## Wheelchair Skills: Important Considerations When Choosing a Wheelchair

## **Description:**

Wheelchair stability and wheelchair mobility have long been at odds with one another. There are at least three approaches that can be used to overcome these tradeoffs – improve accessibility, improve wheelchair design and improve wheelchair skills training.
