This is a heartwarming story about a young Guatemalan boy by the name of Luis. Luis had been badly burned on much of his chest and arm. He lived in a rather remote village, so only got some basic care.

Victor August, Chaplin of La Loma Luz Adventist Hospital heard about Luis' accident. Early in 2006 Victor, Ed & Ruth MacKenzie and Grant McPherson went to Guatemala to find Luis to see if it would be possible to have him come to LLL and be treated by a mission team. They were unable to find Luis so they left a message with a friend to bring Luis to the hospital.



We will let the mission team spokesman, Stephen King, senior vice president for mission and ministry for Colorado's Adventist hospitals pick up the story from here.

"Like any small boy would have been, Luis was oblivious to the danger. While picking up a kerosene lamp, he accidentally tipped it over, spilling hot fuel over a large portion of his chest and arm. The burns were horrible, and the Guatemalan youngster initially received only the most basic of care.

"A year later, when a group of healthcare volunteers sponsored by Denver's four Adventist hospitals met him during a mission trip to Belize, his arm hung uselessly by his side, fused to his body in a web of scar tissue.

"Luis and his parents had heard about the medical team's visit, and traveled from their village to La Loma Luz Adventist Hospital, hoping for help.

"'I felt awful for the poor boy,' says Jane Preston, an intensive care nurse from Avista Adventist Hospital. 'He couldn't lead a normal life.'

"Soon Luis was in surgery, and the expert hands of Dr. William Saber, a plastic surgeon, worked to free the boy's arm and apply skin grafts. It was a painstaking task, and only time would tell if it had been successful. With the rest of her colleagues, Preston watched and waited, praying for a miracle.

"A few days after Luis' surgery, Preston stood once again in Luis' hospital room, surrounded by his family and other mission team members. The boy sat stoically as Dr. Saber slowly peeled back the bandages.

"On the surgeon's instruction, Luis lifted his arm, raising it above his head for the first time since the accident. Though in obvious pain, a massive grin spread across his face, and the room erupted in applause. 'It was the best feeling of the whole trip,' recalls Preston.

"A month later, Luis was back in his village, exploring a new world of possibility that had seemed far beyond his reach. Not long ago, word filtered back to America that he had been baptized into the Seventh-day Adventist Church."

Pioneer Report from Zambia

Here is a beautiful conversion story from one of our new Pioneers. Thank you for your support!

After being trained at Riverside Farm as an Evangelist, Luckson Mseteka had a burden for souls. His father did not want him to study as an evangelist; he was prepared to pay for Luckson's studies at a secular college but not as an evangelist. So Luckson came to Riverside without money. He worked in the banana plantations for his studies.

When the course had finished, Riverside decided to employ him as a Bible Pioneer. But first he came to my office for a request. He had not seen his parents for two years. I granted his request and gave him some money for travel. He travelled to the eastern part of Zambia to spend a month with them.

Luckson was the only Seventh-dayAdventist in his family. His parents were Pentecostal believers. His burden was to share his faith with them during the month's visit. Arriving at his parents' home village, he found them having prayers every night in the Pentecostal way of worshiping and speaking in tongues. He told them he would like to change the worship style to Bible study. They agreed and he studied many topics with them faithfully every night.

After a while he decided to also introduce the Sabbath message to them. Luckson saw that it caused confusion in the family. He changed the subject to "Why we suffer when God keeps on telling us he loves us." Suddently, before closing this study, his dad felt a pain in his stomach. It became worse. He could not eat. He started crying of pain and thought he is going to die. He had never felt like this in his life before.

Luckson was wondering why this was happening. The family wanted to take him to a traditional healer and a nearby hospital. He advised them not to do it, but pointed them to God as the only true Healer.

"I am going to pray for Dad", he suggested. His family was very sceptical and told him that they have never seen a Seventh-dayAdventist perform a miracle healing. It only happens in their church. "God is going to heal Dad", he insisted in faith.

Luckson kneeled down and prayed for his father with his Bible on his stomach. While praying, his Dad felt the pain move like a stone in his stomach and slowly subsided. He was healed from that moment onward. His family was stunned and praised God!

Luckson continued with the Bible studies and now felt confident to share the Sabbath truth. This time they listened carefully. They acknowledged that they were sinning by not keeping all Gods' commandments. Luckson assured them that God forgives them. The rest of his extended family in the nearby villages also accepted the truth and starting to visit the nearby SeventhdayAdventist church. Now all his family members go to church and desire to know more.

The story does not end here. During his secondary school training one of his uncles became a strong Seventh-dayAdventist. After finishing grade 12, Luckson decided to study as an evangelist at Riverside Farm, but his uncle did not know about it. He thought Luckson went for secular training. Luckson decided also to visit his uncle.

On his arrival at his uncle's village, he found his uncle smoking. Ignorant of Luckson's training as an evangelist, he asked Luckson to go and buy him beer; he had backslidden. He was surprised to see Luckson with a Bible. Then Luckson invited him for Bible studies. The Holy Spirit was working on his uncle's heart. He started confessing his sins to Luckson, but he directed his uncle to a God that forgives our sins.

The next evening a calamity struck. His uncle's house burnt down! Fortunately the family escaped to safety. His uncle was humbled. God spoke to him.

"God sent you to me to bring me back to him", was his reply. Not only the family of his uncle but also other members who have backslidden heard about the incident and turned from their wicked ways. The local church has revived and is getting full. Now what the church needs is someone to nurture it.

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Living Water at La Loma Luz

Well, (no pun intended!) we hopefully will have a well in the near future! Gary Bartholomew should be arriving any day now with his drilling rig to start drilling a well for La Loma Luz Adventist Hospital!

Grant spent some time with an aerial photographer who took pictures of the property. They were then sent to a Geologist in the United States who specializes in locating drilling sites so that a favorable site can be chosen in which to drill. Please keep this project in your prayers. The city water we currently use, does not meet Ministry of Health standards quality.

We have dug two previous wells, the first well was SO contaminated, even at 280 feet, that it was unusable, and the second one caved in while drilling, and was not able to be finished. So, we need your prayers and support for this third well we are undertaking. God knows our needs more than we do. His people are ALWAYS in His best interest, so it is, that we drill this well, to take better care of the people that come here for healing!

May the Lord richly bless each home that this newsletter reaches, and may we all prepare for that day when Jesus will come and take us home, out of this old sinful world! May we do our part in preparing for that day, by sharing the "Living Water" of the Good News of His Second Coming, with all whom we come in contact.
