ur high holidays are over, and what a season it was. Beautiful services, inspiring words of Torah, and a Simchas Torah celebration with over 150 in attendance. Yet now it will be months until our next holiday. This is a period so devoid of celebration that the Hebrew month between the holidays has a nickname-mar Cheshvan,

bitter Cheshvan.
Notwithstanding a
Thanksgiving turkey
dinner (or as is the
tradition in my family,
Chinese take-out), it's a
long way until potato
latkes. On a more serious
note, with Hannukah so

far away how do we

build upon the momentum of the holidays to enrich our Jewish lives even further.

The *Beit Yosef*, author of the Code of Jewish Law, writes in the name of his brother Rabbi Yehudah that the three festivals *Pesach*, *Shavuot*, and *Sukkot* correspond to the patriarchs Avraham, Yitzchak, and Yaakov. How so? When the angels visited Avraham, he told Sarah, "Hurry! Three *se'ahs* of meal, fine flour! Knead it and make cakes!" (Genesis 18:6). According to great commentator Rashi the visit took place on *Pesach* and the cakes she baked were actually *matzot*. Since it was *Pesach*, he

wanted her to prepare the dough and not the servants so she might guard against leavening. *Shavuot* commemorates the giving of the Torah and corresponds to Yitzchak because the receiving of the Torah was heralded by the blast of the *shofar*, which according to a Midrash came from the very ram which, at the *akeidah*/binding of Isaac, was offered in Isaac's

stead.

Sukkot is for Yaakov, as the pasuk says, "Yaakov journeyed to Sukkot and built himself a house, and for his livestock he made shelters; he therefore called the name of the place 'Sukkot'" (ibid. 33:17). The name

Why Be Bitter? Be Better!

"Yaakov" spelled in Hebrew has the numerical value of one hundred and eighty-two. Since *Sukkot* is in his honor, in Temple times one hundred and eighty-two sacrifices were offered during the festival.

Furthermore, each of the patriarchs were the archetype of an essential Jewish trait. Yaakov, who is the Patriarch of Sukkos, is described in the Torah as "A wholesome man, abiding in the tents" and thus the archetype of Torah study.

During the saga of Chanukah the Syrian Greeks endeavored to detach the Jews from

any families have a great custom on Thanksgiving: They go around their table and each person has to name at least one thing they are thankful for. I have stated in prior articles in The Scroll that, of all the secular holidays in the calendar, Thanksgiving is one that I believe is most incumbent on every Jew to celebrate. My one disagreement is that I think Thanksgiving should be each and every day. Not in terms of turkey and football. Rather, we should find one thing each and every day that we look to Hashem and give thanks for.

In the not too distant past, Jews around the world could be said to have little to be thankful for. As World War II raged, millions were taken, victims of the ultimate hatred that was the essence of Nazi philosophy. Here in the United States, where the Jewish community sat physically safe from the ravages of the European war, efforts to awaken the American government to its basic human duty to try and impede the massacre were thwarted by the base antisemitism of the US State Department and none other than a leader of American Jewry by the name of Rabbi Stephen Wise. *The Algemeiner Journal* had this to say:

Wise called President Franklin Delano Roosevelt 'Boss' or 'Chief,' and advised President Franklin Roosevelt not to meet with the 400 Orthodox Rabbis that marched on Washington in 1943. To protect their self-interests, Dr. Zohar Segev of Haifa University says Wise and his colleagues "worked actively to tone down any Jewish criticism of the Roosevelt administration." They "used their influence to restrain, limit, and control any efforts towards greater activism." They wanted to maintain the liberal status quo. (Torossian, Ronn. *The Algemeiner*, "The Shameful Legacy of Rabbi Stephen Wise".

Nowadays, I do not think that most of us can conceive of the fear and angst of those days. The world was in flames and people were dying by the millions. Families were being destroyed and our nation's legacy was disappearing in the death camp ovens of Auschwitz, Treblinka, Sobibor, Majdanek, Belzec and Chelmno, not to mention countless concentration camps as well. I have tried to imagine the frustration of the leaders of the Jewish communities who were aware of the terrible destruction taking place and yet were powerless to affect any change. May Hashem preserve us from ever seeing such a situation again.

The war ended over 71 years ago and my intent in bringing this up is not to remind us of past tragedies and to mar the joy of the Thanksgiving holiday. On the contrary, it is intended to remind us just how much we have to be thankful for. In the wake of the greatest human disaster ever to befall not only the Jewish people but the entire world, miracles happened. The world's perennial anti semitism was suspended for a brief second and the United Nations, today a bastion of anti semitic policies and pronouncements, voted for the creation of the State of Israel. From the most modest of beginnings, aided by the United States, our beloved Holy Land is now a thriving nation that leads the world in technology, medicine, agriculture and so many other areas. Despite being outnumbered by her enemies many times over, she is here and stands proud in the face of abject and violent hatred from all corners of the Earth.

Here in the United States, we live in the freest, most prosperous nation on earth. Despite our difficulties, and the United States has many, we still live in a land that has been Israel's

staunchest ally regardless of any denizen of the White House. We are able to freely practice our religion and we reside in a sanctuary against oppression around the world.

I would argue that Jews today have much to be thankful for.

Yes, there is much to be concerned about. Anti semitism is on the rise around the world. In some areas of Europe, it is not safe for a Jew to walk with a *yarmulka* without possibly being attacked. Radical Islamic Terrorism is a scourge that is a blight on the world and there is great concern about how the United States is, can, and should be fighting this existential threat.

Still, I look at our current presidential election cycle and I have to admit I see something very special. You see, most people I have spoken to about this election cycle have asked a very simple yet powerful question: Out of over 300 million citizens in the United States, these two candidates are the best we can come up with?? I have to say that I agree with that sentiment. Still, I think that is the point. There is no way that something like this can happen on its own. Of all the talented people in politics on both sides of the aisle, that these two people have made it to the top of their respective tickets strikes me as nothing more than divine intervention. To put it bluntly, I think *Hashem* is sending us a clear message: he is the one in charge.

To me, this indicates a clear call to action. We must acknowledge that, at the end of the day, *Hashem* is the ultimate arbiter of what is to be. However, we also have a responsibility to show our gratitude to *Hashem* and to this great nation that has given us a home. How? It is not by cooking massive turkeys and consuming vast quantities of food and drink. The greatest thing we can do to show our simple gratitude is to become informed citizens and then, when the time comes, to exercise the right to vote. Note

that I am not telling you whom to vote for. That is, and must always remain, a personal decision. But you have to educate yourself and then show up and vote. If you do not like either candidate, and cannot choose a lesser of the two evils, write someone in. But show up. By taking the time to be informed of all the issues, weighing them, making a decision and then showing up to register that decision in the form of a vote, you are showing *Hashem* that you are willing to do your *hishtadlut* (personal effort) to better your country, and you are showing your country that you care enough to take the time to make and register an informed decision. Once you have done that, the rest is in the capable hands of the *Ribino Shel Olam* (Master of the World).

I would also like to make one other suggestion. When you sit down to your Thanksgiving dinner, consider bringing an *Artscroll Siddur* with you. Open it up to the Prayer for the Government and recite it at your table.

I thank *Hashem* every day for the United States of America. May He continue to shower His blessings on this great nation, grant wisdom to her leaders and may she ever be prosperous and at peace.



Torah study, which is compared to light. *Chanukah*, the Festival of Lights, is thus the holiday in which we celebrate our renewed opportunity to engage in Torah study. Thus, as we leave Sukkot, the festival associated with Yaakov (the prototype of Torah), it is the study of Torah that carries us through the "bitter" Cheshvan, and from Sukkos to Chanukah.

At Shaarey Israel we have many opportunities over the next two months to advance our connection to Torah. Beginning November 28th, I will be presenting a course entitled "Three Jews, Four Movements" which explores how we got

from a single Jewish people to the multiplicity of expressions of Jewish life we see today, along with some suggestions for how our people might develop further. Also in November is our first installment of the Crash Course in Hebrew Reading, a five-session primer that will have anyone reading fluently in no time at all. If you missed it this time around, keep your eyes open for the future. We also study Mishnah every evening at 8 o'clock before our services, and each Wednesday night at 7:30 Lila Stern presents her long-running Jewish Appreciation class. The weather is getting colder, and it might be a long time until the next holiday, but why be bitter when we can be better!



THE ALEPH BETS OF HEBREW by Bill Bradin

Hebrew is not such a difficult egg to crack. Each month, I plan to try and define Hebrew words and expressions that we commonly use in our daily vernacular.

which is pronounced **ah-lee-yah**. If pronounced correctly, the emphasis should be on the 3rd syllable.

The word **Aliya** is most commonly used when we are being called up to the Torah. The root of the word **Aliya** is from the infinitive **La'alote** and means to go up. Depending upon the preposition that is used after the word helps define the meaning of the word. When one goes up to the Bima for an honor, he is elevating himself both spiritually and physically.

The Hebrew language is built on 3 letter roots (shoresh/im). The root for **Aliya** is (**ayin-lamed-hay**). The word "**oleh**", which in this case is a verb, and is used whenever we go up <u>on</u> something such as a ladder. The word "**Oleh**", when used as a noun, refers to one who makes the move to live in Israel.

In Hebrew and in Judaism when one is called up to the Torah. This is called **Aliya LaTorah**. **Aliya** is also the action of fulfilling the mitzvah of moving to our Jewish Homeland in the State of Israel. In English, we call that making **Aliya**. In truth, one does not "make" **Aliya**. They just **Oleh** to Israel.

Coming out of the Tishrei Holiday season, it is interesting to know that if one lives in Israel or "oleh" to Israel, he/she is only obligated to observe one day of the three festivals on both ends.

You see, Aliya has its benefits.






