THIS DATE IN HISTORY

April 4, 1959 In an address at Gettysburg College in Pennsylvania, President Eisenhower makes a commitment to maintain South Vietnam as a free and independent state. He asserts the "inescapable conclusion that our own national interests demand" U.S. support of South Vietnam.

April 11, 1963One hundred U.S. troops of the Hawaiian based 25th Infantry Division are sent to SouthVietnam to reinforce U.S. Army aviation units by serving as door gunners aboard Army H-21 helicopters.

April 24, 1965 President Johnson issues an executive order designating Vietnam a "combat area" and authorizes "hostile fire" pay, retroactive to January 1, 1964.

April 10, 1972 U.S. aircraft carriers Saratoga and Midway are ordered from Florida and California to join the four other carriers and warships already engaged in the bombardment of North Vietnam.

Camp Lejeune Vet Claims to Be Approved Faster for 8 Illnesses

The Marine Corps has begun outreach to hundreds of thousands of veterans who served at Camp Lejeune, NC at least 30 days from August 1, 1953 to December 31, 1987, inviting them or surviving spouses to file a VA compensation if veterans suffered one of eight ailments linked to water contamination on the base. On March 22 the Corps sent an email "blast" to more than 120,000 Lejeune veterans who had shared current online addresses on a registry created to identify and educate potential victims of polluted drinking water at Lejeune over a 34 year period. The email explained that veterans who can show they served during that time for 30 days or more are now eligible to file fast track VA disability compensation claims for eight conditions. The presumptive ailments for Lejeune vets are: adult leukemia, aplastic anemia and other myelodysplastic syndromes; bladder cancer; kidney cancer; liver cancer; multiple myeloma; non-Hodgkin's lymphoma; Parkinson's disease.

Arlington Faces Future Burial Issues On March 29 the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Military Construction and Veterans Affairs held a hearing to discuss current operations and concerns with shrinking space for future burials at the Arlington National Cemetery. Currently, Arlington is estimated to reach capacity around the year 2040 unless more space is added or eligibility is changed. This means a veteran from the 1991 Gulf War who lives to normal life expectancy would not have the option of being buried at Arlington. The Army and subcommittee members are looking for ways to keep Arlington open for new burials beyond 2040. Options discussed include: costly expansions, some of which would be annexes not physically connected to Arlington; changes of eligibility for burial in Arlington, which range from restricting eligibility for military retirees to reducing the amount of eligible veterans to those who have earned certain valor awards such as the Medal of Honor and service members who were killed in action.

H.R. 873 Global War on Terrorism War Memorial Act

The VFW Washington Office hosted a press conference March 28 to announce the introduction of H.R. 873, the Global War on Terrorism War Memorial Act, which is a necessary first step toward the building and placement of a GWOT Memorial in Washington, D.C. The VFW-supported bipartisan bill was sponsored by Rep. Mike Gallagher, R-Wisc., and Rep. Seth Moulton, D-Mass. Gallagher is a Life member of VFW Post 2037 in Green Bay, Wisc., and Moulton is a member of VFW Post 2005 in Marblehead, Mass. GWOT Memorial Founder and Executive Director Andrew Brennan is a Life member of VFW Post 3945 in Pittsburgh, Pa. VFW supports the creation of a GWOT Memorial by the passage of Resolution 302 at the 117th VFW National Convention in Charlotte, N.C.

35th Anniversary of Groundbreaking for Vietnam Veterans Memorial

March 26, 1982 was the groundbreaking for the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. So on March 26, 2017 there was a ceremony to commemorate the 35th anniversary. There was a wreath laying and remarks by Jan Scruggs and Bob Doubek. Scruggs is founder of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund and Doubek is the former Executive Director of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund. Bob Doubek wrote the book called Creating the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, the Inside Story.
