Members Keeping Busy

Many of you know Phil Zins from our clinics who has shown us his dedication to crafting tools and his painstaking detail to restoration of Model A parts.

Here you see him posed next to the NASA quality engine test stand he created and in it is the engine from the project car he has been working on. This engine was rebuilt and assembled to the short block stage at least 40 years ago by one of the early legends of the club, Mr. Chet Larson. Chet wrote most of the restoration manual that the club developed for it's members.

Phil after building the test stand assembled the engine to the long block stage and I was invited to what is

known as the moment of truth.

So on a nice summer night the engine was wheeled out into the driveway and Phil stepped over to the stand and opened the fuel flow, engaged the main power switch and set the throttle and spark advance to the starting positions. He then pressed firmly on the starter rod and the engine rolled over easily for 10 seconds or so and it did not catch. Trial two was another 10 seconds still not running. They say the third time is the charm, I ran over while Phil let it crank and pulled the choke and off it went. It came to life with little to no smoke and settled into a nice even rhythm. Phil was all smiles and began to monitor the temperature, oil and ammeter gauges.

After a 15 minute run and then a shut down a visual inspection revealed a small fuel line leak, oil pan gasket weeping a slight bit of oil and a small amount of liquid on two of the head stud bolts.

Phil let the engine cool down over night and re torqued the head bolts, oil pan gaskets and addressed the fuel leaks. He reports that the head bolts are no longer showing any moisture and that the oil pan leak has almost disappeared. He will continue with a few more heat cycles and further torquing of the head bolts and oil pan gaskets.

The next project he is directing his attention to is body work, upholstery and a small amount of wood replacement.

Ever see one of these ?

Here is a look at an extremely rare item, Richard Darling has a new Zenith mileage tester. It was was never used and it also came in the pictured original shipment box from the Ford Motor Company to the dealer. This testing tool was used to test gas mileage by hanging this unit on the car and with specific instructions of warming up the engine first and with other conditions of operation a known amount of gasoline was placed in this unit, the car then was driven a certain determined distance and a miles per gallon figure was determined. If needed the mechanics then looked to repair or adjust the carburetor as a first step in trying to increase a poor mileage figure. The Zenith carburetor was the design chosen for the production of the Model A. However due to supply issues and business /personal relationships with the Ford Motor company the Holley company was also building this design of carburetor to the Zenith companies engineering drawings. Richard is a wealth of information on the carburetors and the unique features that can identify them to judging standards. He meticulously rebuilds them and can explain the steps of rebuilding them the right way.

The cruise participants enjoyed the journey over the river and through the woods to Jethro's Big Guys BBQ Roadhouse in Hudson where Big Guys' signature meat raffle was worked by generous volunteers, and all had a great time. There was an incredible sunset on Friday night, and when the sun went down a whopping \$1,110.00 was collected by the car cruise participants and the meat raffle contributors to be forwarded to the Model A Youth Restoration Award to assist youth restoring their Model As by providing financial support for parts and supplies.

The Thursday tour was blessed with a perfect weather, Mild temps and a nice breeze. The Target parking lot was the starting point for the 10 Model A's, a Ford Falcon convertible and a modern car.

Ken Schindeldecker led the tour in Dick Zin's '31 coupe. I guess the old coupe just likes to lead tours, it's had a lot of practice.

Before leaving, we talked about our first point of interest. The B-52 bomber crash site from September 16, 1958. We drove by but did not stop at the memorial as parking is very limited and the road is "all no parking".

Next we drove some back roads to the site of the Rex Speedway dirt track which operated in Inver Grove Heights from 1949 – 1954. The track can still be seen though it is grown over.

We then drove a zig zag course avoiding road closures to the Gopher Ordinance Plant site east of Rosemount. Built during WWII to produce gunpowder for the U.S. Navy ships, it only was in operation for ten months when the war ended. The 11,000-acre site was then sold to the University of Minnesota and is used as a research farm. Several of the original 858 buildings are still in use.

We soon found a sign that read "Minimum Maintenance Road" travel at your own risk. This was 3 miles of narrow gravel road with trees arching over much of it.

We then headed to Castle Rock Township to see a Nike missile base built in 1959 during the cold war era. This was one of the four bases built to protect the Twin Cities from enemy attack. Closed in 1972, the base is now privately owned, but looks much as it did in the 60" s Our last stop was the Castle Rock Bar and Grill where we sat outside and enjoyed some good food, good friends and a beautiful evening. Only two minor breakdowns occurred that were remedied quickly. My coupe quit on me and Miles Lindberg saved the day by doing some kind of Voodoo ritual to my distributor and magically she fired right up and ran fine the rest of the tour.
