MU AHEC PROGRAM EXPANSION OFFERS MORE OPPORTUNITY FOR UNDERGRADS INTERESTED IN RURAL MEDICINE

Since 1995, eligible undergraduate college students from rural areas in Missouri have been pre-admitted to medical school at MU. “Students with rural backgrounds are more likely to practice in these underserved areas when compared to their classmates from urban areas,” said Kathleen Quinn, Ph.D., associate dean for rural health and director of the MU Area Health Education Center. “Our Rural Track Program is uniquely positioned to support MU’s rural mission and benefit interested students by helping train and prepare them for practice in rural communities.” Pre-admitted students are required to achieve certain academic standards, demonstrate ongoing professional conduct and participate in required activities.

The University of Missouri School of Medicine recently expanded the Bryant Scholars Pre-Admissions Program to train more physicians to practice in rural areas of Missouri. Seven additional universities throughout the state were added, bringing the total number of eligible institutions to 13. Students from the following schools are currently eligible for the program:

In July, the University of Missouri School of Medicine accepted a new class of Bryant Scholars. Of the newly accepted students, three have been active participants in MAHEC programming since high school.

Hannah Ford from Osborn, Missouri, Shanon Luke from Stanberry, Missouri, and Traci Shipps from Maryville, Missouri have been actively involved with Northwest Missouri AHEC since high school. Over the next two years, all three students will participate in the Bryant Scholars Program to prepare them for matriculation to MU School of Medicine.

Currently, Hannah attends William Jewell College in Liberty, Shanon attends the University of Missouri in Columbia, and Traci attends Truman State University in Kirksville. With the expansion we hope to reach more rural students who have an interest in medicine.
