Commander's Message





Just before 8 a.m. on December 7, 1941, hundreds of Japanese fighter planes attacked the American naval base at Pearl Harbor near Honolulu, Hawaii. The barrage lasted just two hours, but it was devastating: The Japanese managed to destroy nearly 20 American naval vessels, including eight enormous battleships, and almost 200 airplanes. More than 2,000 Americans soldiers and sailors died in the attack, and another 1,000 were wounded. The day after

the assault, President Franklin D. Roosevelt asked Congress to declare war on Japan; Congress approved his declaration with just one dissenting vote. Three days later, Japanese allies Germany and Italy also declared war on the United States, and again Congress reciprocated. More than two years into the conflict, America had finally joined World War II.

The attack on Pearl Harbor was a surprise, but Japan and the United States had been edging toward war for decades. The United States was particularly unhappy with Japan's increasingly belligerent attitude toward China. The

Japanese government believed that the only way to solve its economic and demographic problems was to expand into its neighbor's territory and take over its import market; to this end, Japan had declared war on China in 1937. American officials responded to this aggression with a battery of economic sanctions and trade embargoes. They reasoned that without access to money and goods, and especially essential supplies like oil, Japan



would have to rein in its expansionism. Instead, the sanctions made the Japanese more determined to stand their ground. During months of negotiations between Tokyo and Washington, D.C., neither side would budge. It seemed that war was inevitable. But no one believed that the Japanese would start that war with an attack on American territory. For one thing, it would be terribly inconvenient: Hawaii and Japan were about 4,000 miles apart. For another, American intelligence officials were confident that any Japanese attack would

take place in one of the (relatively) nearby European colonies in the South Pacific: the Dutch East Indies, for instance, or Singapore or Indochina. Because American military leaders were not expecting an attack so close to home, the naval facilities at Pearl Harbor were relatively undefended. Almost the entire Pacific Fleet was moored around Ford Island in the harbor, and hundreds of airplanes were squeezed onto adjacent airfields. To the Japanese, Pearl Harbor was an irresistible target.

For God and Country

The Japanese plan was simple: Destroy the Pacific Fleet. That way, the Americans would not be able to fight back as Japan's armed forces spread across the South Pacific. On December 7, after months of planning and practice, the Japanese launched their attack.

At about 8 a.m., Japanese planes filled the sky over Pearl Harbor. Bombs and bullets rained onto the vessels moored below. At 8:10, a 1,800-pound bomb smashed through the deck of the battleship USS Arizona and landed in her forward ammunition magazine. The ship exploded and sank with more than 1,000 men trapped inside. Next, torpedoes pierced the shell of the battleship USS Oklahoma. With 400 sailors aboard, the Oklahoma lost her balance, rolled onto her side and slipped underwater. By the time the attack was over, every battleship in Pearl Harbor–USS Arizona, USS Oklahoma, USS California, USS West Virginia, USS Utah, USS Maryland, USS Pennsylvania, USS Tennessee and USS Nevada–had sustained significant damage. (All but USS Arizona and USS Utah were eventually salvaged and repaired.)

In all, the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor crippled or destroyed 18 American ships and nearly 300 airplanes. Dry docks and airfields were likewise destroyed. Most important, almost 2,500 men were killed and another 1,000 were wounded.

But the Japanese had failed to cripple the Pacific Fleet. By the 1940s, battleships were no longer the most



important naval vessel: Aircraft carriers were, and as it happened, all of the Pacific Fleet's carriers were away from the base on December 7. (Some had returned to the mainland and others were delivering planes to troops on Midway and Wake Islands.) Moreover, the Pearl Harbor assault had left the base's most vital onshore facilities—oil storage depots, repair shops, shipyards and submarine docks—intact. As a result, the U.S. Navy was able to rebound relatively quickly from the attack.


ADOPT A JOB CORPS STUDENT FOR CHRISTMAS





Legionnaire Bion Acton



Bion J Acton, born March 6, 1923, enjoyed a full and happy life of 91 years, when, on October 29, 2014, he passed peacefully to eternal rest.

Born the only child to Fred J. and Vivian Simmons Acton, Bion was raised and spent his entire life in Guthrie, OK. As a student, he played baritone for the Guthrie Blue jays Band, worked in the pro shop at the Guthrie Golf and Country Club (for \$.50 a day!), and played on the high school golf team. His passion for golf lasted a lifetime.

Bion attended Central State University (now UCO) and the University of Oklahoma, where he graduated with a degree in Business Administration. College was interrupted by WWII, during which he served as a Tech Sergeant in the 26th infantry division in an office in France. He liked to tell his children that he didn't carry a gun in the army; he carried a typewriter! Bion returned from his military service in 1946, finished his degree and married Betty Jean Tippit in Muskogee in 1947. They settled in his home town of Guthrie where they raised their 4 children.

Bion has always been very proud of his hometown and participated in every way he could in the community. He was involved with the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Guthrie Chamber of Commerce and the Rotary Club. He served as a board member for Guthrie Public Schools, Logan County Historical Society and the Logan Hospital Foundation. He served as a director at First Capital Bank, was a member of Masonic Lodge #35, American Legion LeBron Post 58 and the VFW. He served as a past President and board member of the Guthrie Golf & Country Club and was a member of the First Christian Church of Guthrie. He was a strong supporter and promoter of the Pollard Theater and a quiet donor of trees to Guthrie public parks and cemetery through The Tree Bank in OKC.

Legionnaire Bill G. Wagoner



Bill Wagoner was born on September 29, 1928 in Oklahoma City, OK, to Elbert and Mary (Bivert) Wagoner. He graduated from Luther High School in 1945. He served in the U.S. Army and then attended Central State University in Edmond where he received a B.S. Degree in Business Education and M.S. Degree in Administration.

He also completed 32 hours in Administration at Oklahoma State University. He taught at Enterprise, Kansas in 1953-54 and then at Guthrie High School, 1954-1966 as a Business Education teacher and was the first School Counselor employed by Guthrie High School. He also was an Elementary Principal, Assistant Superintendent of Schools and became Superintendent of Schools from 1968-1986 when he retired. Bill also spent four years from 1987-1991 as Basic Education Manager at Guthrie Jog Corps.

Bill served in many organizations in Guthrie: Lion's Club, Albert Pike Lodge 162, Guthrie Scottish Rite, American Legion, United Way, Guthrie All Sports Association attended the First Christian Church. Bill remained active even in his retirement years and received many awards for his work with youth and others.

He served in the American Legion LeBron Post 58 as 1st Vice Commander before stepping down to 2nd Vice Commander and director of Boy/Girls State. He was very active in raising money for Boys/Girls State and assisted transporting all the boys to the camp. He was a major pillar here at the American Legion and will greatly be missed.
