There's a new face at the DCCW Convention head table this year.

On Friday, August 13th our DCCW President, Becky Colombo, announced the Bishop's appointment of Father Ariel Durian as Spiritual Advisor of the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women. Father Durian replaces Father Rene Rodillas, who passed away January 8, 2020.

According to the July 19, 2019 *Intermountain Catholic*: "Father Ariel F. Durian, C.S., was born in the Philippines. He speaks Filipino, English and Spanish. A member of the Missionaries of St. Charles Scalabrinians of the Province of Saint John the Baptist, he was ordained on June 17, 2005 for the Scalabrinian missionaries. For one year he served in Quezon City, the Philippines. He then moved to California, where he served six years

in Sun Valley. From 2012 to 2018 he was pastor of Holy Rosary Church in Kansas City, Mo."

In the Fall of 2018 he was named parochial vicar of St. Mary of the Assumption Parish in Park City and also served St. Lawrence Mission in Heber. In August, 2019 he became administrator of St. Peter Parish in American Fork.

As our Spiritual Advisor, Fr. Durian will attend DCCW board meetings, participate in the discussions, and provide guidance to the board on spiritual matters. He will attend DCCW Conventions, as well as NCCW Conventions when possible.



"God doesn't call the qualified, He qualifies the called."

Bishop Solis shared that quote from Mark Batterson with us during the DCCW Executive Board's annual pastoral visit with him in 2019. We were discussing our leadership roles and those in all areas of Church service, and his point was well taken. Humbly, he believed that God had to qualify him when he was called to be the 10th Bishop of the Diocese of Salt Lake City.

Our Bishop demonstrated faith and trust in God. God the Father knows what is best for us; He gently guides us to accomplish His plan for us. As we pray, we should pause and be quiet, listen, and follow His promptings. Other times, it seems, He sends an angel - often in disguise - to drop hints (or even strong suggestions!). And sometimes circumstances align that we can't ignore that guide us to get involved, participate, and perhaps, lead. This often happens when we least expect it, or when it is not what we believe to be the perfect time, or when we think we are not ready.

Opportunities for involvement in the Church for the laity are varied and abundant. The *United States Catholic Catechism for Adults* states that "God's people share in Christ's kingly mission, which is to lead others through loving service to them.... Actions of such service can point to Christ's Kingdom of love, justice, mercy, and salvation to all persons.... We are also called to a life of service to the Church herself. Servant leadership is a responsibility of all God's people within their differing roles and responsibilities." (p. 118) One of those "differing roles" is a leadership position within your parish, deanery, or diocesan Council of Women; in fact, the mission statement of Diocesan Council of Catholic Women emphasizes the areas of spirituality, leadership, and service, echoing the *Catechism*.

The DCCW's nominating committee will be activated this month and will be looking for qualified candidates for the offices of First Vice President/President Elect, Second Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer to be elected in April 2022. The commission chairs (spirituality, leadership, service, and legislative) are chosen by the newly



elected president. Most deanery and parish Councils of Women elect their leaders in the spring or early fall. So please, if you have been thinking of making a difference on any level of Council through a leadership position, let someone know, or take the step and offer your name for consideration. Get involved and stay involved! Your service through membership or leadership will make a difference and will be welcomed and appreciated.

ROBERT'S RULES.....I know many of you reading this are thinking you have no interest in Robert's Rules and all that formal parliamentary "stuff". But, they are necessary and whether you're going to a meeting or conducting a meeting you should be informed. Robert's Rules should be the parliamentary authority noted in all bylaws. What isn't spelled out in your bylaws and standing rules can be researched in Robert's Rules. Basically, Roberts Rules is a guide meant to make organizations and meetings run smoothly and effectively. They insure every member has equal rights in determining the course of the organization.

Did you know a new **12th version of** *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* was released last September? (Darn if I didn't just buy the 11th edition a few months before when I accepted the parliamentarian position.) The Spring 2021 *Catholic Women Magazine* (*Vol.47 No.1*) highlighted a few of the 89 changes, deletions, or clarifications of the rules. They are also summarized on the Roberts Rules website: <u>https://robertsrules.com/wp-content/uploads/2020/08/CHANGES-IN-12TH-ED-Adopted-by-Authorship-Team-SG-v2.pdf</u> I have to say the one change I am most anxious to checkout is the larger page size. Does this mean larger print?? Perhaps this means I'll no longer have to wear two pairs of readers!! For those who want a more basic book, I suggest the new **3rd edition of** *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised in Brief,* which was released at the same time. In fact, I just ordered it. If you prefer electronic media, both of these new editions are available as an e-book.

RESOLUTIONS: Each year during the business session on Sunday we vote on resolutions for the upcoming year. You know, they're the where—as and be it resolves. The parliamentarian is responsible for putting them together with input from other board members. Writing resolutions is totally new to me. I've been gathering information, reviewing our speaker's topics, talked to our DCCW president on her focus for the upcoming year, and will be looking at what resolutions will be presented at the NCCW convention. Realizing we only have seven months until our 2022 convention, once these 2021 resolutions are voted, it is our hope that our parish and deanery affiliates will follow-through and take action on a few of them.

Becoming parliamentarian is a position I never saw myself in, even after being DCCW president. But, like Casey Pond referenced in her article, God is going to send you places you don't feel qualified to go. **If you've read this far**,

- Rescue Mission's Women's Center-Wasatch Deanery Full sized hygiene products, cleaning products, trash bags


It has been alarming as well as disheartening with the Covid-19 Delta variant and how contagious it is. There has been much controversy about mask mandates and whether we should be masking up again. There are many people who do not want to be vaccinated for various reasons.

In a message to Americans, from The Associated Press on 8/18/21 Pope Francis says getting vaccinated is "An Act of Love." They issued a public service announcement insisting that vaccines are safe and effective. This video message was aimed at a global audience but directed at the Americas. Pope Francis said, "Vaccination is a simple but profound way of promoting the common good and caring for each other, especially the most vulnerable." As per the article; "The Vatican has declared that it is morally acceptable for Catholics to receive Covid-19 vaccines, including those based on research that used cells derived from aborted fetuses". Pope Francis had emphasized from the start of the pandemic, the need to ensure equal access to the vaccine, especially for the poor. "There has been "increasing skepticism about vaccines among religious conservatives, the Vatican has vowed an all-out effort to overcome hesitancy and encourage widespread vaccination".

According to Jean Hill's Prayer & Action Network article, with the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program, (DACA) provided a temporary reprieve from deportation and gave 600,000 immigrants legal authorization to work. Under DACA, 9,000 Utahns were able to lead lives of dignity, working, going to school, and living without fear of deportation back. 2021 is the 20th anniversary since the first Dream Act which was co-sponsored by former Utah Senator Orrin Hatch. In March 2021, HR 6: The Dream and Promise Act 2021 is a bill to create an accessible roadmap to citizenship for certain immigrants including Dreamers, DACA recipients and TPS holders, Temporary Protected Status. As per the article, the DACA began as a temporary fix to a broken immigration system. The latest action was a Judiciary Hearing on June 15, 2021. Please contact your U.S. Senators to support this bill to help citizens live a more stable and secure life.

It is our civic and spiritual responsibility as Catholics to help promote the common good and protect the environment by encouraging our national and local leaders to best support our nation's infrastructure and economic recovery. We need to advocate for working across the aisle and commit to climate and energy policy, prioritize job creation for the poor and marginalized. Americans need safe, decent and affordable housing and enacting economic policies that strengthen families. It is our Catholic faith which compels us to protect the dignity and sanctity of life.

Please remember to become involved as a Catholic to share your views with legislators so they understand how you expect them to vote on various issues which impact God's earth as air quality, climate change, abortion, immigration issues and healthcare. Let us continue to pray for our local and national leaders to be successful so we can be more unified as a community and a country.

And be less quick to anger and show appreciation more and love the people in our lives like we've never loved before.


If we treat each other with respect and more often wear a smile... remembering that this special dash might only last a little while.


Most Councils could not have meetings early on, but the Presidents would call their members, tried Zoom meetings, and once allowed with social distancing held in person meetings.


