

This day began as an informal commemoration for those that lost their lives in the Civil War over 150 years ago. This started out as "Decoration Day" and now is known as Memorial Day, here are a few history facts of this day.

There were no Memorial Day events held in the States until late 1900's, but the practice of honoring those that had fallen in the battles goes back thousands of years to the Greeks and Romans that had a annual day of remembrance by placing flowers on graves of their loved ones including soldiers.

One of the earliest memorials was organized by recently freed slaves. Near the end of the Civil War when thousands of union soldiers were held as prisoners' of war were sent to several camps in South Carolina. One camp had 250 prisoners buried in a mass grave from disease or exposure, this gravesite is behind the grandstand of a formed Racetrack near the City of Citadel, S.C. More than a thousand recently freed slaves and U.S. Colored Troops, Massachusetts 54thInfantry and a handful of white citizens consecrated a proper burial site for these Union Soldiers. They distributed flowers around the cemetery and dedicated to the "Martyrs of the Race Course

General John A Logan a commander in chief of the Union veterans group issued a decree that May 30 should become a nationwide day to commemoration for more than 620,00 soldiers killed in the Civil War in May 1868. This day was chosen because it did not fall on an anniversary of a Civil War Battle, Logan dubbed it as Americans should lay flowers and decorations on the graves of the soldiers killed in war.

The Ladies Memorial Association in April 1886, across the south were gathering to decorate the graves of the Confederate soldiers.

There was not one standard day chosen with this observation but was spread out though Spring and early summer.

It did not become a federal holiday until 1971.

More than 27 states held a ceremony or event, at Arlington National Cemetery there were over 5000 people in attendance for Decoration Day. For over 50 years Memorial Day commemorate those killed in Civil War and no other American conflict until WWI that it expanded to include those killed in all Wars.

It was a long road from Decoration Day to an official Memorial Day. When Changed by the federal law the Uniformed Monday Holiday Act of 1968 went in to effect placing Memorial Day from its traditional observance of May 30th to the last Monday in May. This was not accepted by all, Veterans Groups were concerned that Americans would use this day as the first long week of the summer and not to honor our nations war dead.

There has been rivalry as to who celebrated this day first, Boalsburg, Penn claims in 1864 there was a gathering of women that mourned the ones killed in the Gettysburg. In Carbondale, Ill they are certain they held a parade in 1866 lead by John Logan who years later lead the charge for the holiday. Mississippi and Georgia have battled out for Memorial Day supremacy for decades.

Memorial Days have evolved over the years despite the increasing celebrations of holidays in the summer. On Memorial day the flag should be at half staff until noon, then raised to the top and encourage all to pause for a National Moment of Remembrance at 3PM local time. The government has also used this day to recognize non-veterans - Lincoln Memorial was dedicated Memorial Day 1922 and the Indy 500 has also become a tradition of its own on memorial day marking this the 102nd race to coincide with this holiday.

this Chair of Honor installed in their fa-Colorado cility. Springs is a great "military" town and it will be an honor and privilege for our group to have our first Chair installed there.



First POW*MIA Chair of Honor in Colorado dedicated on May 26th at Security Services Field, home of Colorado Springs Sky Sox and Milwaukee Brewers.





Welcome Home...

The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) announced that the remains of U.S. servicemen, unaccounted for since World War II, have been identified and are being returned to his family for burial with full military honors;

Marine Corps Reserve 1st Lt. William C. Ryan, Jr., 25, of Hoboken, New Jersey, was buried May 10 in Arlington National Cemetery, near Washington, D.C. On May 11, 1969, Ryan was the radar intercept officer of an F-4B aircraft, assigned to Marine Fighter Attack Force 115, Marine Aircraft Group 13, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, Fleet Marine Force Pacific, on a combat mission over



Savannakhet Province, Laos. While pulling out of a bombing pass, the aircraft was hit by enemy fire. The pilot lost control and called several times for Ryan, but received no response. The pilot ejected before the aircraft crashed, and other members of the flight only witnessed one parachute leave the aircraft. The location of the crash site precluded a search and recovery effort, but the pilot was rescued. Ryan was declared deceased as of May 11, 1969.

Navy Fireman 1st Class **William H. Kennedy**, 24, of Titonka, Iowa, was buried May 12 in his hometown. On Dec. 7, 1941, Kennedy was assigned to the USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Kennedy. No single vessel at Pearl Harbor, with the exception of the USS Arizona, suffered as many fatalities.

Army Cpl. Louis A. Damewood, 21, of Carroll County, Maryland, was buried May 12 in Suffolkk, Virginia. On February 13, 1951, Damewood was a member of Headquarters Company, 3rd Battalion, 38th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division, when he was reported missing in action. The unit was attacking a road block set up by opposing forces near Hoengsong, South Korea, when he was declared missing. In 1953, a returning American prisoner of war reported that Damewood had died in Changsong prisoner of war camp in June 1951. Based on this information, the U.S. Army declared him deceased as of June 13, 1951

Army Cpl. George A. Perreault, 20, of Burlington,

Vermont, was buried May 13 in his hometown. On Feb. 5, 1951, Perreault was a part of Support Force 21 and assigned to Headquarters Batterv. 15th Field Artillerv Battalion, 2nd Infantry Division, which was supporting Republic of Korean (ROKA) attacks against units of the Chinese People's Volunteer Forces (CPVF) in the area known as the Central Corridor in South Korea. On



the evening of February 11, the CPVF launched a massive counterattack against the ROKA regiment. The ROKA withdrew, leaving American units to fight alone at Changbong-ni, until they were forced to withdraw too. After enduring a sustained enemy attack, the Support Force abandoned Hoengsong and moved toward Wonju. Perreault never reported to Wonju and he was reported missing in action on Feb. 13, 1951...


This is one of many events in which our chapter is asked to perform this ceremony. We have performed the MMT Ceremony throughout Colorado and New Mexico.






