Conference Overview

Children and youth who have experienced abuse and neglect are at high risk for significant difficulties in their neurological, affective, cognitive, and behavioral development. Therapeutic and caregiving interventions based on attachment and neurobiology can create "safe relationships" where children and teens can develop a greater ability to regulate their emotions, resolve conflicts and traumatic experiences, and establish coherent narratives. In this day-long workshop, Dan will explore the principles and strategies of both psychological treatment and daily care which utilize an understanding of attachment, neurobiology and trauma. This model of intervention will be demonstrated with videos of treatment sessions.

Speaker's Biography



Dan Hughes, Ph.D. has spent over 40 years helping children and youth reach their full potential and reconnect with others in their lives. Dan has conducted seminars, workshops, spoken at conferences, and guest lectured throughout the US, Europe, Canada, and Australia over the past 18 years. Dan developed Dyadic Developmental Psychotherapy (DDP) along with an extensive certification program in DDP for therapists around the world. Dan has also authored many books including: Attachment-Focused Parenting (2009), Attachment-Focused Family Therapy Workbook (2011), Brain-Based Parenting (2012) and The Neurobiology of Attachment-Focused Therapy (2017) with Jon Baylin. His most recent work is Healing Relational Trauma with Attachment Focused Interventions: Dyadic Developmental Psychotherapy with children and families (2019) with Kim Golding and Julie Hudson.
