all breeds may participate. Since the original purpose of Bulldogs was to Bull-bait, and Bull-baiting was banned years ago, Bulldogs could not be eligible for any "purpose-bred" classes. What about the purpose of Toy breeds to be companions? How do you assess their abilities to be a companion? Through CGC evaluations which are open to all breeds?

Field Trial and Hunting Test Events Committee June 10, 2019

The meeting was called to order at 1:05 p.m. on June 10, 2019 by acting Chair, Florence Duggan. Dr. Diane Brown of AKC/CHF handed out the 2019 Research Grants Portfolio. She highlighted a new Tickborne disease grant to use molecular tools to better diagnose, and one that will seek to determine who will develop Lyme nephritis. There is an epilepsy grant that will examine genetics and nutrition and how bacteria in the gut may affect the brain. A new grant will look at diet-associated cardiomyopathy. This is independent of any food company. It is a \$200,000 grant and needs funding. It appears that the common thread may be so-called boutique diets with proteins like kangaroo. They are looking for canine subjects. The study is being conducted in Florida. Other research Dr. Brown highlighted included heartworm, leptospirosis, Chagis disease, brucellosis and muscular-skeletal issues in performance dogs. Dr. Brown was very enthusiastic about a hemangiosarcoma study evaluating propranolol which has been shown to decrease the spread of angiosarcoma in humans. There have been positive outcomes in test tubes with canine cells.

There are three upcoming CHF webinars: July 18 – Canine Flu October 17 – Degenerative Myelopathy November 20 – Effects of early spay/neuter

The Parent Club Canine Health Conference will be August 9-11 in St. Louis. There will be a round table after each speaker and 30 veterinary students will be in attendance. Theriogenology residents will also attend.

There are three bloat studies wrapping up. Before any more research investment is made, Dr. Brown wants to see the outcomes of these studies. While a marker was found for Great Danes, Dr. Brown would like to see the marker identified in another breed. Dr. J. Brad Case has developed emergency methods for decompression before the dog can get to the vet. This will be on the CHF website soon.

Also new on the website are outcome publications associated with grants.

For any Parent Club National, CHF will customize outcome materials based on what research the club has sponsored.

Our Board Liaison, Chris Sweetwood, spoke to us about the Detection Dog Program and the new Service Dog Program. The Detection Dog Program has requested 100 dogs – Labs and GSPs – as these are the breeds preferred by TSA. Several litters will be born over the next few months. All dogs are health tested. Dogs are trained on a compound called UDC which is a manufactured chemical that exists no where else. Then the dogs are trained on drugs and explosives. There will be a Detection Dog Conference in August. The Service Dog program has been set up as a 501(c)(3) under the America Access Dog Coalition. Service dogs will need an ID card to get on a plane, go to a restaurant, etc. Owners will need an in-person visit to a doctor for a prescription to obtain a dog. Dogs will need to pass an AKC-administered test given by CGC evaluators to get the ID card. Recertification will be required every two years. No more comfort dogs allowed on airplanes. Start-up will be five to seven months. The best guess is that there are approximately 12,000 service dogs in the U.S.

There was discussion about an email that went around indicating that drones would be allowed at Hunt Tests. This is not the case and no such provision has been allowed by the Board or staff. A drone may be used to gather footage for an AKC informational film at an upcoming event, but drones will not be allowed in other circumstances.

The sub-committee that will review "Field Trial Rules and Standard Procedure for Pointing Breeds" did not have a chance to begin this project but will meet at the conclusion of this meeting.

The Hunting Test Pointing Breed Advisory Committee does not meet anymore (staff decision). Doug meets with some of the Field Trial Advisory Committee people. There were comments that perhaps our committee is the place for these types of discussions. There was also discussion about the Advisory Committees having no standing to propose rule changes. Only Board, staff and delegate committees are allowed to do that. There was further discussion about whether advisory committees are useful.

A fun day was sponsored by a club and there were dogs in attendance that had kennel cough. Bob Rynkiewicz spoke from the floor and indicated that Hunt Test Rules do not contain any warning about contagious animals. It is in Field Trial Rules. The consensus is that all Rules and Regulations should contain the standard paragraph about contagious disease. [Secretary's Note: At the Coordinating Committee, this issue was addressed by the Canine Health Committee and it is in the process of being resolved.]

Elise Wright spoke about the proposed change to retrieving points for GSPs, GWPs, Weims and Vizslas. She was concerned that the Board was leaning toward approving and option that was different than that agreed upon by the clubs. This will be discussed at the July Board meeting, but Chris did not feel that the Board would force this decision.

Florence gave a report on the Breed Sustainability Committee. There were 42 people in attendance. Larry Sorensen brought a Dachshund Club display board that his club had made to draw people in to the show. He also had examples of a postcard they had made up to give out club contact information. Alan Kalter spoke about how most breeds, with exception of the top 10, suffer similar problems. Fewer breeders are producing fewer puppies. There needs to be an emphasis on getting more breeders to breed more good dogs. Also, breeders need to see that all puppies in their litters get registered. Judges education exists for almost all clubs. Why not implement a similar program to mentor and educate breeders? We should also strive to get more people into Parent and Local Breed clubs. This committee will meet again in September. This was not intended to be permanent and a final report will be available at the conclusion.

Doug Ljungren joined us with his customary handout. Traditional field event entries are down overall 2.6 percent. Only Retriever Hunt Tests showed an increase. Airedales are now allowed to compete in Retriever Hunt Tests. Introduction videos to highlight purpose-bred dogs at Hunt Tests are being filmed and will be available on the AKC website. Retriever Hunt Tests were filmed in April and Pointing Breed Hunt Test footage will be gathered in June. Drones will be allowed for the filming process ONLY and must be preapproved by AKC.

Doug clarified that the Board would be discussing the new point schedule for retrieving and that the option under discussion isinglass fact the one agreed upon by the three clubs, where receiving credit is given depending on the size of the stake.

The Achiever Dog certificate will not be awarded any more. There were 33,000 certificates issued and the program did not motivate people to participate. So, the AKC is exploring new programs for the purpose-bred dog and versatile dogs. First up will be a program for purpose-bred dogs. Dogs will need some type of qualification in breed, performance events and temperament. (AKC will have its own temperament test in October.) Non-AKC working tests will not be recognized. There is discussion about this being the first suffix title after the dog's name. The program could evolve as a step program — Beginner, Advanced ad Excellent. Comments are being taken at purposebredogs@AKC.org. The Versatility program will not be a title for earning titles. It will probably also have stepped levels — Beginner, Advanced and Excellent. There would be a significant degree of difficulty involved. Doug pointed to the current Versatile Companion Dog program where only 100 dogs per year qualify for a combination of tracking, obedience and agility. The Versatility program would compete with UKC's "The Total Dog."

The meeting adjourned at 3:30 PM.

AMERICAN KENNEL CLUB Delegates Meeting June 11, 2019

Dennis Sprung, President in the Chair, called the meeting to order at 10:02 a.m.

Mr. Sprung: Will everyone please rise for the National Anthem. (National Anthem played).

Mr. Sprung: If there is any Delegate present who has not given his or her name to one of the operators at the computers outside the meeting room, please be sure to do so. The Chair would like to introduce the persons seated with me on the dais. On my immediate left is the Chairman, William J. Feeney. To his left is the Vice Chair, Patricia M. Cruz. To my right is Joan Corbisiero, Professional Registered Parliamentarian. To her right is Gina DiNardo, our Executive Secretary. And to Ms. DiNardo's right is Todd DeSimone, the Court Reporter.

It is my sad duty to announce the passing of Louis Auslander on May 6, 2019. Lou was a Miniature Schnauzer and Whippet breeder. In 1969, he became a Judge. He held various officer roles with the International Kennel Club of Chicago, including being Delegate from 1982 to 2009. An advocate for benched shows, Auslander believed in this opportunity to educate the public about dogs. Mr. Auslander joined the AKC Board in 1983. He was Chairman from 1987 to 1992 and also was President in 1991 and 1992, the only person to ever hold both positions.

Condolences are offered in the passing of Dr. Robert Smith on May 25, 2019. Bob was the Delegate for the Huntington Kennel Club from 1996 to 2002, then for the Memphis Kennel Club from 2008 to 2013 and most recently the Virginia Kennel Club since 2018. He was a breeder of American Foxhounds and Welsh Terriers, and he won several Owner-Handler Best in Shows. He was actively involved with local clubs across the country, as well as the American Foxhound Club, the Welsh Terrier Club of America and the American Brussels Griffon Association. Dr. Smith was an All-Breed judge since 1969, he served two terms on your Board of Directors from 1997 to 2002 and 2009 to 2013.

Mr. Sprung: Thank you, and a sincere welcome to all of the new Delegates.

The minutes of the March 12, 2019 Delegates meeting were published in the online April 2019 AKC Gazette and the complete transcript was posted on the Delegates Portal on AKC's website. If there are no corrections, the minutes will stand approved as published. Hearing there are no corrections, the minutes stand approved.

The next item on the agenda is the approval of a new member club. The following club has been approved by the Board of Directors and will be voted on at this meeting. Champlain Valley Kennel Club. In accordance with the Bylaws, a written ballot shall be required, if requested in writing by at least five Delegates, made to the Executive Secretary of the AKC, seven days prior to the start of the meeting at which such election is scheduled. The Chair has been advised by the Executive Secretary that no such request has been made, therefore we will vote today. An affirmative vote of four-fifths of all Delegates is required to elect.

The question is the election of the Champlain Valley Kennel Club as a member of The American Kennel Club. Those in favor, please raise your hand. Thank you. Those opposed, please raise your hand. Thank you. There are four-fifths in the affirmative. The Chair declares that the Champlain Valley Kennel Club has been duly elected a member of the great American Kennel Club.

The Chairman's report which highlights AKC's successes and positive messaging will be distributed to the Delegates via e-mail immediately following the meeting. It will also be available on the Delegate Portal on AKC.org.

Next on the agenda is the President's report. The Chair calls upon Brandi Hunter, our Vice President of Public Relations and Communications, and Melissa Olund, Director of Digital Marketing, to share firsthand information with you on the Chairman's message.

Ms. Hunter: Thank you and good morning. Can everybody hear me? I am Brandi Hunter, Vice President of Public Relations and Communications for the American Kennel Club, and it is a pleasure to be in front of you guys yet again. Today I wanted to just share with you some of the ways we have increased our messaging, our audience and our value in the media space. So just a little bit about what we do. The Communications Department, we execute media pitching, we get our story to the proper media outlets, a various amount of outlets, so it would be print, television, radio, online, digital, and we really carry our story to the media and the public and we also do reputation and strategic management, i.e. crisis management. We keep some of those stories way down low. Some of our key messaging is the work of the AKC and how it benefits all dogs, value of the purebred dog and registration, the importance of breeders in choice of pet acquisition, promoting the sport and its value to dog owners, the benefit of our expertise to dog owners and responsible dog ownership, are our flagship messaging. These are some high-level stats for 2018. We did 22,937 clips. That is a lot of volume for the AKC. We are up about 4.5 percent year over year. We are about 4.5 percent higher than 2017. Our media value is appraised at \$20 billion. That is from our independent media monitoring service, Cision, which is an international corporation. They do a lot of Fortune 500 companies and we are one of their clients as well. Our audience has grown in the last 10 years from an average of 1.3 billion to an average of 17 billion. There are not 17 billion people on the planet, but the average news consumer goes between three to five outlets per day, if you are a high news consumer like me, I'm at 12 to 20 a day, to seek out their news. They are seeing us in various spaces, not just traditional news spaces, but lifestyle spaces. If you go on People.com or you like Rachael Ray or O Magazine, we are also in those spaces, which are important to dog owners. And our sentiment for 2018 was about 46.5 percent positive, 51 percent neutral, and 2.5 percent negative. The neutral is not a bad number. It could very well be counted to positive but for transparency we will call it neutral. That is when we are being cited. They want our expertise. They want a quote from our chief veterinary officer. They are citing the breed if they are talking about particular breeds and stories. So, they are still using our information in the stories. This, please don't try and read it, it is not going to be beneficial to try and read it, but this is what I look at and our team looks at on a regular basis. This is what for Q1 of 2019 our sentiment looked like. We are a little higher in our positivity and our neutrality. Our negativity is very low. That red line you see across the bottom means that we are not being targeted, we are not being written about in a negative space, we are not being accused of anything, so we are not seeing a high volume of media talking negatively about the AKC at all. This is another view of sentiment. As you can see, the bulk of our stories are specifically about the AKC and then we have our most popular announcement which gives us a lot of traffic. The Museum of the Dog which has done really well this year and we are happy to have that back, Canine Health Foundation, government relations, compliance, and other topics make up the remainder, but for the most part people are writing about the AKC. That's where most of our clips are coming from specifically. Here are some high-level numbers for some events. As you know, we hold three major ones, well, two major ones really and that's a major announcement for us. So, our numbers are really high. Over 3 billion impressions for national championship. our media value is high, our clip volumes are high. By contrast, if you look at the average nonprofit or not for profit, they are mentioned about 31 times per day nationally in a high news cycle. We average about 63 at this point. So, we are doing well above the curve. We are doing it in a positive manner and we are getting our information out there and our expertise out there to the proper audiences. Here are some of the places we are being seen. This is just in about the past 90 days as a matter of fact. New York Times, CNN are really high level, but we also do a lot of local and regional press as well, specifically around shows, legislation, we help GR out a lot to ensure that our message is reaching down and we are going down the funnel. So, if you are not consuming these at a high level but you are consuming it at a regional or local level, we are still making an impact. Here are some of the ways in which we are being covered.

Again, don't try and read this. But we honored George W. Bush's dog Sully for the Paw of Courage. We got a lot of high-level national press on that. It also put us in some different conversations about how we celebrate working dogs which was really great. Pet disaster relief trailers are always excellent stories of how we are out there for dog owners in times of turmoil. The Museum of the Dog got a lot of coverage, and the Southern Living clip you see in the bottom here, that is a lot of how we get covered, how often should you feed your dog, how often should you wash your dog's bowl, best leashes for your dog, best practices, how do I train my dog. We get a lot of requests like that that come through our experts, so we are able to add ourselves to a very useful conversation for dog owners who are not necessarily in the sport. So far in Q1 we have had our national championship winner on Good Morning America for the second year in a row. They have already invited us back for a third. We are really excited about that. We have executed a major press campaign for the Museum of the Dog, over 1,500 articles on the museum in 14 different languages around the world and we are still counting. We are still seeing an average of 15 to 20 clips on the museum a day. So, we are really excited and we are about to start full court press for the next exhibit. We are up almost 3,000 clips from this time last year. So last year we were at 9,223. This year we are at over 12,000. We are trending ahead for the year. We announced new breeds and had the largest number of clips surrounding AKC Meet the Breeds in 2019. We were up about 7 percent there. We began to syndicate our content with our Chief Veterinary Officer, including him in our McClatchey, which is an article we create every week and serve to 600 media outlets. He is being viewed as an expert there and solidified him as a trusted resource in all things dog. He has actually told me he has 20 or so requests a week and he is trying to get through them as fast as he can, so he is doing a lot of good work for the AKC. Built new relationships and working with national outlets. There were some roadblocks we had before. We don't have them now. We have seen a lot of volume with places that two years ago even we weren't able to get a response from. We are very encouraged there. AARP was one of them, The Today Show was one of them. So, we are breaking some good ground. Other accomplishments. We distributed over 110 press releases and media alerts for the year 2018. This year we will be a little bit higher. We will be at about 140. 52 weekly articles to over 600 newspapers. We create a weekly newsletter that goes to 86,000 people and helped developed content for The Nibble which goes to over 1,000,000 users per month. And we also manage media relations for the AKC Humane Fund, Museum of the Dog, and Reunite, as well as building content with our chief veterinary officer that goes on our social properties, AKC.org. And we are increasing his presence at veterinary conferences, so we are adding our voices to those conversations as well. And that is all I have for you guys today. Now I will turn it over to Melissa Olund, our Director of Digital Marketing, for her presentation.

Ms. Olund: Hello. This is my first time speaking to a room this large of dog people, so a little positive reinforcement at the end would be lovely. I'm speaking to you today about AKC Marketing and what we do. We have three key goals in the AKC Marketing Department. I'm just going to go ahead and read them to you. Number one, we want to increase ownership and registration of purebred dogs. We want to increase awareness and participation in AKC sports and events. And we want to improve dog lovers' perception of the AKC, generally, both part of the fancy and the average person who has a pet dog at home. There are three key things that we do in order to sort of advance those goals, one of which, probably one of the most important, is breed education. So, sharing our breed expertise as the AKC is key to driving that ownership and registration of purebred dogs. We want to engage people with messaging that connects them, spurs them to action, when it comes to the world of purebred dogs. We want to reach them while they are searching for the right breed for their lifestyle and educate them and connect them to responsible breeders and inspire them to do more with the dogs that they end up acquiring. AKC.org is one of the key ways that we do this and that is our website for

everybody who has been there. We average 8 million users per month and that's a lovely number that is increasing. Our organic search traffic on AKC.org is up nearly 40 percent year over year. So that speaks to how we are really doing a great job of reaching people while they are in that behavior of looking for information about dogs and about breeds and about what to do with their dogs. And just a few examples of how we have kind of brought this great education to life, our puppy pack, we have two photos here, Gideon on top and then Nymeria on the bottom, they follow the lives of these puppies in their first year and show all the different things that go into raising a puppy of the different particular purebreds. I have a short clip here, there is no audio, but it is an example of how we are doing more on Instagram to really drive the breed of the day program that we run. That is a little trivia about Pembroke Welsh Corgis. So people, you know, who follow us on Instagram, they may not know that much about Corgis or they might feel they are an expert on Corgis, but either way, when they get done with our trivia they will have engaged with and learn information about Pembrokes and learn something new. Sports and events really allow us to bring some exciting and inspiring stories to our constituency, both the fancy and the average pet dog owner. It is a rich source of digital content for us, whether we are at an event, whether we are, you know, seeing things that people are posting on social media about their participation in an event. It really is one of those things that you can't really replicate. You've got to see it to believe it sometimes with dog sports and events. So, a lot of the video that we do on social media and on site is based on sports events, and we can see that, you know, with 28 million just year to date video views on Facebook alone, it is a really rich way for us to reach people and get them excited about doing more with their dogs. Some examples of how we bring this to life, our videos, as Doug mentioned, there is explainer videos that kind of serve to demystify some of our different sports so that people can see something, say my dog can do that, you know, and learn how to get involved. I'm one of them. I just did my first Fast CAT over the weekend, so hooray. We also do some live coverage of our National Championships. We went to the Rally and Agility and Obedience championships and did live coverage with all the people who were participating, sharing the results and interviewing the winners as they came out of the ring. They were all very excited to be featured and shown to our social media audiences. So, I'm going to show you right here a quick, video of one of our junior handler spotlights. This is a program that we are also doing every month. We are featuring a different junior handler. This young lady, when we met her, she was 11 years old, she is 12 now I believe. Her name is Brielle. We met her at the Progressive Dog Club Toy Specialty Show. And I think you will enjoy this video.

Ms. Olund: I'm glad you enjoyed that. Brand perception is another key way that we in the Marketing Department are aiming to increase the profile of AKC. As we continue to expand our reach to dog lovers everywhere we are successfully communicating the value and the important work of AKC on a greater scale than ever before. I think one key thing that is really, really important for everybody to understand is that our social media reach is growing. It is bigger than it has ever been. We just broke the 4 million mark on total followers, and that's a huge number. But the key thing to know about that is that some social media platforms are actually plateauing. So, they are not growing at the same rate that we are. We are growing faster than their user base is growing. So that's a very positive signal as to how engaged people are when we are speaking to them on social media. Email also targets our core constituency. I know Doug mentioned this as well. Our email reach grew 10 percent in 2018 with 138 million emails sent across over 1,000 campaigns. Other areas where we are growing the brand perception is by increasing our social media community management. That means we are out there answering people's questions on social media, we are talking to people, we are giving them tips and tricks and making sure that they know how to find the things that they

are looking for. So, we are not just letting people talk about us, we are actually talking with people, and we see a lot of great feedback when we do that. We are also expanding Facebook groups. That's a key part of how Facebook is moving forward and so we want to be on that cutting edge with them. That's all I've got. Actually, one more slide, my fault. Positive reinforcement. We know the Marketing and Communications Department impacts the AKC in many ways beyond our key goals. We have increased our brand awareness, we have enhanced our corporate reputation, and we have measurable public understanding of how AKC serves dog lovers everywhere. Just as a side example, our social media sentiment, the positive sentiment is 88 percent on average and that's an incredibly strong number. That means when people are talking about us, they are talking about us in a positive way, sharing things that they have done over the weekend, a new title that they won. So, it really has a great impact on that, you know, social sentiment that we see out there. And that's all I've got. Thank you so much.

Mr. Sprung: Thank you, Brandi and Melissa. So well done and appreciated. The Chair calls on Joe Baffuto for the financial report.

Mr. Baffuto: Good morning to you, the AKC Delegate body. It is with great privilege and pleasure that I present to you our unaudited financial results through April 30, 2019. It has been an efficient and productive first four months of our fiscal year and I am confident that we will be able to continue our successes moving forward through the remaining balance of 2019. Let's begin with a summary of our revenue and expenses. Our income statement reflects just under \$25.7 million in total revenue and \$23.8 million in total expenses, for an impressive operating income of \$1.78 million. During the first four months of the 2018 year we recorded \$25.1 million in revenue, with \$24.3 million in expenses, for \$819,000 of operating income. From our summary, now let's reflect on our core registration volumes. We continue with positive upward trends for both litters and dogs at a 3 percent and 2 percent mark respectively. Thanks go to our remarkable staff supporting the registry and the mission of the AKC. Focusing next on the revenue side of our operational equation, we are representing a \$555,000 increase in total revenue as of the four months ended April 30, 2019. Subsequently, we can drill down into this 2.2 percent increase. With a concentrated and targeted focus from our Board of Directors and executive management, our registration programs are succeeding. Most particularly, dogs, litters and pedigrees have each had positive variances of approximately \$200,000 this year to date over prior year results. Also, our core concentration of sports and events have been highly successful to date this year, outperforming last year's revenue results by approximately \$347,000. Registrations and sports and events are what we do and in 2019 we are continuing to do it right. Transitioning to the expenses side of the equation, we have controlled our costs this year by \$414,000, in comparison to the period ended April 30, 2018. There are a handful of contributing factors to this 1.7 percent favorable decrease, so let's further evaluate. First off, payroll and benefits. Our current full-time equivalent head count of 354 has increased by 4 percent since last year. However, we have been able to decrease our total payroll and associated benefits by \$151,000 in 2019 measured against 2018 levels. Next, our consulting costs have decreased by \$515,000 in a year over year comparison. Several functions and programs throughout the organization have contributed to the year to date decrease, including our New York office relocation activities from 2018, along with the timing of some of our marketing and technology efforts this year. Next, our equipment and maintenance and rental costs. Equipment, maintenance and rental have dropped by \$129,000 or more than 30 percent in comparison to the same period last year. This can be attributed mainly to our purchasing efforts and technology operations team working hard to negotiate favorable maintenance contracts for services and equipment. Lastly, our postage costs have decreased by about \$75,000 or almost 8 percent below last year's

level at the same time. We regularly conduct internal reviews of our division level spending and we expect to closely monitor our costs through the remainder of 2019. Observing our financial results independent of our operating activities, we can note our investment performance year to date which presented significant unrealized gains. The portfolio had a 10.7 percent rate of return in the first four months of 2019 which valued at approximately \$10.8 million and outperformed our benchmark for the period by a full 100 basis points. Our balance sheet indicates the long-term fiscal power of our organization. As of April 30, 2019, we are exhibiting total assets of \$180 million, with \$109.7 million in total liabilities. As we can see here, these are both significant multimillion dollar increases over the prior year. The difference between our total assets and total liabilities are our unrestricted net assets. Let's take a deeper dive into the composition of the unrestricted net assets. Our operating reserve of just under \$42 million represents approximately 50 percent of our operating budget, while solidifying the functioning continuity of our business if there were a significant disaster impacting our capabilities to operate the organization for an extended period of time. Our investment in property, plant and equipment of \$25.4 million represents the value of our technology equipment, furniture, fixtures and leasehold improvements. You will note this has increased significantly by more than \$15 million since 2018 due to the completion of our new headquarters at 101 Park Avenue in New York, along with completed renovations to our operations facility in Raleigh, North Carolina. The underfunded status of \$60.5 million for our pension and post-retirement plans represents the combined shortfall from our long-term liabilities to these benefit plans. Lastly, the \$63.4 million of our AKC Board designated funds allows us to make long-term decisions which will continue to help us succeed in supporting our core mission. The complete deck which I have presented to you here will be available on the Delegates Portal by the close of business tomorrow for you to communicate to your clubs. Also, if there are any questions, please note my e-mail address and feel free to contact me. Have a wonderful summer season and we will see you again in September.

Mr. Sprung: Thank you, Joe.

Today's first vote is on Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 11, Section 4 - Dog Show Entries, Conditions of Dog Affecting Eligibility, which would only change the format of the section. The amendment was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. The question is on Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 11, Section 4. Is there discussion?

Those in favor, please stand. Thank you, be seated. Those opposed, please stand. There are two-thirds in the affirmative and the amendment is adopted.

The next vote is on the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 11, Section 12 - Dog Show Entries, Conditions of Dog Affecting Eligibility, which would change the italicized portion of the section to be part of the rule. The amendment was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. The question is on Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 11, Section 12. Is there any discussion?

The Chair recognized Sue Goldberg, Delegate for the Lewiston-Auburn Kennel Club, who spoke as follows:

Ms. Goldberg: Sue Goldberg, Lewiston-Auburn Kennel Club. Before the vote is taken, I have been asked to read an excellent statement that is a clarification written by our own staff liaison, Gina DiNardo, that is designed to clarify and alleviate any misconceptions or misunderstandings. It reads in part: "There is no change to the verbiage, interpretation or the

enforcement of the policy as it exists today. An individual serving as a show secretary is not a superintendent and is not held to the 30 days before or after a show restriction. The reference in Chapter 11, Section 12, references the eligibility of a show secretary or superintendent to exhibit as agent or handler for any dog owned or co-owned by them to be entered in the event." The last three paragraphs of this section are clear that they apply only to superintendents, employees of superintendents, and those household members of the aforementioned individuals. Thank you.

Mr. Sprung: The question is on the floor. Those in favor, please stand. Thank you. Be seated. Those opposed, please stand. There are two-thirds in the affirmative and the amendment is adopted.

The third vote is on the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 11, Section 13 - Dog Show Entries, Conditions of Dog Affecting Eligibility, which would change the section to be gender neutral, changes the first two paragraphs of italics to become part of the rule and adds clarification. The amendment was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. The question is on Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 11, Section 13. Is there any discussion?

Those in favor, please stand. Thank you. Be seated. Those opposed, please stand. Thank you. There are two-thirds in the affirmative and the amendment is adopted.

The next vote is on the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 14, Section 8 - Measuring, Weighing and Color Determinations When Factors of Disqualification in Breed Standards or Eligibility Under Conditions of a Class or Division of a Class Cancellations of Awards, which would reword the section only. The amendment was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. The question is on Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 14, Section 8. Is there any discussion?

Those in favor, please stand. Thank you. Be seated. Those opposed, please stand. There are two-thirds in the affirmative and the amendment is adopted.

The fifth vote is on the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 16, Section 6 - Championships, which would change the italicized portion of the section to be part of the rule. The amendment was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. The question is on Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 16, Section 6. Is there any discussion?

Those in favor, please stand. Thank you. Be seated. Those opposed, please stand. There are two-thirds in the majority and the amendment is adopted.

The last vote is on the Field Trial Rules and Standard Procedure for Retrievers Chapter 14, Section 4, which would end the possibility for dogs to run as the first dog of a series more than once at the same stake at the same trial. The amendment was proposed by the Retriever Field Trial Advisory Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. The question is on Field Trial Rules and Standard Procedure for Retrievers Chapter 14, Section 4. Is there any discussion?

Those in favor, please stand. Thank you. Be seated. Those opposed, please stand. There are two-thirds in the affirmative. This amendment is adopted.

The Chair now calls on the Executive Secretary to read the proposed amendment to the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 7, Section 12 - Judges.

Ms. DiNardo: This amendment is to the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 7, Section 12 - Judges, which allows clubs to efficiently close out a ring on the day. This amendment was proposed by the AKC Board of Directors, endorsed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. It will be published in two issues of the AKC Gazette and you will be asked to vote on it at the September 2019 meeting. The full text is on the worksheet previously e-mailed.

Mr. Sprung: Are there any questions on the proposed amendment?

The Chair now calls on the Executive Secretary to read the proposed amendment to the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 14, Section 2 - Measuring, Weighing and Color Determinations When Factors of Disqualification in Breed Standards or Eligibility Under Conditions of a Class or Division of a Class Cancellations of Awards.

Ms. DiNardo: This amendment is to the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 14, Section 2 - Measuring, Weighing and Color Determinations When Factors of Disqualification in Breed Standards or Eligibility Under Conditions of a Class or Division of a Class Cancellations of Awards, which would reword the section to incorporate broader language regarding the display of identification by a person or dog exhibiting. This amendment was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. It will be published in two issues of the AKC Gazette and you will be asked to vote on it at the September 2019 meeting. The full text is on the worksheet previously e-mailed.

Mr. Sprung: Are there any questions on the proposed amendment?

The Chair now calls on the Executive Secretary to read the proposed amendment to the Rules Applying to Dog Shows, Chapter 14, Section 9 - Measuring, Weighing and Color Determinations When Factors of Disqualification in Breed Standards or Eligibility Under Conditions of a Class or Division of a Class Cancellations of Awards.

Ms. DiNardo: This amendment is to the Rules Applying to Dog Shows Chapter 14, Section 9 - Measuring, Weighing and Color Determinations When Factors of Disqualification in Breed Standards or Eligibility Under Conditions of a Class or Division of a Class Cancellations of Awards, which permits move-ups to occur when an award has been disallowed in non-regular classes and also in groups; it further reiterates that this will occur when Best in Show is cancelled. This amendment was proposed by the Delegate Dog Show Rules Committee and brought forward with approval from the AKC Board of Directors. It will be published in two issues of the AKC Gazette and you will be asked to vote on it at the September 2019 meeting. The full text is on the worksheet previously e-mailed.

Mr. Sprung: Are there any questions on this amendment?

The Chair now calls on the Executive Secretary to read a list of vacancies for the Delegate Committees that are to be filled in September.

Ms. DiNardo: These are the vacancies on Delegate committees that are to be filled at the September Delegate meeting:

All-Breeds Clubs Committee: Four, three-year terms.

Bylaws Committee: Four, three-year terms and one, one-year term.

Canine Health Committee: Four, three-year terms and one, two-year term.

Companion Events Committee: Four, three-year terms and one, two-year term.

Delegate Advocacy and Advancement Committee: Four, three-year terms and one, one-year term.

Dog Show Rules Committee: Four, three-year terms.

Field Trial and Hunting Test Events Committee: Four, three-year terms.

Herding, Earthdog, and Coursing Events Committee: Four, three-year terms and one, one-year term.

Parent Clubs Committee: Four, three-year terms.

Perspectives Editorial Staff: One, one-year term and six, two-year terms.

Mr. Sprung: Delegates will be e-mailed self-nomination forms by the end of June. The self-nomination form must be returned to the Executive Secretary by Friday, July 19, 2019. Questions on the procedures to be followed should also be directed to the Executive Secretary.

Delegates may only self-nominate for one committee, except that a member of the Perspectives Editorial Staff may also serve on another standing committee. In August, the Delegates will be e-mailed the nominees for each committee and their qualification statements with the September Delegates meeting notification.

The Chair calls on Sheila Goffe, Vice President of Government Relations, to make a special presentation.

Ms. Goffe: I am very pleased this morning to read to you a resolution honoring David Helming. Whereas, David Helming joined the AKC Board of Directors of the American Kennel Club Political Action Committee in January 2011 and served through March 2019.

Whereas, David Helming first joined the AKC Delegate body in 2006 representing the Hutchinson Kennel Club and was again elected as a Delegate for the Newfoundland Club of America in 2013.

And Whereas, David Helming has been active in the American Kennel Club for many years as a breeder of Newfoundlands, Portuguese Water Dogs and Norwich Terriers.

Whereas, in 2005 he was elected AKC Breeder of the Year after being chosen as the AKC Working Group Breeder of the Year in 2002.

And Whereas, David Helming is an honorary member and past president of the Newfoundland Club of America, served as vice chairman of the NCA Charitable Trust Management Board, and currently serves as of the NCA's Delegate to the American Kennel Club.

And Whereas, he is a member of the Somerset Hills Kennel Club, Westchester Kennel Club, Kennel Club of Philadelphia, Westminster Kennel Club, and the Morris and Essex Kennel Club, and has served these clubs in various capacities including president, director, show chairman, and treasurer.

And Whereas, David Helming's leadership, knowledge and experience in matters pertaining to legislation and public policy have been of great value to the AKC PAC Board.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Directors of the American Kennel Club Political Action Committee honor David Helming's service and dedication to the American Kennel Club and its Political Action Committee and extend to him their grateful appreciation and best wishes for his future endeavors. Thank you, David.

Mr. Sprung: For your information, the Tuesday, September 10, 2019 Delegates meeting will be held here, at the Doubletree Newark Airport Hotel. The Conference and Travel Department will

place the hotel information on the Delegates Portal when our block of rooms becomes available.

Lunch will be served following this meeting on the Terrace, which is on this floor. Delegates are reminded to leave their badges at the registration desk following lunch. Is there further business to come before the body?

The Chair recognized Frances Stephens, Delegate for the Puyallup Valley Dog Fanciers, who spoke as follows:

Ms. Stephens: Good morning, group, I will make this brief. I'm Fran Stephens, Delegate for Puyallup Valley Dog Fanciers. If you will remember, many of you were here four years ago, our club treasurer absconded – we discovered had absconded with a large portion of our treasury. We fought hard and fast to get our county to file charges and pay attention to this, because while it wasn't an injury issue, physical, it was very painful for our club and we almost did not were not able to continue, but we were fortunate, and we did, and we fought with the county and we got the conviction. A year ago, she was convicted of felony theft and has to pay restitution. This is all well and good. AKC was notified. We filed charges. We were told we had to wait for the courts, which we kept AKC informed all the way along. A year ago, in April, when the judge made the final decision, and everything was wound up, we filed again with AKC and we sent all of the paperwork, the transcripts, everything. As yet, AKC has failed to act on this. She is still in good standing with AKC. Now, we have pushed, our President has called repeatedly. We were last told that it had been – it would be determined, and the results would be published in the May Gazette. It wasn't. Now she is saying oh, well, it will be in the June Gazette. Well, the Board members I have spoken with have not been aware that this has been brought before the Board. So, nothing has been done. It has been over a year. It is not a complicated issue. There is no legal issue because she has been found guilty by the courts. You know, we are frustrated because we depend on AKC to have our backs and it hasn't happened. So, I'm talking to board members personally and now I'm talking to everybody. Please, can we get some action? You know, we realize that having her suspended is not going to be a big issue for her because she is registering dogs under her mother's name, we know that, and we can't do anything more. She is having to pay restitution to us. We get a whole \$25 a month and she took nearly \$80,000 from us. So, you can understand why we are frustrated. This was not a small thing. This was a pretty major event and we were fortunate we were able to survive. But we would really like to have some action from AKC on this.

Mr. Sprung: You will have an answer shortly.

Ms. Stephens: Thank you, Dennis

Mr. Sprung: You're welcome.

The Chair recognized Sylvia Thomas, Delegate for the Kennel Club of Riverside, who spoke as follows:

Ms. Thomas: Sylvia Thomas, Kennel Club of Riverside, and Perspectives editor. First of all, I would like to thank everyone in this room for their faithful readership of Perspectives and your support. The June issue was very well received, as evidenced by the number of requests we received to reprint articles. And if you are interested in doing so, even though Perspectives is written by Delegates and intended for Delegates, we welcome the opportunity to share it with a wider audience. The procedure is quite simple. You send me an e-mail, tell me what article or

articles you are interested in reusing. I will seek the permission of the author, create a PDF, and send it to you for your use. This particular month we received requests which were approved to reprint - Carl Ashby and Carmen Battaglia's respective articles on Sustainability, Robin Foust's article on Service Dogs, Joyce Dandridge's article on Ring Stewarding, and Jon Green's wonderful article on FSS Open Shows, which will also be published in a future issue of the Gazette. We have so much to share with our members and we use Perspectives as one way of doing that. While I have your attention, if Geno Sisneros and Don James are in the room, would you please stand. You are not in trouble. Don was listed as the coordinator for the September issue but due to circumstances he is going to do December instead and Geno has graciously volunteered to be the coordinator for the September issue. So, send your articles to him. Our deadline is July 15, 2019. Finally, if you are dying to know the answer to who the wonderful little baby picture was in the June Perspectives, we did have a winner who guessed correctly, and Dick Blair, would you please stand. Dick is a winner in so many ways. But Dick is also the adorable baby in the picture. If you are interested in playing along with us for the September issue, if you would discretely send me a baby picture, you might be featured. Thank you.

I'm sorry, I just can't give up the mic. One more thing. I do have some hard copies of Perspectives with me. If anybody would like one of these to read on your plane ride, or don't read it in the car while you are driving, but I have some, just see me and I will give them to you. Thank you.

The Chair recognized Herman Tietjen, Delegate for the McKinley Kennel Club, who spoke as follows:

Mr. Tietjen: Mr. President, I'm Herman Tietjen from the McKinley Kennel Club. I wish to thank all of the dog people who made the nice comments on Facebook and elsewhere about the passing of my late wife. So, again, I greatly appreciate the outpouring of sympathy that was sent to me on her behalf. Thank you.

The Chair recognized Jeffrey Ball, Delegate for the Ramapo Kennel Club, who spoke as follows:

Mr. Ball: Jeffrey Ball, Ramapo Kennel Club. I just want to briefly say, give you a quick update, for those who don't know, we had our Lobby Day yesterday here in New Jersey. We took an approach, a very positive approach. We proposed a state dog and that state dog we proposed was a Collie, and we did that based on the history of the Collie in New Jersey. So, we went there, we took a vote on this at the federation, we brought it to the state legislators. Along with that we had AKC Reunite, they were kind enough to send Megan up from North Carolina. We also had some bills to address. We had 20 people show up. We met with 57 of the 120 legislators. We had legislators jumping on board sponsoring our Collie resolution, bipartisan already, so that is moving forward. AKC Reunite did a wonderful job. And we currently have four trailers. We had, with the assistance of the Philadelphia Kennel Club, two more confirmed - Ocean and Atlantic, so that brings up six. We are working on two others. Again, thank you to Philadelphia Kennel Club. But where I'm going with this is that we had a breeder of merit show up and say why don't more people do this, and my mouth just dropped and I looked at her, and I said do you really want to know? I said they don't believe in the importance of it. And she was the first one to say I didn't either, but it is completely opposite of what I thought. She said, the opportunity to speak to these legislators, the opportunity to educate them and make a difference is just amazing. You can do this at the local level. I mean, AKC now has established wonderful programs that we can utilize to reach out to the public. You are starting to see some of the positive. But it really needs to come from us even more so, and that is everyone here in

the room, you are the most knowledgeable, you are the most advanced people that AKC can utilize to reach the public, educate the public and bring them back to our side. So, if you're not doing it, you can't expect other people to do it. They are not going to do it for you. All this media is great, but it takes you. It takes you even working with your town, working with your county. When I have my county executives telling me, things like – I never realized the stuff about rescue, and fighting an argument with some of our new card members about the temperament issue, why it is important to have a purebred – I think where is this coming from? Then I realize it was me telling them 10,000 times that it sunk in. So, all of you are absolutely needed. If you are not involved at least on your local level, the county level or state level, don't expect other people to do it. You need to do it. We need you. As Delegates, lead the way for all your members and clubs. And I will be more than happy to share any of my little tricks I have learned with any of you. Thank you.

The Chair recognized Glenda Stephenson, Delegate for Space Coast Kennel Club of Palm Bay, who spoke as follows:

Ms. Stephenson: Glenda Stephenson, Space Coast Kennel Club of Palm Bay. As you all know, I'm from the sunshine state of Florida where we have lots of hurricanes and due to the animals being – getting lost due to hurricanes, I have always advocated the microchip. So, 11 or 12 years ago – there is an article this month in the end of Perspectives magazine, it is called *The Dreaded Telephone Call*. It is very emotional to me. Anyway, I microchipped the dog and off he went to his new home. Fortunately, the owners never changed their records, so I was the contact information for that dog. As in the article, I get a phone call from an animal shelter out in Texas and I ended up with my dog back. Recently, there was a Fun Match in town. I took my dog and I was able to meet with a veterinarian and collect sperm and to bring it round robin, I would like to thank Dr. Mary McDaniel for collecting on my dog, and she is a Delegate here today. Make sure you microchip. Share my story to anybody. If you have litters of dogs, microchip them and hopefully one will come home.

The Chair recognized Betty Winthers, Delegate for Olympic Kennel Club, who spoke as follows:

Ms. Winthers: Betty Winthers with the Olympic Kennel Club. I'm really proud to do a brag. This is our 75th Anniversary show, and we are having it over five days. We have Conformation, Obedience, Rally, Dock Diving, Agility, Disk Dog, Fast CAT and we are having three different group clubs to connect with us. So, we really are very proud of this event. I'm not sure I'm going to be able to beat Jeffrey's little old spiel. But, anyway, thank you.

The Chair recognized Dominic DiBalsi, Delegate for Lehigh Valley Kennel Club, who spoke as follows:

Mr. DiBalsi: Dominic DiBalsi, Lehigh Valley Kennel Club. Just a thought and observation from this go-round. A few days ago, seeing a lot of kids going through the hotel, maybe we would consider a fun program for the kids on the Sunday before the meeting, maybe like 2:30, 3:00 and one at 6:00, the AKC may want to sponsor something like that. Just a thought.

The Chair recognized Karen Gunzel, Delegate for Trenton Kennel Club, who spoke as follows:

Ms. Gunzel: Karen Gunzel, Trenton Kennel Club. In May of 2020 we will be hosting our 100th show and it will feature Conformation, Lure Coursing, Canine Good Citizen and Trick Dog. I hope you will join us. Thank you.

Mr. Sprung: Hearing nothing further, the meeting stands adjourned. Travel safely.
