Sunday Message

THE WORD

In today's Gospel Jesus has a confrontation with the chief priests and the leaders of the people. He criticises them for being "yes men," whose fine words are not matched by fine deeds. They are great at making promises but not very good at living up to them.

Jesus uses a parable to make his point. A man has two sons. He asks both of them to work in his vineyard. The first says a blunt "no," but afterwards thinks better of it and changes his mind. The second says, "Certainly, sir," but then does not go at all. "Which of the two," Jesus asks his listeners, "did his father's will?" The answer is obvious; only one son was obedient to his father.

Jesus then explains the meaning of the parable. The son who refused but then reperted represents the tax collectors and prostitutes who listened to the preaching of John the Baptist, and accepted it. The other son represents the chief priests and the leaders of the people who did not listen to or accept John's preaching. They still did not listen to John even after seeing for themselves the wonderful transformation his preaching had brought about in the lives of the tax collectors and prostitutes.

The chief priests and religious leaders liked to boast about their goodness and their fidelity to God. They were big into outward plety and making the proper religious sounds but it was all only lip service because it was not matched by their actions. They failed to show true obedience to God.

There is a danger that sometimes we too can be like the chief priests and leaders of the people. We can say "yes" to God but be far away from him in our hearts. We can promise to live in obedience to him but fail to practice what we promise. Today's Gospel challenges us to look at how well we live out every day what we proclaim in church. It reminds us of our need for constant conversion.

REFLECT

ver since Eleanor Roosevelt more than 80 years ago, American First Ladies typically promote a cause or launch a campaign to which they commit the prestige of their office. In the 1960s, Ladybird Johnson focused on cleaning up the nation's highways; Betty Ford focused on substance abuse, Michelle Obama on education and healthy eating.

Nancy Reagan decided her focus would be the war on drugs. At the time, drug addiction was destroying numerous lives, as it continues to do. So she spearheaded a campaign that had a simple, snappy, easy to remember title: Just Say No. Her message to those tempted by illicit drugs was: Just say no. The campaign (and others like it) wasn't a huge success. Vulnerable people needed practical help and support in order to be able to just say no. They needed more than words or slogans or expensive advertising campaigns.

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells his followers they must not just say yes, but must back it up with concrete actions. He is telling us that if we are serious about following him, we must live the faith we profess. Words, no matter how pious, are not enough. We must go from church to world to transform the world by the kind of lives we live, because we are going to be judged by our deeds rather than by our words.

This makes our task all the more difficult, because we know it's easy to talk the talk; it's much harder to walk the walk.

As Christians, we mustn't just say yes. We must just show it. We must live it.

DO

Think about the major promises you have made in your life – the baptismal promises that were made on your behalf, the marriage or religious vows you professed, the commitments you have entered into. How well have you kept them? What do you need to do to be more faithful to them?

PRAY

To follow Christ faithfully is not easy. Pray for the strength to be faithful to your baptismal promises.
